## Texas Voters To Polls Saturday In Primaries

Parmar County voters will join other voters throughout the state of Texas tomorrow (Saturday) in Democratic and Republican Primary elections.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. CDT, with voters deciding the fate of three contested Parmar County races in the Democratic Primary, in addition to contested races in both the Democratic and Republican primaries for United States Senator and United States Representative, District 19.

Also in the Democratic Primary there are several contested races for Supreme Court Justices and Court of Criminal Appeals Judges.

Parmar County Clerk Bonnie Warren advises that voters may cast ballots in either the Republican Primary or the Democratic Primary, but not in both.

Candidates in the contested races for Parmar County offices on the Democratic ballot (in the order of which their names appear) include:

Incumbent M.C. (Bill) Morgan, Jr. and Steven K. Hillock seeking the office of County Sheriff.

Incumbent Archie Tarter and Robert White seeking the office of County Commissioner, Precinct No. 3.

T.A. Kelley and incumbent Ernest E. Anthony, candidates for County Commissioner, Precinct No. 1.

Unopposed Democratic candidates seeking county offices include: incumbent Charles Aycock for County Attorney; and incumbent Hugh Moseley, County Tax Assessor-Collector; as well as County Chairman and Precinct Chairmen.

No Republican candidates have filed for the county offices.

On the Democratic ballot in the heated race for United States Senator, the candidates are Robert S. Sullivan, David Young, Kent Hance, Robert (Bob) Krueger, Lloyd Doggett, and Harley Schlanger.

For United States Representative, District 19, also a

heated race, the candidates are Delwin Jones, Gary D. Condra, John Selby, Don R. Richards, and Thomas M. (Tom) Richards.

On the Republican ballot for United States Senator, the candidates are Phil Gramm, Rob Mosbacher, Henry C. (Hank) Grover, and Ron Paul.

For United States Representative, District 19, candidates on the Republican ballot are Larry Combest, Richard Wilder, Ron Fleming, and Tom Schaefer.

Two years ago, Hershel Walker forsook his last year of football at the University of Georgia to play professional ball. Hershel took a lot of flack in the national press. We wrote a paragraph supporting his actions and likewise got jumped upon from some local football fans. We still believe Walker did the right thing for himself and his family.

We bring this out of the past as a prelude to saying that we do not agree with the decision of Akeem Olajuwon of the Houston Cougars in turning to pro basketball with a year of college remaining. We think there is a significant difference in these cases.

Walker needed the money and so did his family. He had no other obligations in life. His pro contract solved money problems for him for life if he takes care of it.

Akeem is different. We have read where he originally was sent to the University of Houston by his family to be educated so that he could assist them in their business in Nigeria. His size and ability put him into basketball, but he has a family and a National obligation to consider in his life. Shortchanging his education will later shortchange his family and his country.

Emerging countries need the help that their educated sons can give them in this advancing world. The National Basketball Association is shortpotting Akeem, his family, and his country by allowing him to play before his education is completed.

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**Commissioners Court Accepts Pickup Bid**

Parmer County Commissioners Court, due to the absence of Judge Porter Roberts because of illness, was presided over by Commissioner Ernest Anthony in its regular meeting on Monday, April 23, in the county courtroom.

Bids on a new pickup advertised for by Precinct No. 1 were opened. Bids were received from Reeve Chevrolet-Olds of Friona and Friona Ford Sales, Inc. of Friona. After a discussion of the bids as submitted, the Commissioners agreed to accept the bid by Friona Ford Sales, Inc. The pickup was purchased with radial tires for a trade difference of \$6,334.80.

The Panhandle Regional Housing Finance Corp. Board was discussed, and it was pointed out that in order not to have such a large board and to make it easier to form a quorum, Parmer County needed to appoint someone to represent the county. Approved was the appointment of F. Michael Carr of

Deaf Smith County as this county's representative.

A request was received from Petty-Ray Geophysical Division of Geosource Inc. to do a survey on League 316 in Gaines-Andrew County. Permission was granted by the Court and Commissioner Anthony was authorized to sign the permit for the geophysical survey.

