Texas Primary Runoff Elections Set Saturday

Parmer County voters will join others from throughout the state of Texas tomorrow (Saturday) in the Primary Runoff elections.

Two, polling places as follows: No. 3 - Bovina American Legion Hall; No. 7 - Community Center at Rhea; and No. 22 - Community Center and Show Barn in Friona.

Any registered person may vote in the Primary Runoffs, but those voters who cast their ballots in the May 5 Primary elections must vote in the same party runoff election.

The runoff elections are necessary because the candidates running for the offices did not receive 50 percent of the votes cast in the Primaries.

In the Democratic Primary Runoff, the statewide races are as follows:

For United States Senator, Kent Hance, who received the most votes in the Primary but not a majority, will oppose Lloyd Doggett.

For U.S. Representative, District 19, Don R. Richards, the top vote getter in the Primary, will oppose Thomas M. Richards.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, W.C. Bill Davis and Roy E. Greenwood are vying for the position.

For Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3, the race is between Bill White and Thomas B. Thorpe.

In the Republican Runoff for U.S. Representative, District 19, Larry Combest, who had the most votes in the Primary but not a majority, is opposed by Ron Fleming.

In the only county race, for Parmer County Chairman, Martin Kube of Farwell, incumbent, and Steve Struve, who tied in the Primary election, will be in the Runoff.

New Mexico Primary Election will take place Tuesday, June 5, and Curry County voters as well as voters across the state will decide county, statewide, and national races.

Polls will be open from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. MDT.

Texico voters will cast their ballots at the Texico Community Building. Presiding Democratic judge will be Mae Stone, and John R. Hadley will be the Republican judge. Clerks will be Bernice Thigpen and Evelyn Hadley.

far as Florida, east to Washington, D.C., north through the Midwest to Canada and New York, and west as far as California.

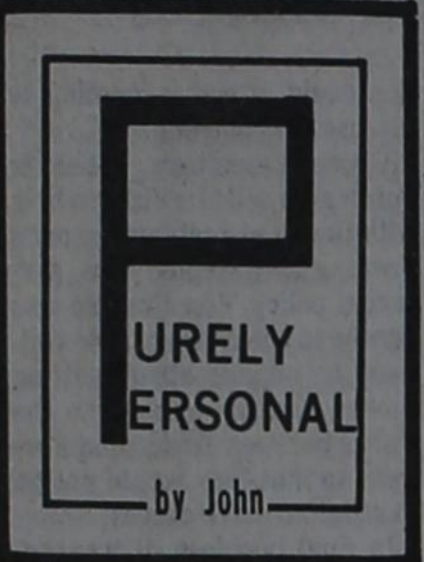

Bob Bullock, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, has been running for the Office of Governor ever since Mark White was sworn into the office. Bullock is in a good position to remind the taxpayers of Texas what it is now costing and is going to cost to support White's political programs.

Bullock recently issued a rate comparison of Governor White's proposed tax increases and the tax rate in the other 10 largest states on these items. It certainly puts Texas near the head of the state tax parade.

For example: in the sales tax department, Texas now ranks sixth among the top ten large states. White's plan would promote Texas to second. On motor vehicle sales tax, Texas taxes would jump the state from sixth to second. White's plan goes all out on "sin" by keeping Texas tippers in first place and jumping the smokers from fourth place to the league leader in the tax bracket.

White's proposed jump in the gasoline tax would push Texas from eighth place to a fifth place standing. So while he is taxing "sin," the good governor will also make driving back and forth to work much more expensive. In Texas, no place is close to any other place, and it will cost more to buy transportation and keep fuel in the tank. A good shot for the working man, governor.

This Saturday, Texas voters will go to the polls to make a final decision on the party candidates who will square off against each other in the fall elections. Those eligible to vote, but did not do so in the first primary election, may go to the polling places of either party and vote for their candidates. Voters who participated in the first primary must vote in the election of the party in which they first voted. This is designed to eliminate cross over voting.

Next Tuesday, the citizenry of New Mexico will go to their party primary election places and vote for their party candidates.

With the hotly contested local races in Curry County, it is necessary for everyone to express their candidate preference so that their party will be represented by someone who agrees with their political viewpoint.

In expressing the political thought of the people, the party primaries are as important as general elections. Sad to say, it is in primaries where special interest groups and "one issue" coalitions are able to be most effective, and thereby get nominees on the general election ballots who oftentimes do not really represent the rank and file of the party. Be it Democrat or Republican.

Vote in primary elections, it is virtually important to your country, your community, and your party.

He is survived by his wife, two brothers, one sister, and his mother.

