
The students observed that she readily exhibits a two-finger grasp and that her general physical development in handling a ball indicates potential expertise as a Steerette basket-

During the course, the students have already studied growth principals in the developments of infants through the first year, including growth proceeds from head to foot, with special implications on potty training. They have also studied growth proceeds from near to far, or from center outward, allowing infants to make whole hand "swipes" at objects before they are able to close their hands around them and finally pick them up with a two-finger

In addition, the class has studied growth proceeds from the simple to the complex; from sleeping and eating to holding their bottle, eating finger foods, and using eating utensils, and they've learned that growth is continuous and orderly, and tollows certain patterns of development, even though each child has its own rate of devel-

The class was able to observe all of these things first hand through Gaylen's and Linda's visits, and are looking forward to learning about social, emotional, and intellectual development of children from birth to age six in the remainder of the semester, according to instructor Martha White.

The class is also planning to observe more children in Farwell and other kindergarten and pre-school facilities.
