Following completion of seminary, he joined the New Mexico Annual Conference, accepting his first appointment in Grants in 1982.

uled a Harvest Festival for Nov. 11-14, he said.

Plans are also to become more involved in the Meals on Wheels program, Stephens said.

The goal for the United Methodist Church as a whole, is evangelism and spiritual growth for the next four years, Stephens said.

When making theological statements, the United Methodist, world wide, uses the Wesleyan Quadrilateral - scripture - tradition - reason - experience.

Stephens said, "Scripture is primary but the other three are important too."

The United Methodist in general, Stephens said, is a pluralistic and inclusive church. There have been women ministers in the Methodist church since 1925.

"We believe in everyone being involved in the church. We have lots of ethnic minorities and people from

We worried about putting on too much weight, after our landlady brought over some brownies, and the church ladies showed up with some goodies, too.

We were looking for a quiet, friendly place to spend the rest of our lives and we believe we have found it. It's nice to live in a place where we can share the same philosophical and religious feelings that most folks here have.

Now, mind you, we are not without our weaknesses. I'm a dyed-in-the-wool Chicago Cub baseball fan, for example. If you ever see me in a morose mood during the baseball season, you can bet dollars to doughnuts that the Cubs lost the previous day.

Being a lifelong Cub fan ought to tell you something about me - they haven't won a title since 1945 and end up more times in the cellar than you can shake a stick at. But I'm a strong believer in loyalty and as long as John Getz stays a Republican, I'll stay a Cub fan.

Speaking of the Cubs, you might enjoy this vignette:

When I first arrived in the Washington, D.C., area six years ago, I wrote a column about my passion, the Chicago Cubs. Soon afterward, I received a letter from this fellow in Washington who told me that I had just become No. 71 on the roles of the Emil Verban Memorial Society.

It seems that this fellow, also a longtime Cub believer, had started a friendly group of diehard Cub fans in the area. There were no dues, they met for lunch once a year and he published a quarterly newsletter.

With that initial letter came a list of the other 70 members (which since has doubled). It included a Supreme Court Justice, several Senators and Representatives, heads of national organizations, prominent journalists - and little, old me.

I was impressed.

And why was it called the Emil Verban Memorial Society? Well, it seems that Emil "the Antelope" Verban played for the Cubbies in the years right after World War II. And he set some kind of record for never hitting a home run in Wrigley Field, the home of the Cubs.

For those who don't know much about professional baseball, Wrigley Field is a very small park, and with the wind blowing out, even a Punch and Judy hitter can stroke a home run.

But in his years with the Cubs, Emil Verban didn't succeed at that feat. Sort of symbolized the Cub mystique.

Anyway, outside of reading the newsletter, I never got involved in the affairs of the club. But I'll never forget reading this note in one of the last newsletters I got:

It seems that one club member was driving down the back roads of Central Illinois when, wouldn't you know it, he spied a farm mail box with the name "Emil Verban" on it.

So he pulled his car into the driveway, got out, rang the bell, and asked the fellow who answered if he was THE Emil Verban of baseball fame.

Indeed, he was "the Antelope," the man responded.

Then the club member told Emil about the Washington, D.C., club and the fact that it was named after Emil for his "non-feat."

Emil didn't think it funny. No sense of humor, these farmers.

