The country is again to be in peril. Congress will be in session during an election year, and politics will rule the roost when it comes to spending the taxpayers' pelf. This will be especially true in the House of Representatives.

A Congressional Representative, with only a two-year term, is for all practical purposes constantly running for office. There is hardly a time when that person can cast a statesman vote for the good of the entire country. Instead, they must always be on the good voting side of every squeaking wheel and pressure group in their district. This is a large factor in giving us the profligate government we have endured for the past four decades or longer.

It goes against our grain to want to tinker with the U.S. Constitution in the matter of elected officers; however, we have in the past so done with respect to the President and Senators.

Possibly doing so with the House of Representatives would be a prudent move sometime soon. At first blush, our thoughts turn to extending their term of office. A four- or six-year stint, with no succession, would to some degree remove them from the constant pressure of running for office. By staggering the terms, the House would always be responsible to the tide of sentiment prevailing in the minds of the voters. This is similar to the Senate. However, we would prevent Representatives from having a second term as Senators would continue to have.

With Congressional salaries at over \$69,000 and by providing a very modest pension, all provident holders of the office would look forward to at least a comfortable income for their service to the good of the country.

Somehow, some plan must be devised to curb the spending appetite of Congress. We cannot go on in our present sea of red ink. Even an income tax surcharge, as advocated by one Presidential aspirant, would be a fraud and sham on the public. Total spending must be cut before dedicated taxes for debt reduction can be of any benefit toward this worthy goal.

We were "sort of" for the Raiders in the Super Bowl. Just why we do not really know. Possibly they have embarrassed our Dallas Cowboys less, in the last two years, than the Washington Redskins. Anyway we think that the 'Pokes did not deserve to be in the Big Bowl this year.

We note where it is now said that Tom Landry will have a small interest in the group that seems to be the most likely to acquire the franchise. Our opinion is that the new broom ought to look at the Landry record for the past several years and think of a new coach rather than making him a part owner.

To be in the Super Bowl again, the Cowboys are going to have to change more than just the playing personnel. The Cowboys have drafted some mighty good players, kept them around for several years, and then cut them from the team. Several of these have come back to haunt Dallas with their outstanding play. This might indicate that the only coach the team has ever had is slipping in his judgement of the worth of new players and keeps has been around too long.

are not involved with a local congregation.

