## Champions Named At Livestock Show

With 52 entries on the books, judging in the 10th Annual Farwell FFA-4-H Junior Livestock Show got underway at 1:30 p.m. Saturday, Feb. 8, with Grand Champions and Reserve Champions being named in barrow, steer and lamb competition. Approximately 26 individual competitors were booked for the show.

The show was conducted at the Farwell Ag farm with Bob Middleton from Texas State Technical Institute in Amarillo serving as judge. Don Gerles and Mike Haseloff were general superintendents and Fred Chandler handled the secretarial and booking duties for the show.

During the annual event, a special presentation was made to W.M. Roberts, superintendent of Farwell Schools who is retiring from his office effective July 1. The presentation of a plaque expressing the Farwell Future Farmers of America Chapter's appreciation to Roberts for the aid and support he has given to the FFA in its many projects and shows was made by FFA'ers Thad Phillips and Mark Haseloff. Phillips is president of the local chapter while Haseloff is serving in the capacity of vice-president.

Louie Welch, a former mayor of Houston, made a pithy statement sometime ago. He said, "Garbage - everybody wants it picked up but nobody wants it put down." Putting it down has been a sore problem for Amarillo lately as the news from that community reveals.

Fortunately we have not had that particular problem around here, but we expect that our garbage hauling and disposal system will eventually come under scrutiny by the federal and state powers that be. When they get around to viewing our methods we expect that as usual it will call for more money, via the tax route, for proper garbage handling and disposal.

For the present, the only change in the picture is the fact that the City of Farwell is now billing for garbage service by the month instead of by a special tax assessment. The local rate is \$2 per month for residences and \$3 for businesses. This seems like a reasonable charge to dispose of a rather disagreeable subject.

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We have often remarked in this column that a business doesn't pay taxes, that the consumer is the one that pays the tax. In light of some of the strange court findings in California we will add to that and say that insurance companies do not pay claims - policyholders pay claims.

As a result of this truism, medical care is endangered nationwide by the astronomical escalation of physician malpractice insurance. An article in the latest National Observer cites a physician having to pay an annual premium on his malpractice insurance in the range of \$24,000 per year. Guess how high his fees went to pay that tab.

The same thing applies to auto insurance. Huge jury settlements have resulted in ever mounting premiums to the public. In an attempt to reduce the burden of auto insurance, many states are in the process of adopting a "no fault" type of auto insurance. A side benefit of this is that it discourages the "ambulance chasing" fringe of the legal profession from promiscuously taking cases on a percent of settlement basis. One of the factors contributing to the proliferation of "damage" cases seems to us to be this large percent of a settlement that a lawyer retains.

This "percent" basis also carries over into other types of "damage" cases in addition to auto insurance. All businessmen know what has happened to workmen's comp. insurance. It has gone up. So, the businessman has to add a bit to his cost of doing business and the consumer of the goods or product winds up ultimately paying the additional insurance cost.

The next time you feel a burst of generosity with an insurance company's money just reflect from whence that money came. It was probably your pocket, "O spreader of alms."

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Even fairly recent history seems to be a murky subject for many of our high-powered politicians in Washington. History has taught that political theory will not repeal the natural laws of science.

Soviet Russia for years put its pursuit of science under the domination of political theorists. As a consequence, their technology and scientific achievements were far behind the western world. It took WWII and the death of Stalin to bring them out of the polemic dark ages. Once they did, scientific achievement went by leaps and bounds. Now in Russia their social upper crust is found in the scientific fields. They have learned their lesson well.

Politicians in the United States are now trying to replace natural laws with political cant and wondering why it isn't working. The free enterprise system under which the United States became the premier producer of goods and services is being rewritten according to political theory instead of economic science. It won't work for us just as it did not work for Soviet Russia.

Our approach to "prosperity" has taken on the aspects

## Commissioners Court Adopts Six Resolutions

Parmer County Commissioners convened in regular session Monday, Feb. 10, and following various discussions adopted a total of six resolutions.

