# Texico Chamber Banquet Scheduled Tuesday Night

Texico Chamber of Commerce annual banquet is set for Tuesday, April 3, at 7 p.m. MST in the Texico gymnasium. Theme of this year's banquet is "Community Teamwork."

Tickets to the annual event are \$7.50 each, and are available from any chamber member, or from Bill Christian at the Texico bank.

Highlighting the affair will be the naming of Texico's 1984 Man and Woman of the Year. Last year's honorees, Oneta Luce and Ray Pritchett, will announce this year's honorees and present them with their awards.

Keynote speaker will be Larry S. Milner, vice-president of communication and public affairs for Southwestern Public Service Company in Amarillo. He will be speaking on the topic of "Winners of '84."

Milner was promoted to vice-president after attaining success in a series of progressively more responsible positions

which began in 1966, when he joined the company as manager of industrial development.

Southwestern Public Service Company provides electric service to a population of more than one million in a 70,000-square-mile service area including southern and southeastern New Mexico, the Panhandle and South Plains of Texas, the Oklahoma Panhandle, and southwestern Kansas.

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## Good Crop Year

Even though this tepee-shaped pile of wood had burned down when this picture was taken, it was lit at 6:48 a.m. on Thursday, March 22, just as the sun peeked over the horizon. The east wind blew the smoke from

the fire steadily toward the west and, according to Weldon Crim of Lazbuddie, who is pointing to show the wind direction, this means a better than average crop year in this area. Crim is carrying on the tradi-

tion of weather forecasting of his late father, J.W. "Indian" Crim, who performed the Indian ceremonial rites for many years at the family homestead near Lazbuddie.

# Weather Forecaster Predicts Good Year

At 6:48 a.m., exactly at sunrise, on Thursday, March 22, Weldon Crim of Lazbuddie lit the tepee-shaped pile of wood to predict the weather and crop prospects for the coming year.

The wind was blowing steadily but softly directly from the east to the west, and Crim predicted that this meant a good crop year, at least a better than average year.

Weldon is carrying on the tradition of his father, the late

J.W. "Indian" Crim, who learned the weather forecasting rites from Weldon's late grandfather, Taylor Crim, who was taught the ritual from the Indians.

J.W. Crim carried on the tradition from 1923 until his death in 1980, and his ceremony was well-known throughout the Panhandle and South Plains area. It was J.W.'s wish that his sons continue the tradition.

A bumper crop is indicated if

the wind is blowing from the north-northeast at sunrise on March 22. A northwest wind means only a fair year, and a west, south, or southwest wind indicates a poor crop year with little rain.

The ceremony was performed at the family homestead near Lazbuddie. Present for the ritual was Weldon's wife Alma, his daughter Vickie, and his sister and husband, Evelyn and Fred Curtis from Farwell.

## One Suspect Arrested, Charged With Burglary

Parmer County Sheriff's Department reported the arrest of another suspect in the rash of burglaries that occurred recently in the County.

Farwell Church of Christ will host the A Cappella Chorus from Lubbock Christian College tonight (Friday), March 30, at 7:30 p.m. CST.

