Victor M. Kaneubbe, Choctaw Indian from Okmulgee, Okla., will be guest speaker for the Texico Chamber of Commerce Banquet Saturday, April 19. The annual event will be

held at the Texico School Cafeteria at 7:30 p.m. MDT.

Tickets sell for \$3.50 each and may be purchased from any Chamber member. Advance tickets are also on sale at the Citizens Bank in Texico and tickets will also be available at the door Saturday night.

Kaneubbe has had seven years experience as Music and Education Director in Baptist churches in Bowlegs, Okmulgee, Tulsa, Pawhuska and Osage, Okla., as well as Kirkwood, Mo.

He has served 26 years in Home Mission Fields beginning in 1943 as a student missionary for the First Baptist Church in Oklahoma City, Okla. Kaneubbe also served in this field at the Baptist Indian Center in Oklahoma City, Shawnee, Okla.; The Haskell Institute at Lawrence, Kan.; General Missionary New Choctaw Baptist Association in Philadelphia and Mississippi; Baptist Indian Center, Farmington, N.M.; and Navajo Baptist School, Fruitland, N.M. He was also Regional Missionary for north-west New Mexico and the First Indian Baptist Church at Gallup, N.M.

The well-known vocalist sang with the Bison Glee Club at Oklahoma Baptist University for five years and sang solo over the "Baptist Hour" radio program with the Glee Club. In Albuquerque, N.M., during the year 1948, he was Music Director for a city-wide Youth Revival. In 1956, Kaneubbe was minister for Sunday Worship Service for "All American Indian Days Celebration" at Sheridan, Wyo.

He is the author of "Indian Life on New Trails." His biography appears in several books including: "Indian of Today," "Dictionary of International Biography," "Men of Achievement," "Community Leaders and Noteworthy Americans," "Who's Who in American School Administration" and "Personalities in the West and Mid West."

Kaneubbe, a man of many achievements, and his wife Eleanor Eileen have two adopted daughters, Vicki Hotana, 20, and Tina Sue, 12.

A 1940 graduate of Okmulgee High School, Okmulgee, Okla., he received his B.A. degree in Liberal Arts at Oklahoma Baptist University, Shawnee, Okla.; worked towards his Bachelor of Fine Arts Degree for a year and a half at O.B.U. He attended the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Tex., and Central Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Kans.

Positions he presently holds are: Missionary Pastor of the First Indian Baptist Church at Gallup, N.M.; Student Work at Fort Wingate Indian School

and the New Mission among the Navajo Indians in Gallup.

Master of ceremonies for the upcoming banquet will be A.D. McDonald, who will also be installed as president. The invocation will be given by James Wilbanks, and Lewis Cooper will introduce special guests.

Twister Hits Mesman Place

Asa Smith reported about .10

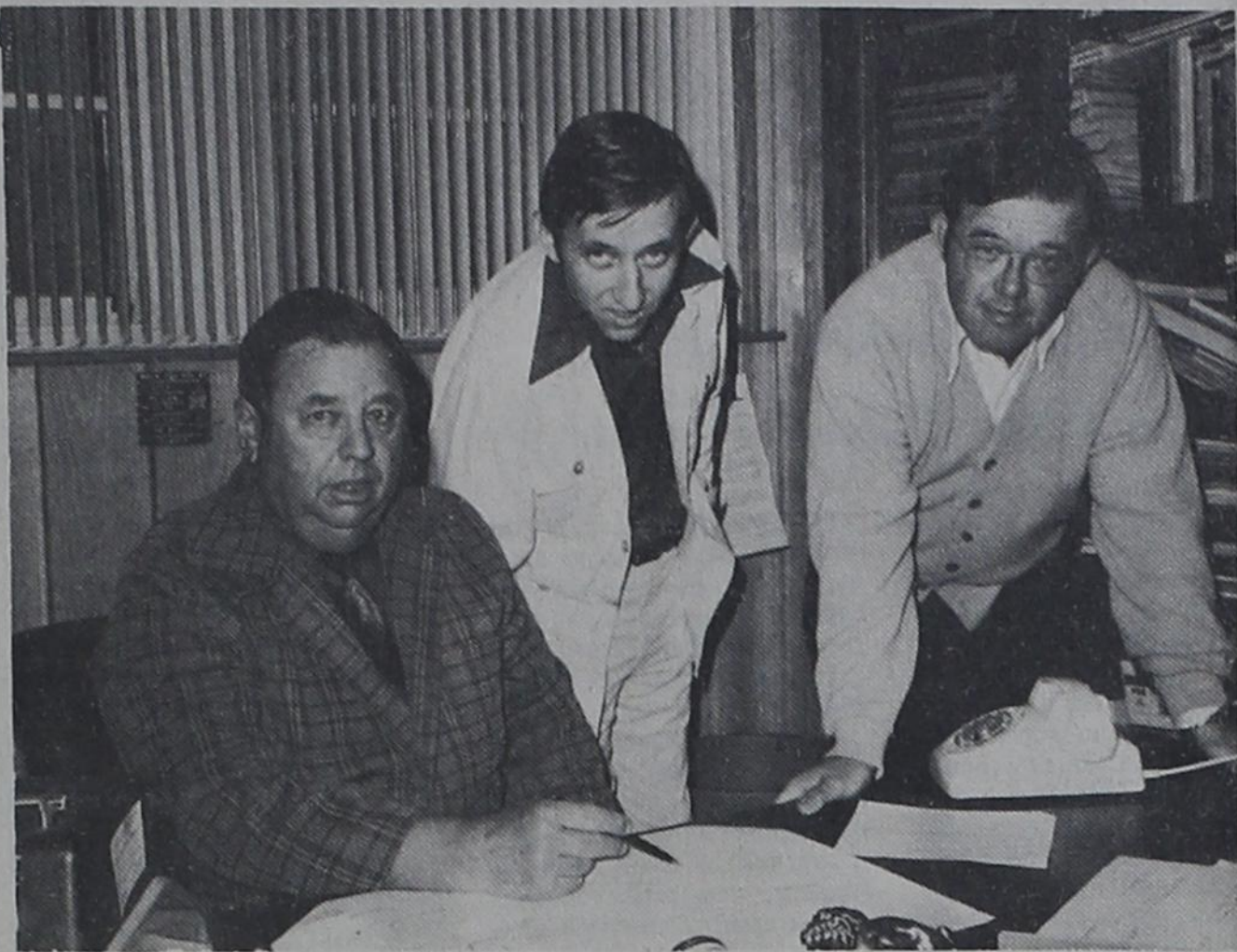
inch with a little hail that melted very fast at Lariat. There was no crop damage.

