Cowboy Bill Bates Is Banquet Speaker



Farwell Banquet Speaker

Dallas Cowboy Bill Bates, NFL Specialty Teams Player of the Year, will be the guest speaker at the annual Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet tomorrow night (Saturday), May 19, at 7:30 p.m. in Farwell Community Center.

The 6'1", 198-pound free agent rookie was also named to the All Rookie Team by the pro football writers and the UPI. Bates plays safety on the special teams and was a starter on the Cowboys' 4-0 defense, and Coach Tom Landry has nothing

but praise for the rookie. Bates' defensive play has been described as a crash landing about belly-button high on a ball carrier. Bates is a Knoxville, Tenn. native, and was a starter all four years as safety at the University of Tennessee.

The "Mystery Cowboy" speaker is no longer a mystery.

Dallas Cowboy Bill Bates, No. 40, free agent rookie who plays on special teams and the 4-0 defense, will be the guest speaker at the Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture Banquet tomorrow night (Saturday) at 7:30 p.m. in the Farwell Community Center.

Bates' superior play and tremendous impact on the specialty teams earned him the "NFL Specialty Teams Player of the Year" award in 1983. He was also named to the All Rookie Team by the pro football writers and United Press International (UPI).

The 6'1", 198-pound safety and starter on the Cowboys' 4-0 defense has drawn nothing but praise from Coach Tom Landry. Sports commentator John Madden told a national television audience that Landry had confided in him that if the Cowboys had five Bill Bateses, the coach wouldn't have to tell the defense what kind of coverage to run.

Dallas sportswriter Randy Galloway said "it's nothing really new when rookie Bill Bates makes a crash landing about belly-button high on a ball carrier, and it isn't exactly a scoop in Dallas that this kid loves to deliver a lick.

"Commenter Madden has made Bates the most famous part-time player in the NFL," writes Galloway, "and it's a kick to tune in on TV and listen to Madden describe the kamikaze play of Bates.

"Bates fooled the computer," said Galloway. "Early on, it was determined that Bates would hit, but no one was saying for sure if he could play. Because his position is safety, and his 40 speed is 4.7, the computer belched at the mere mention of

Bates' name.

"A month into the season, even with Bates going bazai crazy on the field and Madden telling the TV audience, 'watch No. 40, he'll smash somebody,' secondary coach Gene Stallings was cautious.

"Stallings started bringing in Bates as linebacker in the 4-0 defense, and that's where he's had success. But down the line, could he survive as a 4.7 safety?"

"That question, Stallings said, has been answered, 'We got us a player' is Stallings' opinion."

Writer Robert Vernon of the Dallas Cowboys Weekly wrote, "Although he loves playing football and he admits the attention ain't too bad either, the biggest thrill Bates gets is playing in all the places his heroes played."

"It's great," said Bates, "to go to all the different places we play and realize that all the greats who have played the game have played there, and to know that now you are part of it. Sometimes that makes me stop and think."

In his college career, Bates started all four years as a safety at the University of Tennessee.

He played in three bowl games: Peach Bowl, Garden State Bowl, and the Bluebonnet Bowl. He was named All-American his freshman and sophomore years, and was All-Southeast Conference his junior year and second team All-SEC his senior year. In his senior year, Bates served as captain of the team.

Bates is a native of Knoxville, Tenn. He is involved with the March of Dimes, Special Olympics, Fellowship of Christian Athletes, Knoxville Boys Club, and he participated in the D.D. Lewis Golf Tournament, benefiting the Boys Club.

Bill Bates is single, and resides in Dallas.

Another highlight at the Chamber banquet will be the drawing for the winner of two tickets to a Dallas Cowboy home game, from among the correct guesses of the Cowboy speaker on the stubs of all advanced ticket purchases.

Tickets are available from any Chamber member, or may be purchased at the door at a cost of \$8.75 for adults and \$6.00 for children under 12 years of age.

Also highlighting the banquet will be the naming of Farwell's Man and Woman of the Year. Last year's honorees, Joe Jones and Gertrude Foster, will make the presentation and announce this year's top citizens.

All past honorees from the years 1970 through 1983 will be recognized, and it is hoped that all these past top citizens of Farwell and their families will be present at this year's banquet for the recognition.

The Honorable District Judge Jack D. Young will be master of ceremonies, and Jerry Monk will introduce the guest speaker.

Ed and Juanita Hardage will provide the dinner music, before and during the catered meal.

The Community Center is ready, and this annual event promises to be one of great enjoyment, say the Chamber members, so those persons who have not already purchased their tickets may do so from any chamber member or they may be purchased at the door. Either way, just plan to be there for an entertaining evening, urge the banquet planners.

be by school board members Joe Hughes and Wilbert Kalbas. Julia Symcox and Susan Johnson will provide the processional and recessional music.

