### THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

### The Cheapest Way

Next Thursday Parmer County property owners will vote on a 30-cent tax rate increase. If approved, the almost 30 percent hike will go toward paying off past indebtedness on farmto-market rights-of-way and for obtaining property easements for future roads built in the

As high as taxes for almost all tax-supported bodies are, no one likes to see another raise, but in this instance it will be the most economical way if the taxpayers approve the hike.

The increased tax rate is one of two ways the commissioners court can obtain the necessary funds for acquiring easements for farm roads, and it is by far the cheapest. The other way would be the raising of property valua-

The valuations have been the same in the county for many years, but they can and will be raised by the commissioners if there is no other alternative. This can be done without the vote of the people.

The tax rate is presently 95 cents per \$100 valuation and the revenue goes into five different funds. Ten cents of the figure goes into the right-of-way fund. To raise the valuation where the right-of-way fund would be adequate to meet present needs, it would overflow money in all the other funds, as well as to increase the state revenue, which is based on the same valuation.

The state rate is 65 cents, so every time the county receives 95 cents, 65 goes to the state. It is easy to see what the increase in valuations would do. With the increased tax rate, though, all the additional revenue will be designated to the purpose for which it is needed.

Whether or not a person believes that farmto-market roads are worth the money it costs the state and county (and few if any would say that they are not), approving the rate increase is the only logical way.

The state builds the roads all over Texas. The county has no say so in where the roads will be built, other than requesting ones which they think are needed. When one is approved for Parmer County, it would be foolish to not

To accept a road, the county has only to crease is the most economical way.

Four-lane highways are something the county is going to have to face sometime in the future. How this will be done, we don't know, but it would have been a nice set-up if it could all come under this one raise. Since it doesn't though, it will just have to be another bridge to cross later.

ditch seepage. The reason I still wonder why lies in the first reason, concerning poor distribution because of long rows. Of more importance than water application of fertilizer is the practice of having rows too long to control penetration of water. The end result of rows too long is tail water that finds its way into road ditches and lakes to be wasted from the standpoint of getting on crops.

The difference in having rows too long and having rows the correct length is the difference in irrigating and just watering. There is a difference.



## **Draggy Market** Slows Friona

A slow market at the first of potato digging season is acting as a mild brake on the 1957 crop, says John O'Haugherty, sales manager for Friona Growers and Shippers.

Potato digging and packing started last week at the Friona shed with the price beginning at \$2.60 for No. 1 potatoes. The price dipped slightly to \$2.50 by the middle of this week, O'-Haugherty reports.

The slight dip in price and amount of demand kept momentum of the digging from increasing. This may help more than it hurts, O'Haugherty says. /

"Size of the potatoes and the skin will improve when the potatoes are left in the ground to allow an advance in maturity. This will likely improve the quality and shipping," the sales manager says.

Only three growers had done any digging until the middle of this week. These included Earl Lance, Kenneth Neill, and John Henderson. Grade and percent of first class potatoes are good, reports USDA inspector Lee Morris of Edinburg.