First on the agenda was a report from architect Warren Pendleton of Clovis on the progress of the Parmer County Law Enforcement Center and a discussion concerning the installation of sidewalks. Following the discussion, Commissioners adopted a resolution that Pendleton be authorized to draw plans and make contact with the contractor for a quotation for sidewalks for the Center.

Jana Pronger, County Home Demonstration Agent, met with the Court and informed the Commissioners that a Sew Fair is scheduled March 13 in the Community Center in Friona. She also reported a fee of \$25 will be necessary for use of the Center. The Court then resolved the County pay the use fee for the Center.

Next order of business concerned insurance for the county. An estimate was presented to insure the county barns and the county residences located in Lazbuddie.

A lengthy discussion was conducted after which it was

mutually agreed to leave these buildings as they are now, as they have never been insured and consider them at some later date.

It was resolved by the Court that insurance on the present Courthouse building and contents be renewed for one year as it had previously been written with the following exceptions: That the Courthouse building value be raised to \$400,000 and that the old jail be dropped completely.

It was determined this route is cheaper and more applicable as the 80 per cent co-insurance credits could be given here where they could not be given with a value of \$250,000 placed on the Courthouse building.

Business concerning the County and School Depository was then conducted by the Commissioners. Bids were received by all three banks in the county and after discussion, the Friona Bank was selected county and school funds depository for the next two years.

Discussion was entered into relative to trash and litter from roads. In regard to this matter, the Commissioners Court adopted a resolution stating: "The Commissioners Court hereby requests that the residents of the County coop-

erate with the road crews of this County and refrain from scattering trash and littering the roads and bar ditches of Parmer County, as it is very expensive to remove such trash or litter."

"We would further point out that anyone depositing litter or trash on a road or highway is subject to a fine of not over \$25 nor more than \$200."

Next on the agenda was a discussion concerning the condition and need for two new cars for the Sheriff's Department deputies. It was resolved that advertisement be made for two new cars per specification which will be inserted in the advertisement and that two 1970 Impala Chevrolets will be traded in and that bids will be opened on March 10.

Resolution was also made that the Commissioners Court make advertisement and take bids for one new tractor with backhoe. A Hi-hoe backhoe mounted on a 500 Series GMC truck and one Massey Ferguson tractor are to be traded in on the new tractor.

Present for the meeting were Commissioners Jimmy Briggs, Charlie Jefferson, Cecil Atchley and Tom Lewellen, and County Judge Paul Fortenberry.

Some examples of political wishful thinking are: That you can create prosperity by spending more money and going deeper in debt. That you can indefinitely pay people more than they produce. That you can indefinitely pay people for not working at all. That you can indefinitely tax away from some people the fruits of their labors and give them to others without suffering a loss of productivity. That you can remove from people the inescapable burdens of life and expect them to retain the desire to help themselves.

Congress for the last 30 years has enacted a myriad of laws in an attempt to make the above myths work and supplant the natural laws of economics. The result has been today's woes with many more to come.

Only our God who created the world in which we live can change the great laws of nature. Nobody in Washington is walking on water, they are only sinking in the mire of self-delusion.

Texico School Board Awards G.O. Bond Bids

The Texico Municipal School District Board of Education awarded the bid for the purchase of the district's series March 1, 1975 General Obligation School Building Bonds to Quinn and Co., of Albuquerque, who submitted a low bid of 4.7891 percent effective interest rate.

The bid was awarded at a meeting of the Texico Board of Education on Tuesday, Feb. 11, at 7 p.m. at Texico High School. Present for the meeting were Roy Richardson, Dee Smith Day and Paul Skaggs, school board members; A. D. McDonald, superintendent; James Pierce, high school principal; Randall Kilmer, architect; Bill Henderson of Colton Construction Co., who received the construction bid; and representatives from several of the companies who submitted bids on the bonds.

Other companies submitting bids and effective interest rates include: Clovis National Bank, 5.30 percent; Stern Brothers and Co., 4.8645; Citizens Bank of Clovis, 5.4172 percent; Zahner and Co., 5.4009 percent; Kirkner Moore and Co., 5.165541 percent; E. F. Hutton and Co., 5.05855 percent; and O. R. Richards, 6.90 percent.