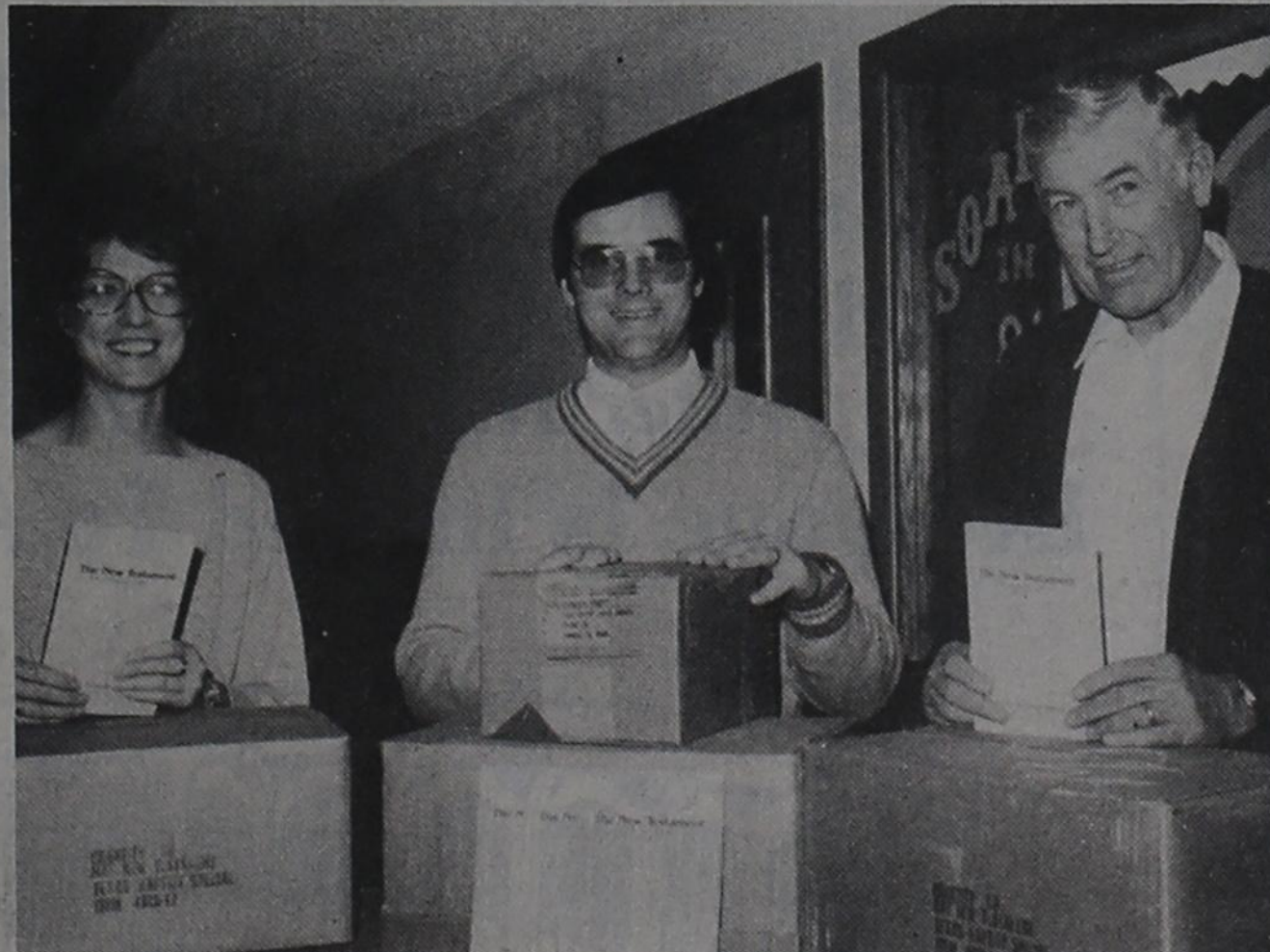

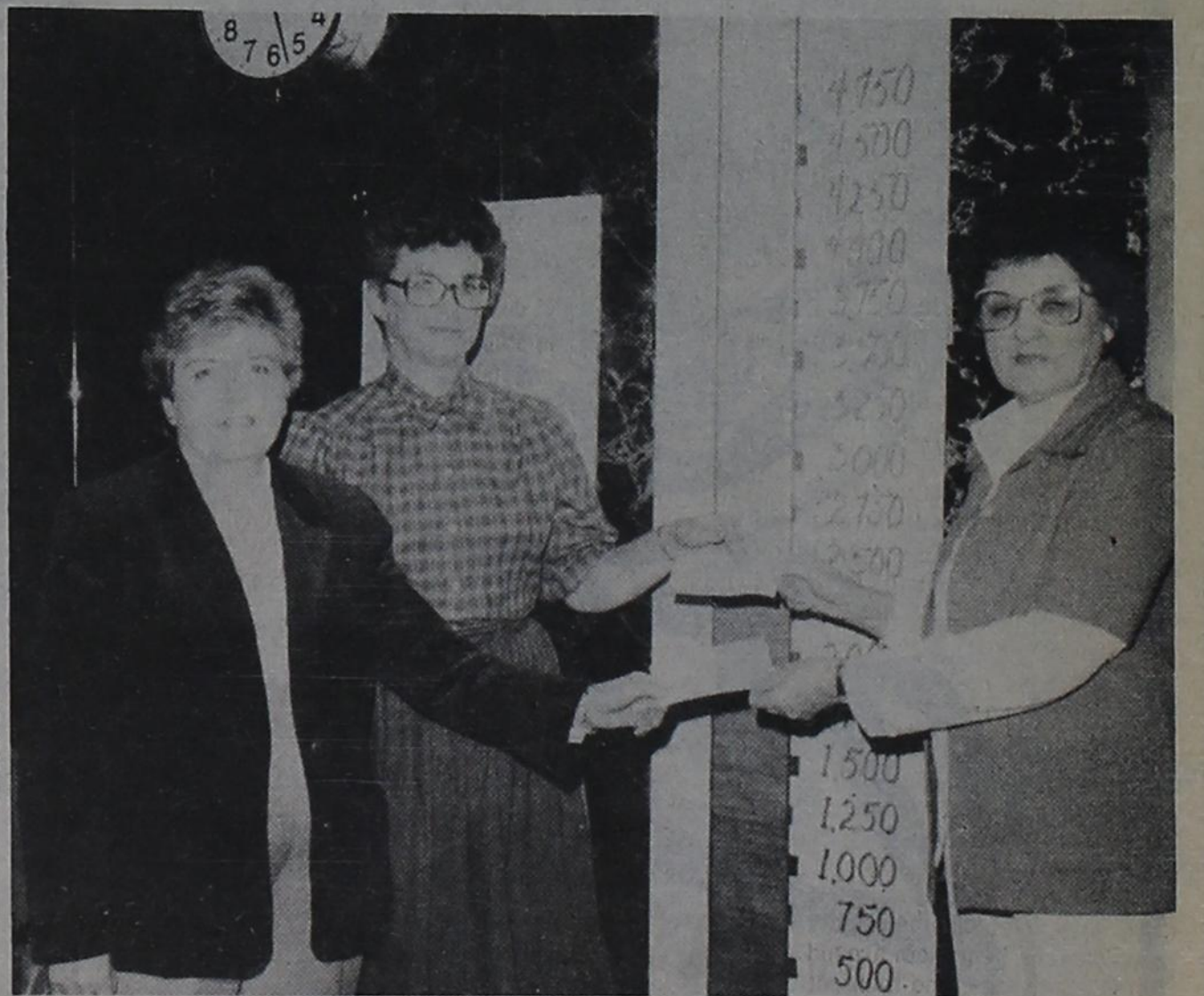
In other business, the council voted down City Ordinance 224 on mandatory financial responsibility because that issue is covered under City Ordinance 225.