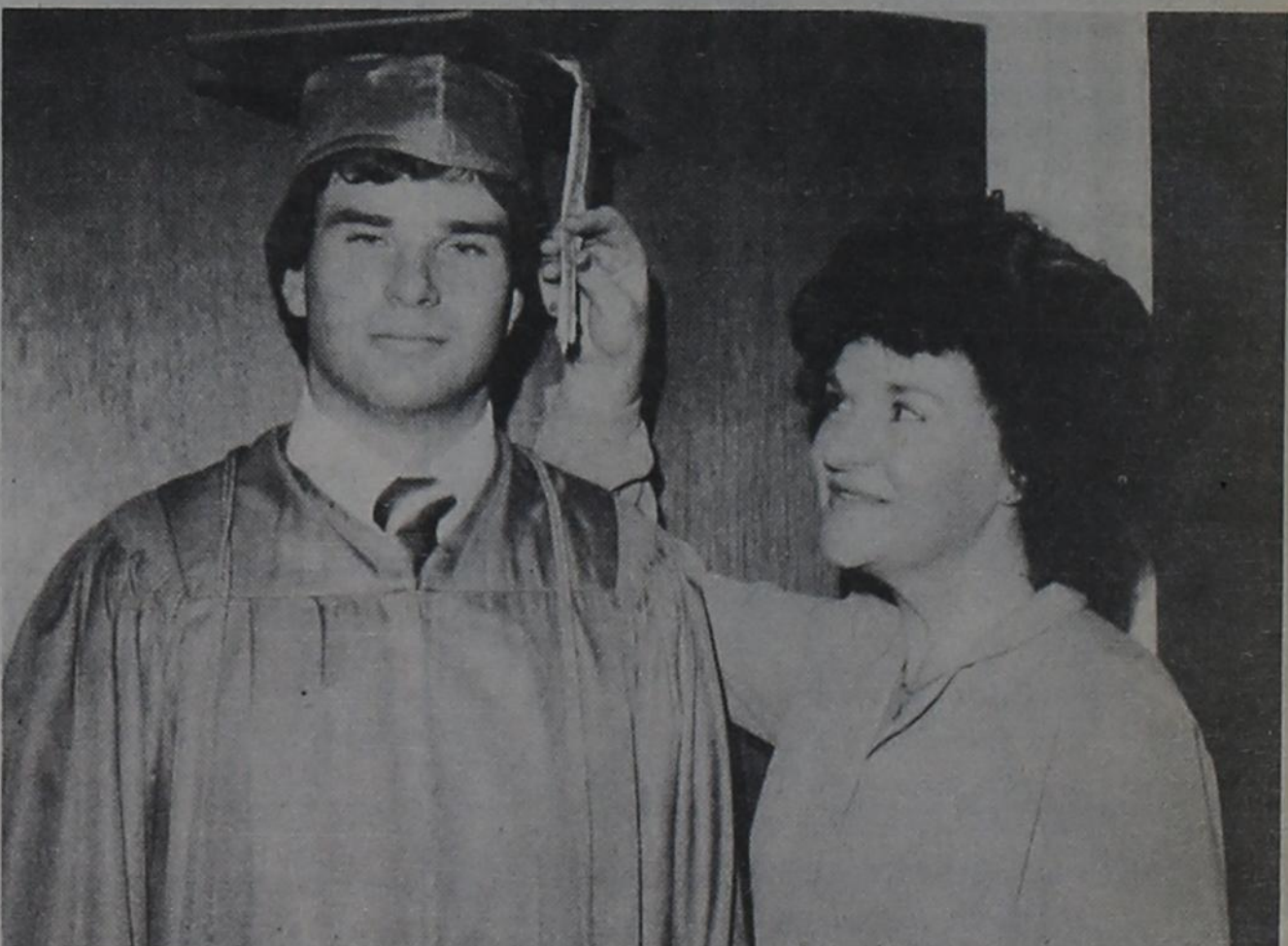

Area-Wide Meeting Tues. On Condominium Interest

Area residents are reminded of the meeting scheduled by the Farwell Hospital District on Tuesday, May 22, at 7 p.m. CDT in Farwell Community Center.

The area-wide meeting has been set to determine if there is enough interest in condominium living for elderly persons.

Reese Graves, development consultant from the Good Samaritan Society, and the Farwell Hospital District board members will present information about condominium living for the elderly.

Duplexes or apartments in a condominium setting are 500 - 700 square feet, with one bed-

room and a self-sufficient kitchen. The units are not connected to the nursing facility, but offer independence and security, with personal and supportive services. Meals would be available in the central dining room if desired.