The bonds are in the aggregate principal amount of \$150,000, will bear the date of March 1, 1975 and will be in the denomination of \$5,000 each. The bonds were authorized in a bond election on Sept. 3 in the amount of \$150,000 for the purpose of erecting, remodeling, making additions to and furnishing school buildings and improving school grounds.

Maturity of the bonds will be on July 1 of each year as follows: \$15,000, 1976; \$10,000, 1977; \$10,000, 1978; \$5,000, 1979; \$55,000, 1980; and \$55,000, 1981.

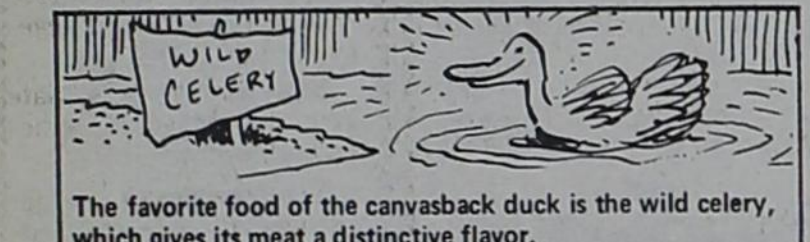
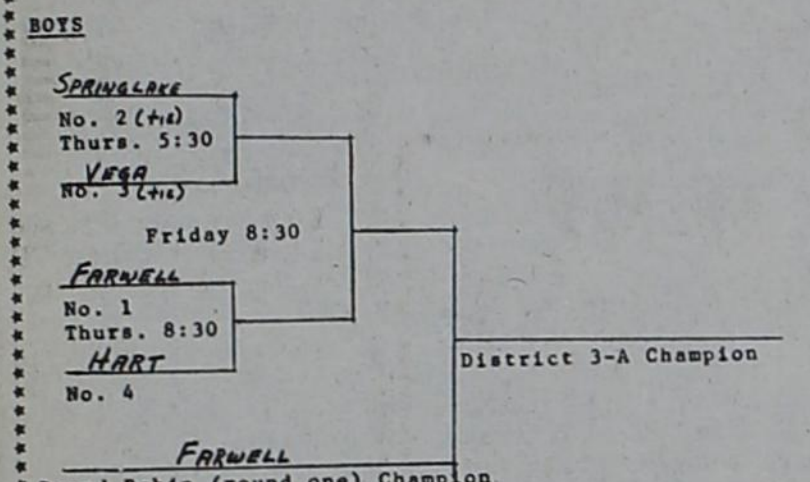
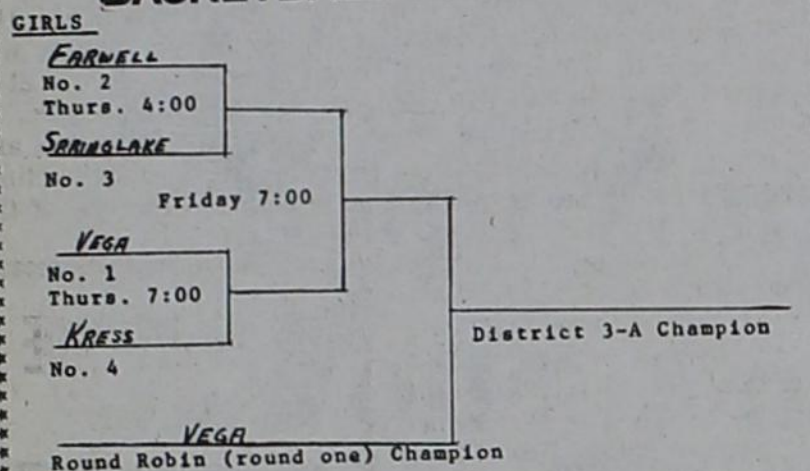
Sides Receives Recognition