Vegetable Conference To Help Growers Meet The Challenges Of The Eighties

HEREFORD - Electronic marketing methods for the Texas vegetable industry, the labor and transportation situation, and new potato market potentials will be featured at the annual conference of the High Plains Vegetable Growers and Shippers Council here Tuesday, January 31.

Conference participants will hear also the latest information on vegetable farm planning under risk, new hot and sweet pepper varieties, and onion and potato variety development and testing.

The educational conference begins at 8:30 a.m. at the Hereford Community center, 100 Avenue C at Park Avenue, and adjourns at 4:30 p.m. The \$5 registration includes the barbecue lunch. Many interesting exhibits will be staged by agribusiness people who will also provide valuable door prizes.

Co-sponsors with the Council are the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Deaf Smith County Vegetable Crops Committee, Texas Tech University, and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

"This program deals with every major concern of our Texas vegetable growers from the evaluation of market, labor and transportation risks, and the potential of new markets, to variety selection and new information on culture, management, and irrigation," said Dr. Roland E. Roberts, Extension vegetable specialist.

Growers will be updated on new developments in the vegetable industry and get to talk with the people who are working to help them to profit from vegetables, Roberts said.

Texas A&M University scientists will report research results on pepper variety testing, new techniques to develop super potato varieties for Texas, new ways to grow onions with less cost, and irrigation research with potatoes and onions that saves time, money, and water.

Texas Tech University scientists will report research results on potato responses to drought stress and soil fertility, hot pepper adaptability, vegetable farm planning under risk, and vegetable research for the rolling plains.

Electronic marketing in the vegetable industry and new market opportunities for Texas potatoes will be detailed by Dr. Forrest Stegelin, Extension economist, marketing-agribusiness from College Station.

The vegetable marketing outlook for 1984 will be analyzed by Gordon Powell, Extension fruit and vegetable marketing specialist, College Station.

Soil-borne diseases that cut vegetable yields and quality will be explained by Dr. Robert Berry, Extension plant pathologist. Extension soil chemist, Dr. Dale Pennington, will describe a new, powerful system for predicting nutrient requirements for vegetables which he calls DRIS. DRIS is short for Diagnosis Recommendation Indexed System.