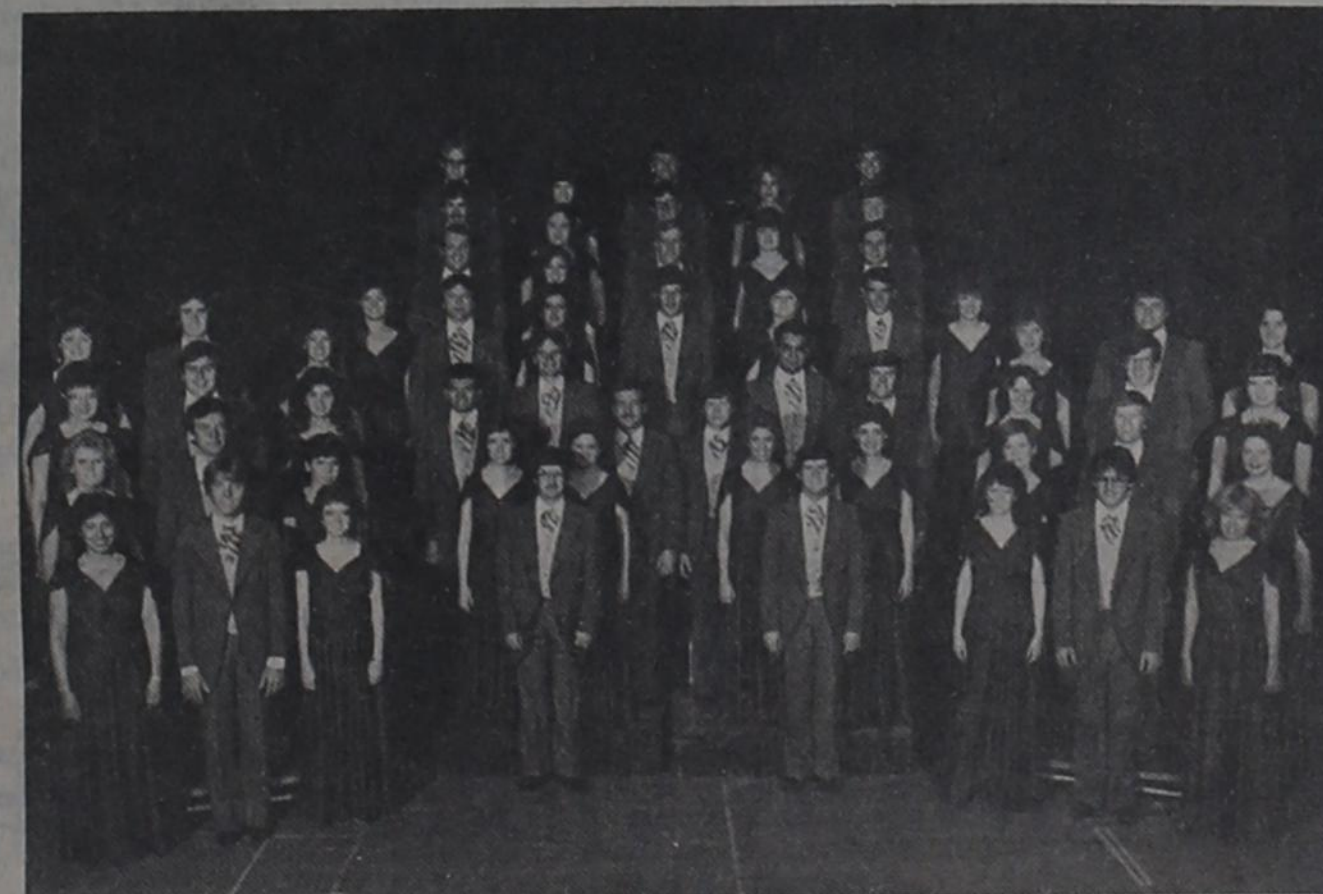
The 50-voice choral group of young men and women travels throughout the United States

The BTD Committee has set the first meeting of 1984 for Monday, April 2, at 8 p.m. at Luce's restaurant.