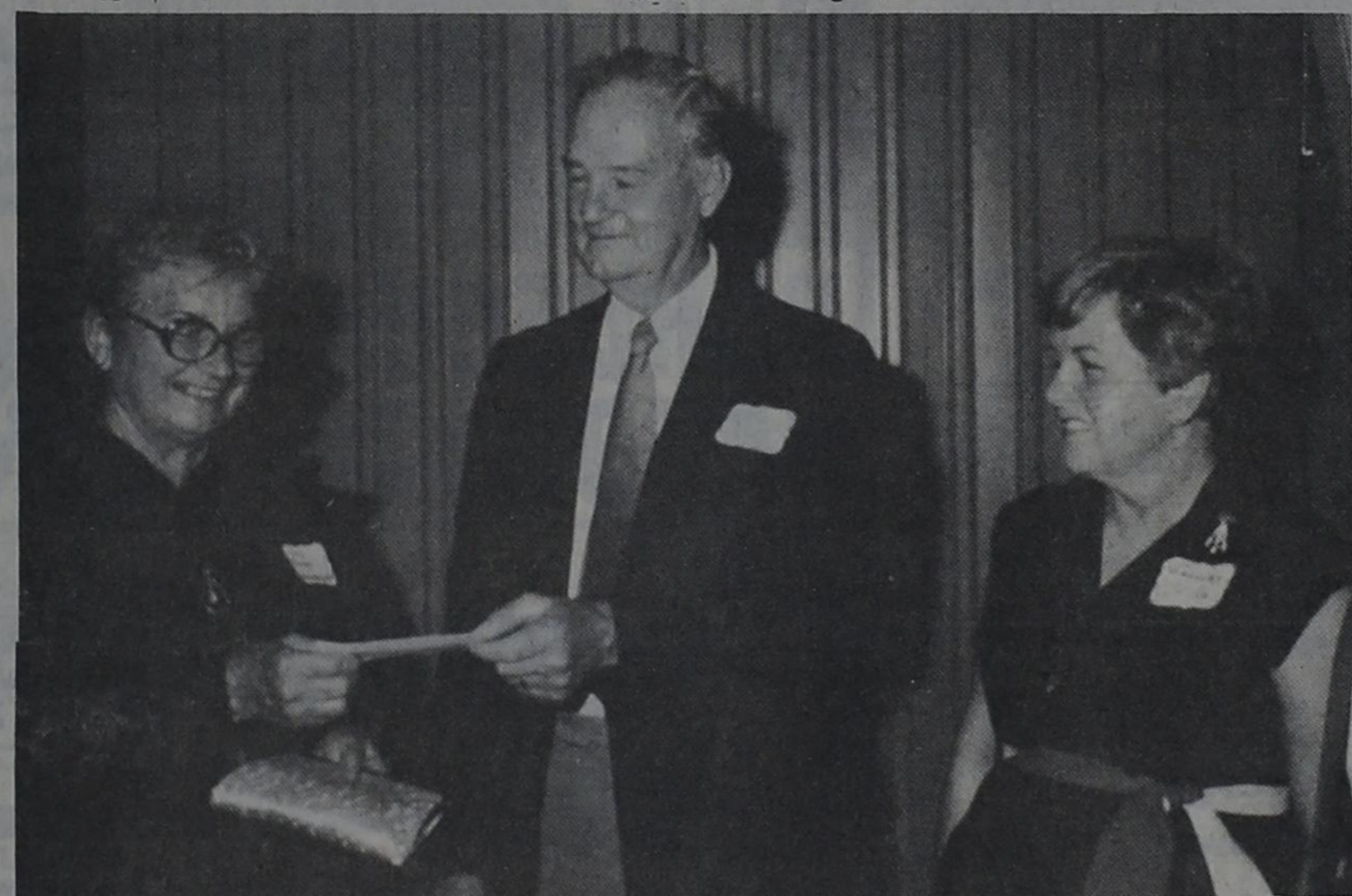
skiing and water skiing. He also likes to read, fish, talk and drink coffee.