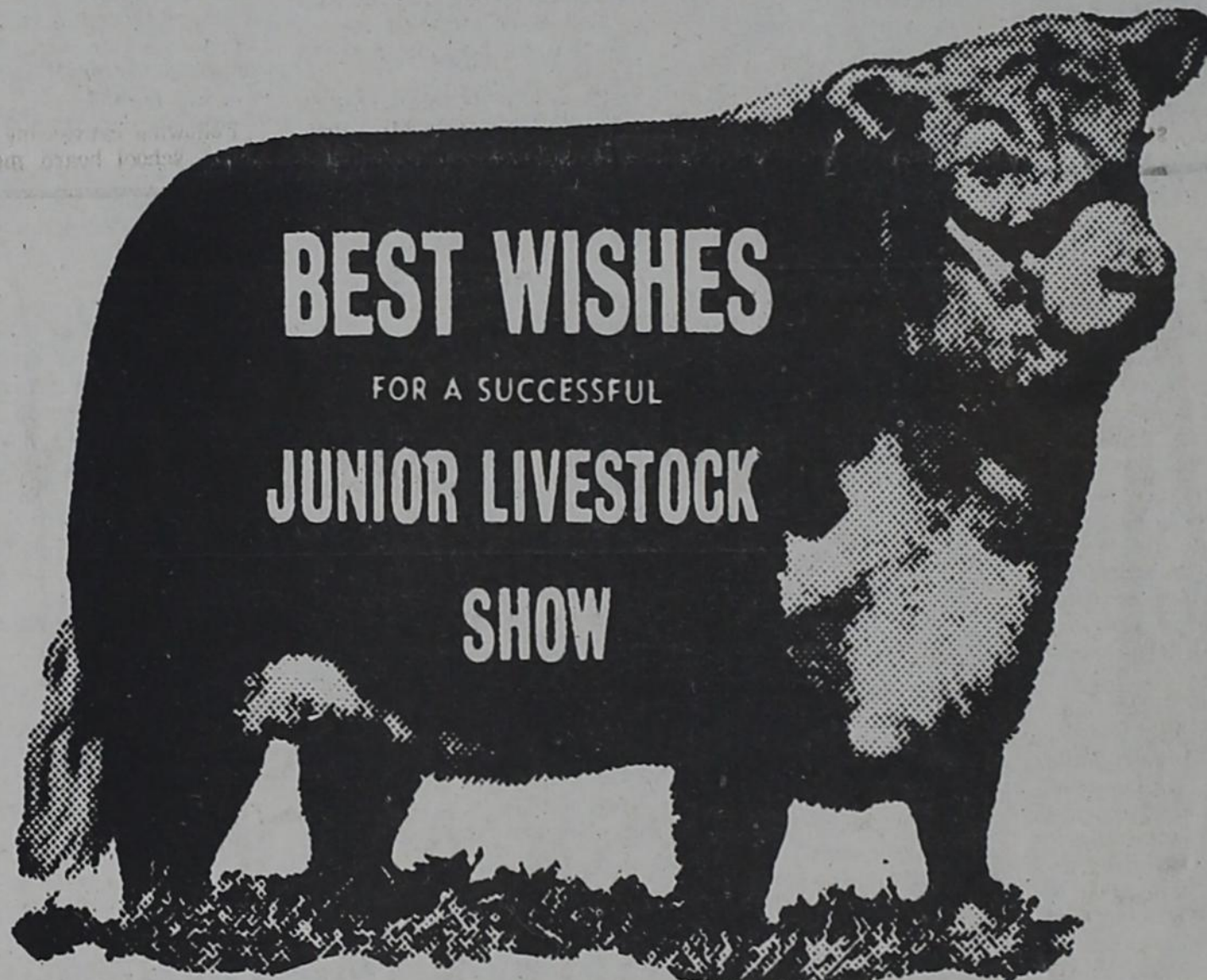
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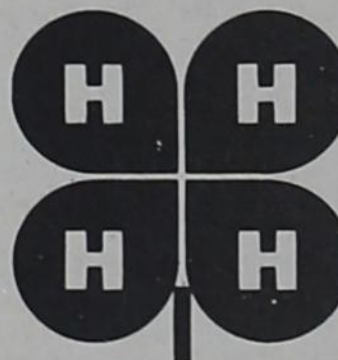

The prized certificate of improvement awarded by "Golf Digest" magazine was presented to each of the winners by Joe Lamberson, head professional at the local club, during December.

