Parker Is Coach Of Year - -

## Texico Wolverines Win State 1A Crown

In a herald of fanfare, the Texico Wolverines were escorted home in style befitting State Champions Sunday afternoon when they were met just outside of Clovis by a Sheriff's escort and a convoy of more than 30 cars containing proud Wolverine parents and fans.

The Wolverine basketball team, which had competed at state only one time before, defeated Reserve, Cimarron, and finally, Cliff, in the New Mexico Class A Tournament last week in Albuquerque to claim the state title.

Taking further honors, Wolverine Coach Scott Parker was named Class A Coach of the Year by the New Mexico Activities Association, and Wolverine Joe Steward was awarded the Class A Sportsmanship of the Year trophy.

In addition, three Wolverines, Brad Steward, Kevin West and

Terry Tubbs, were named to the All-Tournament team.

Saturday night in the University Arena, Texico defeated two-time defending champion Cliff in a 61-35 rout in the finals to capture the Class A State Championship.

"Teamwork did it for us," said Coach Parker. "I believed all along that if we could stick together as a team, we would make it. Sure, we have a lot of key players, but each man on the team contributed something, and without that we wouldn't have won the championship."

"Leadership in all three games was excellent. I feel that we represented Texico very well in all aspects, from sportsmanship to good playing."

Coach Parker commended assistant coach Mike Littlejohn for all the help he contributed to the team, and also praised

student coach Borde Williams for his help.

"I especially want to thank all the fans from Texico and around the area, the students, faculty, parents, and the entire community for their support. They're what made winning special," said Coach Parker.

A school rally Monday afternoon in the Texico gym honored the Wolverines and their coaches.

Superintendent James Pierce spoke expressing congratula-

tions to the team for bringing pride and the state title to the school and the community. He then introduced the coaches and they in turn introduced the players who each made a few comments.

The crowd, led by the Texico cheerleaders, expressed their pride and congratulations to the basketball Wolverines champions with many cheers.

## Rabies Clinic Set In Texico Mar. 20

Area residents who are planning to have their pets vaccinated, are encouraged to take their animals to the Texico-Farwell animal clinic scheduled for Tuesday, March 20.

Glenn W. Keim, DVM, will be on hand from 2:30 to 4:30 MST to administer the vaccinations. The clinic will be set up in the back of the Texico City Hall, and anyone who is planning on going to the clinic is asked to please use the back entrance.

Charges for rabies vaccinations will be \$5 plus tax. Distemper and Parvo shots will also be available at reduced rates.

Both Farwell and Texico city ordinances require that all cats and dogs be vaccinated for rabies and be licensed.

Tags will be available at the clinic for both Farwell and Texico cats and dogs. Cost to license Farwell cats and dogs will be \$2 each.

Under the new city ordinance in Texico, all cats and dogs who are sterilized may be

licensed for \$1. Any cat or dog who has not been sterilized will be licensed at \$3. These fees hold for any household who has

only three pets. For households who have more than three cats or dogs, the fee for licensing the additional pets will be \$8.

## Texico Bands To Present Spring Concert

Texico Bands will present their spring concert at the new Educational Complex Building Tuesday night, March 20, beginning at 7 o'clock MST. The concert will be the first for the music department this year, although many of the band students have already competed in two solo contests.

The concert will feature the Stage Band, the Wolverine Concert Band, the 6th Grade Band, the 5th Grade Elementary Band, and the 3rd-4th Grade Elementary Choir.

The Spring Concert will be dedicated to the memory of Betty Doshier, for her many years of service to the Wol-

verine Band as bus driver and sponsor.

Cost of the concert will be \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students, and is one of the few things around that hasn't gone up in the last ten years, says band director, Jerry Sadberry. Come hear the concert in the comfort of the new Educational Complex theater, invites the director.

The Stage Band will feature recent Grammy Award winners "Beat It" and "Billy Jean," made popular by singer Michael Jackson. The band will conclude with "Lapti-Nek," featuring a variety of solos. The Stage Band was formed last year at Texico, and has performed at

Several years ago, a friend of ours who was knowledgeable in the utility business told us that in the long run the idea of a Public Utilities Commission in Texas was not a good thing. At that time a massive campaign was underway for the establishment of such a commission, and the utilities were on record as opposing this idea.