The Good Samaritan Society, Inc. pioneered the campus or village concept over 30 years ago. The significant feature is that various types of care—from self care with supportive services in apartments to skilled nursing home care—are offered at one location.

Studies have shown that with supportive services such as help

with bathing, intravenous injections by nurses, and the availability of the central dining room, apartment residents can live independently for several more years than is otherwise the case.

Area residents are urged to attend the meeting to learn more about condominium living for the elderly with "beautiful surroundings and personal services provided, to enhance independence and life-style."

Farwell School Board Approves UIL Events

Farwell School Board, in a busy session on Monday night, May 9, approved the UIL activities, accepted two teacher resignations, and hired one teacher, among other items on the agenda.

Participation in the following UIL activities was approved: football, boys' and girls' basketball, boys' and girls' track, boys' and girls' golf, boys' and girls' tennis, one-act play, and all of the academic and literary events of the Spring meet.

The Board accepted the resignations of Kay Stanton, who will continue her studies an ENMU, and Bettie Martin, who has accepted a position with Alamogordo High School.

Mrs. Rex Cumpton was hired as an aide in the high school Resource Room for the 1984-85 school year, and approval was given to Lynn Burton, high school principal, to hire an assistant band director, guitar and history teacher at a salary of \$4500 above the state salary schedule.

In other action, the Board approved the senior trip plans and the use of a bus to transport the seniors to Amarillo, where

they will take a chartered bus to Florida. Members also approved the use of the cafeteria for the Junior-Senior Banquet and granted permission for the prom if it is properly supervised.

The Board voted to continue contracts with Region XVI Education Service Center on the Bilingual Staff Development Cooperative, Chapter II Contracted Services Agreement, Media Contract, Chapter I ECIA Technical Assistance Agreement, and Chapter I ECIA Migrant Cooperative Agreement.

Howard Carlyle presented a report on the results of the TABS test to the Board, and members approved the nomina-

tion of Max Reno as trustee of TASB, and appointed member Joe Hughes as delegate and member Wilbert Kalbas as alternate to the TASB Delegate Assembly, which is to be in San Antonio Sept. 29 - Oct. 1.

The Board studied the 1984-85 budget, but action on the budget was postponed to a later date. In final action, the financial report was approved and bills were paid.

Attending the meeting were Board members Joe Hughes, Wilbert Kalbas, Floyd Coates, Steve Pierson, Richard Hasehoff, and Edward Corn; also W.M. Roberts, Lynn Burton, Jerry Dee Owen, James Craig, Howard Carlyle, and Richard Montgomery.

Base Work Underway

The contractor is at work preparing new base for asphalt surfacing on FM 3333 from U.S. Highway 60, five miles north-east of Farwell, east to FM Highway 1731, says Rhea E. Bradley, supervising resident engineer, State Department of Highways and Public Trans-

portation, of Littlefield.

It is expected that the contractor will begin asphalt surfacing in the near future. It is anticipated that this project will be completed in June 1984.

A concession stand will be open serving snacks and soft drinks.



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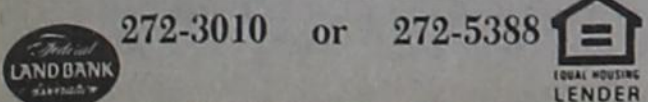

Commissioner Anthony Presides Over Session

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session on Monday, May 14, with Commissioner Ernest Anthony presiding as chairman in the absence of Judge Porter Roberts who is ill.

Chairman Anthony pointed out that the next meeting date of the Court would fall on May 28 which is a holiday, so the Commissioners set the next meeting date on May 25 at 10 a.m. The courthouse will be closed on May 28 in observance of Memorial Day.

A bill in the amount of \$300.50 for an attorney ad-litem for juvenile hearings, as well as boarding care bills for county foster children in the amount of \$2,070.00 were approved for payment. The later amount will be reimbursed to the county.

Commissioner Anthony had been approached by Parmer County Community Hospital for help on indigent care, and after discussion, the Court approved the payment of \$4,227.85 to help with indigent care.

Specifications were presented on a motor grader needed for Precinct #3, and the Court approved the advertisement for bids for the purchase of a motor grader. Bids will be opened June 11 at 11 a.m.

At the suggestion of the county treasurer, the Court ap-

proved that C.D.s maturing on 5-15-84, be reinvested as follows: Farm to Market C.D.s of \$200,000 and \$100,000 to mature 6-12-84; two General Fund C.D.s of \$100,000 to mature 6-29-84; and a General Fund C.D. of \$150,000 to mature 6-12-84. The above C.D.s are invested for short terms to be accessible when needed before a date has expired.