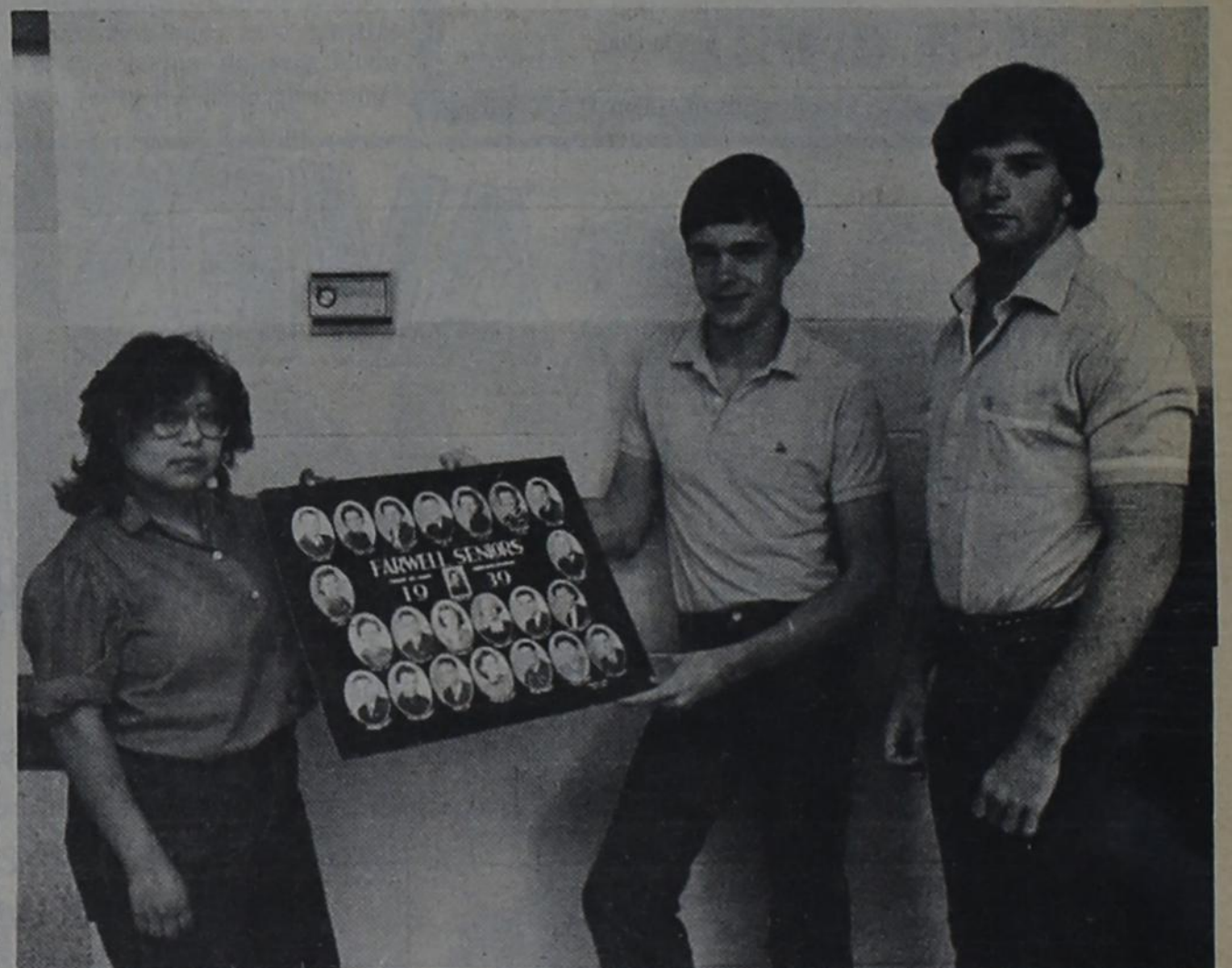

Ah, Spring. It is tiptoeing upon us in subtle ways. We noticed that the naked winter limbs of the trees are beginning to show a fuzzy outline of budding leaves. Looking down a line of stately elms gives a definite sheen of green to the formerly bare and brown branches. The blue grass lawns all over town are perking up and have lost their winter drabness. Already many of the early spring flowers are not only above ground, but our hardy crocus is just about past its spring prime.

The sun has climbed back north, and in the late evenings it is looking full bore at the drivers as they motor toward Clovis. The long winter shadows have shortened up and the morning sun on big glass panes makes rooms almost too warm for comfort. God's children have their ups and downs but the majesty of God's celestial creations follow their inexorable ways. Observing nature is akin to observing our Creator.

Almost as relentless as the ebb and flow of the seasons is the politicians' frantic quest for more taxes to spend as they deem wise and fair. Right now we are listening to all sorts of political cant about raising taxes and closing loopholes for the rich.

A lot of this is now being hawked under the banner of "fairness." The gist of these arguments is that the "rich" are soaking it to the poor and that the "rich" should pay more taxes.