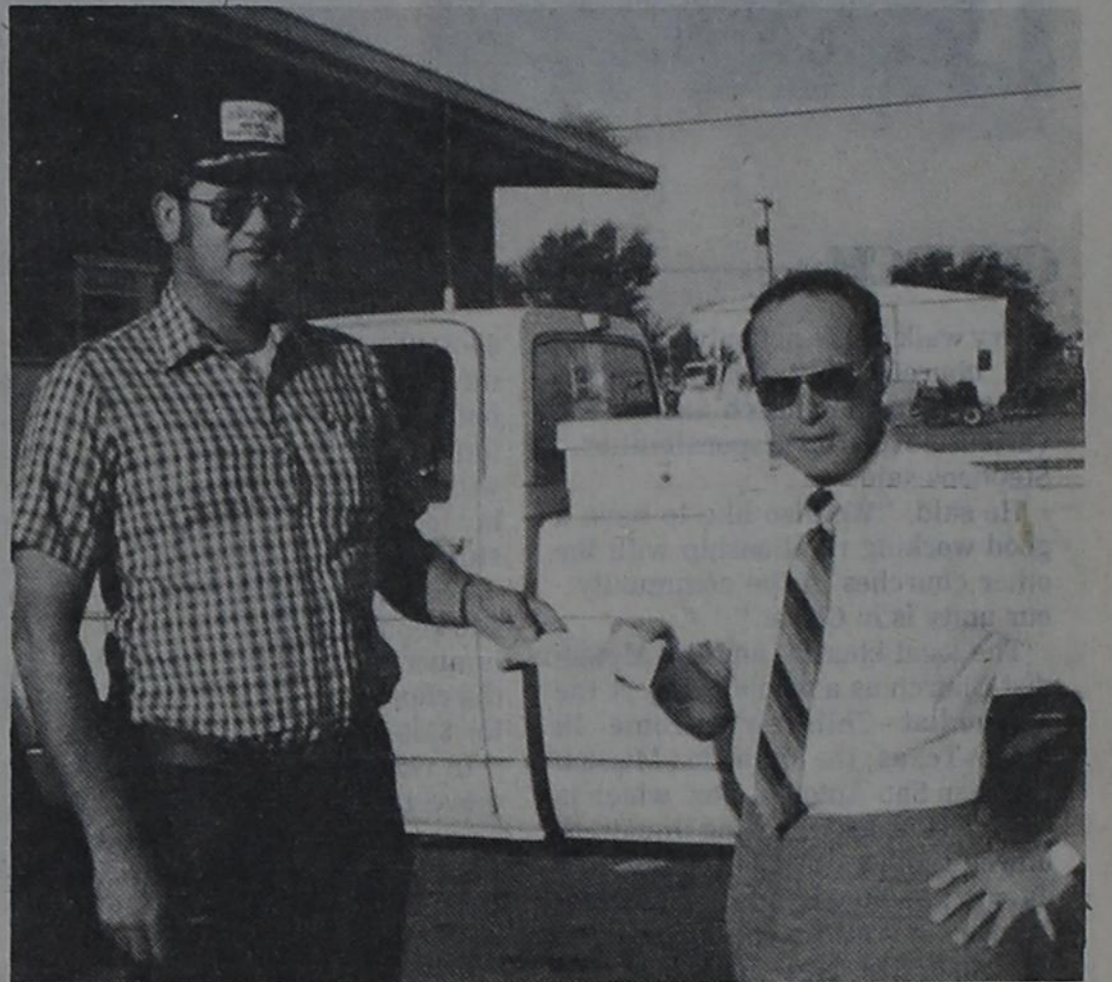

Practice starts Oct. 1

Dr. W.T. Green will be in "full swing" practice at the Farwell Clinic on Oct. 1.

He will begin seeing patients Sept. 24 for physicals and medical situations not requiring dispensing of narcotics.

Dr. Green is currently waiting for his federal license to be renewed. This will be final Oct. 1. The renewal is the result of his having practiced out of the United States for the past four years.

Although it has been awhile since Dr. Green has been in this area, the community is not unknown to him. His father, Dr. M.F. Green, was a general practitioner in Farwell during the 1950s and 1960s. Since 1946 he served as the doctor for not only Farwell but, also, Muleshoe and Clovis.

While in the Farwell community

Dr. Green resided on Third St. where he lived until 1964 when he moved his practice to Clovis. Dr. Green retired from active practice in 1978.

Farwell's new doctor, Dr. William Green, attended high school in Muleshoe and Texas Tech. He attended medical school at the University of Texas S.W. in Dallas. He is certified by the American Board of Family Practice.

Following graduation from medical school he practiced medicine for 20 years in the Dallas area. He has just returned from four years of corporate medicine practice in Saudi Arabia.

Dr. Green said he and his family have "come home to settle down." His wife, Ann, is an RN nurse anesthetist and will be helping part-time in the clinic.

Retirement apartments' plans move along

The volunteer department is technically supposed to make emergency runs only, the board will consider this situation further.

Bids have been put out for the addition of a reception area for the dental clinic and the board hopes to get started on the project soon.

Reports from the Farwell Dental Clinic and the Farwell Convalescent Center were reviewed.

The board approved the tax rate as presented. It will remain the same as last year-.046 cents.