"Everyone who needs to know what is going on in the vegetable business ought to be at this conference," said Kenneth Gray of Lorenzo, president of the growers and shippers council.

Windbreak And Drip Irrigation Seminar Set In Friona Feb. 9

A two-hour windbreak seminar will be held at the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District office in Friona on February 9 at 2 p.m., featuring four specialists on windbreak and drip irrigation systems.

Marvin Strachan, nursery manager, Colorado State Forest Service, Fort Collins, Colo.; Edward Holcombe, state forester, SCS, Temple; James Henson, state biologist, SCS, Temple; and Kyle Sikes, Ag. engineer, SCS, Amarillo, will be available to answer all questions.

Drip irrigation systems have proven to increase the survival rate of windbreak tree plantings and many other things needing water.

The survival rate of plantings

is increased due to ease of watering. In most cases, a faucet is the only thing that needs to be turned on. Also when watering trees, if the system is installed properly, each tree receives the same amount of water.

Emitters which are installed at each tree allows the water to be applied at a rate of one or two gallons per hour. At this rate there is no runoff and water is allowed to soak into the ground where the tree's roots are located. This reduces weed competition and weeds are held to a minimum.

Due to the characteristics of drip irrigation, the soil condition for the growth of trees is more favorable. By not only having water available to the trees, the air pores in the soil

under drip irrigation allow the trees' roots to "breathe."

Drip irrigation systems also are suitable for irrigating gardens, flowers and shrubs, reducing water usage and waste.

The Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is making drip irrigation materials and windbreak trees available to the public.

