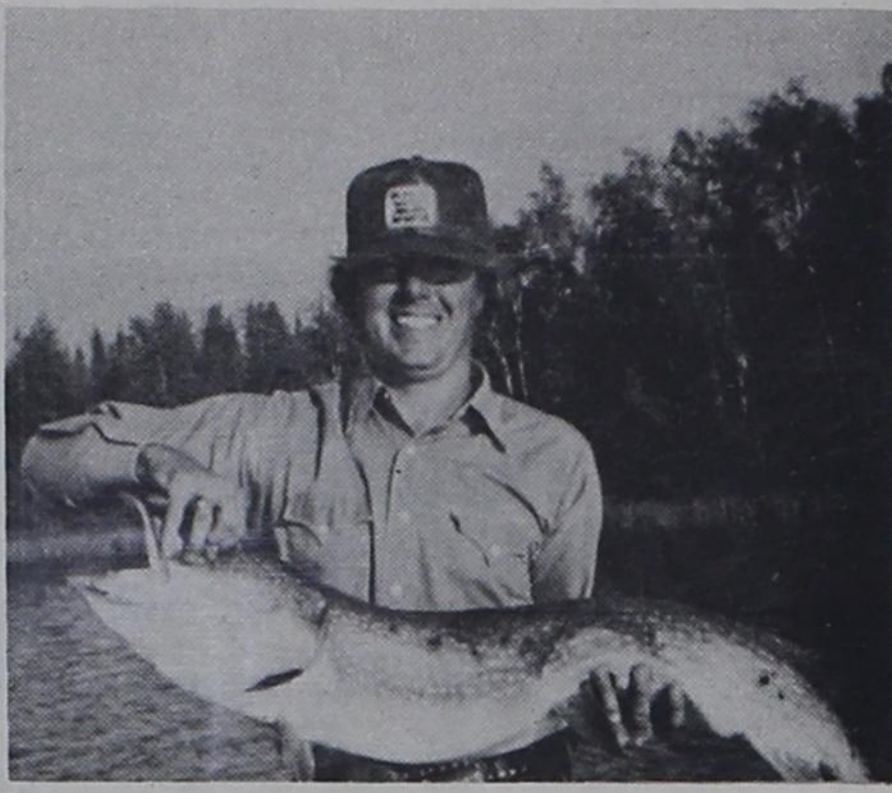

A group of local men were recent guests of Weather Master Seed Company on a fishing trip to Saskatchewan, Canada, where they set their lines in the water at Lake Wapata, some 60 miles from the Northwest Territories near Stony Rapids.

Those making the trip were Max Crim, Melvin Snider Jr., Adolph Haseloff, Delbert Lingnau, Donald Watkins, Mike Spearman, Phill Elliott, Edwin Lingnau, Bob Johnson and Bill Roberts.

Leaving Farwell July 14, the group drove to Scott City, Kans., where they spent the night. The following day they boarded a plane for Canada, spending that night at Melfort, Saskatchewan. On the third day, they left Melfort and

arrived at the lake about 2 o'clock, leaving about eight or nine hours of fishing time since at that time of the year the sun did not go down until about 11:30 p.m.

Mike Spearman caught the biggest fish in this group, landing a 25-pound Northern Pike in Cree River. Bill Roberts, another member of the fishing party, reports that the group caught a "big bunch" of fish, but that they threw back all those that weighed in at only eight to 10 pounds.

After three days of fishing, the men returned to Melfort for one night and also spent one more night in Scott City. They report they are "just waiting until next July" so they can do it all over again.

Farwell Cub Scouts have reorganized for the new school year, three dens have been established, and 12 boys have already joined.