Elmer Langford, north of Texico, said he received just a shower. B. A. Rogers of Texico reported a light sprinkle, not enough to call a rain, and lots of wind and sand.

Three Re-Elected - -

Voter Turnout Heavy In City, School Elections

In two elections which turned out the largest number of voters ever, three incumbents were returned to office with voters electing one new member to the Farwell City Commission and one new Farwell School Board Trustee.

Farwell City Mayor Gil Patschke was re-elected during the city election with Ralph Franse voted into office as City Commissioner.

Voters in the School Board election returned Charles Aycock to his office and elected Joe Hughes to fill the vacancy created by the expiration of the term of Walter Hughes. Walter Hughes did not file for re-election to the post.

Voter interest in the city election rose to an all time

high as only one person, incumbent Commissioner Fred Chandler, had filed for a position on the ballot before the designated filing deadline. Write-in candidates then began to make known their candidacy for the open position on the ballot.

There were three announced write-in candidates when the polls opened Saturday, but a total of nine persons received write-in votes.

Those announcing their intentions to seek election to the City Commission by write-in ballot were Truman McKillip, James Craig and Ralph Franse. Other persons receiving write-in votes were J.T. Ford, Albert Johnson, W.M. Roberts, B.V. Hughes, Clay Henson and Fred

Curtis.

Incumbents who sought re-election were Mayor Gil Patschke, who just completed his second term, and City Commissioner Fred Chandler. Each received a record number of votes during the election.

In unofficial results of the city election in which a total of 239 registered voters cast ballots, Gil Patschke received 146 votes with J.T. Ford receiving 82, Albert Johnson, two, and W.M. Roberts, one.

In the race for City Commissioner incumbent Fred Chandler received a total of 197 votes with 146 votes being cast for Ralph Franse, 72 for James Craig, 44 for Truman McKillip, three for Fred Cur-

tis, two for Clay Henson and one for B.V. Hughes.

According to Farwell City Clerk Janie Bowery, the elected officials will take office immediately following the swearing-in ceremony to be conducted the latter part of this week.

A special meeting to canvass the votes and administer the oath of office to the elected officials had been planned for Wednesday morning but postponement was necessary due to the death of Mrs. Jessie Mae Franse, mother of newly-elected City Commissioner Ralph Franse.

Franse was elected to fill the post vacated by the expiring of the term of Jim Berry who did not seek re-election. Berry completed one term of office.

The election ballot showed spaces for two write-in votes in the City Commissioner race. In each race, the highest vote total determined the winner or winners. There was also space on the ballot for write-in votes for the position of Mayor.

In the Farwell School Board election, also conducted Saturday, a total number of 296 (Continued on Page 2)

Absentee Balloting Underway

Absentee balloting is now in progress at the Parmer County Courthouse for the Constitutional Amendment Election to be held April 22.

Voters who will be out of town on April 22 may cast their vote by absentee ballot for the two Amendments between now and April 18, according to Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren.

Constitutional Amendment No. One, if passed, would revise and consolidate provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and provide for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals.

Constitutional Amendment No. Two, if passed, would set the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and set a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees.

Humor is one attribute that separated man from the beasts. Mankind has been able to find some humor amid almost impossible conditions.

Inasmuch as our government qualifies as an "impossible condition" we will pass along this article concerning Creation. It was originally written by Andrew Hinshaw, a California Congressman.

The article follows:

There's a message to this unique account of CREATION: "In the beginning, God created Heaven and Earth."

He was almost immediately faced with a class-action lawsuit for failing to file an environmental-impact statement by HEPA - the Heavenly Environmental Impact Agency.