Our friend also said that while the utilities were publicly in opposition, they felt that such a commission would in the long run allow them to plead, cajol and lobby a small group of persons rather than to have to treat with a myriad of cities, towns, and hamlets across the entire state.

It appears to us that such has come to pass and that the Public Utilities Commission has proved to be a better deal for the utilities than for the public. Utility rate making has become a monopoly of a few persons in Texas rather than the prerogative of local governments. The competitiveness of a thousand communities has been replaced with a monopoly of one commission.

Theodore Roosevelt rode a white steed into the political fray around the turn of the century to slay the dragons of big business that were concentrating economic power in the hands of a few.

The concept of the federal government having to protect the public from abuse of power by a few took a deep root in the American governmental philosophy, and has done a good job of keeping our industries on competitive terms.

In the early Franklin Roosevelt years, Congress cut a big hole in that concept. They excluded labor unions from the laws governing monopolistic practices.

It is now time to rectify this by putting labor unions under the same restraint as business. Labor is big business and growing bigger and more abusive. Another factor that has become much more prevalent in the past decade is that fewer unions have to bargain with fewer big businesses.

Economic factors have caused a rash of business mergers and stock take-overs lately which has the government again concerned with the monopoly factor. Today, two or three labor unions dealing with two or three large corporations in only two or three areas of manufacturing can effectively control the price structure of the majority of items that the United States consumes public purchases.

Labor unions can effectively set the price of their labor demands, the corporations can meet these demands and set a price on their product, which both fulfill labor desires and their corporate financial goals. The buying public has little recourse but to pay both of these inflated objectives.

Foreign competition in several vital industries is being stifled by again resorting to tariff impositions, import numbers restrictions, and local content regulations. This destroying of free trade will be disastrous to the economy of the United States.

Virtually the only commodity that the United States is able to export on anything like competitive terms is foodstuffs. One reason for this has been a deliberate policy by the government and labor barons for cheap food.

It is an everlasting tribute to our farmers that they have been able to survive at all against this unholy alliance of power. Monopolistic practices must again come under close scrutiny, and labor must also be held accountable to the same laws as business. A house divided against itself cannot stand. An economic system divided by two sets of different rules cannot long survive either.