Also approved by the Court was a \$5.00 tax which the state allows a county to charge on registered vehicles. This tax remains in the county and is used for the upkeep of roads and maintainers. This \$5.00 tax will be charged on all registered vehicles.

A group of Parmer and Bailey county men met with the Court to discuss forming a Bailey-Parmer County Agricultural Development Corporation.

After a lengthy discussion, this item was tabled until further information can be obtained.

A letter had been received expressing interest in leasing some Parmer County School land in Gaines County, and the Court requested that a letter be sent asking that a representative meet with the Court on June 11, to discuss the land in question.

In final action, the Court approved and ratified the following soil conservation work to be performed when the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the roads:

Precinct 2: Wm. Gromowsky, John F. Dixon, Kregg Wilson, Leon Schilling, and Norvell Strawn.

Precinct 4: Mike Miller, Bill Hunt, Rusty Whitt, DeWitt Precure, James Glaze, and Mike Fred.

Farwell City Council Accepts Coating Bid

Farwell City Council, meeting Monday evening voted to accept the bid of Lipham Construction of Aspermont to seal coat the city streets. A bid was also submitted by Applan Corporation of Hereford.

Three representatives of McCaw Communications, Lynell Skarda, Gordon Smith, and Shelley Ford, were on hand for the meeting to discuss the new franchise ordinance and to give a demonstration of the new machine which will operate the expanded cable system.

Following discussion of the

new franchise ordinance, the Council decided to table the issue until the recommended changes made by City Attorney Charles Aycock could be discussed.

After approving the bills for payment the Council granted permission for City Clerk Janie Bowery to attend a revenue sharing workshop in Lubbock.

Those present at the meeting were Councilmen Jerry Monk and Fred Chandler, and Bob Baker, Dee Hammit, Janie Bowery, and the three cable company representatives.

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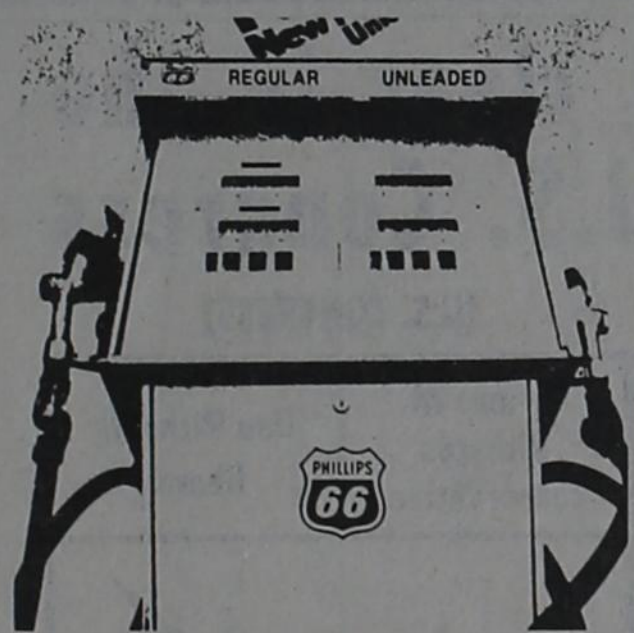
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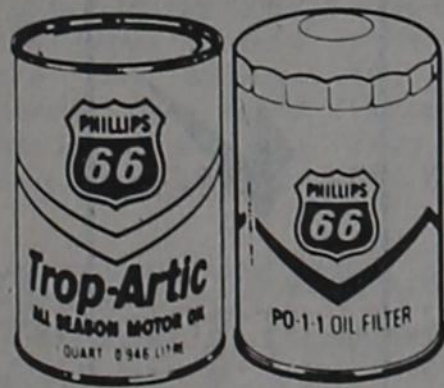

"Many persons want to warm themselves by fires they did not build. You are living in the greatest nation in the world which was carved out of black wilderness, and many people in