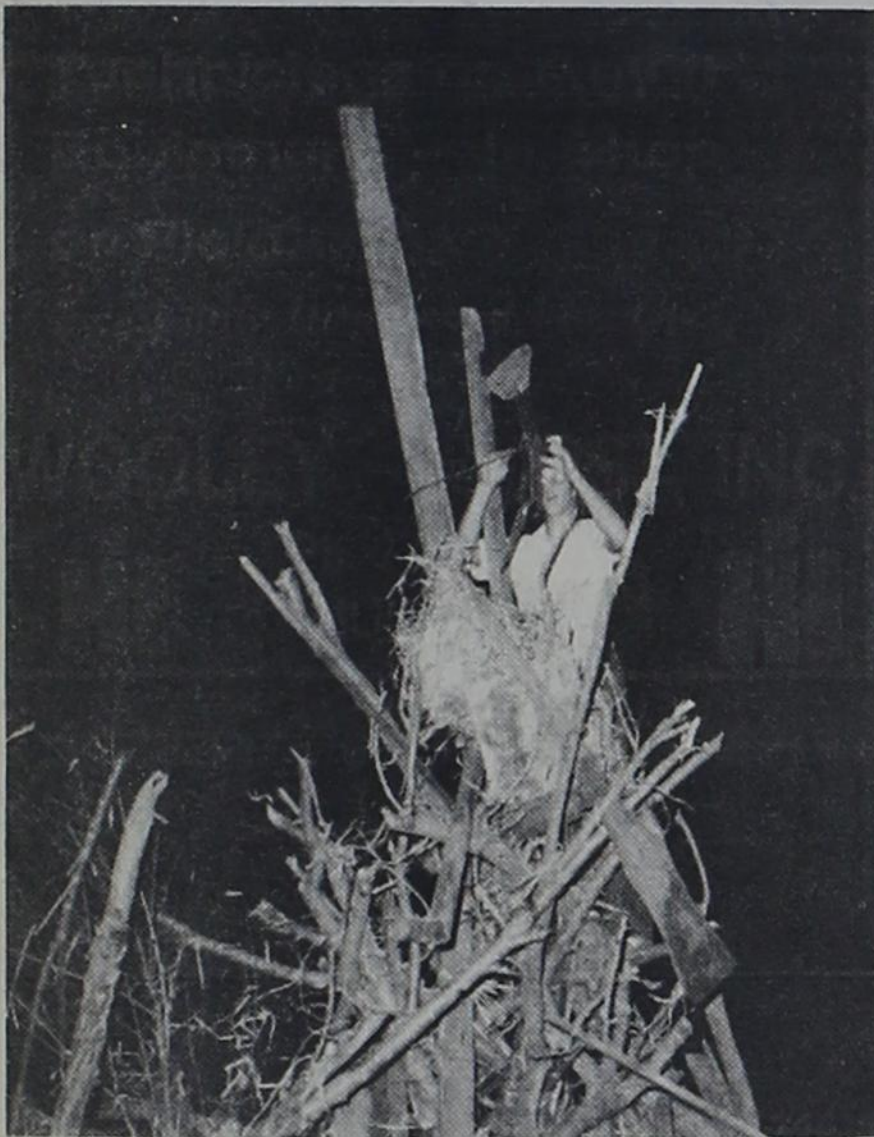

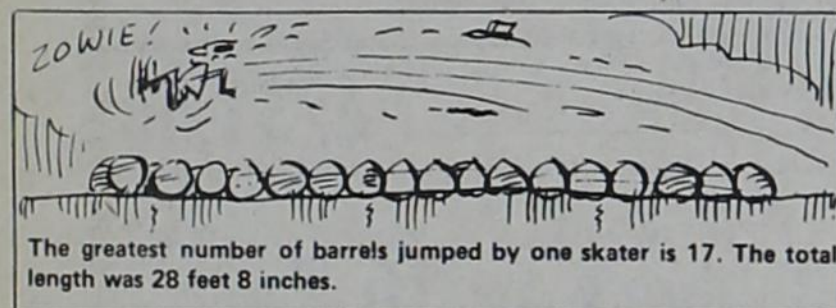
The first Cub Scout meetings of the year are scheduled to begin the week of September 27.

Basic reading, math, science, history and English will be offered. Included among the classes is English as a second language for newcomers to the United States.

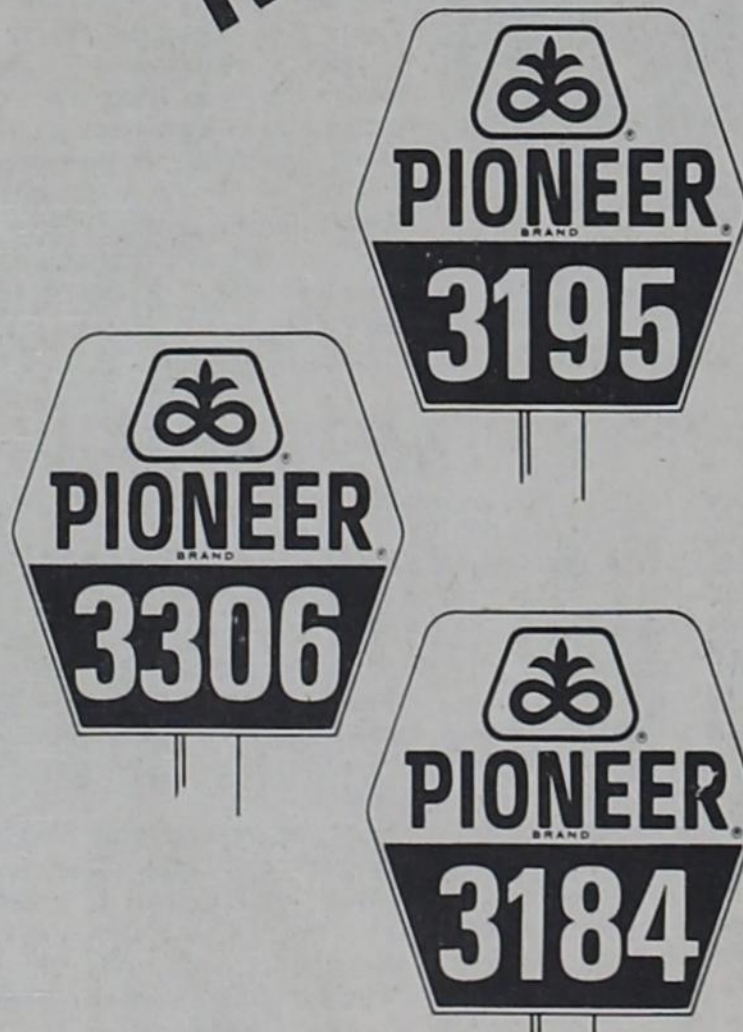
Preparation for U.S. Citizenship and the High School

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Seek Second Win - -

Wolverines On The Road Against Melrose

The Texico Wolverines, coming off a crushing 48-0 victory over the Vaughn Eagles, make a sojourn into Buffalo Land this Friday night as the Mean Green meets Melrose at 7:30 MDT.

"We played good football against Vaughn last Friday night and our offense looked good," commented Coach Paul Toppliff. "Coach Roy King and myself were very pleased with our defense as well as our offense," added Toppliff.