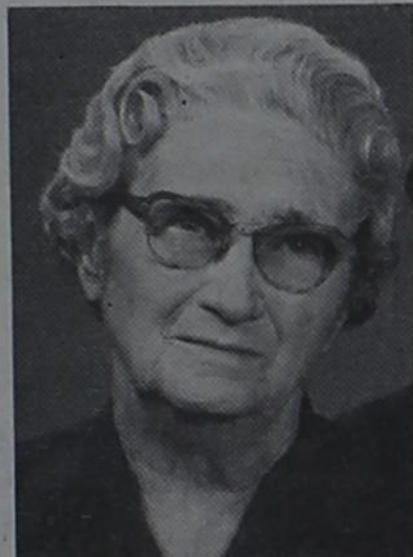

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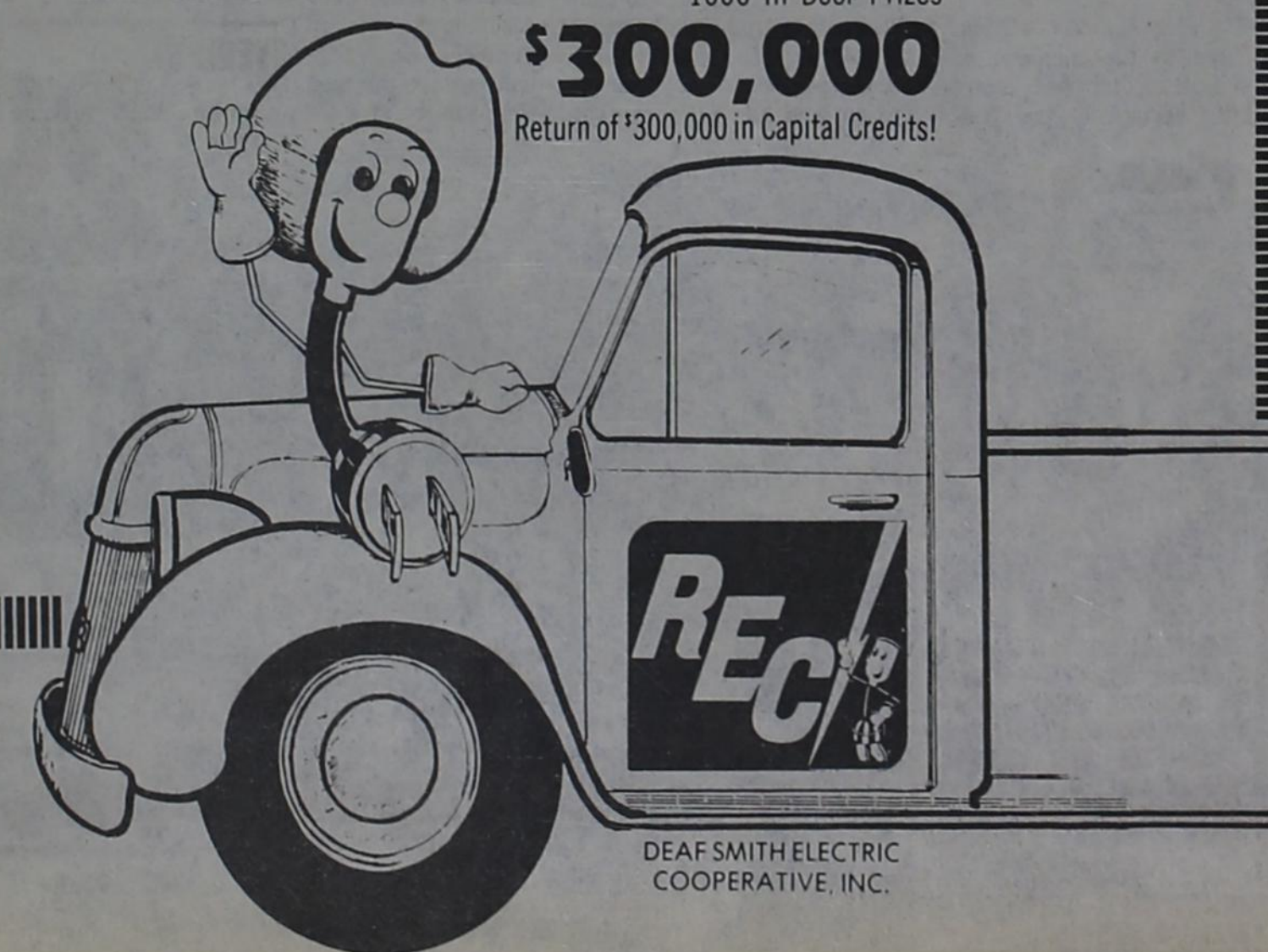

## Commissioners Court Sets Policy For City Prisoners

Parmer County Commissioners Court, meeting in regular session on Monday, March 12, established a new policy regarding prisoners who are held in the County jail on city charges.

Sheriff Bill Morgan met with the Court to discuss the establishment of a new policy for the county jail that would allow the county to bill any city in the county for actual meal costs for prisoners held in the county jail on city charges. This policy was approved unanimously by the Court.

A representative of Bravo Pipeline Company met with the Court to explain about a pipeline that is to cross part of the county and approximately nine roads. After a discussion of the method of operations that the company plans to use at the point of crossing each road, the representative was instructed to obtain more information on these crossings and meet again with the Court.

In other business, the board of care bills for the county foster children in the amount of \$1,769 were approved for payment. Also approved for payment was a bill in the amount of \$438 to Richard Collard, at-

torney ad litem at a juvenile hearing.

At the suggestion of the county treasurer, the Court agreed to reinvest Farm to Market funds from a CD maturing 3-13-84 in the amount of \$100,000 in a CD to mature 3-30-84. The short duration with this amount of money still earns income and still makes the funds available in two weeks if needed.