God was granted a temporary permit for the heavenly portion of the project, but a cease-and-desist order was issued on the earthly part.

Upon completion of his construction - permit application and environmental - impact statement, God appeared before the agency to answer questions.

When asked why he began these projects in the first place, he simply replied that he liked to be creative.

This was not considered adequate reasoning, and he was directed to substantiate this further. He was advised that the agency was unable to see any practical use for earth since "the earth was void and empty and darkness was upon the face of the deep."

Then God said, "Let there be light!"

This action was in gross error since one member of the agency was active in the Sier-rangel Club and immediately protested, asking, "How was the light to be made? Would there be strip mining? What about thermal pollution? Air pollution?"

God explained that the light would come from a hugh ball of fire.

Nobody in the agency really understood this, but to disguise their ignorance, they issued a provisional acceptance assuming: (1) there would be no smog or smoke resulting from the ball of fire, (2) a separate burning permit would be obtained, and (3) since a continuous light would be a waste of energy, it should be dark at least one-half of the time.

So God agreed to divide light and darkness, and he would call the light, day, and the darkness, night. The agency expressed no interest with in-house semantics!

When asked how the earth would be covered, God said, "Let there be firmament made amidst the waters, and let it divide the waters from the waters."

One ecologically radical agency member accused him of double-talk but the agency tabled action since God would be required first to file for a permit from the Angelic Bureau of Land Management and further would be required to obtain water permits from the appropriate agencies involved.

The council asked if there would be only water and firmament, and God said, "Let the earth bring forth the green herb, and such as may seed, and the fruit of the tree yielding fruit after its kinds, which may have seen itself upon the earth."

The agency agreed, as long as native seeds would be used.

About future development, God said, "Let the waters bring forth the creeping creatures having life, and the fowl that may fly over the earth."

Here again the agency took no formal action since this would require approval of the Game and Fish Commission coordinated with the Heavenly Wildlife Federation.

It appeared that everything was at last in order until God stated he wanted to complete the project in six days.

He was sternly advised that his timing was completely out of the question as the agency would require a minimum of 180 days to review the application and the environmental-impact statement. Then there would be the public hearings! No final action could be expected before ten or twelve months.

Slowly God picked up the voluminous documents before him, and as he turned away was heard to mutter, "To Hell with it!"

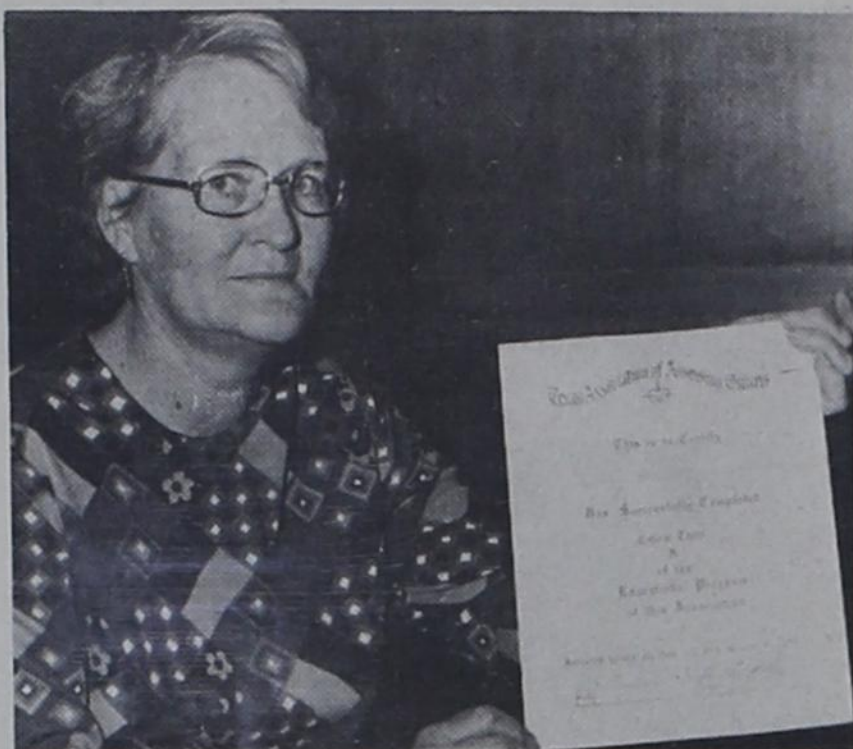

Nix Spraying Deadline - -

Commissions Court Has Special Called Meeting

A called meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners Court was held Tuesday, April 1. The special meeting was called by Judge Paul Fortenberry. In attendance were Commissioners Jimmy Briggs, Charlie Jefferson, Cecil Atchley and Tom Lewellen.

"Certain requests had come to some members of the Court to extend the deadline for spraying hormone-type herbicides for weeds," said Judge Fortenberry. "It was pointed out that the weather had not been conducive to spraying, consequently these requests were made," he explained. "It was also pointed out that cotton, sugar beets, and in some cases, potatoes would be planted soon and possibly some were being planted at this time. These crops could be up and could be destroyed by the drifting of this spray if the deadline were extended," explained Judge Fortenberry.

Both men were placed on the Grand Jury docket and bound over with bond being set at \$2,500 each.