The Wolverines, with a 1-2 won-loss mark, will be seeking their second victory Friday night against Melrose, who also is 1-2 for the year. Melrose compiled its first victory of the season Friday night by defeating Albuquerque Indian School.

The Mean Green offensive unit, spearheaded by quarterback Homer Ashley, churned out 498 total yards in last week's game with 381 steps coming by the run and 177 yards through the air. Ashley and fullback Steve Askew both had big nights running, picking up 106 and 133 yards, respectively.

Wolverine Steve Turner, a flanker back for Texico was on the end of three receptions for 66 yards and rushed for 24 yards on three attempts. Turner is averaging 18.1 yards per reception in three games.

"We can beat Melrose if our kids go out there and play good solid football," noted Toppliff.

"Melrose is not very big, but we will have to contain their quarterback," added the first year Wolverine mentor.

"Mental mistakes have hampered the offense so far this season," stated Toppliff. "We fumbled the ball going across the goal line against Vaughn and we accumulated 120 yards in penalties, 80 of those coming in the first half," remarked the coach.

Texico had three touchdowns called back Friday night and Coach Toppliff says, "These mistakes have hurt us all season. We are just going to have to work harder on these mental errors."

Toppliff was very pleased with the performance of quarterback Ashley. "Homer had an excellent game for us, moving the offense and running the football. We have to get movement from Homer in order for us to win," added Toppliff. Ashley was named "Offensive Player of the Week" for his fine per-

formance. "Our defensive unit is starting to tackle a lot better and our linebackers are reading the opponents' offensive sets better," noted the coach.

On offense, the Wolverines had six different players getting into the scoring column. Ashley scored a pair of touchdowns and threw touchdown strikes to Mark Howard

and Turner. Steve Askew tallied a six pointer along with Joey West and Dwain Turner. Keith Hadley was on the end of an Ashley conversion pass.

Defensive standouts for the Green and White were Mike Williams, John Burgett, Larry Rolan, Jimmy Reid and Doug Scioli. Reid was tabbed "Defensive Player of the Week" by Coaches Toppliff and King.

Texico Jr. High Mauls Melrose

When it's Goode, everything is good, especially when it's hard-running Barry Goode of Texico Junior High. Goode totaled three touchdowns and a two-point conversion in leading Texico to a 40-8 victory over Melrose Saturday morning.

Coach Cecil Davis' young warriors exploded for a touchdown midway in the first quarter on a 65-yard sustained drive with Herbert Bibbs taking the ball the last six yards. Goode burst off tackle for the two-point conversion and a 8-0 Texico lead.

Texico's defensive unit held the Melrose visitors in check and set up the second score when David Cavallero recovered a Melrose fumble at the 33. Texico drove steadily down the field and with 1:44 remaining, Goode took it in from the two. After a penalty on the extra point attempt, Cavallero raced to the end zone for two more points, giving Texico a 16-0 lead.

Melrose lit up the scoreboard for the first time in the third quarter after a pass interception and two penalties against Texico set the ball on the 11-yard line. Quarterback Tommy Roper found Mike Cook in the end zone with an 11-yard pass. The duo teamed up again for the two-point conversion. Texico led by a narrow, 16-0 margin.

The Buff defense and penalties against Texico kept the young Wolverines scoreless in the third period. Texico had a touchdown nullified by a clipping infraction. However, with 7:07 remaining in the game, Goode reached paydirt on a 25-yard run around end. Cavallero sprinted across for the two-point conversion, expanding Texico's lead to 24-8.

Texico kicked off to Melrose

and the defense held the Buffalos in check, forcing them to punt. Melrose kicked the ball out of bounds on its own 26. With 3:54 remaining in the game, Herbert Bibbs garnered his second touchdown of the game with a nine-yard run. The try for the extra point failed, but Texico held a commanding, 30-8 lead.

The old flag game erased a touchdown run by Alan Hall. Ronald Kirby recovered a Melrose fumble to set up the run by Hall.

However, Texico settled for two points when Ricky Foreman and Cavallero teamed up to sack the Melrose quarterback in the end zone, giving Texico a 32-8 lead.

After the safety, Melrose teed the ball up for the free kick. The kick settled into the hands of Goode with three seconds remaining on the clock. Goode broke through the first wave of tacklers and sprinted 26 yards into the end zone. Cavallero put the 40th point on the board on the conversion.

Coach Davis remarked, "I was real proud of the eighth grade. They scored one touchdown and played well."

"We will try to keep the eighth and ninth grade as separate units," added Davis.

Davis also commented, "If we can beat Fort Sumner and Tatum, we could go undefeated this year."

Players drawing praise from Davis were Cavallero, Kirby and Clyde Bibbs on offense, and defensive standouts were William Lassiter at defensive end and cornerback Herbert Bibbs, an eighth grader.

Texico posted 12 first downs and ground out 281 yards rushing. The young Wolverines were penalized for 85 yards.

Coach Larry McDorman reported that the second team played the fourth quarter and did a good job.