This is complete twaddle at best and sheer demagoguery at the worst. There just isn't enough of the "rich" to make a dent in even the interest on the national debt. It is the great middle class of America that pays the taxes today, yesterday, and probably tomorrow.

Washington is not playing Robin Hood and getting from the rich to give to the poor. They are robbing the middle class to give to the poor. The middle class is easier to separate from their earnings.

The first round of elections in El Salvador are apparently over and according to the big media, not much was settled. Of course anything that does not please the TV moguls is always open to question. We are surprised that El Salvador was even able to have an election considering all the advice they got from our politicians and television pundits.

Whatever the outcome there, we in the United States should hang our collective heads in shame when we look at the percentage of El Salvadorians who voted as compared to the percentage of Americans who voted in our last Presidential election.

Maybe they really ought to advise us on how to hold an election.

Survivors include his wife, Eleonora, of the home; four sons, Arlyn of Las Cruces, Lloyd and Nolan, both of Greeley, and Kenneth of Sacramento, Calif.; two brothers, Herbert of Copperas Cove and Martin of Greenville, S.C.;

Also, one sister, Alma Miller of Troy, Tex.; and six grandchildren, Joan of Austin, Beth of Midland, Kristine and Jody of Sacramento, and Brian of Greeley. He was preceded in death by one infant daughter, one sister, and two brothers.

## Commissioners Court Decides Use Of 2-4-D

Parmer County Commissioners discussed the use of 2-4-D or derivatives of 2-4-D in the county, when it met in regular session March 26.

Present and entering into the discussion were Dennis Maloney, pesticide specialist with the Department of Agriculture; Gary Patterson, county Extension Agent for Agriculture; and Joe Jones, Bovina pesticide applicator.

After the detailed discussion of the needs and conditions, the Court unanimously agreed to set April 15, 1984, as the deadline for spraying 2-4-D and its derivatives in Parmer County, and setting the closed time from April 16, 1984 to October 31, 1984.

The possibility of Parmer

County joining the Hi-Plains Agricultural Development Corporation through P.R.P.C. for the purpose of promoting the processing and marketing of farm products by farmers, was discussed. Vicki Jacobs will meet with the Court on April 9 to explain all the details of this procedure.

The New Mexico Highway Department had reported to Judge Porter Roberts that a bridge which is in Precinct 3 had gotten into very poor condition. Commissioner Archie Tarter said that he would resolve the situation.

A letter with an attached resolution was received from the Texas Association of Counties asking support for funding

for county roads through a one cent fuel tax. The Court unanimously approved that the resolution be ratified and copies mailed to the Governor, Lt. Governor, Speaker of the House, and our State Senator and State Representative asking their support for this resolution.

At the suggestion of the County Treasurer, the Court approved the following CDs maturing 3-30-84 be reinvested as follows:

General Fund CDs of \$100,000 and \$150,000, and Farm to Market Fund CDs of \$100,000 and \$200,000 be reinvested in CDs to mature 5-15-84;

Also, \$100,000 of General Funds, which is new money, be invested in a CD to mature 5-15-84, and \$30,000 of Right of Way Funds, which is new money, be invested in a CD to mature 9-28-84.

The General Fund CDs and Farm to Market Fund CDs are invested for short terms to be accessible when needed before a date has expired. The new money is coming in as taxes are collected and held until needed while earning income.

The following soil conservation work was approved and ratified, to be performed when the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the roads:

Precinct 1, Roy Byrd; Precinct 2, J.B. Barrett; and Precinct 4, Junior Barnes.

## Texico City Council Sets Clean-Up Week

Texico City Council met Tuesday evening in regular session at the city hall and set Clean-Up Week in Texico.

The Council voted to begin planning a city-wide Clean-Up Week to be held the last week in April, in conjunction with the city of Farwell's Clean-Up Week.

J.B. Sudderth was on hand to provide the Council with information regarding the proposed building of eight ethanol plants outside of Texico. Sudderth stated that the new plants would be an improvement of the existing ones, and that they would give off no odor. The Council decided that after the

extra territorial zoning laws had been checked on the land where the plants would be constructed, that it would issue a letter of approval regarding the building of the plants.