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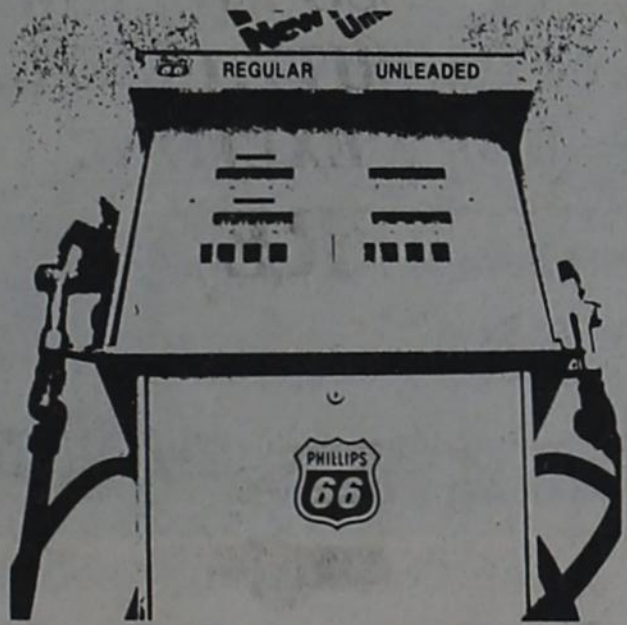

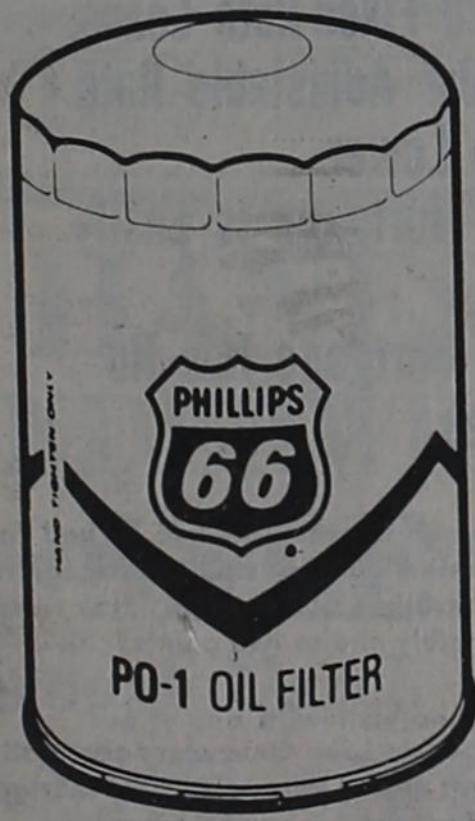

## Texico Students Compete For ENMU Scholarships

Five students from Texico High School were among the 243 students who recently participated in Eastern New Mexico University's Talent Scholarships and Career Day.

Attending from Texico were Kevin West, winner of a psychology scholarship; Chet Burrows, alternate winner of an agriculture scholarship; Dana Morris, alternate winner of a business administration scholarship; Joe Steward, alternate winner of a military science scholarship; and Tobin Tate, alternate winner of an accounting/data processing scholarship.

Students from 59 Texas and New Mexico high schools were given the opportunity to compete for one of 80 \$200 scholarships—making a total of \$16,000 awarded during the day.

There were 25 test areas from which to select, and each student was limited to one area of competition. Scholarships of winners who decide not to attend Eastern will be awarded to alternate winners.

Williams led the Wolverines in rebounds, stretching for 12, followed by Tubbs with 10.

"We really played well," said Coach Scott Parker. "Reserve was probably the most physical team in the tournament, and we stayed with them. Losing to Tatum in the regional finals probably helped us. This was a big win for us, and I really believe it set the tempo for the rest of the tournament."

In the semi-finals played Thursday morning, the Wolverines found themselves facing Cimarron, and after a really hard-fought battle, which went into overtime, the Wolverines pulled off the win, 65-63.

The Wolverines weren't hitting their mark quite as well as the night before, and averaged only 41 percent from the field and 53 percent from the line. Texico and Cimarron were fairly even in the rebound department, Texico coming down with three more than Cimarron, 42-39.