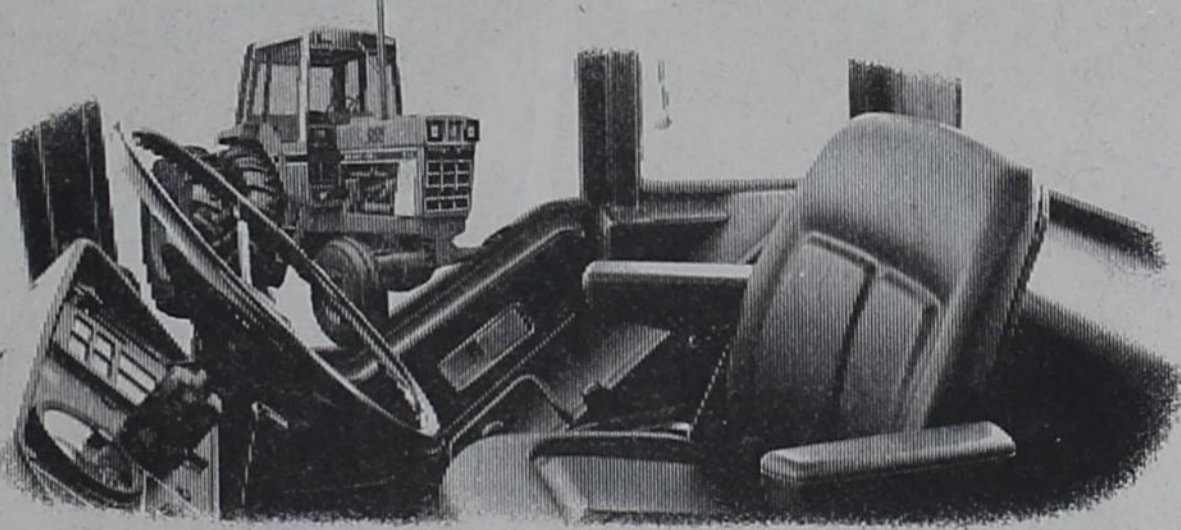
McDorman remarked, "We looked better, but will have to work more on our blocking assignments."

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Cowboys Not So Happy - -

Farwell Steers Stampede Happy Cowboys, 67 - 6

"Happy," as described by Webster, is "enjoying well-being, peace, and comfort; joyous. 2. favored by luck, or fortune."

However, after last Friday night, the Happy Cowboys may not agree with Mr. Webster, especially after Lady Luck seemed to have abandoned the Pokes as the Farwell Steers ran roughshod over the un-Happy Cowboys, 67-6.

The victory by Farwell extended the Steers' victory string to three in a row. The contest in Happy also proved a point that the Steers could run its offense to near perfection. Farwell controlled the game from the initial kickoff with a balanced attack, accumulating 358 yards on the ground and 185 yards through the air.

Farwell wasted little time in getting its offense untracked. Happy kicked off and booted the ball into the end zone. The ball was brought out to the 20, where the Blue and White went to work in a precision drive toward the Happy goal. Russ Jones promptly went to the air, hitting Travis Bibbs for a 12-yard strike and a first down. The ball rested on the 48 after two running plays by Billy White and Chip Craft had given the Steers another first. Jones again went upstairs, connecting with Bibbs again for a 52-yard touchdown pass. Bibbs kicked the extra point as 10:56 showed on the first quarter clock.

Coach Van Whatley's charges struck again late in the first quarter. After forcing Happy to punt, Farwell set up shop on its own 21, and Jones went to the air again. His first pass was overthrown, but this second attempt found Rowdy Chandler for a 20-yard gain. Craft picked up 11 yards on a run, but a holding penalty wiped out the gain. Jones found Bibbs again on a fingertip catch to bring up a second and five for Farwell. White picked up the needed yardage. With the ball resting at the Happy 29, Bibbs picked up three and Mike Goettsch exploded for seven and a first at the 11. With Goettsch, Bibbs and Chandler carry the mail, Farwell worked down to the two. On fourth down, Billy White found running room and scored the second touchdown of the game. Bibbs' placement was perfect and the Steers led, 14-0, with 3:25 remaining.

The visiting Steers' third touchdown was set up by the defense as Farwell recovered a Happy fumble at the Poke 28. The Steers used only five plays with Goettsch carrying the load and going over from the one. Bibbs kicked his third straight point-after, boosting Farwell's lead to 21-0, with 10:49 remaining in the half.

Goettsch put the Steers back in business on the Happy 34 after intercepting a Poke pass. Six plays later the Steers had tacked seven more points on the scoreboard. Bibbs ran in from the one and booted the extra point for a 28-0 Farwell lead with 7:58 remaining.

The Cowboys' lone bright spot in the game came after Farwell kicked off. The ball was returned to the Happy 42 by Sammy Moore. On the first play, the Cowboys were caught moving before the snap and were moved back five yards by the officials. Quarterback Tim Moudy connected with J.T. Henry for a 59-yard touchdown strike. The conversion failed.

On the kickoff, Farwell started a 78-yard, 11-play drive. Chip Craft finished the drive with a one-yard run with 3:28 remaining. Bibbs missed the conversion point.

The next Farwell touchdown came after Russ Jones intercepted a Happy pass and returned it to the Happy two-yard line. Jones lost four yards on the first play, but came back with a pitch-out to Bibbs with 0:59 remaining. Bibbs scored on a six-yard run. Kent Goldsmith tallied the two-point conversion on a pass from Jones, making the score 42-6.

Happy set up shop on the 20 after the kickoff. The Farwell defense trapped quarterback Tim Moudy and the Poke signal caller coughed up the football, which Tim Norton recovered at the 18. A penalty against Happy moved the ball down to the Poke nine. Bibbs scored on a two-yard run and Goettsch kicked the point-after giving Farwell a 49-6 halftime advantage.