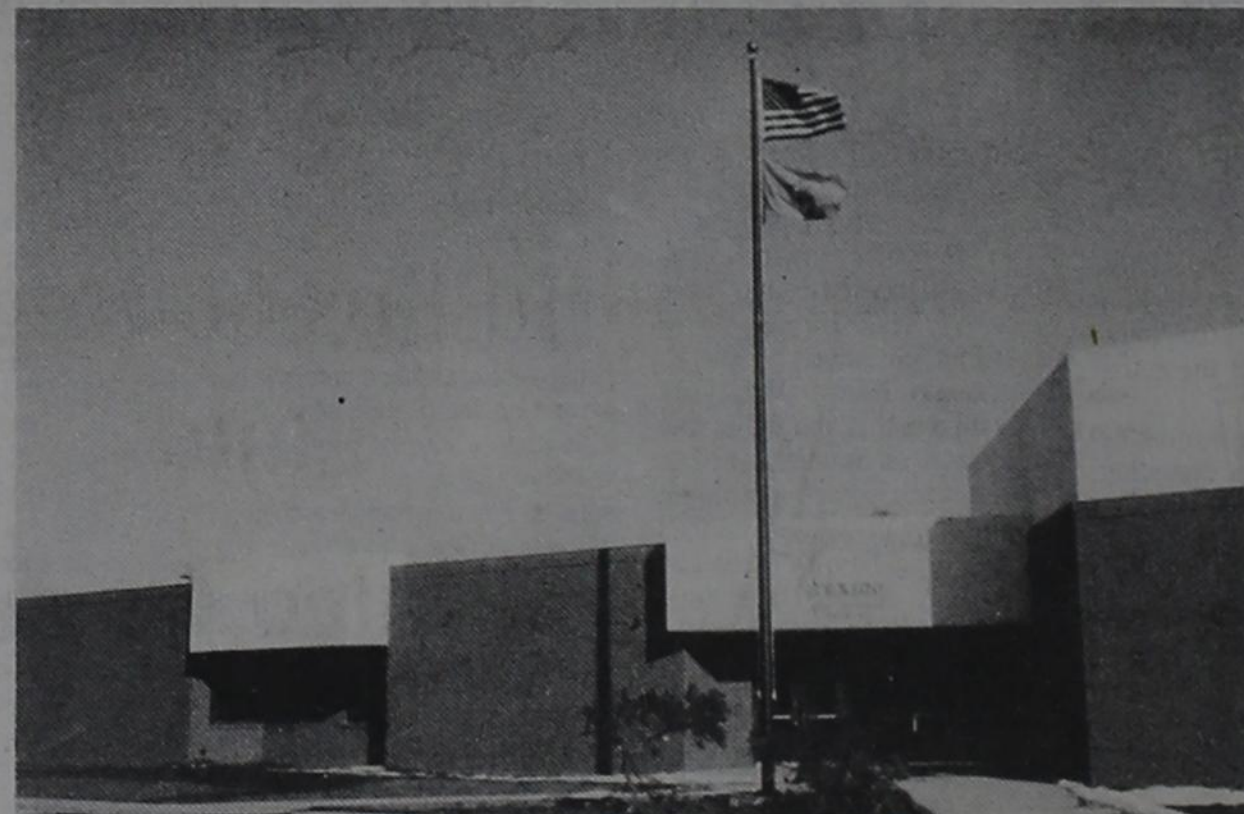
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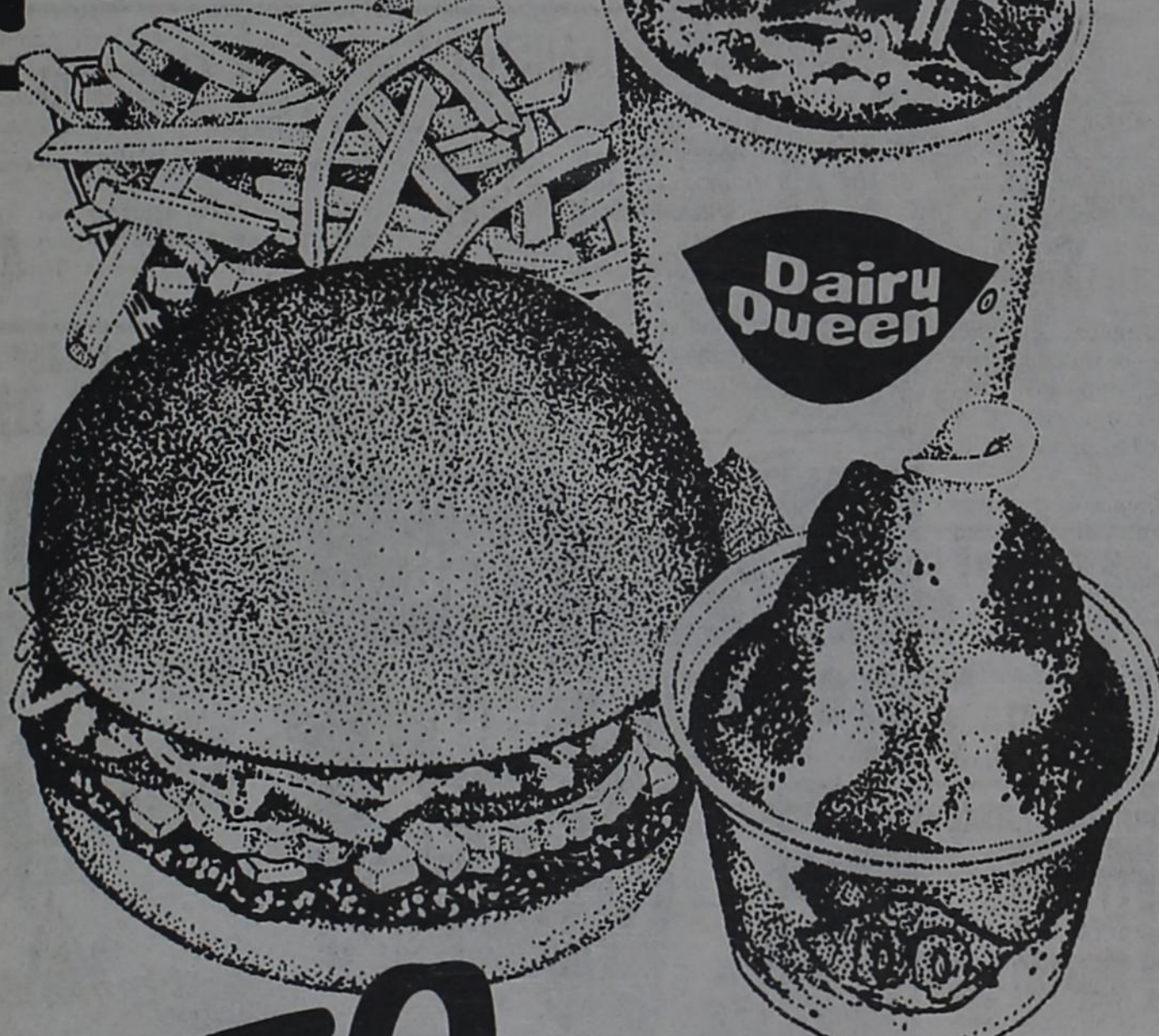