Both teams were pretty well matched in the first quarter, with Texico taking a three-point lead, 15-12. At halftime, the Wolverines were still leading but by only two points, 30-28. During the third period, Cimarron picked up speed and pulled ahead of the Wolverines 44-37. After a "back and forth" fourth quarter, the game went into overtime tied at 61-61.

During the overtime period, the Wolverines managed 4 of 8 attempted free throws, while Cimarron hit only one field goal, giving Texico the win 65-63.

Leading scorers for the Wolverines were Brad Steward with 25 points and Kevin West with 21 points. Terry Tubbs scored 10 points, Joe Steward 5, and Billy Bibbs and Mark Meeks each 2.

Tubbs grabbed 15 rebounds, Regan Williams had 8, and Brad Steward and Joe Steward each had 6.

"We had the lead and blew it," said Coach Parker. "We got ahead and then fell apart in the third quarter. It wasn't until the last three minutes of the game that we were able to get with it. We were determined to win."

"Brad, Joe, and Terry had super offensive and defensive games. Kevin did a good job passing. Regan did a good job on the boards, and Mark and Billy came off the bench and did a super job on defense. They showed a lot of composure and played really well."

In the finals Saturday night, Texico squared off against Cliff, the team which had won the state title the last two years. From the moment of the first tip, the game belonged to the Green and White. The Wolverines racked up 13 points before Cliff could score, leading 15-2 at the end of the first period. By halftime, Texico led 29-14, and outscored Cliff in the final two quarters, 32-21, to take the win, 61-35, and the state championship.

Brad Steward led in points for the Wolverines with 29, followed by Terry Tubbs with 14, Kevin West 10, Joe Steward 4, and Danny Powell and Regan Williams 2 each.

Wolverine averages were up from the day before, scoring 49 percent from the field, and 57 percent from the line. They outrebounded Cliff, 48-35, with Terry Tubbs coming down with 17.

"We were really excited to

beat Cliff," said Coach Parker. "They had won the state championship title the last two years, and this was their fourth straight year to make it to the finals. I knew that whichever team came out playing well in the first quarter would have the game, and we did it."

"We were a little nervous, but the leadership was there, and our attitude was great. Brad played a super game, he shot well and passed well. Kevin and Terry really came through for us also."

Along with the state crown, Brad Steward, Terry Tubbs, and Kevin West were named to the Class A All-Tournament team. Coach Scott Parker was named Class A Coach of the Year and Joe Steward was awarded the Class A Sportsmanship of the Year trophy.

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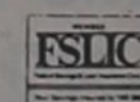