Subdivision No. 1 includes all land in the Rhea and Bovina School Districts.

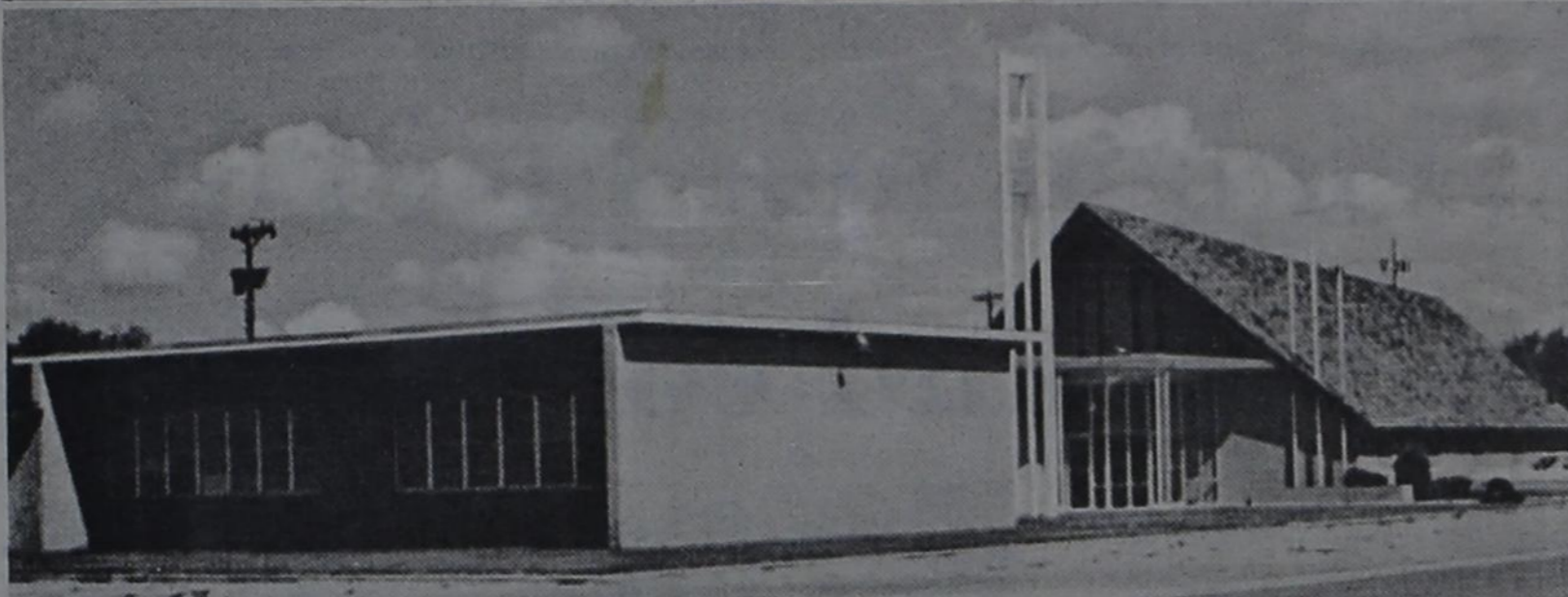
Rebekah Rose

every walk of life not only attending our churches but holding higher positions in the church and having various levels of responsibilities," Stephens said.

He said, "We also like to have a good working relationship with the other churches in the community - our unity is in Christ."

The local church, and the Methodist Church as a whole, support the Methodist Children's Home in Waco, Texas; the Methodist Mission Home in San Antonio, Tex. which is used for the deaf, hearing impaired, unwed mothers and is an adoption agency; and the Landon Methodist Manor, a retirement facility in Carlsbad. The local church is also involved in ministry at the Farwell Convalescent Center. Former pastor of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist, W.T. Perry was one of the founders of the center.

The congregation of Hamlin Methodist moved to its current church home, the 300 block of South Fifth St. in Farwell, in 1960. Plans for this new church plant had begun in 1957 when it was determined due to continual membership growth a new facility was a must.

In 1965 a new sanctuary, foyer and office spaces were added and consecrated for use. During the same year a new parsonage for the minister was acquired. The land on which the church is built was donated by Hamlin Overstreet.