A letter was received by the Court from Tom Nichols resigning from the Parmer County Industrial Board. The resignation was accepted, and Commissioner Anthony explained that a new member would be appointed by the Industrial Board.

Commissioner Anthony reported that he had been approached by B.K. Buske concerning some expenses of the Industrial Board such as postage, telephone, stationery, and some mileage. The Court discussed the work put in by the board members and progress which they are making in bringing in new industry. The Court

approved the payment of actual expenses, subject to their review.

Don West of Bravo Pipe Line met with the Commissioners and he gave a list of counties which had already signed easements. He said that none of these counties had charged for the crossings. After a lengthy discussion on the reasons for charging for the crossings, the Court unanimously agreed to stay with the decision to charge and discuss the matter further with County Attorney Charles Aycock.

Bill Holt, Child Protective Supervisor of Amarillo, and Cindy Burnam, case worker for the Child Welfare Board, met with the Court. They explained the areas covered by the Child

Welfare Board and the number of workers who cover the area. Holt explained further the need for another worker for this area, and also explained a new funding called "Split Funding," where the state pays half and the county pays half of a case worker's salary.

In this area, three counties are involved, so each county would pay one-third of the half. This item was tabled until Holt can visit with the other counties involved, and he will meet back with the Court at a later date.

The following soil conservation work was approved and ratified, to be performed when the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the roads: Precinct No. 2 - Buck Ellison and Dale Berggren.

The place of embarkation was Pill, a tidewater port five miles down the River Avon from Bristol, England. Meticulous research for the painting was done in 15 different museums, libraries, galleries, and scientific institutions in America and England.

The size of the original painting is 4 x 6 feet, and has been reduced to 20 x 8 inches in this first reproduction.



**"Older Texans Make Health Last a Lifetime"**

For older Texans, healthy habits can make a difference now. That's why the theme for this year's older Texan month is "health; make it last a lifetime."

Your past health habits may not be worth bragging about, but a change now can increase your chance for a longer, healthier, more enjoyable life. Experts in aging tell us that developing positive habits in diet, exercise, and stress management can help anyone—no matter what their age.

To develop positive dietary habits, you must first take a critical look at what you eat. It's important that you eat a nutritious, balanced diet and avoid excessive amounts of sugar, salt, fat, alcohol and calories.

Changing eating habits at age 60 cannot completely erase the results of a lifetime of poor nutrition. But an increase in healthy eating practices can benefit your health status and feeling of well being.

For example, losing excess weight may help arthritis be more mobile with less pain, increasing intake of water and fiber can enable some people to discontinue laxatives, and reducing salt can contribute to lowered blood pressure.

Exercise is important too. Regular exercise increases your circulation, flexibility, strength, coordination and stamina. It not only makes you feel better physically and mentally, but also strengthens that important muscle—the heart.

An exercise program doesn't have to be complicated. It can be walking, dancing, swimming, or even a movement routine performed sitting in a chair. Whatever you choose, you need to exercise for 15-20 minutes at least three times a week.

Finally, remember that coping with and reducing stress has been linked to health and happiness. Chronic stress can lead to high blood pressure, ulcers and depression. While we all have some stress in our lives, too much can threaten our health. Recognize the stressful events in your life and then find some ways to deal with that

stress. If you want to improve your diet, begin an exercise program or reduce stress, plenty of help is available. You can find free nutrition and stress control information at your county Extension office. Many people find that hobbies, friends, family, and religious activities help them deal with stress. Senior citizens centers, community education programs, and Extension offices also sponsor special programs where you can enjoy the company of other people while you learn about nutrition and exercise.

Recombinant DNA, a practice more commonly known as "cloning" or "genetic engineering," is under study by Texas A&M University veterinary scientists to determine if it can produce healthier, heftier cattle.

Dr. James Womack, a geneticist, and Dr. Duane Kraemer, a pioneer in embryo transfer studies, are leading tests with cattle regarding the insertion of genetic material from one strain of mammal to the embryo of another.

Immediately following the dinner, the awards will be presented in the new educational complex. These awards will be handed out to the top high school athletes.


Tickets are now on sale for the banquet at \$3.50 each, and may be purchased at the high school office. Tickets purchased at the door will be \$4.00 each.