The Steers cashed in on another scoring opportunity in the third quarter, but misfortune struck the Steers when freshman halfback Max Lonsdale sustained a broken ankle after almost scoring. Tim Norton scored on a three-yard run. The point-after failed, but the Steers commanded the game, 55-6.

Farwell's defense came up with the ball at the Happy 46. Norton carried the ball on five straight plays and scored on a three-yard run. The placement failed, giving Farwell a staggering 61-6 lead.

The Steers' Bruce Mayfield intercepted a Happy pass giving Farwell the ball at the Happy 35. Craft and Norton combined to drive the ball down to the Poke 11-yard line. Benny Yruegas took the ball across the line for the final Farwell touchdown.

Goettsch was the leading rusher for the Steers with 97 yards on 11 attempts followed by Norton with 87 yards. Chip Craft contributed 66 yards on six carries and Bibbs added 41 yards.

The Steers' aerial game was at its best this season as the Farwell quarterbacks completed seven of 12 passes for 185 yards. Jones hit on six of 11 passes for 150 yards while Chandler hit one of two passes for 30 yards. White and Goldsmith each had 52 yards in receptions and Bibbs caught three passes for 42 yards.

Farwell draws an open date this week, but will return to action against Shallowater October 1 at Shallowater.

Steers To Add New Offensive Wrinkles

The Farwell Steers are open this week and, according to Coach Van Whatley, the Steers are going to regroup and get rid of the soreness which developed in their last outing. Whatley stated, "With the open date, it will give us time to put in some new offensive wrinkles and help us get several players well."

Farwell, off to one of its best starts in several years, has posted three straight wins. The Steers started the season off with a question mark about its offensive line. The line is still young, but with three games under its belt, Coach Whatley feels that the line is maturing each week. "They are doing a good job, but are still making some mental errors on blocking," stated Whatley.

"We have to stop making mental errors, because it will cost us later in the year, especially when we get into district competition," commented Farwell's first year head coach.

"I feel that our offensive backs are executing very well," remarked Whatley, "but we are still getting poor blocking from the backs and we are going to have to correct that."

Our defensive secondary is doing an excellent job of going to the football," added the coach.

"One of the things that is hurting us is penalties at the wrong time," says Whatley. "We have had six touchdowns called back because of rule infractions," Whatley emphasized.

Steve Meeks and Clay Roberts drew praise from the coach for their improvement at offensive tackle. Also cited for outstanding play were D.D. Foster and Mike Goettsch. Whatley remarked, "D.D. is improving every game and he is going to be an excellent football player."

Goettsch, Farwell's leading rusher in the game with 97 yards on 11 carries, was named Steer of the Week by Farwell's coaching staff. Goettsch, who is a senior fullback, also doubles at the linebacker position.

The Steers have an open date this week, but jump back into action October 1, when they travel to Shallowater.

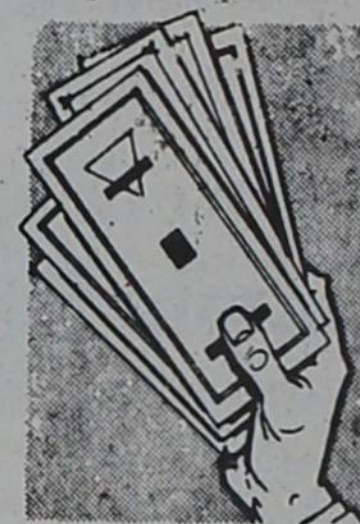

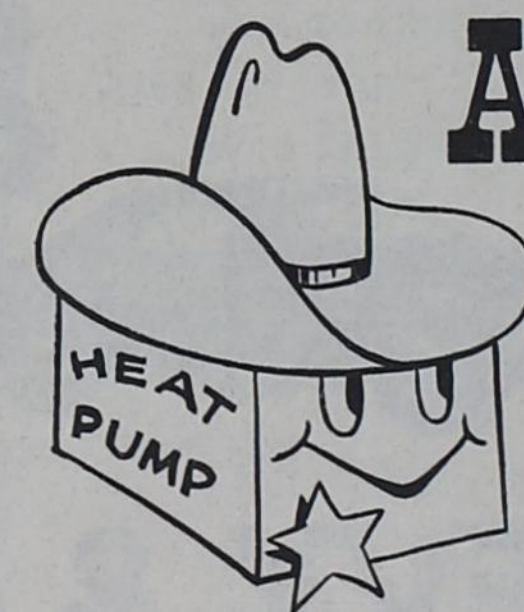
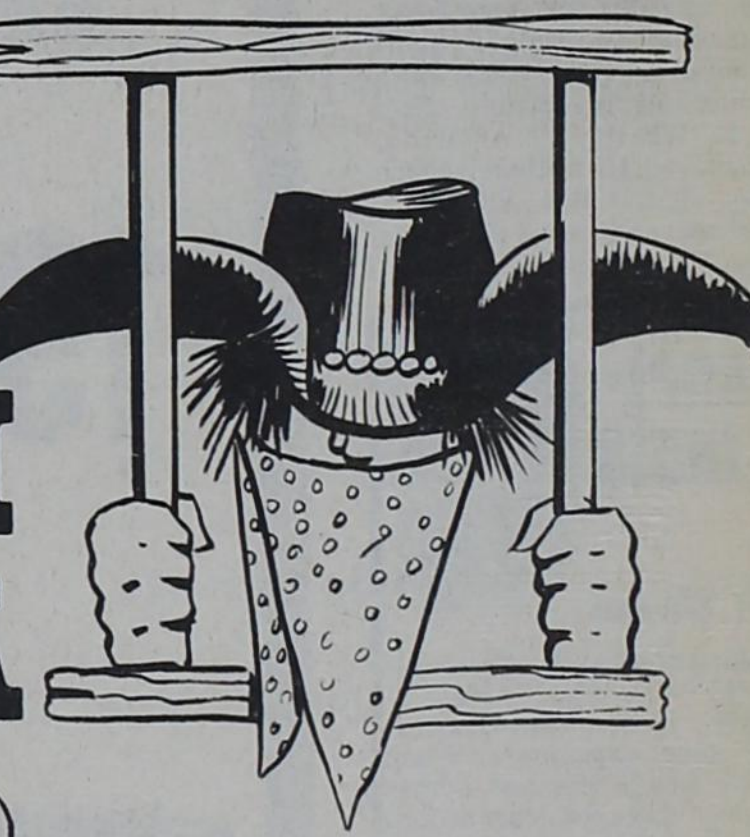
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Faye Ford Excited Over First Canning Experience