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Wolverines Lose Championship Thriller, Take Second 2nd In EPAC

In a hard fought championship battle Saturday night at Dora, the Texico Wolverines had to step down as reigning EPAC champions as they were defeated by Floyd, 51-48.

The first game of the tournament for Texico was Wednesday night against Dora. The Wolverines trounced the home team 78-49 to set the tempo for the tournament.

First quarter action saw the Wolverines leading by 15 points, 24-9. During the second quarter, Dora outscored the Wolverines by two points, but at the half, Texico was out in front 38-25. They pulled farther away in the third and fourth periods to win by 29 points.

The Wolverines hit for 30 of 63 field goals for 48 percent, and 18 of 31 free throws for 58 percent. They outstretched the Dora team by coming down with 53 rebounds to Dora's 30.

Kevin West was lead scorer for the Wolverines with 15 points, followed by Terry Tubbs with 14, Brad Steward 13, John Thomas 9, Joe Steward 8, Regan Williams 6, Doug Thornton, Billy Bibbs, and Bobby Steward 4 each, and Stanley Cross 1.

In rebounds, Joe Steward and Tubbs each had 8, followed by Williams 7, Brad Steward 6, West 5, Bibbs and Bobby Steward each 3, Thomas and Cross 2 apiece, and Ronnie Dunsworth, Danny Powell and Jeff Campbell, 1 apiece.

The Wolverines also managed to steal the ball 22 times. Doug Thornton led with 4 steals, followed by Brad Steward, Joe Steward, and Tubbs 3 each, West, Bibbs, and Williams 2 apiece, and Thomas, Bobby Steward and Tommy Powell, 1 each.

West had the most assists with 6, followed by Joe and Brad Steward each with 5.

"Dora played well in the first quarter, but we played a little harder, and a little more intensely," said Coach Scott Parker. "Defensively we played very well and offensively, we had a lot of patience. Everyone got in quite a bit of playing time, and we had a chance to look at some other people on the bench. The kids really wanted to win EPAC. I believe we set the tempo for the whole tournament during that first game."

Second round play for the Wolverines took place Friday night when they won over the Tatum Coyotes 63 to 47.

Texico led in scoring throughout the first three quarters but Tatum came back in the fourth period getting 19 points while holding Texico to only 8 more. However, it was not enough to catch the Wolverines. Texico hit for 52 percent of their field goals and 46 percent from the free throw line. Again the Wolverines stretched for the most rebounds, coming down with 42 to Tatum's 27, and managed 11 steals.

Brad Steward was high scorer for Texico with 20 points, followed by Kevin West with 14. Regan Williams added 8, Joe Steward 7, Terry Tubbs, Jeff Campbell, and Mark Meeks 4 each, and Doug Thornton 2.

Leading rebounder for the Wolverines was Joe Steward with 8, followed by Thornton 7, Brad Steward and Williams 5, Tubbs and Campbell 4 each, and West and Meeks 3 each, Billy Bibbs 2, and Ronnie Dunsworth and Danny Powell 1 apiece.

Joe Steward and West each had 3 steals, Brad Steward and Tubbs each had 2, and Williams had 1.

Coach Parker said, "We were worried about the game. The last time we played Tatum we had a 17 point lead, and in the final two minutes, they came within 5 points of us. Offensively we found that patience is a virtue. Defensively I would say that this is our best game up to date."

"We had a 29 point lead, and put in our boys on the bench. I really received some encouragement from them. Brad Steward played an overall super game. We took them right out of their game plan."

The win against Tatum led the Wolverines down the road to the championship game played Saturday night, but the Wolverines lost a heart-breaking battle to Floyd, 51-48.

