

"We use out-of-town judges so that in no way will partiality be shown to any girl or either town in selecting our new queen," Mrs. Getz explained.



Judging will be based 50 percent on originality and theme; 30 percent on neatness; and 20 percent on use of color.





About one-quarter of all household water use can be traced to the kitchen and laundry room. But with just a few adjustments, families can cut the amount of water they use for cooking and washing dishes. Here are some of the water-saving suggestions:

Cut down on the number of utensils used in preparing meals and on the plates and glassware used with the meals themselves. Plan more one-dish meals in which vegetables are cooked or baked in little or no added water, and save nutrients too.

Because a kitchen faucet can deliver five gallons of water a minute, find ways to avoid running water. For example, use a pan of water to wash fruits and vegetables instead of doing it under the tap. If you wash dishes by hand, use a dish pan and rinse all the dishes at once rather than a few at a time.

Find ways to make double use of water. Ideally, the liquid from cooking vegetables and other foods should be used again as stock for soups or broth. But even if you don't intend to use it for cooking, don't







Two games per session are scheduled with sessions starting at 8:30 a.m., 1 p.m., and 6 p.m. MDT.


Evangelist to preach at **Texico Baptist Church**







Methods of irrigation will be discussed:


Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) on sprinkler system will be demonstrated and discussed by Leon New, Agricultural Engineer with the Agricultural Extension Service.

Surge Irrigation equipment will be demonstrated and discussed by Phillip Johnson, farmer and secretary of Parmer County S.W.C.D., and Jerry Walker, Agricultural Engineer with the Soil Conservation Service.