Mrs. Uvon (Fay) Ford of Farwell is a versatile woman who enjoys living life to its fullest measure. She is talented and will try anything new once, she says. Her latest endeavor at trying something new is home food canning. This year is Mrs. Ford's first year to can and she estimates she has put up 12 dozen pints of squash pickles, peas, green beans and okra.

According to the local woman she never had enough space in the past to warrant canning. Nearly a year ago she and her husband moved into their new home in Farwell which has an abundance of storage space, a "must" as far as Mrs. Ford is concerned.

She began her first venture into canning about six weeks ago and has successfully filled a large Lazy Susan with a variety of jars, including eight gallons of pickles and 60 pints of beans. Mrs. Ford has also prepared and frozen 100 packages of corn. In order to prevent the corn from getting freezer burns she does not blanch it. Instead, she seasons it, cooks it down, cools it and then places it in packages for freezing.

Canning is not Mrs. Ford's only "talent". She drew the plans for her home because she had never had enough storage space. She does her own yardwork and looks after her own garden. The local woman describes herself as a "country girl" and says she loves to do her own gardening. Much of what Mrs. Ford canned came from her own patch of earth in her back yard.

The homemaker also likes to crochet afghans in the winter when she cannot get outside. Sewing and cooking are other favored hobbies. Mrs. Ford likes to add her own specialties to the recipes she uses, sometimes adding a little more or supplementing a new ingredient.

At age 50 she bought a piano and took lessons for one year from a neighbor. Now Mrs. Ford plays piano for her own enjoyment and the enjoyment of her family and friends.

Another favorite pastime is watching football games, especially when 13-year-old grandson Kerry, plays. The Fords also have a granddaughter, Darrisa, who is 12. They are the children of their son Barthell and his wife Jeanette.

Besides canning, gardening, sewing, and attending football games, Mrs. Ford likes to spend "an afternoon with the girls" which occurs about three times a week. Usually about 15 to 20 local women meet on Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday afternoons at a local restaurant to drink tea and chat with their friends. Mrs. Ford describes the time as "most enjoyable" and says

she tries not to miss one of the gatherings.

Mrs. Ford has consented to share two of the canning recipes she used this year. The 15-Day Variety Sweet Cucumber Pickles recipe has been in her family for a long time. It takes 15 days to put up the pickles by doing a "little each day," according to Mrs. Ford. The Yellow Squash Pickles recipe is a new one that she discovered this year.

SWEET CUCUMBER PICKLES [15 Day Variety]

5 pts. vinegar
5 c. sugar

1 T. celery seed
1 T. stick cinnamon

Wash and cut enough cucumbers in chunks to make 2 gallons, place the cut cucumbers in a stone jar and pour 1 gallon boiling water (in which you have dissolved 2 cups salt) over them.

Let stand one week, skimming every day or two. On the eighth day, drain and again cover with 1 gallon of boiling water. Let stand 24 hours. On the ninth day, add the third gallon of boiling water after first draining other off and add 1 tablespoon powdered alum and let stand for 24 hours. On the 10th day, drain and pour on

another gallon of boiling water. Let stand overnight.

On the 11th day, drain and add hot syrup and spices to suit taste. On the 12th, 13th and 14th day, drain and reheat the liquid, adding ½ cup sugar each day, then pour back over the cucumbers, always stirring pickles each day. On the 15th day heat the liquid and cucumbers till very hot and put in hot sterilized jars and seal.

YELLOW SQUASH PICKLES

8 c. sliced yellow squash cut into slices ¼ to ½ inch thick

1 T. pickling salt
2 c. chopped onion
¼ c. chopped green peppers
1 c. apple cider vinegar
1¾ granulated sugar
½ t. mustard seed
½ t. celery seed

Wash and slice squash. Sprinkle with salt and set aside for one hour. Bring vinegar

and sugar to a boil. Add squash, onion and green peppers and bring to a boil again. Pack hot squash, onion and peppers into hot sterilized jars. Add mustard and celery seeds to vinegar and sugar mixture. Bring to a boil again. Pour over squash. Place lids on jars. Process in water bath for 10 minutes.

The local woman had always frozen vegetables before, but had never had the room to can until she and her husband moved into their new home about a year ago.