The local church got its humble beginnings in 1904 when Rev. Joe Hedgepeth was assigned to begin a new Methodist Church in the Texico-Farwell area.

In the fall of 1904, a building was erected in Texico where Highways

60-70-84 and the Pleasant Hill Road intersect. The 30 by 44 foot frame building was planked with rough lumber and stripped to keep the wind and dust out. The building was heated by a pot-bellied coal burning stove.

The parsonage at that time was a two-room building made of rough lumber. It was located next door to the church and had been purchased for \$350.

In 1908 church officials decided to move to a new location in eastern Texico. It was on two lots there that a church was built which served the Methodist people in Texico and Farwell for over 50 years.

In 1910 the church was known as the Texico-Farwell Methodist Episcopal Church, South. Church records from this period were rather sparse.

It was in February 1926 that a faulty flue resulted in a fire that totally destroyed the church building and equipment. On the afternoon of the fire church officials met amid the smoking ruins and with the pastor, Rev. W.B. Gillian, plans for a new building were begun.

On July 8, 1926, a contract was let for the construction of a new building. The cost was \$10,450. The building was first occupied in 1927 and

served as the worship facility until 1960.

It was in 1929 that the church name was changed to Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church of Texico-Farwell in tribute to the leadership, service and influence of J.M. Hamlin.

The Hamlin Methodist Church now has a membership of about 300 people and what Stephens said he notices is that, "the two communities work together, give lots of support and show a real concern."

Deadline reminder

Crop insurance covers unavoidable loss of production resulting from adverse weather conditions, wildlife, earthquake or fire, according to Jackie Harris, district director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation.

Harris said the FCIC will cost-share up to 30 percent of the cost of carrying insurance in an effort to assist producers.

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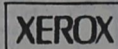
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Lazbuddie falls to Hart

A release said 50 of the winners will be awarded a trip to the National 4-H Congress in Chicago from Nov. 25-29.

