Farwell debaters qualify for state

From Farwell High debate coach Angela Hall:

Farwell High qualified four students for the UIL cross-examination meet to be held March 13-15 in Austin.

Qualifying were Jon Beaubien and Jourdan Kirkland, who placed 1st and were named District champions out of 17 teams with a 6-0 record. This is their 2nd yar to qualify for state.

Placing 2nd in district and qualifying for state for the first time after defeating Sudan's No. 1 seeded team was Lauren Beaubien and Blake O'Hare. They also were undefeated at district with a 5-0 mark.

These two CX teams also qualified for the Texas Forensics Association state meet March 2-4 in Pharr, Texas. This will be a great preparation for the state UIL meet the next week.

Also placing at district was Farwell's 3rd CX team of Cameron Kirkland and Kade Foster. They posted a 3-1 mark and were quarter-finalists. They forfeited a round due to a seeding against Kirkland and Beaubien in the quarter-finals.

Also, some legislators are trying to get a law passed having all Texas schools start after Labor Day. If this occurs, Lazbuddie classes would begin Sept. 5.

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

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'Prairie **Progress'** report given

Wendy Carthel, who is the curator at the Parmer County Pioneer Museum in Friona, gave a report on "Prairie Progress" at the Monday meeting of the Parmer **County Commissioners.**

The museum board requested financial support from the commissioners of \$10,000 a year. The commissioners voted to give the museum \$12,500 (see the breakdown by precinct in the Parmer County Commissioners' story elsewhere in today's Tribune).

The museum, at 6th and Cleveland in Friona, showcases the history of Parmer County and the residents who settled this area. It displays historical documents that chronicle the founding of the communities and school districts in the county.

The Pioneer Heritage Society was organized in 1995. The building has been restored and the museum is off and running.

In the past four months, Mrs. Carthel reported, the museum has had over 500 guests view the exhibits. Upcoming is a Living History Day, a Pioneer Family Reunion, the Friona Centennial in 2006, and the Parmer County Centennial in 2007.

The museum partners with Friona Schools and their service learning project, which averages over 200 volunteer hours by students each year at the museum. They do tasks such as painting, display construction, cataloging, cleaning and website creation.

The museum is currently staffed by volunteers on Saturday mornings and by request during the week. Mrs. Carthel said it is hoped that the museum could be open regular hours with a part-time person employed as curator.

Mrs. Carthel presented a calendar of events for this year, which included:

February -- speaking at the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club; a Texas Plains Trail meeting in Whiteface; a Friona Junior High oral history project (recording the Reeve and Schlenker families), and Friona High School choir workshop.

March -- Window displays for the Friona Chamber of Commerce; and opening sales on the Friona Centennial T-shirt at the Friona Chamber banquet.

April -- Service learning workdays: Friona High seniors have projects scheduled that include building a stand for the trophy case from the Oklahoma Lane School; cleaning and repairing a stove donated from the Mauer Home; cataloging and constructing new displays; building a fence on the property line, and preparing for

the May 18 National History Day event.

May -- National Museum Day will be held on the 18th. A noon meal, chuck wagon style, will be served. Oral histories will be presented at scheduled times during the day. Living displays of pioneer life in Parmer County will be presented by folks in authentic costumes.

July -- Museum will have special displays for the Schlenker family reunion.

September -- Special displays and events will be held in conjunction with Friona Maize Days.

And in 2007, the museum will work with the Parmer County Historical Society on planning several special events for the county's centennial. This may include: Mt. Olivet Cemetery, talking tombstones; and traveling history of Parmer County.

Meanwhile, the oral history recordings are continuing. Families recorded so far have been: Bovina -- Baca. Brito; Friona -- Reeve; Rhea -- Schlenker; and Oklahoma Lane -- Carpenter.

Oral histories scheduled in the future include: Friona -- Bradley and Lillard; and Bovina -- Roach and Foster.

The museum also has collected photo histories of Parmer County families recently: Friona -- Hart, Sympson, Bradley, Reeve and O.C. Jones; and Black --Alexander.

Photo collections of school histories have been taken from Black, Bovina, Lazbuddie, Lakeview, Oklahoma Lane and Friona.

The museum's photo archieves documents dates as early as 1901, showing Bovina in its earliest days.


Farwell Debate

Coach Tra Hall said, "These boys are going to do great things over the next few years in debate. They have worked extremely hard this year and we are very proud of their accomplishments. Farwell High School was the only school to advance all three teams to the elimination rounds at District. Other teams included Sundown, Sudan and Whiteface. Farwell's 1 and 2 teams beat Sudan's 1 and 2 teams in the semi-final rounds, causing both Farwell teams to advance to state and both Sudan teams to place 3rd and 4th and stay at home.

Sudan has been the District champion in CX Debate for the past five years. This is Farwell's first District championship since becoming Class 1A in 2000. Farwell is in the toughest and biggest CX and UIL district in the state of Texas in Class 1A.

The kids have worked very hard for this chance to compete at the state level. I expect both teams to do very well at state this year. We learned a lot from last year's experience and we won't make the same mistakes. It is a privilege to coach these kids and be a part of their success. They are the best kids in the world. We are just so excited about getting a District championship. That is what we wanted and to advance two teams to state ...