James Harding attended the meeting to discuss the management of the city swimming pool, and the board decided to accept bids to make major repairs on the pool. It was also decided that the Council would discuss making more stringent rules and regulations concerning the pool this summer.

Billy Hammit was given permission to purchase an air pack, and also new tires for the city pickup.

## New Hart Pastor Comes Seeking Country Values

[Editor's Note: Rev. Reuben Meissner is a son of Mrs. Helen Meissner of Farwell. The following story appeared in February in the Tri-County Record, published in Rushford, Minnesota, and was written by Managing Editor Alan Reed. Hart, Minn. is one of the three towns served by the Tri-County Record.]

Coming to Hart to serve at St. John's Lutheran Church is a homecoming of sorts for Rev. Reuben Meissner.

Meissner, who was installed at St. John's on October 23 of last year, grew up on a farm near the town of Farwell in northern Texas. He thought by coming to a rural area again he might be able to recapture some of his boyhood memories.

"I thought that while I was still in good health, I would like to serve in a rural area. I felt I could come in and keep myself quite active and busy," Meissner said.

He comes to Rushford after his most recent service as pastor at Trinity Lone Oak Lutheran Church of Eagan, Minn. on the south edge of St. Paul. Like most who live near the Twin Cities, Meissner became accustomed to the wider variety of social and community events offered in that metropolis, but he says in coming to St. John's, "I don't feel that I have given up anything, and I've gained some of the values of being out in the country."

Meissner and his wife, Joyce, are now settled in the comfortable parsonage immediately adjacent to the church. With both buildings located directly off Minnesota Highway 43 just north of Hart, Meissner says he finds himself getting around a little easier than he did while pastor at Eagan. He says in Eagan, the parsonage was about a quarter mile from the church, but with the arrangement at Hart, numerous trips to and from are eliminated.

"The working conditions are 100 percent improved. It does make it very nice not having to go back and forth seven times a day," he said, as his office is located in the lower level of the parsonage.

Meissner has served a total of five other congregations prior

to coming to Hart, and he says the members of his newest congregation, "I've found are more receptive to my calling," as he has already visited about 70 families in the 100 family congregation. He has discovered the people in this area, "are more aware of what is happening to one another. It's sort of a secure type of thing. Not that they're trying to be nosy, but that they are interested in what is happening and it comes through that somebody cares enough to know that you are home in the evening. I find that a big plus."

In the process of the past three months, Meissner says he sees his methods of ministering, "changing, adjusting myself to the living patterns that we have here, getting to know how to best meet their needs and adjust to become part of their situation." He adds the problems one runs into in family life and marriage in the bigger communities are quite similar to those found in the rural com-

munity, saying, "They are there, just as are some of the hurts and the pains."

A 1953 graduate of Concordia Seminary in St. Louis, Missouri, Meissner says the job requirements at St. John's, "doesn't have a bombardment of meetings," and affords him more time to do the thing he likes best - be with people. He feels his strengths as a pastor lie in, "person-to-person, individual-to-individual. Getting to know a person, where they are, and getting to know their lifestyle."

When dealing with congregations that consist of large numbers, Meissner feels you get to know the members on just a surface level. However, a situation such as St. John's, "gives you a better opportunity to (inter-relate)."

He finds the structure of the present congregation to be a good mix of all ages and, "rather on the strong side with the young families, with better than average amounts of children and young families." Meissner says he senses the members may feel they are somewhat isolated living in this rural setting, "but I don't necessarily think they will find a better life. I think people have a lot more here than they sometimes realize."

The Meissners have 12 children, none of which live at home, and are proud grandparents to 12 others, with their 13th grandchild expected this summer. Being a shut-in during the winter months, Meissner says he is anxiously awaiting the coming spring, summer, and fall, "and getting to know some of the outdoor things people become involved in."