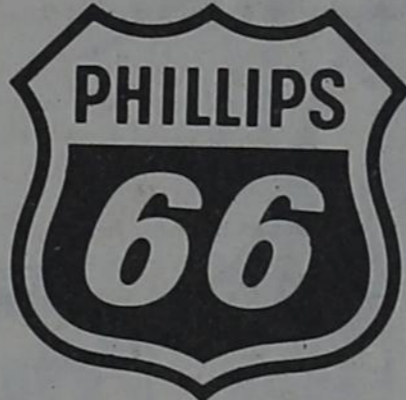

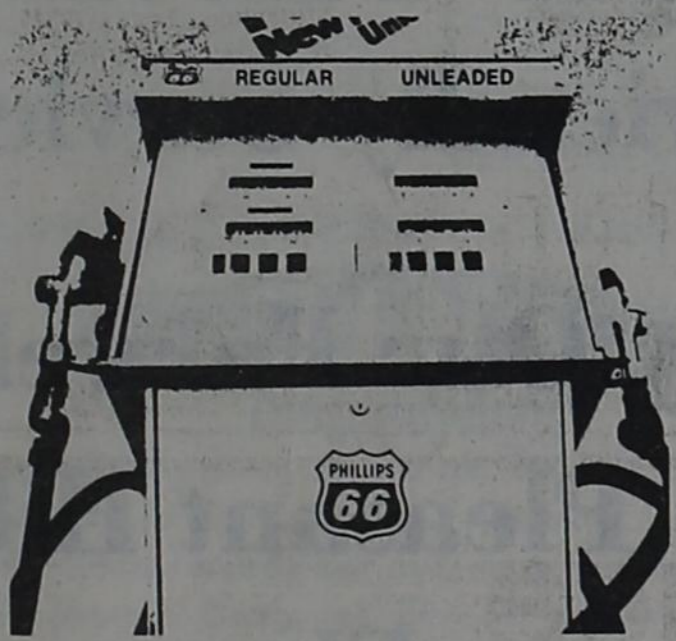

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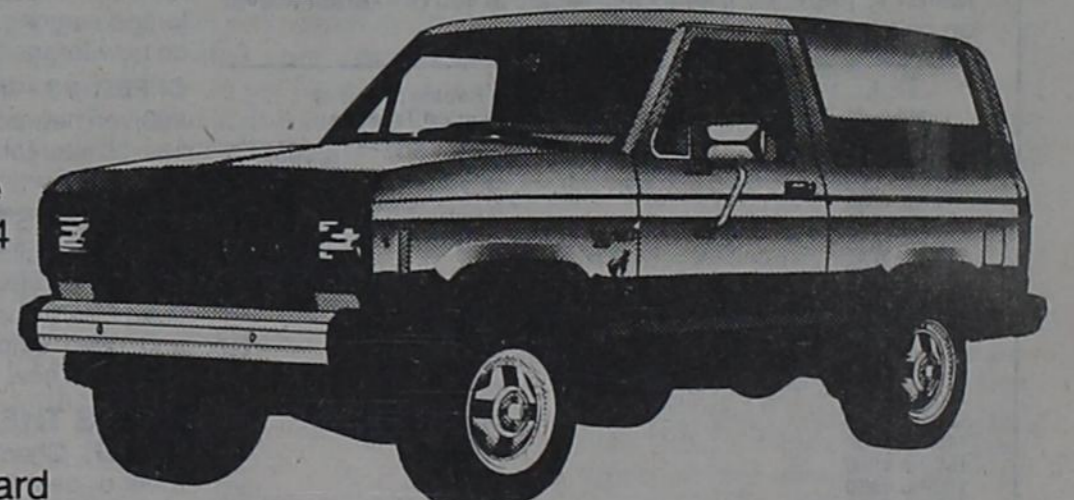

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Wolverines add notch to belt

The Texico Wolverines added a second notch to their victory belt when they defeated the Capitan Tigers, 28-14, on the Tigers' turf last Friday night.

In the first quarter Texico used a ground attack to gain 70 yards and put the ball on the one-yard line. With 3:28 left, fullback Ronnie Galvan plunged into the end zone to put the Wolverines on top, 6-0. The extra point kick was no good. Capitan got nowhere with their possession and the Wolverines took over on the 42 yard line and drove to the Tigers' 23 yard line before fumbling the ball.

Capitalizing on the Texico error, Capitan pushed into the end zone, but the touchdown was nullified by a penalty. On the next play the Tigers scored again, but a holding penalty cancelled the score. At halftime, the Wolverines held a slim 6-0 lead.

Receiving the second-half kickoff Capitan put together a drive which ended on the Texico ten-yard line when a tough Wolverine defense stopped the Tigers' surge. On their next possession, the Green and White capped off a 50 yard drive when Billy Bibbs made a three-yard run into the end zone. Quarterback Danny Powell ran in a 2 point conversion to put Texico on top, 14-0.

On Capitan's next series, Texico's

Doug Thornton recovered a Tiger fumble at their 22 yard line. This set up another Wolverine touchdown when Billy Bibbs again scored from three yards out to give Texico a 20-0 lead.

When the Tigers took the ball for their first possession in the fourth quarter, the center's snap went over his kicker's head into the end zone, where Capitan recovered, handing the Wolverines 2 points for a safety. A Capitan punt went short and Billy Bibbs ran it in from 27 yards out for the Wolverines' final touchdown for the evening. The Wolverines' kick for an extra point failed, and the Wolverines had a comfortable 28-0 lead.

The Tigers went to the air in an attempt to get on the scoreboard. Capitan's receiver, Troy Keller, caught a 63 yard pass from quarterback Dewey Keller to put Capitan on the scoreboard for the first time. Their PAT run failed. Texico Junior High plays its next game Sept. 29, at 10 a.m. (MDT) against Portales, in Portales.

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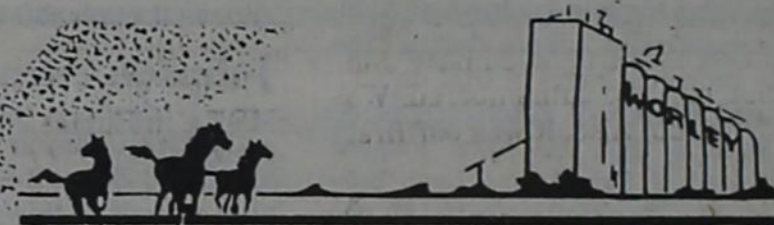

The Steers play Seagraves tonight (Friday) at 8 p.m. in Farwell.