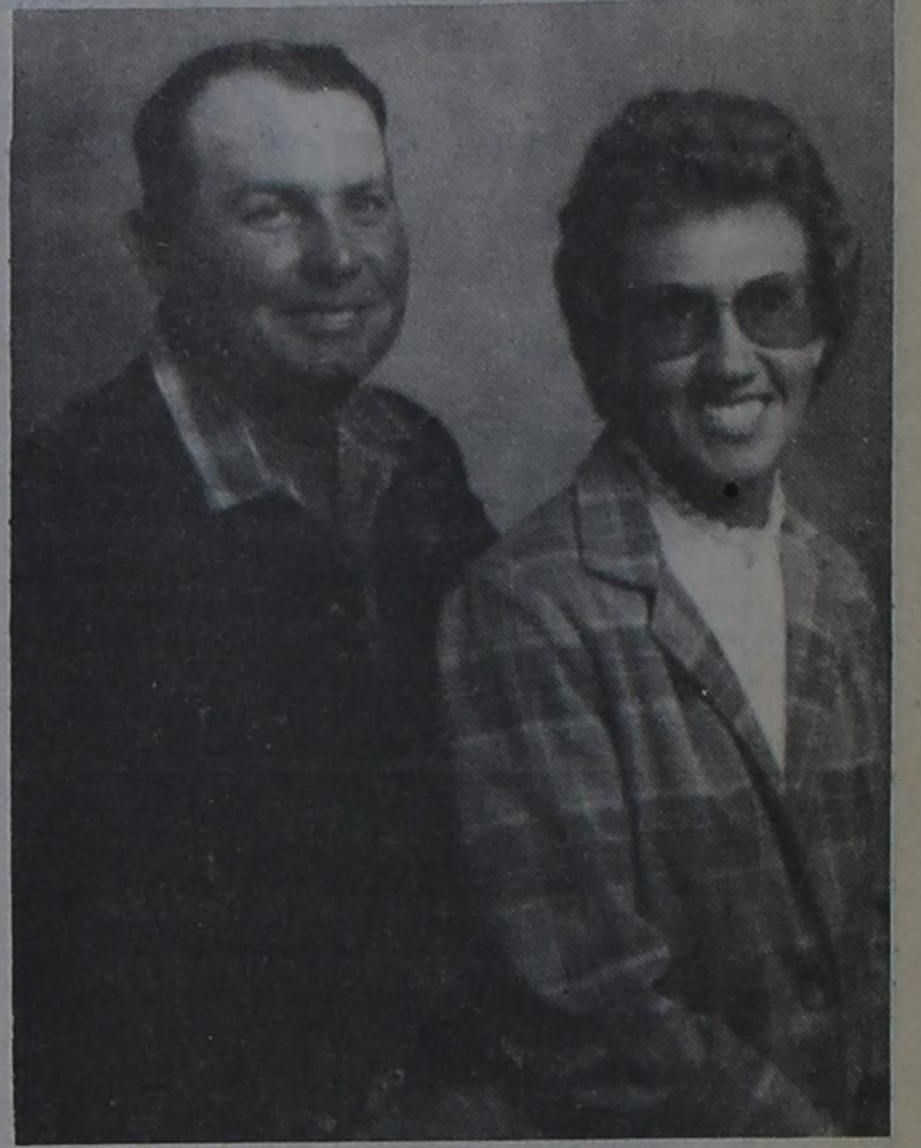
those days built the great fires," Gates continued.