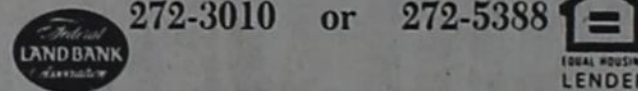
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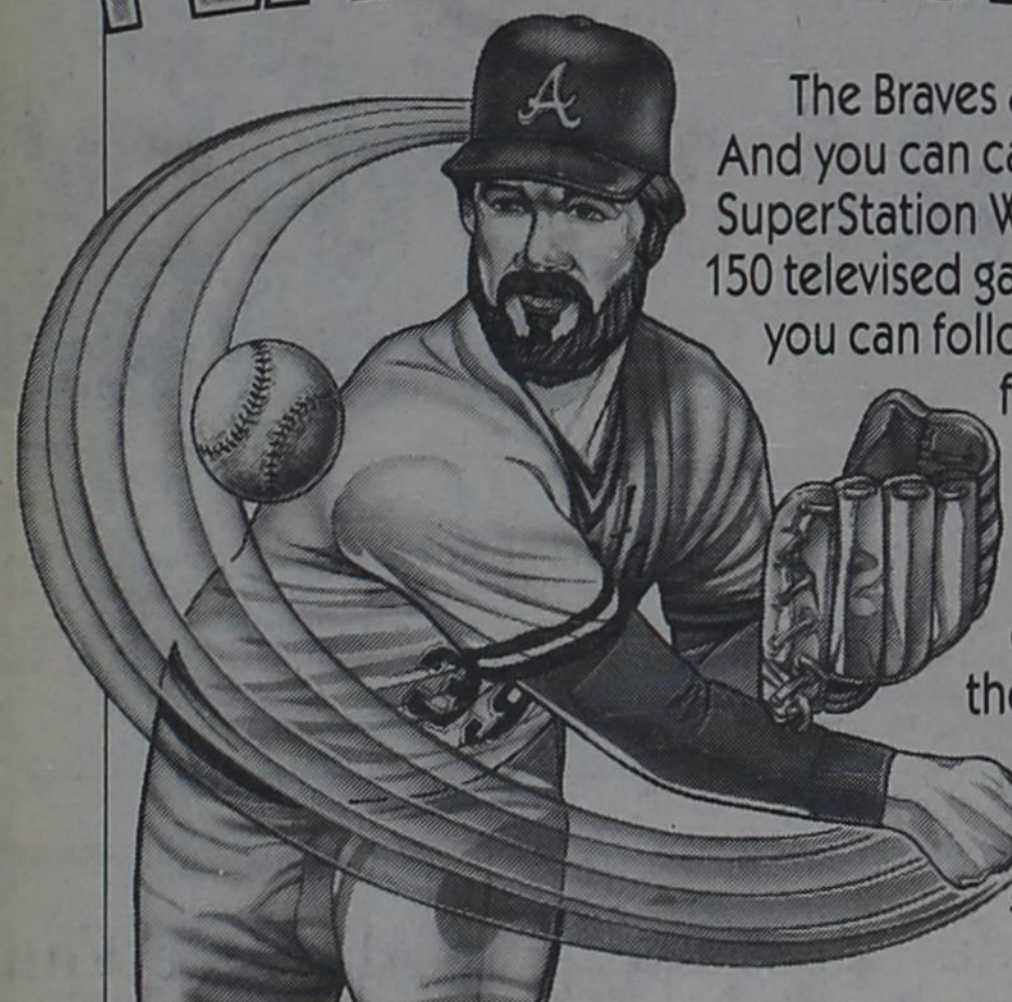

## Farwell Child Development Classes Learn First Hand

The Child Development classes at Farwell High School are currently studying child development in stages conception through school age, and were recently treated to visits from first hand experts, Gaylen Suderth and Linda Armstrong.

Gaylen is the four-month-old son of Darren and Darrisa Suderth, and Linda is the 10-

month-old daughter of Ricky and Alice Armstrong.

Gaylen demonstrated to the class what an aspiring four-month-old can do in the area of whole hand reflex grasps. The class observed that Gaylen is well above the four month norm on this task, and has no problem connecting with his favorite bear.

Gaylen's mom, Darrisa, is a former child development student, and she and husband Darren, enjoyed relating first hand experiences, as first time parents, to the class and answering questions from the students.