The Big Tex Elevator, located in the northeastern part of the county, was hit again. Stolen was a clock radio and about \$14 in petty cash from the office.

This incident is still under investigation by the sheriff's department. They received the report of the break-in March 31, according to Sheriff Lovelace.

A house was vandalized about three and a half miles west of the Hub, according to the sheriff. However, very little damage was done and nothing was reported missing. It is suspected it was done by youngsters living in the area.

Sheriff Lovelace received a report of a break-in early Monday morning, April 7, at Red Prather's Phillip 66 Service Station in Farwell.

Approximately \$90 in cash was taken and the incident is being investigated at this time.

Texico Kindergarten Registration Slated

Registration for the 1975 session of the Texico Municipal School Kindergarten has been scheduled for Monday, April 14. Registration and classes for the session will begin at 8:30 a.m. MDT Monday with classes scheduled to continue through May 23.

Only those children who will be in the first grade in August, 1975, and live in the Texico district will be accepted. Children being registered must be six years of age before November 1, 1975. Parents are urged to bring their child's birth certificate to registration.

According to Rogers, a nurse will be on hand to explain about immunization and records. "Immunization of school children will be strictly enforced," Rogers related.

"I would suggest, if you do not have the necessary immunizations," commented Ro-

gers, "that you begin them as soon as possible. Your child must have the immunizations before the start of school next year anyway."

Kindergarten children will be permitted to ride the bus to school provided the space is available. Parents will need to pick up their children because the kindergarten classes will dismiss at 12 noon. Kindergarten hours will begin at 8:30 a.m. and classes will be conducted in the southwest room of the south gymnasium.

The school will furnish some of the supplies to be used by kindergarten students. Parents must furnish the following: beginner pencil, crayons (eight colors), tablet (wide line), scissors, (blunt point), white paste (not liquid), facial tissues (small box), and a small box for supplies.

In other business conducted by the Trustees, bids on moving the bleachers to the new football field were opened. W.K. Bigam and Sons of Lubbock were awarded the contract.

The contract for pouring foundations for the bleachers was awarded to Charlie Hromas by the board.

Jack Williams, high school principal, reported on the quarter system the Farwell Schools will be moving into next year. James Craig, junior high principal, and Vernon Scott, elementary principal, were present for the presentation.

Scott, Kathy Weems, Kindergarten instructor, and James Perkins, superintendent-elect, discussed the Head Start Program for next year with the board and the possibility of enrolling four-year-olds in the program.

Eugene Jennings, athletic

director, presented phases of the athletic program to the assembled group.

Board members renewed the teaching contract of Mrs. Shirley East, science teacher, for the 1975-76 school term.

Applications for transfer into the Farwell School District for the forthcoming school term were approved, according to Superintendent Roberts.

Texico School Trustees Hire Staff And Faculty

Faculty and staff members where hired for the Texico Municipal Schools during the Tuesday night, April 8, Board of Education meeting. All persons whose employment was approved will be receiving letters from the superintendent's office in the new future. Faculty and staff hired are for the 1975-76 school year, according to Superintendent A. D. McDonald.

The school budget was discussed during the meeting though no official action was taken at this time due to the fact that there were some items pending.

The major portion of the meeting was with officials of the Eastern Plains Vocational School, at the request of Melrose and Ft. Sumner who want to become part of the Eastern Plains District.

Following presentation of their applications to the district, approval was given and vocational educational programs will be made available to these communities following citizen approval through election in each community.

The board approved payment of pending bills and there being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

37 Pints Donated To Lions Blood Bank

Out of 41 potential blood donors, 37 donated. Six Farwell High School students were donors. There would have been more high school students donating, according to Walker, but the donors must be at least 17 years old. There were several 15 and 16 year-old donors willing, he said.

Serving as song leader will be Jimmie Sartain of Trinity Methodist Church in Clovis.