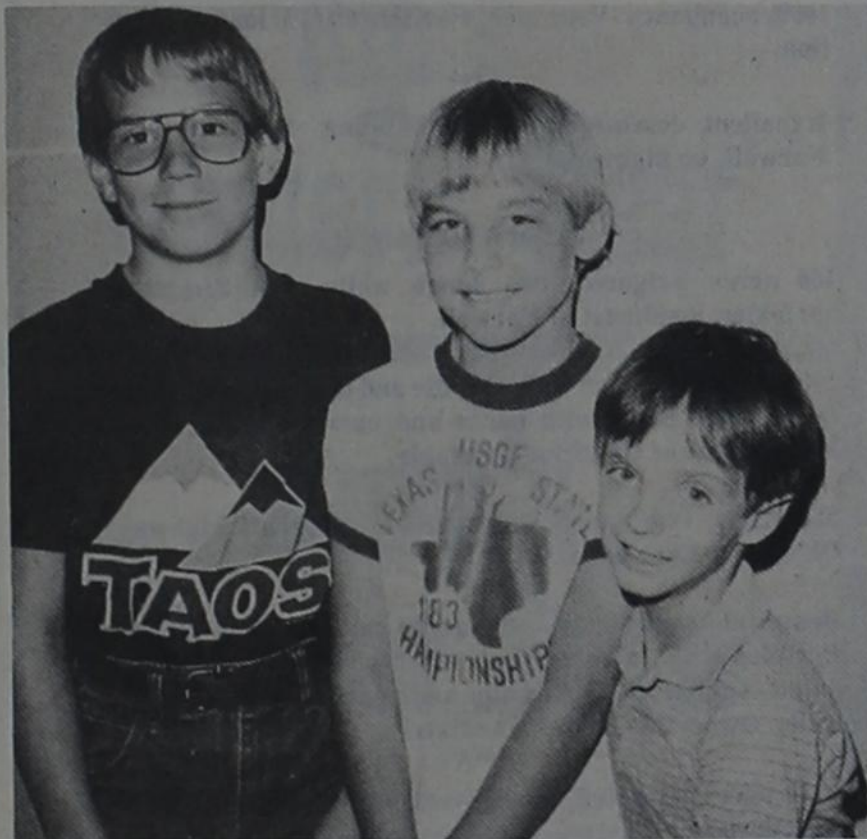

## Farwell Tennis Teams Win First At Plains

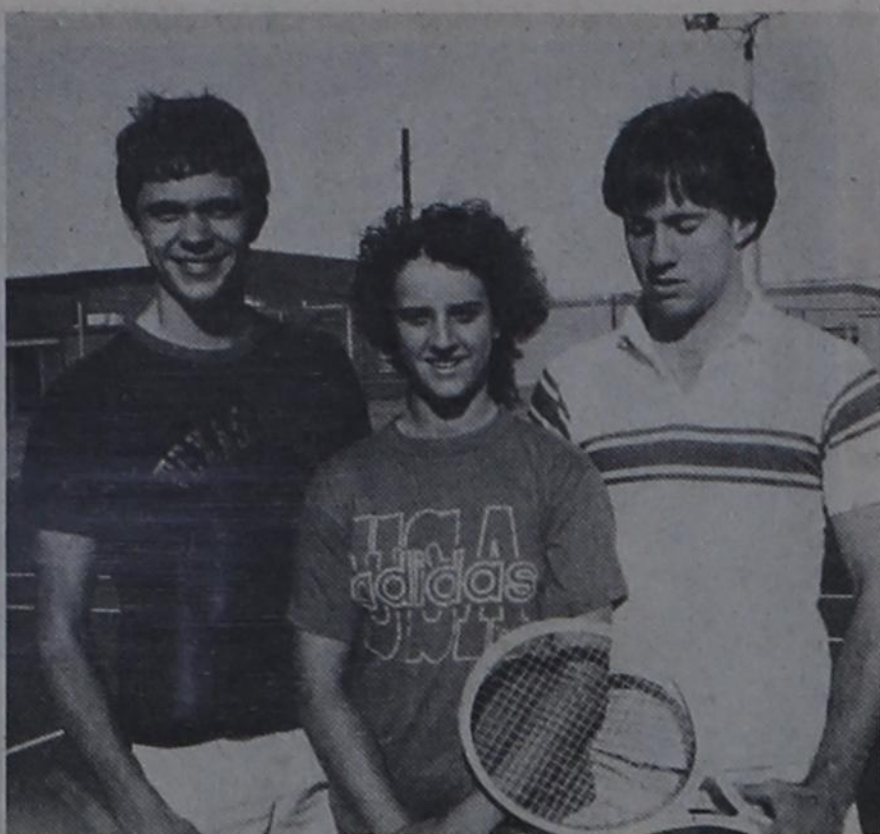
Farwell varsity tennis teams competed in the Plains Invitational Tournament last weekend, their second tourney this season, and came home with two first place wins.

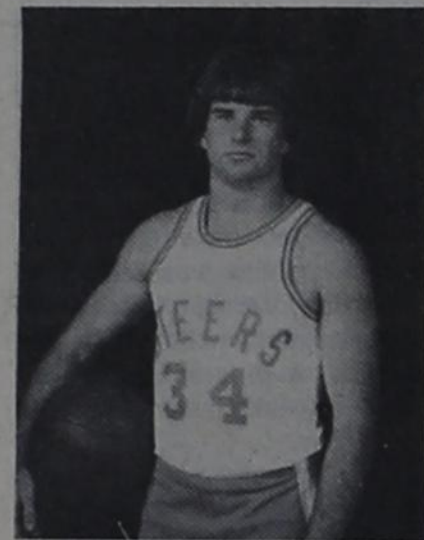