Through participation at the state meet, students qualify for Texas Interscholastic League Foundation Scholarships. Since its inception in 1954, the TILF has provided \$19 million to over 14,500 students. This year, TILF expects to award an estimated 520 new and renewed grants. Grants and donations from foundations and individuals have funded these academic scholarships. Jon Beaubien, a senior, will be eligible to apply for one of these scholarships if he and Jourdan Kirkland advance to the elimination rounds on the second day of the tournament.





LIVE CATTLE: There was no cash trade this week for he first time since anyone can remember. Packers are still reportedly operating in the red and probably taking advantage of the winter storm due to hit the East Coast over the weekend. A major storm would slow the movement of beef and pressure prices. Bids are mid to high \$80's and offers in the mid \$90's. Next week may tell the rest of the story, but for now, trends are down into the April/May time frame.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeders also bounced a little on Friday, but overall trends are still pointing down into the April/May time frame. Price projections range from \$1.02-1.04 even though this would be like predicting the weather? There may be few cattle to draw from as dry conditions have moved most the cattle inside, but lower June/August Live Cattle prices are expected to add presure.

CORN: The market has moved up rather quickly which is in line with normal seasonal expectations. Normally, prices will remain fairly strong into the early April time frame and then take a drop. Weather will probably have more impact this year than last depending on the number of planted acres we see in late March. Ethanol production is expected to keep this market fairly strong this year, but there are still lots of questions as to usage?

SOYBEANS: There is s flat pattern which has held prices down over the last few weeks. As we move nearer to South American harvest, the market may find it difficult to rally for any length of time. There may be a Spring rally during the March/April time frame?

WHEAT: The KC Wheat prices have shot up to another contract high this week. Weather is still the main concern surrounding wheat prices. There is a winter storm predicted to cover the Mid West and Central Plains next week which could bring in some selling pressure. The market is at a point in time that improving weather could top the market? Otherwise, trends are still pointing higher.

COTTON: Although cotton prices dropped this week, there is little in the way of news to give the market any direction at this time. Most analysts have predicted an pturn in exports to China, but so far there is only a nornal flow out. Dry weather remains a concern over many areas ahead of planting and large ending stocks need to move out?

Faster is better?

Since I was 16 years old, I have been known as a story teller, with good reason.

I enjoy telling my tales in a humorous way, so folks never know whether I am making them up or now. Actually, they are all true, but many seem unbelievable.

I'm sure you don't believe many that I have related over the years here.

For example, last year, in this column, I told some of my old school stories. I wasn't quite sure of the educational methods used, like having me sit separately from other students because I couldn't do the work properly, or the time I sat in a foreign language class for 5 months not having one inkling of what was being said.

But who am I to second guess the educators... I was just a punk kid doing what he was told to.

Anyway, here's another tale and if you can explain the reason for this method of teaching, please send me a note at P.O. Box 255, Farwell, TX 79325.

The class, for about three months, was given this work:

You were to read paragraphs out of stories as fast as possible. And the teacher would time you. Now, I don't recall exactly what was given, but it was something like reading out loud 6 long paragraphs in, say, 30 seconds, for the first step.

There were about 6 steps, and if you got the last step done, like reading 3 pages out loud in 90 seconds (or whatever), you got an "A".

I got 5 steps okay, but the last one was a real lulu. No one in the class could get it.

Frankly, at the time, I thought this was pretty silly. I mean, isn't it more important to know what you are reading rather than how fast you can speed through it?

What say you?

With the drought in the area, here are some important conservation tips:

Install a low-flow shower head that restricts the flow of water from the shower to 2.5 gallons per minute.

Install a low-flow toilet that uses only 1.6 gallons of water per flush.

Take short showers. Install a showerhead with a cutoff valve or turn the water off while soaping and turn it back on again to rinse.

When brushing teeth, turn the water off until it is time to rinse.

Do not let the water run while washing hands. Turn the water off while soaping and turn it on again to rinse.

When shaving, fill the Isink with hot water instead of letting the water run continuously.

Test toilets for leaks. Add a few drops of food coloring or a dye tablet to the water in the toilet tank, but do not flush the toilet.

Wait a few minutes to see if the coloring appears in the bowl. If so, the toilet has a silent leak that needs to be repaired.

Never yes the toilet as a trash can to dispose of bugs, cigarette butts, or other items. Unnecessary flushing wastes water.

Never run the dishwasher without having a full load.

Keep conservation in mind when working in the kitchen. Small water savings, such as not making too much coffee or letting ice cubes melt in a sink, can add up over time.

Never run the washing machine without a full load. On adjustable models, match the water fill setting with the amount of clothing to be washed.

Cotton profitability workshop scheduled

Cotton producers can get a leg up on planning their management strategies for 2006 at the cotton profitability workshop sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension in Muleshoe on Feb. 22 from 9:30 a.m. to noon at the Bailey County Coliseum.

"We will take a long, hard look at higher production expenses, and how that may affect your operating strategy," said Dr. Jackie Smith, Extension economist based at Lubbock. "We know producers will face higher energy costs for irrigation, fertilizer, fuel and ginning.