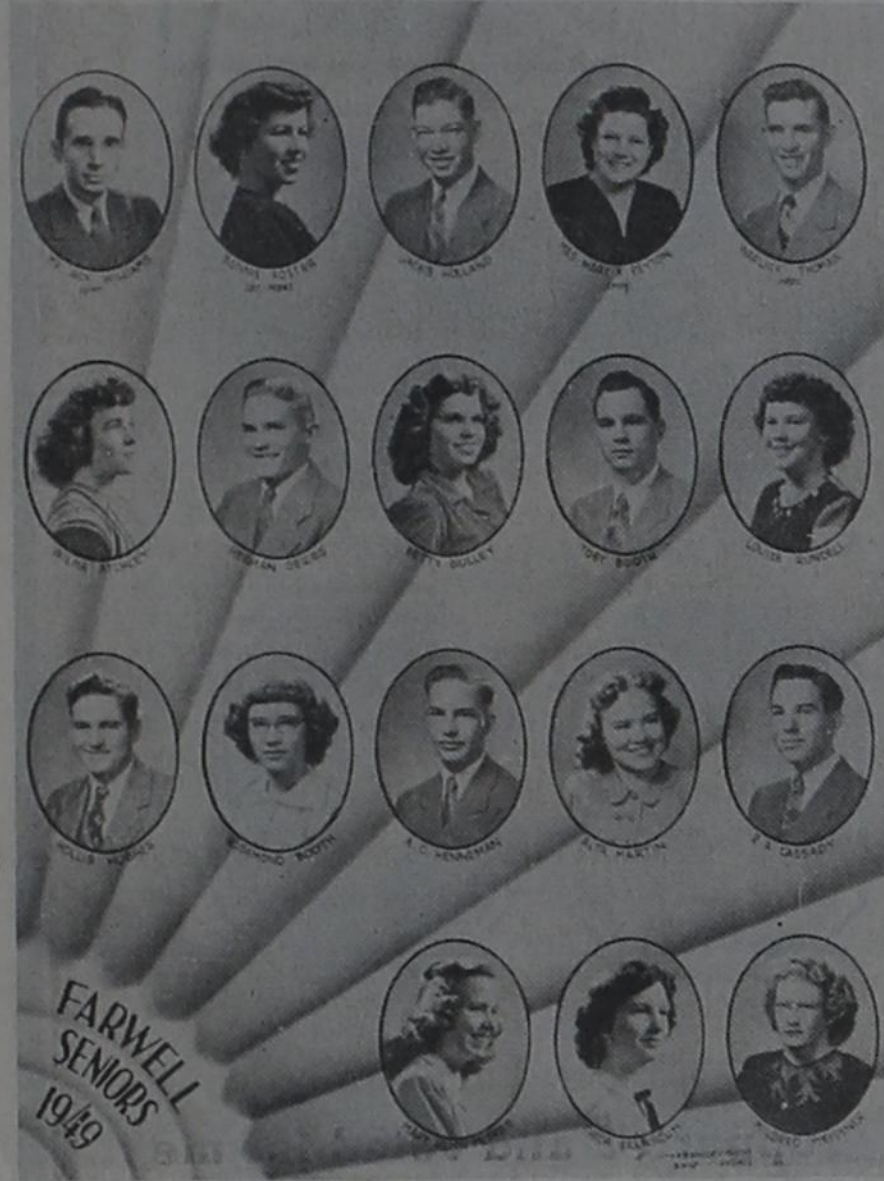

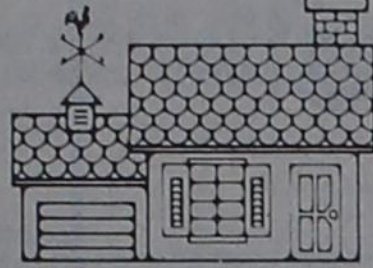

"Salad Bar Nutrition"

The salad bar is becoming an American institution. They can now be found in every type of restaurant from fast food stores to the finest steak houses.

Of course, restaurants have salad bars because their customers want them. When the magazine Restaurants and Institutions recently asked customers what menu items they're ordering more often, salad was the number one answer.

People like salad bars for a variety of reasons, most of them having to do with nutrition. Often they'll say they eat at the salad bar because it's not fattening, it's nutritious, you can make it any way you want, you can make a whole meal out of it, and it's good for you even if you're on a special diet.

Salad bars can live up to these nutritional expectations but it's not automatic. Whether your salad is high in nutrients, low in calories, right for your special diet, or adequate for a one-dish meal, depends entirely upon the choices you make.

For some people, a salad is a bowl of iceberg lettuce with dressing. That type of salad is high in fiber and low in calories if you don't over-do it on the

dressing. But you can do better nutritionally by adding vegetables high in vitamins A and C.

Pale green leaves, such as iceberg lettuce, don't provide much vitamin A and C. But dark green leaves like Romaine lettuce and spinach do. The typical salad bar also has many other good vitamin A and C sources such as hot red peppers, broccoli, carrots, cauliflower, and coleslaw.

Vegetables can't do everything for you, however, so if your salad is supposed to be an entire meal, you should include some non-vegetable ingredients like bacon bits, shredded cheese, chopped egg, or cottage cheese. These are good sources of protein, calcium and riboflavin.

Some nutrients, like thiamin, iron and niacin, are primarily supplied by foods you don't often see at salad bars, such as meats and grain products.

If you're looking for a low-calorie meal, the salad bar may not necessarily be the best place to find it. By choosing helpings of potato salad, cottage cheese, gelatin and coleslaw along with your vegetables, then topping it with bacon bits and croutons

and using a non-diet dressing, you can wind up with more calories than a "regular" meal.

To keep your calorie count down when you go to the salad bar, follow these suggestions from the American Council on Science and Health:

*Select the plain raw vegetables because they have the lowest calorie counts.

*Don't take too many pickled foods. They're somewhat higher in calories because sugar is added in the pickling process. Pickled beets, for example, have twice as many calories as plain beets.

*Avoid the non-vegetable items such as cottage cheese and the various high-calorie dressings. Cottage cheese and cheese are good sources of calcium, however, so you might want to include them if you are not normally a milk-drinker.

*Stay away from prepared salads like coleslaw, potato salad, and marinated salads. Prepared salads are higher in calories than plain vegetables because they use high-calorie dressings. For example, coleslaw contains more than six times the calories of plain cabbage.

*Use only a small amount of diet dressing. Some diet dressings have as much as 30 calories a tablespoon, and the calories will add up fast if you use a large amount.