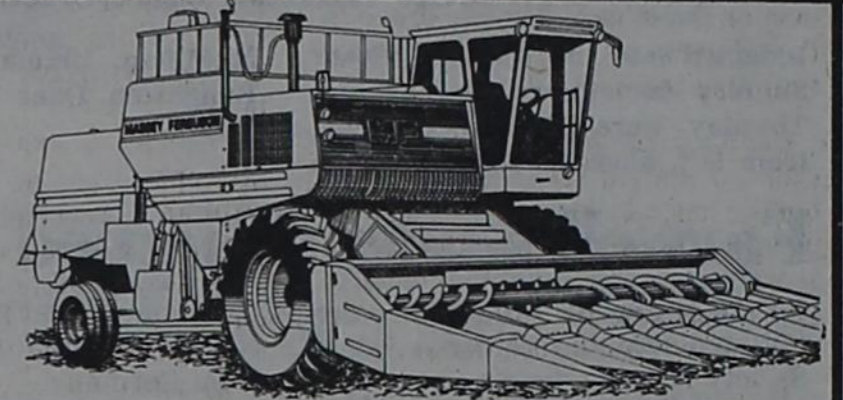
Barnes said, "They'll be good but we'll play better than last week and not make the same mistakes."

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED
CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 6, 1984

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 29 proposes a constitutional amendment that provides to state-chartered banks the same rights and privileges that are or may be granted to national banks of the United States domiciled in this state. For example, if national banks become authorized to maintain branch offices, this amendment would extend the same privilege to state banks. The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide state banks the same rights and privileges as national banks."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 19 proposes a constitutional amendment that restructures the Permanent University Fund to provide: (1) for the expansion of the institutions eligible to participate in the bonding capacity of the fund to include the components of The University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems that have been added to those two systems of higher education since the Permanent University Fund was last restructured by constitutional amendment; (2) for the expansion of the purposes for which bond proceeds can be expended from new construction to include major repair and rehabilitation projects and the acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials; (3) for an increase in the bonding capacity from 20% (¾ for The University of Texas System and ½ for the Texas A&M University System) to 30% (20% for The University of Texas System and 10% for Texas A&M University System) of the value of the assets (exclusive of real estate) in the Permanent University Fund in order to provide sufficient bond proceeds to care for the addition of 10 new institutions to those authorized to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program and to care for the expanded purposes for which the bond proceeds can be spent; and (4) for the dedication of the dividends, interest, and other income from the Permanent University Fund remaining after payment of principal and interest due on bonds and notes issued, to the provision of support and maintenance (over and above normal legislative appropriations) for Texas A&M University in Brazos County, Prairie View A&M University, and The University of Texas at Austin. House Joint Resolution 19 also annually appropriates \$100 million in each fiscal year, beginning September 1, 1985 (from the first money coming into the state treasury that is not otherwise appropriated by the constitution) for the use of those

agencies and institutions of higher education which are not included in The University of Texas or Texas A&M University Systems and, therefore, not eligible to participate in the Permanent University Fund bonding program. The amount of this appropriation could be adjusted every five years by a ⅓ vote of the Legislature, but could not be adjusted in such a way as to affect outstanding bonding indebtedness. Each institution of higher education that is eligible to participate (i.e., those institutions of higher education outside The University of Texas and Texas A&M University Systems) would be authorized to expend directly its share (such share to be determined pursuant to an equitable formula) of the \$100 million appropriation for the purposes of acquiring land, constructing and equipping buildings or other permanent improvements, major repair and rehabilitation of other permanent buildings or improvements, and acquisition of major capital equipment (e.g., computers and laboratory equipment) and library books and materials. Additionally, each institution would be authorized to issue bonds backed by a pledge of up to 50% of its share of the \$100 million annual appropriation for the purpose of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects. Except in the case of fire or natural disaster and in other extraordinary cases, verified by a two-thirds vote of each house of the legislature, all institutions of higher education would be precluded from receiving appropriations of general revenue funds for the purposes of land acquisition, new construction, and major repair and rehabilitation projects.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to create from general revenue a special higher education assistance fund for construction and related activities, to restructure the Permanent University Fund, and to increase the number of institutions eligible to benefit from the Permanent University Fund."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 65 proposes a constitutional amendment which authorizes the legislature to provide for the payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of officers, employees and agents of the state or its political subdivisions, including members of organized volunteer fire departments and members of organized police reserve or auxiliary units authorized to make arrests, who die in the course of performing hazardous official duties. Payments to surviving spouses and dependent children of