During the first quarter Floyd jumped to a 10-0 lead, but by the end of the period, the Wolverines were behind only by 3 points. At halftime, the Wolverines were trailing 18-15. During the second half, Texico rallied and outscored Floyd in both the third and fourth quarters, but lost in the final seconds of the game.

The Wolverines shot for 35 percent from the field, and 67 percent from the free throw line. For the first time during the tourney, the Wolverines were outstretched by 5 rebounds, having 23 to Floyd's 28.

High scorers for the Wolverines were Joe Steward and Terry Tubbs each with 10 points. Brad Steward and Kevin West each had 9, Regan Williams 5, Mark Meeks 3, and Billy Bibbs 2.

Tubbs managed 4 of the team's total of 12 steals and came down with 6 rebounds. Brad Steward had 4 rebounds, 2 steals, and 4 assists. West stole the ball 5 times, assisted 4 times, and came down with 2 rebounds. Joe Steward had 1 steal, 2 rebounds, and 2 assists; Bibbs had 2 rebounds, and Williams stretched for 4.

Floyd jumped to a 10-0 lead in no time, hitting 5 long shots from 15 to 20 feet out," said Coach Parker. "Our defense was hazy the first quarter, and didn't react quickly to the game."

"With three minutes to go we tied them or led by one at least twice. We had a chance to take the lead, but Floyd spread out on the floor and pulled a delay game. With four seconds to go we missed an outside shot that would have given us the game by one. We fouled Floyd and they took the win by three points. As bad as we played, and as good as they played, we stayed close."

The coach added, "The boys traveled to Dora early Saturday to support the girls in their fight for third place. I think support is really important and we would really like to thank the students, parents, faculty, cheerleaders and fans for their support. I know it is a boost to the boys and they really appreciate it."

Brad Steward was chosen as the tournament's Most Valuable Player and Brad, Terry Tubbs, and Kevin West were selected to the All-Tournament team.

The Wolverines face Melrose at home tonight (Friday), and then travel to Floyd Saturday night. Texico is 15-1 for the season, and 4-0 in district.

The Lady Wolverines hit for 48.8 percent of their field goals, and 75 percent of their free throws. They had a total of 39 rebounds, with Cheryl Scott stretching for 13 and Helen Jo Boarman coming down with 11. Other rebounders were Snodgrass with 7, Cavallero 4, Harrison 3 and Lynn 1.

Making steals for Texico were Boarman and Harrison with 3 each, Karen Snodgrass 2, and Cheryl Scott had 1. Harrison also had 9 assists.

It's What Up Front That Counts

A study of more than 900 motorcycle accidents in southern California has shown that most accidents happen right in front of the rider. In fact, only seven percent occur from the rear. Unfortunately the biggest problem for motorcyclists is other drivers—they just aren't looking out for riders.



The best tip for motorcyclists is always be on the watch-out for potential problems. But there are ways riders can make themselves more visible to other drivers, according to the Motorcycle Safety Foundation:

- Ride with the cycle's headlight on at all times. Most new cycles come from the factory with a headlight that shines when the ignition is turned on.

- Wear bright colored clothing—especially on the upper part of your body—when you ride. Army green and denim blue may be the fashion but it's hard for drivers to see you in surrounding traffic.

- At night put reflective material on your helmet, jacket and cycle. A cycle's smaller silhouette is even more difficult for drivers to see at night.

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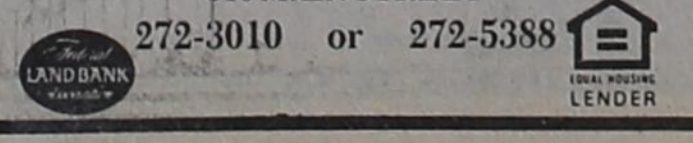

"He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life; and he that believeth not the Son shall not see life; but the wrath of God abideth on him" (John 3:36).

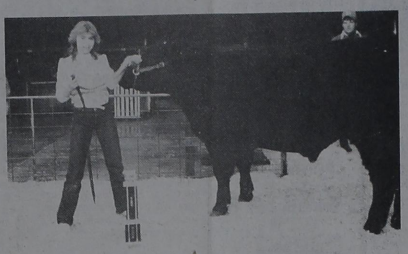