Conservation tillage prevents erosion and increases farm profits by reducing operating costs of tillage operations.

There are several forms of conservation tillage. Conservation tillage is the best environment possible for growing a crop with a limited amount of soil disturbance. Retention of residue on the soil surface after planting for protection from erosion is the major reason for conservation tillage.

Examples of conservation tillage include no-till, non-inversion tillage, and strip tillage.

No-till consists of planting in undisturbed residue. Herbicides are used to kill growing crops after harvest and control weeds.

Non-inversion tillage consists of using sweeps or chisels to kill growing crops following harvest and retain residues on the sur-

face. Succeeding crop is planted in remaining residue which is adequate for protection from erosion. Herbicides may be used in this system to aid in the control of weeds.

Strip tillage system consists of preparing a seedbed no wider than 1/2 of the distance between the rows in which to plant the succeeding crop in the previous crop's residue. Two-thirds of the area is left untilled with protective cover of mulch to prevent erosion.

These are just three forms of conservation tillage. There are many others and different combinations which can be adapted for different farming operations.

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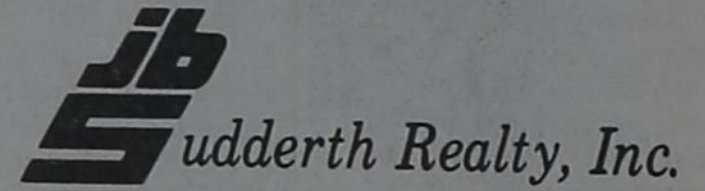

"We are interested in getting applications by June 1 from students all over the state, but particularly West Texas," the Midland College and former Texas Tech journalism director, said.

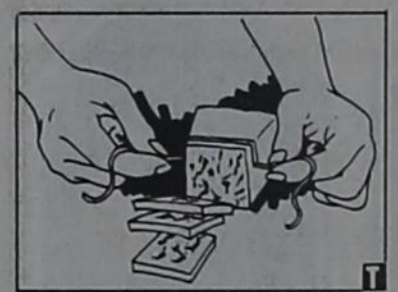
Ample housing is available in the city, Sellmeyer noted, and for those students living away from Midland, the college will assist in finding suitable living quarters.

Cooking Hints

On pasta and casseroles, in salads and toasted sandwiches, with bread and fruit or a glass of wine, cheese can fill a hundred chinks in your meal plans with satisfying nourishment. A new book called *Betty Crocker's Kitchen Secrets*, shares with cooks everywhere authoritative, up-to-date information on cheeses, plus dozens of other culinary hints in categories ranging from Beverages through Vegetables.



To cut Bleu or Roquefort cheese without crumbling, use a piece of dental floss or heavy thread. (To prevent cooked cheese from becoming stringy use low

temperatures and avoid overcooking.) Add cheese in small pieces or shreds to casseroles for quick, even melting.

Firm cheese will freeze well if tightly wrapped in small amounts. Thaw in refrigerator to prevent crumbling. Save leftover bits of cheese by freezing and using later to blend with cream for spreads and dips.