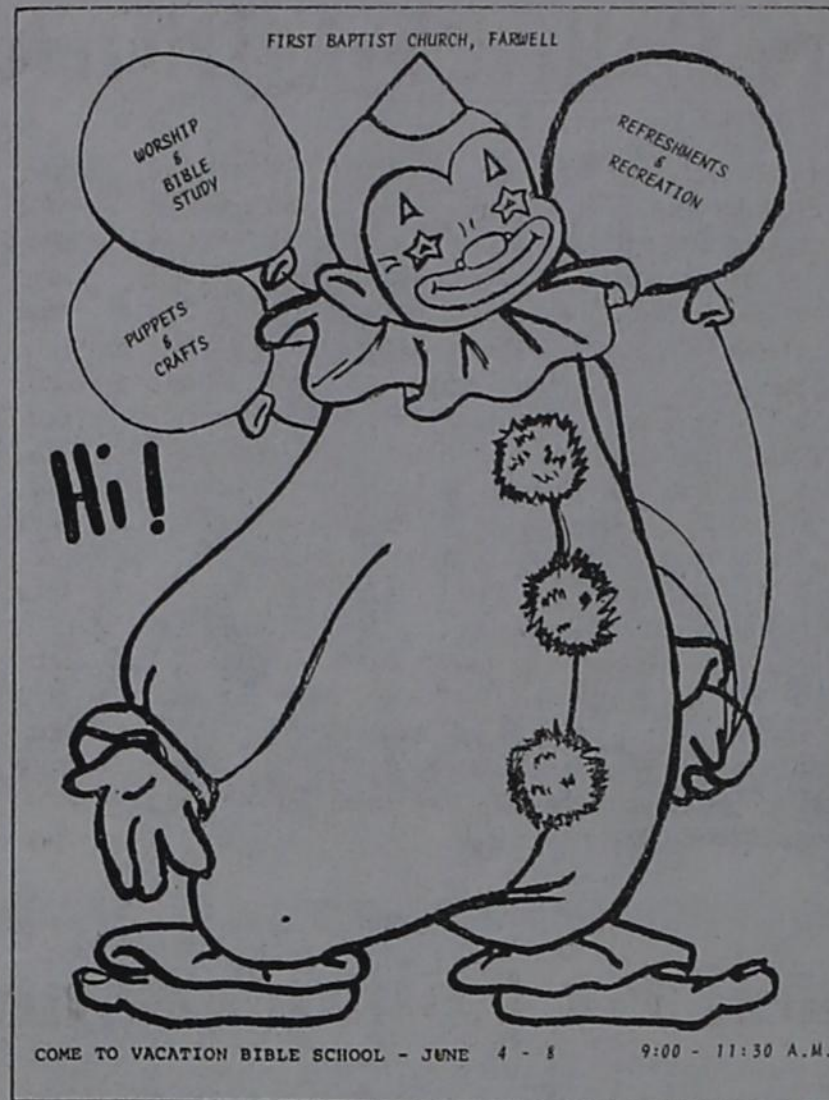
FIRE CALLS

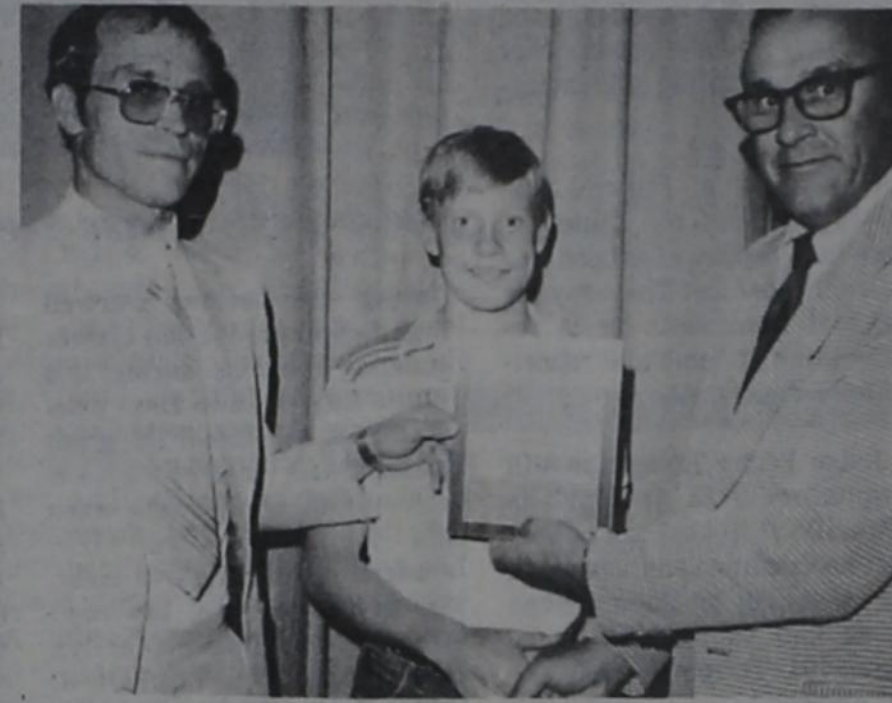