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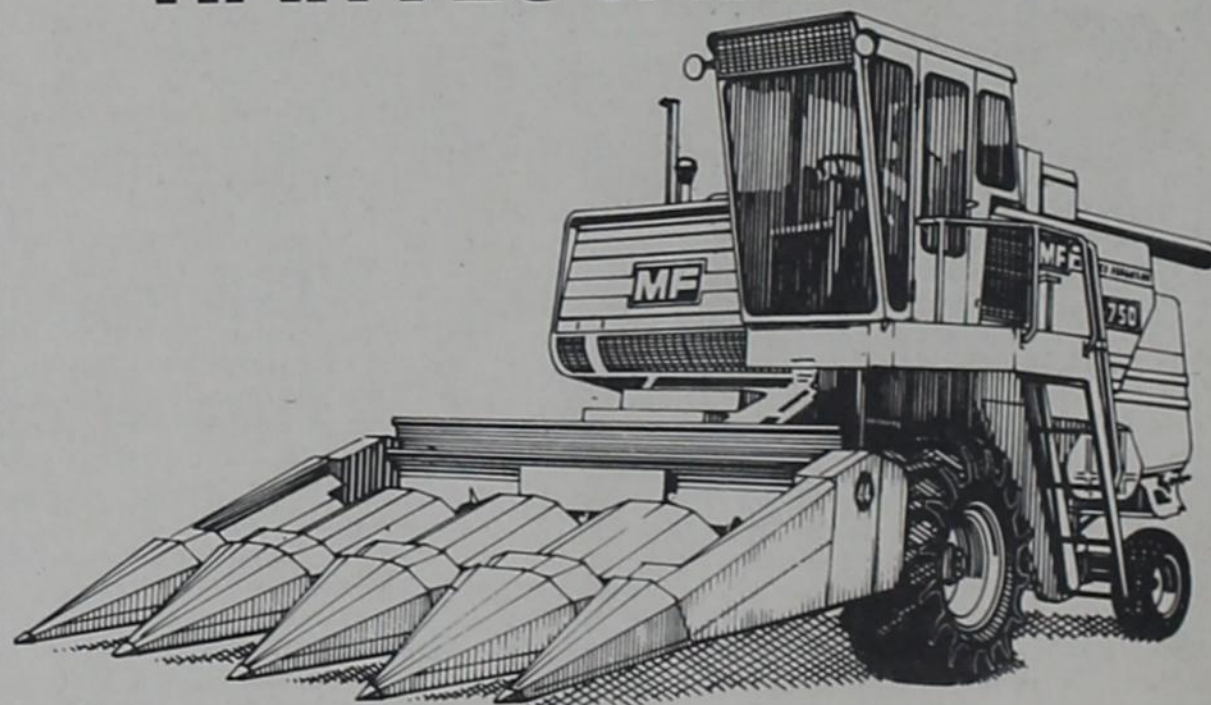
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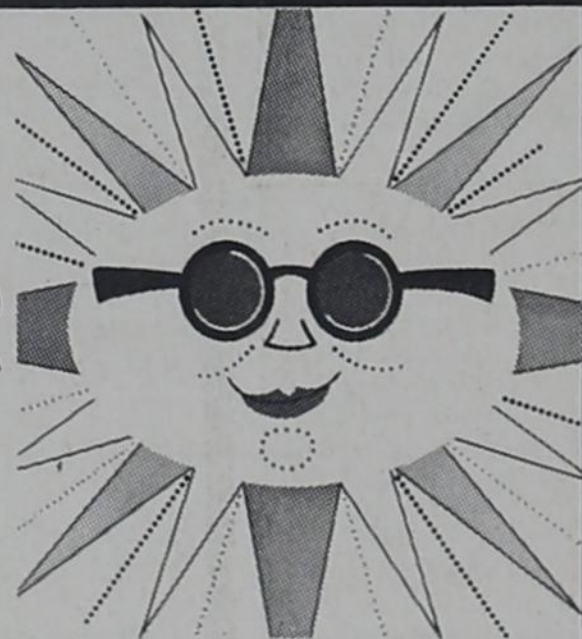
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'This Is Your Life' Program Honors Coach Vernon Scott

In his opening comments, emcee Jack Williams, Farwell High School principal, stated, "Today we have gathered to honor a great human being who is very deserving of this recognition. A person who has given of his time, effort and ability to work with the youth of our community in many areas."

Following a few comments as to the personality and character of the honoree, a short biography was given relating: Vernon Ross Scott was born on the banks of Grosbeck Creek in the county of Hardeman, Tex., in a small town (Quanah) which is a suburb of Acme, Tex. He attended formal school at Quanah graduating from high school and then attended Ranger Jr. College until he took a vacation to visit Uncle Sam.

"When his tenure with Uncle Sam was over he enrolled in Wayland Baptist College at Plainview. This is where he met his lovely wife, Ometa Bradley. Ometa was attending business school in Plainview at

that time and she realized, prior to her marriage to Scott, that she would probably play second fiddle to sports if she did marry this man.

"To this lovely family has been born two sons, Steve Scott and John Scott.

"While at Wayland, Scott's coach was Harley Redin, who is quite a basketball bug himself. He would have liked to have been at this program; however, he is with the Wayland Flying Queens in Gallup, N.M., where they played in the N.A.A.U. Tournament.

"For this reason he was unable to attend; however, he did send a letter and asked that his message be passed along to Scott's relatives and many friends and especially to Coach Scott," in which he said only a basketball game could keep him from being with Scott.

A letter was also received from Bobby Field expressing his best wishes to Scott and his regrets that he would be unable to attend. Also letter was received from Lewey Bradshaw expressing his best wishes.

At this time, a "This Is Your Life" program was kicked off by Martin Chandler, Farwell resident, friend of Scott, and former Wayland dorm brother of Scott. Martin was only one of many who related some of the humorous antics of "Scotty" to the group gathered to honor Vernon Scott.

Coach Scott has been a very versatile educator while being connected with the Farwell School. He is an excellent teacher and administrator. He has coached in the football area, basketball area and worked with the Little Dribblers, which he was instrumental in getting started in this part of our country.

Scott coached the high school girls basketball team and several of his girls team members were present to honor him. Each one took a turn at a microphone backstage and commented on their basketball days when they played under the direction of Scott before making an appearance. They were Nelda Wilhite, Deb Norton and Patsy Camp. Roberta Johnson was also a senior member of the 1963-64 girls basketball squad.

