



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
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## Farwell Steers Stampede Happy Cowboys, 67 - 6




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
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
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## Texico Wolverines Pluck Eagle Feathers

Texico Wolverines plucked the Vaughn Eagles in Texico's homecoming bout Friday, Sept. 17, with a final score 48-0.

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
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## Wolverine Of The Week



Mrs. Burris said she used to travel a lot but now has reached the point where she would almost rather stay home. "The twin cities are like two big families. You can not find people like them anywhere else," she exclaimed.

Besides all her other interests, hobbies and activities. this homemaker works at the drug store in Farwell. She has worked there for 13 years and "enjoyed every moment of it." Mrs. Burris explained that she helps out in all aspects of the store. "I just do whatever needs doing," she said.

She began her first venture into canning about six weeks ago and has successfully filled a large Lazy Susan with a variety of jars, including eight gallons of pickles and 60 pints of beans. Mrs. Ford has also prepared and frozen 100 packages of corn. In order to prevent the corn from getting freezer burns she does not blanche it. Instead, she seasons it, cooks it down, cools it and then places it in packages for freezing.

Canning is not Mrs. Ford's only "talent". She drew the plans for her home because she had never had enough storage space. She does her own yardwork and looks after her own garden. The local woman describes herself as a "country girl" and says she loves to do her own gardening. Much of what Mrs. Ford canned came from her own patch of earth in her back

> SWEET CUCUMBER PICKLES [15 Day Variety]

1 T. stick cinnamon

Wash and cut enough cucumbers in chunks to make 2 gallons, place the cut cucumbers in a stone jar and pour 1 gallon boiling water (in which you have dissolved 2 cups salt) over them.

Let stand one week, skimming every day or two. On the eighth day, drain and again cover with 1 gallon of boiling water. Let stand 24 hours. On the ninth day, add the third gallon of boiling water after first draining other off and add 1 tablespoon powdered alum and let stand for 24 hours. On 8 c. sliced yellow squash cut the 10th day, drain and pour on

another gallon of boiling water. 1 T. pickling salt Let stand overnight.

On the 11th day, drain and place in clean jar and add hot syrup and spices to suit taste. On the 12th, 13th and 14th day, drain and reheat the liquid, adding 1/2 cup sugar each day, then pour back over the cucumbers, always stirring pickles each day. On the 15th day heat the liquid and cucumbers till very hot and put in hot sterilized jars and

1¾ granulated sugar ½ t. mustard seed

Wash and slice squash. Sprinkle with salt and set aside

for one hour. Bring vinegar

and sugar to a boil. Add squash, onion and green peppers and bring to a boil again. Pack hot squash, onion and peppers into hot sterilized jars. Add mustard and celery seeds to vinegar and sugar mixture. Bring to a boil again. Pour over squash. Place lids on jars. Process in water bath for 10 minutes.




