

"When my generation inherited this country a few years ago, we were the richest and most respected nation on earth," he says. "But now look at us! We tried to buy our way into the hearts of nations all around the globe, with the end result that no one respects this country, we don't even respect each other, and we're the most debtridden country in existence. A couple more paragraphs to make you stop and think:

"We owe \$275 billion and they tell us that in the 1960's, the tab for social security will be around \$750 million. That's more than the combined debt of all the nations in the world. We're not the richest, we're the brokest nation in the world.

"Roosevelt's largest peacetime budget was \$9 billion in 1940 and we thought he was a spendthrift. Truman's largest peacetime budget was \$37 billion in 1950 and we thought he had gone insane with the rest of the country.

"Now only seven years later, Ike's asking for \$71.8 billion, and even his brother is wondering what has happened."

ered is a city bond election. If a city route is worked out, such an election will be required to finance the acquiring of the right-of-way.

The highway expansion might well be in the far distant future, as there are several other problems which will have to be ironed out before work can start. Before the road can be built, a right-of-way for the 11 miles from the city limits to the county line will have to be furnished by the county.

At the present time, farm-tomarket roads have deleted the county road fund and an election for a tax rate increase for replenishing it is in the making. However, the Parmer County commissioners court has indicated that even with a tax rate increase, it will do no more than finance farm road right-

of-way for several years.

To be ready for such a four-lane road whenever the county can pay for the rightof-way is what local promoters of a city route are hoping for.

The recent heavy rains have greatly improved the prospects for a good pecan crop in 1957. But, warns Extension Horticulturist B. G. Hancock, uncontrolled pecan nut casebearers can take millions of the prospective pounds of nuts. Now is the time to get on with the control job. The three most important phases of the control program are timing of the spray application, proper application of the spray and use of the right insecticide. Hancock urges pecan growers to check with their local county agent for details on a good control program.

Chickens need elbow room. Efficient broiler production demands at least two linear inches of available feeder space per bird. Tests conducted by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station showed that growth response was from two to five percent greater when chicks got sufficient feeder space.