During 1963-64, Scott's first year at Farwell, he coached the boys basketball team, as well as working with all other areas of coaching, and led the Varsity Steers to a District Championship. Graduating senior Steer basketballers for 1963-64 were Leon Lovelace, Danny Lindop, Alan Busbice, Joe White and Roy Donaldson.

In 1964-65, Scott led the Steers to another District title with graduating seniors being Johnny Atkinson, Warren Gossett, Jerry Childs, Dale Gober, Bruce Billingsley and Jerry Fields.

1965-66 saw the Steers take their third District crown under Scott's leadership. Team members included graduating seniors Doyle Johnson, Larry Gregory and Charlie Dannheim.

The seasons of 1966-67 and 1967-68 were not championship years for the Steers but several graduating seniors attended "Vernon Scott Day" to honor their coach. Graduating seniors for 1967 were Randy Robertson, Bruce Dollar and Bobby Field. Seniors for 1968 were Lew Bradshaw, Warlick Dollar, Lawrence Bryant and Robert Rhodes.

The two years without a District championship were followed by two years of winning the crown, 1968-69 and 1969-70. Seniors playing in 1969 were Kyle Sheets, Al Phillips, Dennis Ensor and Robin Mahaney. Senior basketballers for 1970 were Greg Hargrove, Jimmy Meeks, Greg Meeks, Mark Williams, Dean Stovall and Danny Prince.

The year of 1971 was a down year for the Steers as they

dropped the crown. Senior team members included Gene Sheets, Billy Brigham, Randy Chandler, Steve Franse and Gary Erwin.

A four-year District winning streak was begun in 1972 with seniors being Larry Erwin, Randy Gregory, Brett Hargrove, Rod Johnston and Mike Travis.

Another winning streak, that of winning the Bi-District title, was begun in 1973. Seniors playing during this season were Johnny Boling, David Dannheim and Doug Johnston. The streak continued through 1974 with senior members Kent Armstrong, Kevin Hardage, Carl Kirkland, Kevin Hargrove and Greg Taylor.

During the 1974-75 basketball season, the Steers took the District Crown, the Bi-District Crown, and made their bid for the Regional Championship. The 1975 Steer squad was dropped in their game for the Regional Crown, but under the direction of "Scotty" had fought to within reach of the title.

Members of the 1974-75 Steer Varsity team presented Scott with a basketball as they made their appearance on stage with the coach and his family. Team members are Brad Jones, Russ Jones, Billy Roberts, Gene Christian, Gary Green, Mike Woods, Lesley Curtis, Gerald Hardage, Mike Goetsch, Chip Craft and Travis Bibbs.

As each class was recognized, the senior class members who were present for the program spoke to Scott from backstage then made their appearance to congratulate the honoree and his family.

Following the presentation of the basketballers, Farwell athletic Director Eugene Jennings lauded Scott for the many contributions he has made to the school and to the community. This was followed by the presentation of a poem by Mrs. Lauretta Pool on behalf of the elementary school teachers who are "glad Scott is their principal."

A final tribute was paid to Scott by Elmer Hargrove who spoke on behalf of Scott's golfing buddies. Hargrove related that Scott was a fantastic golfer who can drive, chip and is a marvelous putter, probably the best there is between Farwell and Clovis.

In honor of the putting expertise displayed by "Scotty," his golfing buddies had secured his favorite goldplated putter and had it "fixed". This "fixing of the putter" consisted of a few well-placed crooks and bends. In appreciation to the job done on his favorite club, Scott appeared speechless except for the phrase, "Hey, this really is may putter."

The program in the auditorium was closed with a standing ovation to the Scott family and was followed by a social in the cafeteria of the school.

Decorating the social room were caricatures of the 1974-75 Varsity Steer basketball squad and, of course, a caricature of Coach Scott, as well as one of Coach Don Alana. Those attending were registered and were served refreshments of coffee, punch and cookies. Mothers of the 1974-75 Varsity Steer traveling squad were in charge of the social.

Younger and his wife had spent the winter months in Mesa, Ariz., and were returning to Clovis when he suffered the apparent heart attack.

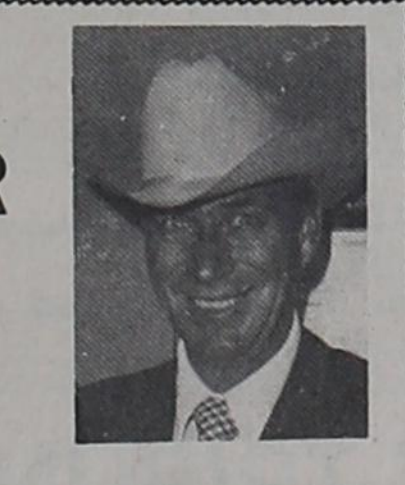
Younger served as a teacher and principal in Clovis and Curry County for 24 years.