Miss Vinton achieved her award by reducing her handicap from 36 to 22 during the 1974 season. Hargrove reduced his handicap from 8 to 5.

This honor is one of the nation's most prized individual golf awards, according to the

## Farwell City Election To Be Held On April 5

Election for the City of Farwell has been scheduled for Saturday, April 5, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. CDT at the Farwell City Hall.

Investigation of expanding the present three-member commission to a five-man alderman system has been completed by city attorney Charles Aycock, and the following information was released by Farwell city clerk Janie Bowery.

For the City of Farwell to consider the alderman system, a petition must be presented to City Hall bearing names of qualified registered voters residing within the city limits of Farwell. The petition must contain 10 percent of the eligible voters, which amounts to approximately 60 names.

Next step in the process would be to obtain candidates for the positions; then the city clerk must draw up the legal notice which must be posted and printed.

If the petition is certified as correct with the 60 names of qualified electors, the measure will be presented to Farwell voters at the same time as the city election. Electors will have the opportunity to vote for or against the alderman system at that time.

If the alderman system fails to be approved, then the mayor elected in the city election would serve as mayor, and the two persons with the highest number of votes would take the two commission positions.

According to Mrs. Bowery, incumbents are automatically placed on the ballot to run for re-election unless a statement is signed stating that the individual is not running for re-election and will not serve if elected.

Forms to file for a position are available from Mrs. Bowery at Farwell City Hall.