such officers, employees, and agents are already authorized by the Constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for payment of assistance to the surviving dependent parents, brothers, and sisters of certain public servants killed while on duty."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 20 proposes a constitutional amendment which abolishes the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties if a majority of the voters in each of those counties vote in favor of abolishing the office of county treasurer in a local election to be held on the issue. All the powers, duties, and functions of the office of county treasurer in each of these counties would be transferred to the county clerk.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Bexar and Collin counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which provides a new method of filling a vacancy in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The amendment requires the President pro tempore of the Senate to call together the committee of the whole Senate within 30 days after a vacancy occurs in the office of Lieutenant Governor. The committee would be required to elect one of its members to perform the duties of the Lieutenant Governor until the next general election. This individual would continue his duties as Senator at the same time that he performs the Lieutenant Governor's duties. If the Senator who is elected ceases to be a Senator before the next general election, another Senator must be elected according to the above procedure to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties. The President pro tempore would be required to perform the Lieutenant Governor's duties pending the election of one of its members by the committee of the whole Senate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state senate to fill a vacancy in the office of lieutenant governor."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that permits the use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on non-assessable life, health, or accident insurance policies and annuity contracts issued by a mutual insurance company authorized to do business in this state. The constitutional prohibition against a grant of public money to an individual, association, or corporation or against becoming a stockholder in a corporation, association, or company has limited life and health group policies of political subdivisions to non-mutual insurance companies. The amendment would permit mutual insurance companies to bid for those policies.

The proposed constitutional amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment to permit use of public funds and credit for payment of premiums on certain insurance contracts of mutual insurance companies authorized to do business in Texas."

PROPOSITION NO. 7 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment to change the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct to include one Judge of a Municipal Court and one Judge of a County Court at Law, who shall be selected at large and appointed by the Supreme Court with the advice and consent of the Senate.

The amendment also provides additional grounds for removal from office of judges or justices of Texas courts, and provides additional disciplinary actions that could be taken in lieu of removal or censure. The amendment would extend the Commission's disciplinary authority to masters, magistrates, and retired or former judges who hear cases by designation. The amendment creates a tribunal to review recommendations of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct for removal or retirement of a judge or justice. The review tribunal would be composed of seven (7) Justices or Judges of the Courts of Appeals selected by lot by the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court. The amendment also provides for appeal of the review tribunal's decision to the Supreme Court of Texas and grants an accused judge the right to discovery of evidence.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: The constitutional amendment relating to the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and the authority and procedure to discipline active judges, certain retired and former judges, and certain masters and magistrates of the courts."

PROPOSITION NO. 8 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 22 proposes a constitutional amendment which increases the per diem members of the Legislature. The amount of per diem allowed during a calendar year would be equal to the maximum amount set in federal income tax statutes as of January 1 of that same year as a deduction for ordinary and necessary business expenses incurred by a state legislator. Current per diem is \$30; the maximum deduction is now \$75.

The buttons, which feature a picture of football and volleyball players or cheerleaders of your choice, must be paid for in advance. The cost is \$3 per button.

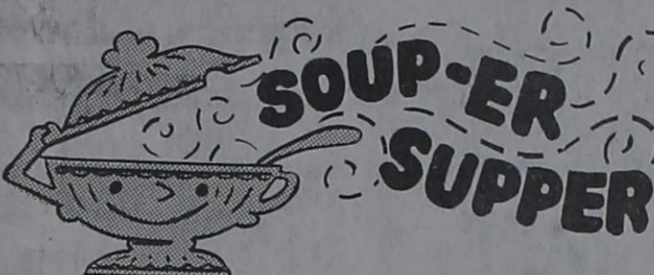