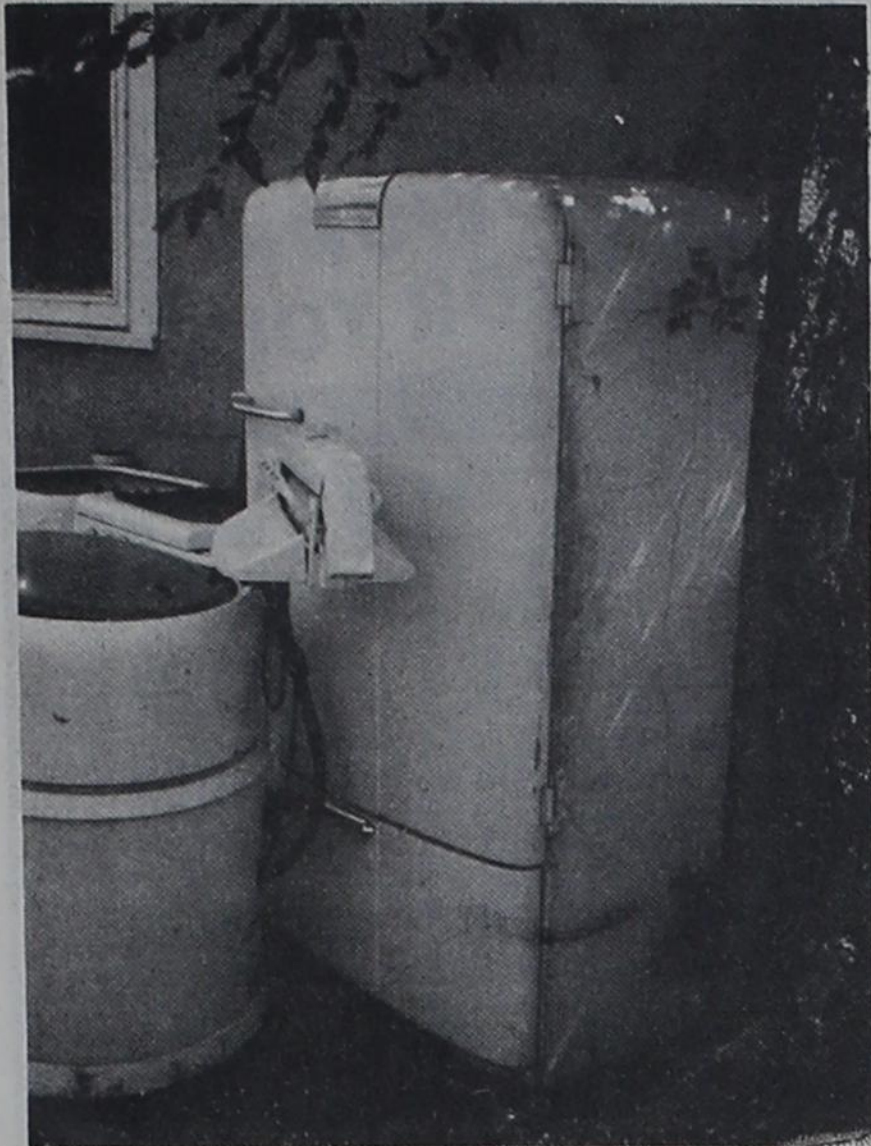

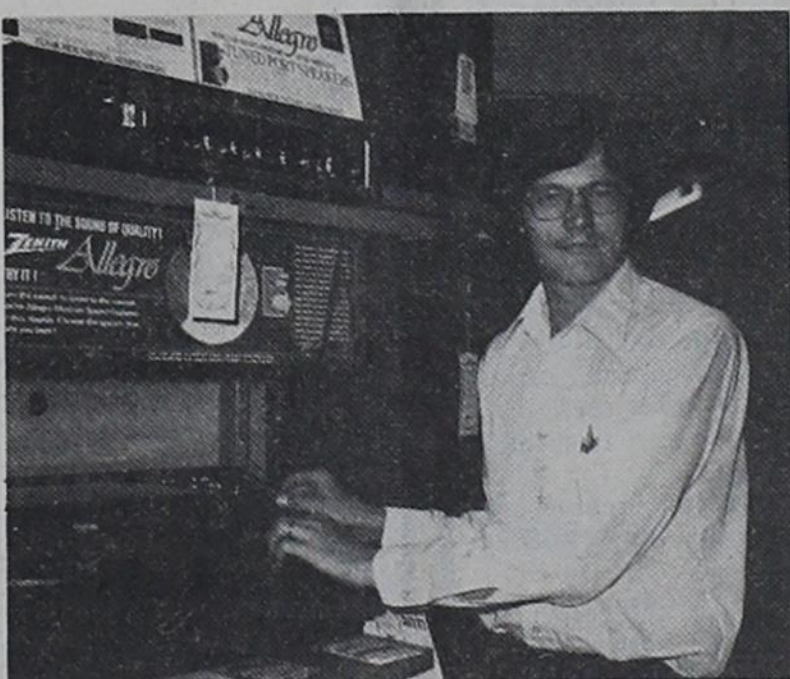
TSTA has produced a 15-minute, 16mm color and sound motion picture in which four Texas teachers express this