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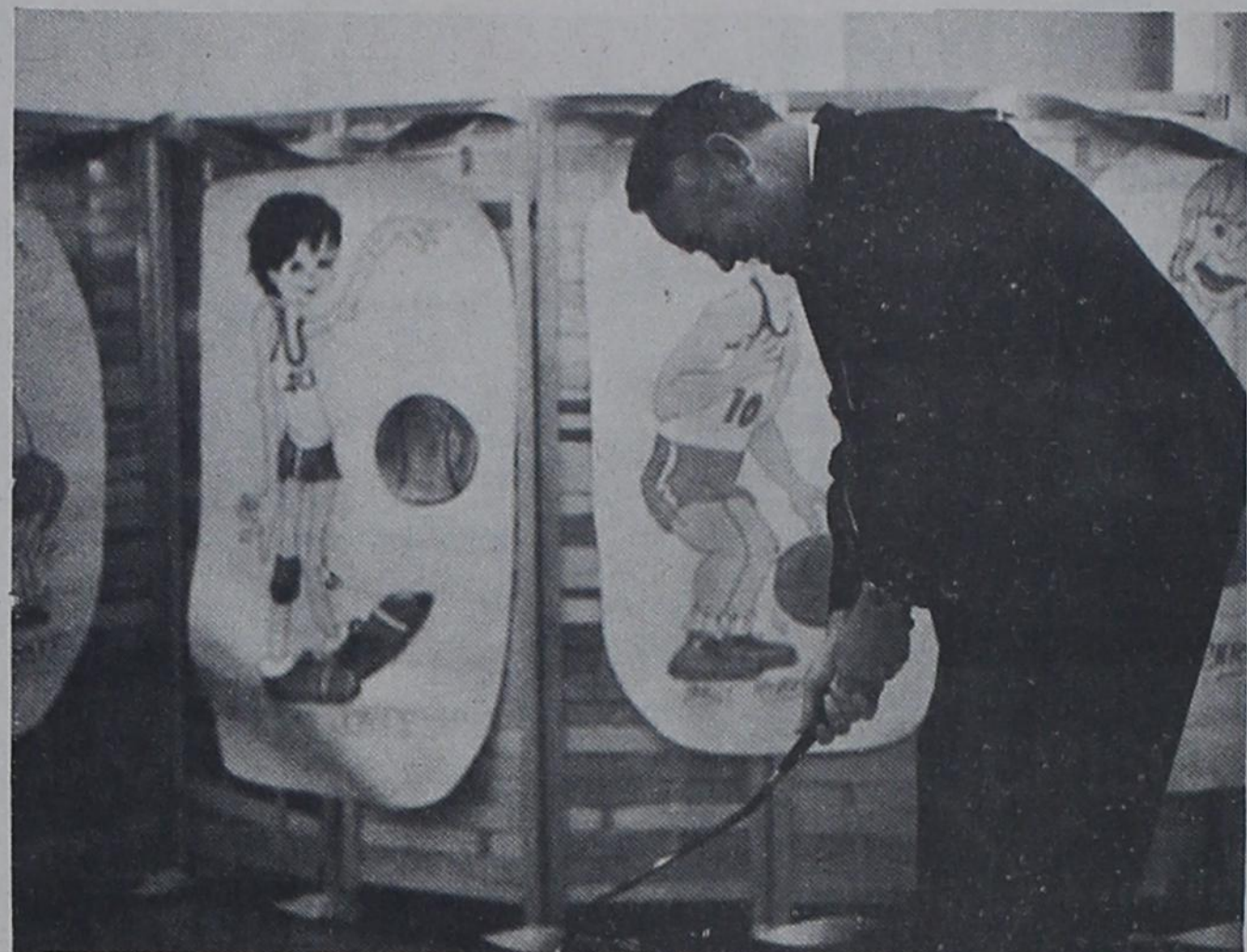

Where you affect 12 boys a year through basketball, hundreds of children are affected daily through their public school career. Who can measure each teacher's lasting influence on each of them?

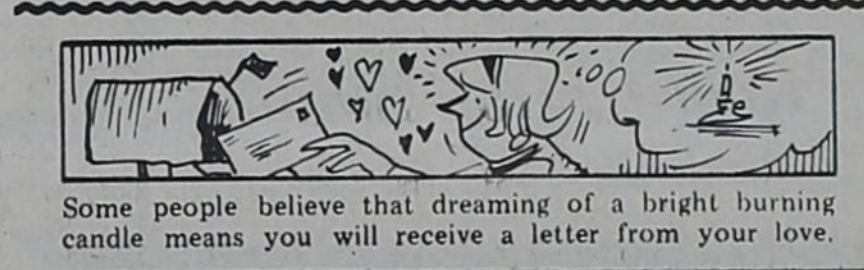
Maybe in accepting the honor on "Vernon Scott" day, it can symbolize a public appreciation to all those who are seldom recognized for a job well done.