Linda, who also made an appearance before the class, gave the students an opportunity to observe later motor development and beginning language activity. Linda enjoyed showing the class that while only ten months old, she is very near the one-year level of walking alone, and can readily communicate her desire to have a hand to help her walk toward her destination.

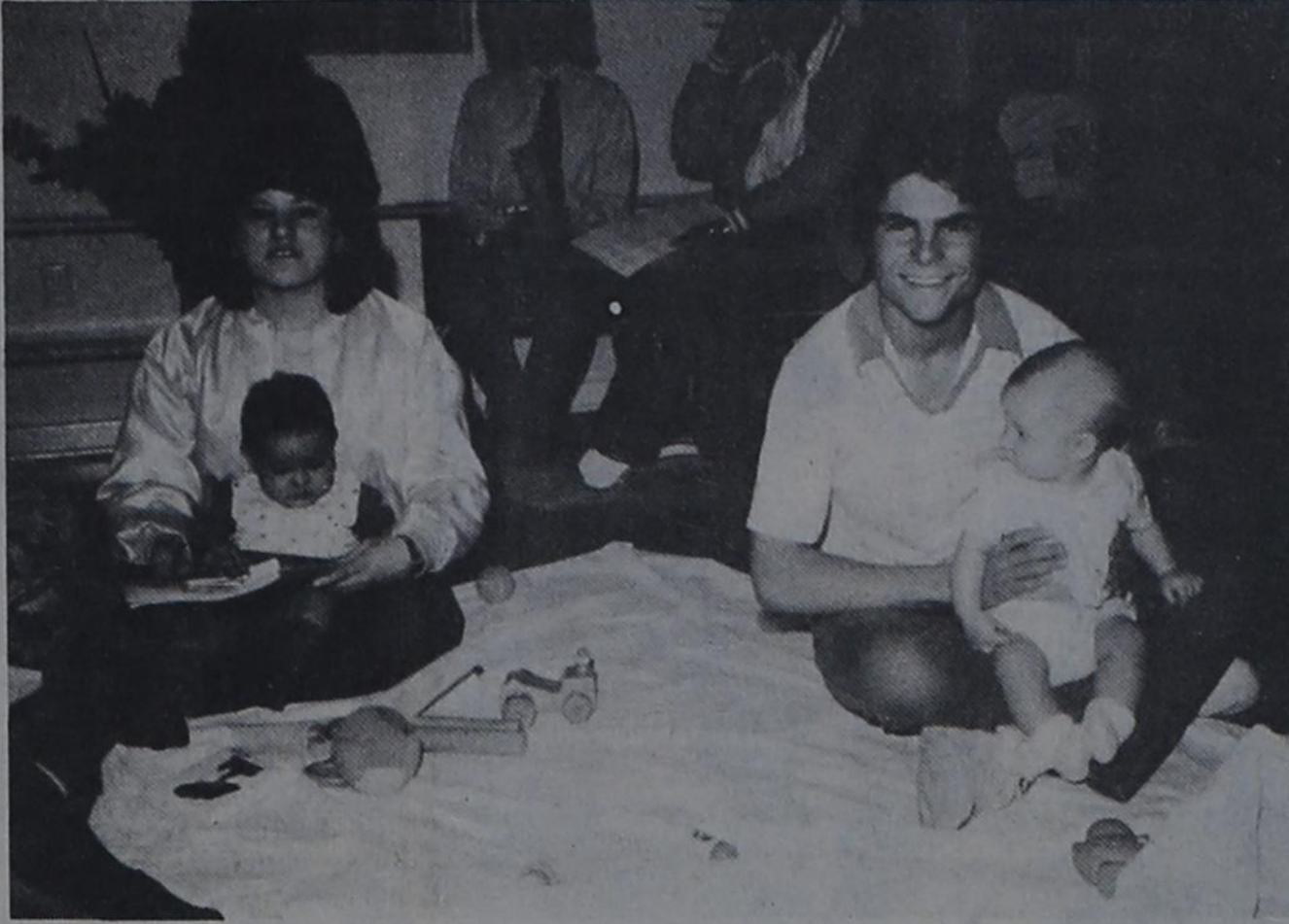
The students observed that she readily exhibits a two-finger grasp and that her general physical development in handling a ball indicates potential expertise as a Steerette basketball player.