"We will also examine rental arrangements, how energy prices have affected them and how they might need to be adjusted."

Jeff Pate and Jay Yates, Extension risk management specialists based at Lubbock, will provide an outlook for fuel, fertilizer, other farm inputs, and crop prices for 2006. They will also discuss farm program payments



and possible production budgets for irrigated cotton.

Smith will examine crop share rental arrangements, focusing on how tenants and landlords can share the risk and total investment in an equitable agreement. He will also discuss cash leases.

Barett and Martin answered with baskets for Farwell, but a 3-pointer by Bovina's Vela made it 48-34, to end the 3rd quarter.



Texico looks at city work

The Texico City Council on Tuesday looked into several city improvements, including widening the streets, fixing the city pool, and giving a face-lift to the community center.

New Mexico gives out grants each year to help cities take care of their streets. Normally this money has been used to fix cracks and potholes. Darryl Stanton reported that all of the streets are chip sealed and are in good shape. The council is looking at other projects that might make good use of the money.

One idea is to widen some streets, such as Hamlin, Hudson, Eunice, Mildred and Kendred. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey pointed out that these streets would be the easiest and have the most area. Curbs, gutters, ditches, and engineering costs would have to be looked at before a decision is made, especially in the cases of Craig and Hereford streets, where bar ditches would force them to reshape the surrounding areas as well.

The city pool needs plumbing help. The skimmers are not working properly, and will require part of the concrete to be removed before it would work well. Autrey stated that if the summer is hot and dry, the pool needs to be open.

The council also looked at a new paint job for the community center. The paint on the floor has become scuffed and chipped off in places. A paint job can help make the floors look better, but the center would have to be shut down for about a month.

In other business, the council:

- Voted to approve a Memorial Stone at the city cemetery. The Cemetery Association asked for this after seeing several burial certificates of people who are presumably buried in the cemetery, but whose graves are either unmarked, or have been lost over the years.

Heard that the Rural Infrastructure Program has approved Texico for a loan of \$325,000 at 3% interest for the current water project. City Consultant Mike Hannagan is working on a CDBG grant of \$300,000 that, if received, would be able to pay directly to the loan. - Hired Guadalupe Loera as the new Court Clerk.

From Bovina City Manager Ernest Terry:

There is a fire ban in the entire state of Texas which has been re-enforced in Parmer County. Simply stated for all to understand, this ban is a ban on all open flames.

The City of Bovina didn't restate the ban, because existing ordinances and state laws cover burning within the city. But, what does all of this really mean?

Within the city limits of Bovina, no open fires are allowed, no fireworks are permitted, grass may not be burned, trash may not be burned, and charcoal barbeques are not allowed. If you violate this ban, a criminal citation may be issued. And, if you have an open flame and it gets away from you and the fire department has to be called to put out the fire, you may be required to pay for the cost of the fire departments time, expense, and effort. That can be very expensive! And we haven't even talked about the danger of the fire itself.

It hasn't rained in a very long time. The ground and vegetation is VERY dry. No one knows when it will rain again. The countryside is a tinderbox. Be very careful Continued on Page 14

Bovina, engineer reach agreement

The Bovina City Council on Feb. 9 agreed to a buy-out with former city sewer project engineer Rick Oller & Associates, for \$164,000 for work done.

The attorneys will meet later this month to finalize the pact, which Oller has algready agreed to, said City Manager Ernest Terry.

As part of the agreement, Oller will give Bovina the engineering designs, ecology assessments, surveys, etc., that he has done on the project.

Oller resigned late last year after the city council questioned the project's expenditures.

The city will now ask the Texas Water Development Board to release \$164,000 early to pay Oller. If the TWDB says no, the city would get a bank loan for the amount.

In other business, the council:

-- Heard citizen Marie Venable complain about junked cars and other debris. The city will check on the debris problem and send letters to property owners.

-- Approved the 2006 elections. See legal ad elsewhere in today's Tribune.

-- Heard Foy Pricer, of the Texas Municipal League, make a presentation on the retirement program.

At age 64, retiring city employees will be allowed to keep their health insurance, but pay for it themselves.

The council will review this and discuss it at its next meeting.

-- Discussed possibly amending the cemetery ordinance, but will seek the views of residents and cemetery board members before making a decision.

Basically, some citizens have suggested that the cemetery allow "lapida", personal mausoleums. Also, there is no provision for vaults.

Currently, nothing over 6 inches above ground, except for monuments, is permitted.

The council may set aside a certain section if it goes along with the suggestions.

-- Heard councilman Jessie Stone encourage Bovina residents to use the roll-off dumpster at the east end of town and not dump debris on county roads. It takes a lot more work for county employees to clean up the debris along the roads.

-- Heard Mayor Stan Miller suggest creating a park board to help fix up the playground equipment at the city park. Some of that equipment is wearing out.

The Bovina Chamber of Commerce banquet will begin March 4 at 7 p.m. at the school cafeteria.


Tickets are \$12 each. They are available at the Bone Joint and the Parmer County Appraisal District office in Bovina.