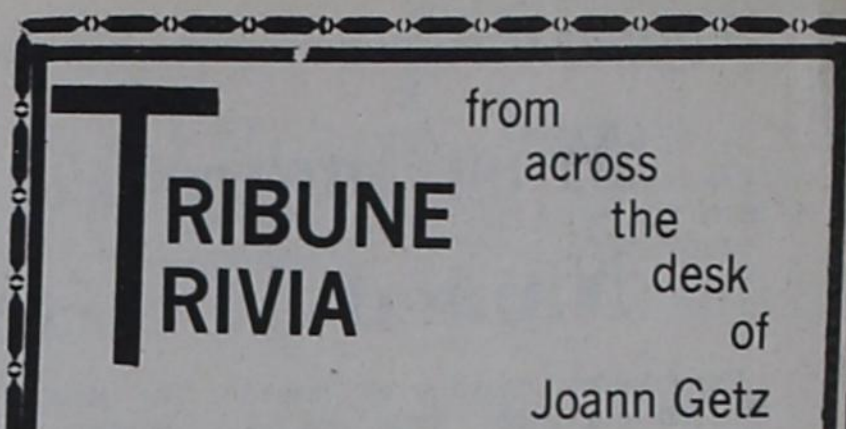

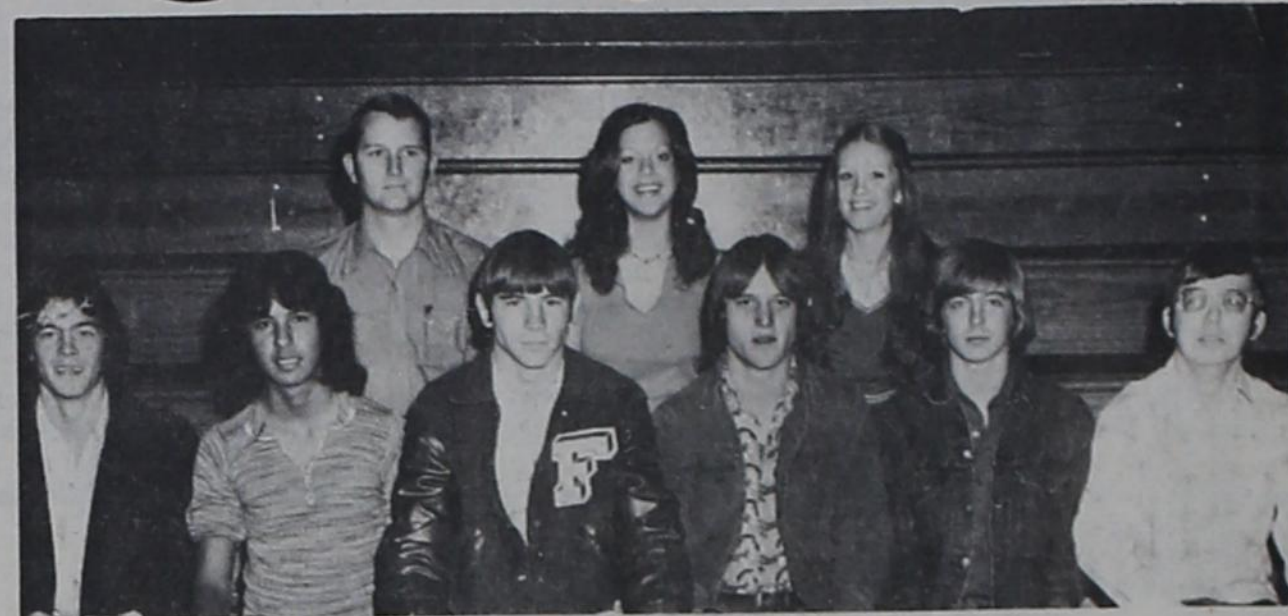

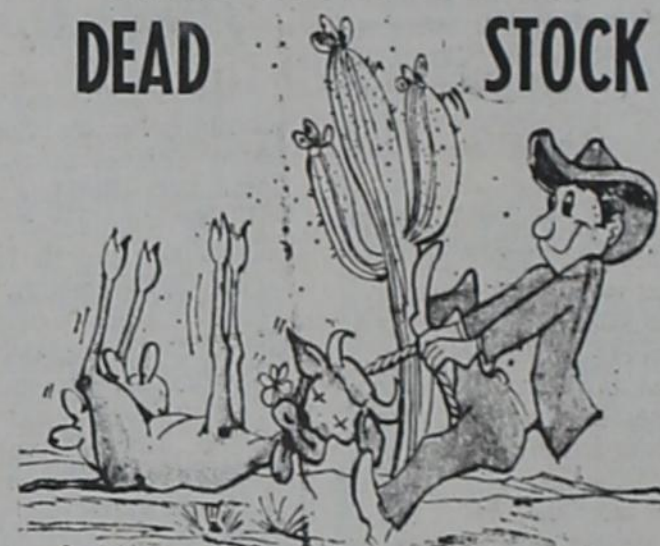

**THE LAW MISUNDERSTOOD**  
There are three misconceptions that most people entertain about the law of God and its Ten Commandments.  
1. Most people have a vague notion that the law always was; that it must have been given to Adam or soon after. Actually, God gave the law to Moses for Israel about 1500 B.C., after about 2,500 years of human history had elapsed (John 1:17). So mankind lived on earth for about 2,500 years without the law of the Ten Commandments.  
2. Most people suppose that the law and the Ten Commandments were given to mankind in general, while in fact it was given to Israel alone (Deut. 5:2,3).  
3. Most people suppose that the law was given to help us to do right. Even some clergymen teach this, although the Bible clearly teaches that the law was given to show us that we are guilty sinners.  
It is true that the law, while given to Israel, also shows the Gen- tile that he is a sinner. This is why Rom. 3:19 says:  
"Now we know that what things soever the law saith, it saith to them who are under the law; that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may be brought in guilty before God."  
But most important of all: few people realize that the Lord Jesus Christ died for our sins to deliver us from the just condemnation of the law. This is taught in the following Scriptures:  
"Christ hath redeemed us from the curse of the law, having been made a curse for us..." (Ga. 3:13).  
"For God hath made Him to be sin for us, (Him) who knew no sin; that we might be made the righteousness of God in Him" (II Cor. 5:21).  
"For sin shall not have dominion over you; for ye are NOT UNDER THE LAW, BUT UNDER GRACE" (Rom. 6:14).

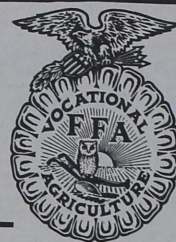