During the course, the students have already studied growth principals in the developments of infants through the first year, including growth proceeds from head to foot, with special implications on potty training. They have also studied growth proceeds from near to far, or from center outward, allowing infants to make whole hand "swipes" at objects before they are able to close their hands around them and finally pick them up with a two-finger grasp.

In addition, the class has studied growth proceeds from the simple to the complex; from sleeping and eating to holding their bottle, eating finger foods, and using eating utensils, and they've learned that growth is continuous and orderly, and follows certain patterns of development, even though each child has its own rate of development.

The class was able to observe all of these things first hand through Gaylen's and Linda's visits, and are looking forward to learning about social, emotional, and intellectual development of children from birth to age six in the remainder of the semester, according to instructor Martha White.

The class is also planning to observe more children in Farwell and other kindergarten and pre-school facilities.

County and regional winners will receive special awards following the competition on the 28th.

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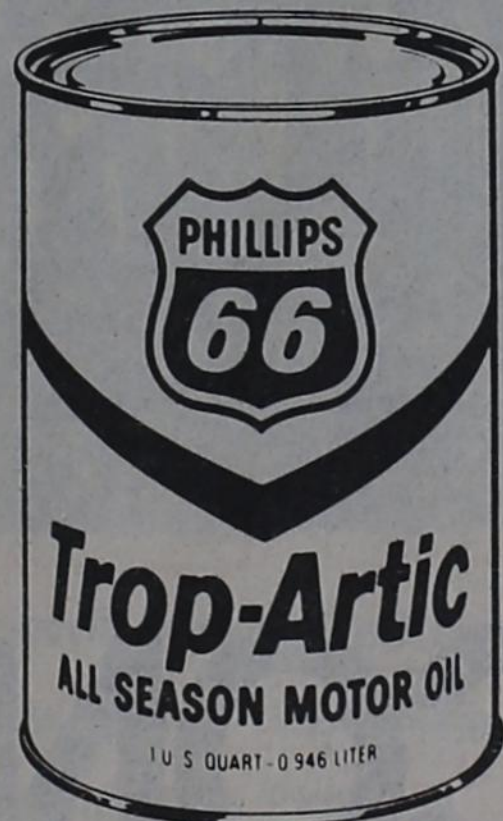


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## Farwell Varsity, Jr. High Tracksters In Texico Meet

**What Is This?**

It is water that finally fell in the Texico-Farwell area Tuesday. The moisture came in several forms ranging from rain and drizzle to fat damp snow flakes,

with winds blowing from 20 to 30 miles-per-hour and gusting to 40 mph. Following the weather front, the temperature dipped to 34 degrees but soon began an

upward climb. Total moisture from that spring spate was reported to be about three-tenths of an inch.

**Parmer Well Permits Increase**

Improved economic signs are beginning to come home to the local area, and irrigation farmers are starting to make the improvements in their farming operations that they have been putting off for the last couple of years.

Signs of this improvement are being seen in the number of applications for water well permits which are issued by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

During the first two months of this year, 94 permit applications have been issued throughout the

Water District's 15-county service area. This compares to a total for the previous 12-month period of 127 applications and amounts to 74 percent of last year's total.

Ken Carver, Water Use/Conservation Division Director for the Water District, indicated that this upswing in permitting activity could in part be attributed to the PIK program last year which brought some measure of profit back to the farming community.

Carver also suggested that as a result of this small profit margin, farmers are beginning

to upgrade their irrigation systems including replacing older wells and drilling new wells.

In Parmer County, 20 permits have been issued during the first two months of 1984 as compared to 19 permits issued during the preceding 12-month period. This amounts to 105 percent of last year's total.

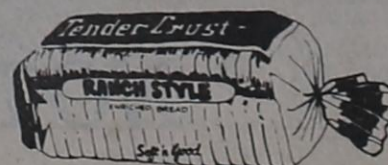