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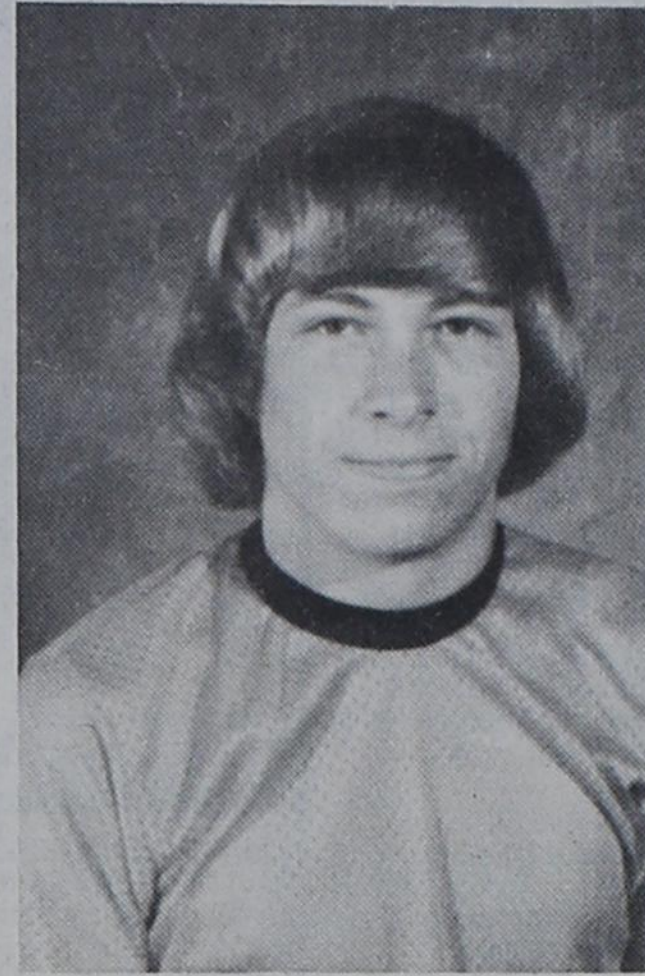

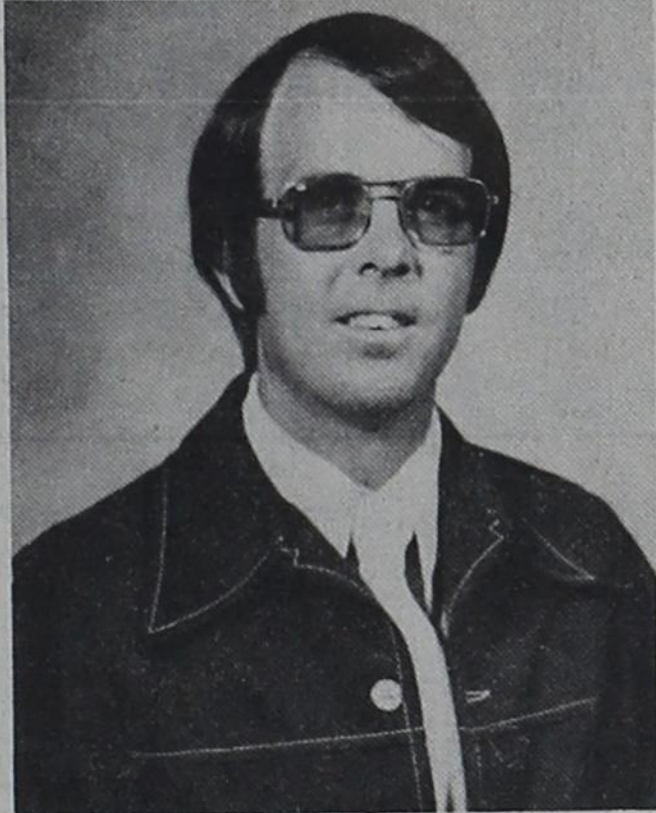

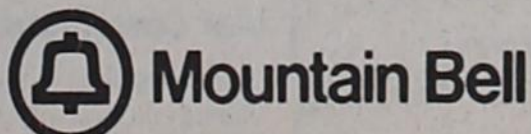

LIGHT OUT OF DARKNESS

"For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ. "But we have this treasure in earthen vessels, that the excellency of the power may be of God and not of us" (II Cor. 4:6,7).

Any instructed Christian reading this passage from the pen of the Apostle Paul naturally goes back in his mind, to the time when God first said: "Let there be light" and dispelled the darkness of the primeval world.

He might also recall the incident related in the book of Judges, when Gideon's army went to battle against the Midianites, each man with a sword in one hand and a lamp, hidden in a pitcher in the other. At Gideon's command Gideon's soldiers broke the earthen vessels and the lights shone out to strike terror into the hearts of the enemy, who could not account for the crash and the blaze of light at that midnight hour.

For every believer God has caused light, wonderful light, to shine out of the darkness and fill the heart, just as once He said to the dark and chaotic earth: "Let there be light - and there was light."

But we believers have come into "the light of the knowledge of the glory of God" by coming to know Christ. Our Lord rightly said: "No man cometh unto the Father but by Me" (John 14:6). God is unknown and unknowable apart from Christ, who is God manifested in the flesh. It was He who lived a perfect life and then died a sinner's death in order to bring us into relationship and fellowship with God. And we come to know God through relationship with Christ Himself - God manifested in the flesh.

It is wonderful to have the light of God's truth shine into our hearts - and it is more wonderful still to use that light to win spiritual victories for God. "Thanks be unto God... who has made us meet to be partakers of the inheritance of the saints in light" (Col. 1:12).