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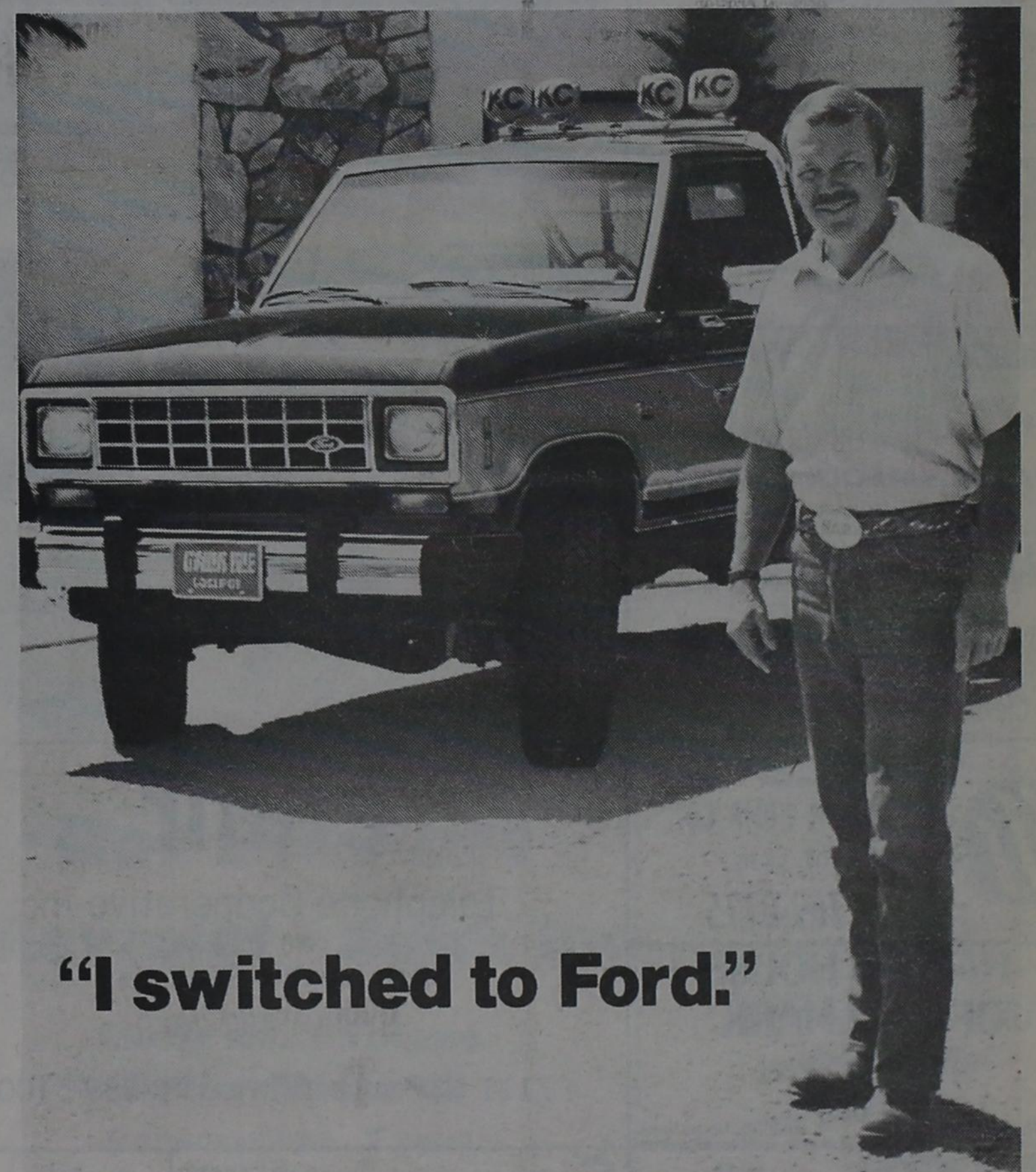
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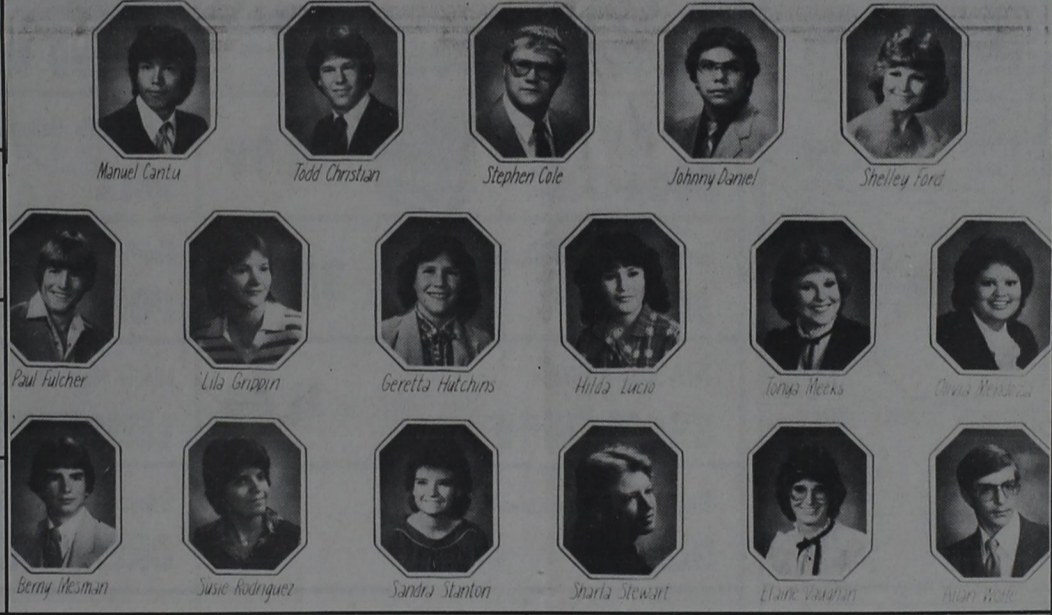

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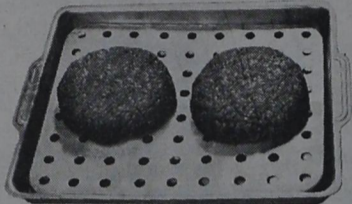
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