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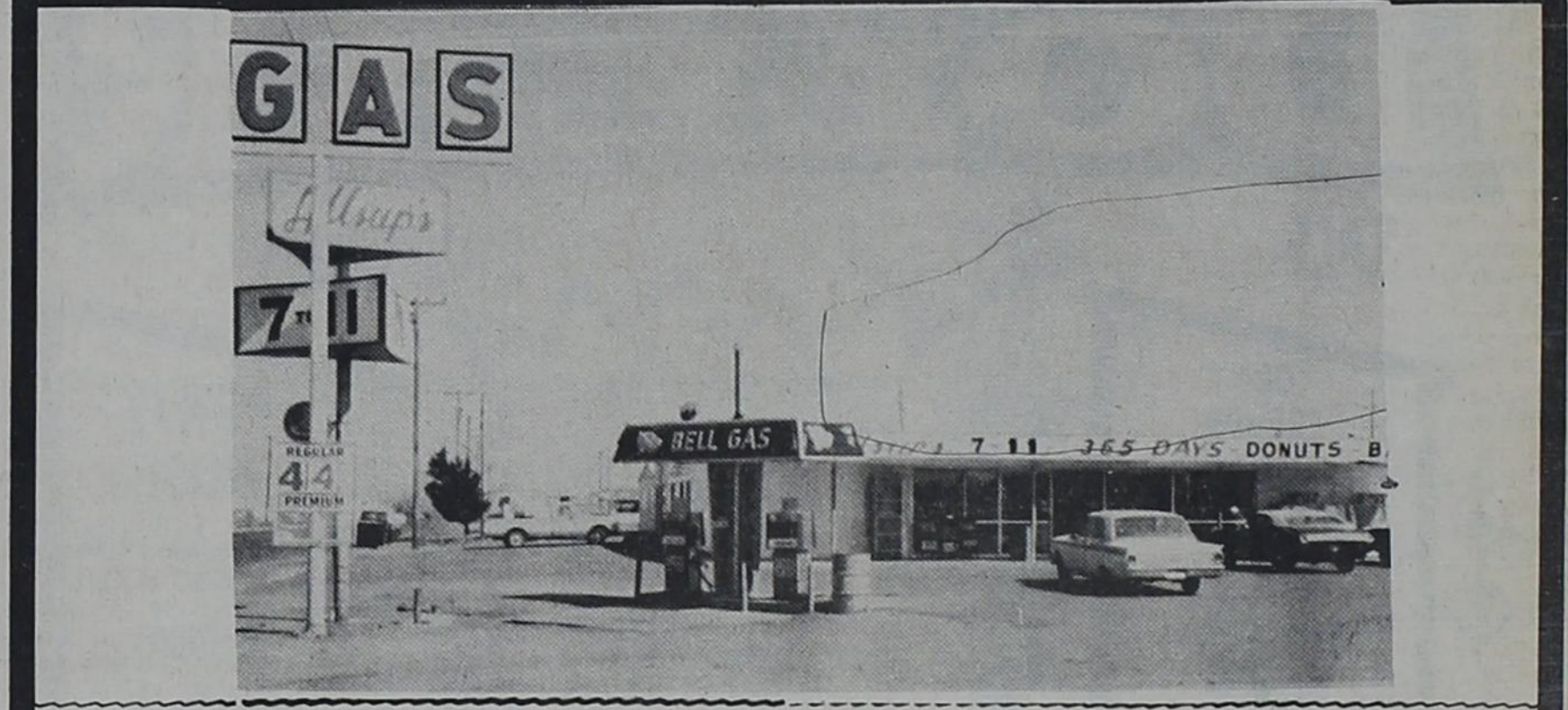
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Portraying Area Homemakers

Featured Area Homemaker for this week is Mrs. Truman (Mary Ellen) McKillip of 105 Sandia Drive in Farwell. Mary Ellen, housewife and mother of two children, is an active community worker as well as an efficient homemaker.

"Improving my home and homemaking abilities is one of my continued goals," states Mary Ellen. "Running a home is a complicated task and trained skills are needed to keep things going efficiently."

"My social activities are connected with improving my skills as a homemaker or sharing the knowledge I have acquired with others, especially youngsters," she added.

Mary Ellen is a member and secretary of the Oklahoma Lane Demonstration Club. She is currently serving as the Texas Home Demonstration Representative and Chairman of Parmer County for District I.

She also assists with the Oklahoma Lane 4-H Club. Working with other adult leaders, Mary Ellen, has instructed courses in knitting, sewing, cooking and acted as tour guide for field trips.

"Sewing is one of the most enjoyable things I do in the home," insists Mary Ellen. "I try to recycle our clothing to keep up with the latest fashions. Creating new styles keeps me busy learning different sewing techniques."

Recently she participated in the Sew Fair held in Friona. She assisted with promotion of the exhibits which displayed various sewing skills and techniques.

"My hobbies include crocheting, crewel designing, painting, and flower arranging," she commented. "Creating beautiful centerpieces by using artificial flowers and fruit is challenging. I try to make them look real and fit the occasion."

Cooking is another way our Area Homemaker uses her creativity around the home. She isn't just satisfied with using "tried and true" recipes, although she uses many of them; but she likes to experiment with new combinations.

During the last year, she ac-

quired some yeast from her husband's family that is kept "alive" and used to make bread. A portion of the yeast is retained and "fed" every ten days or so to keep it ready when bread is needed. "The lump of yeast I now have was made from yeast several years old that has been handed down through the McKillip family for many years," reports Mary Ellen.

"Using old recipes are fine, but I feel a certain satisfaction when I am able to invent a new recipe or change an old one and create a new delicious dish," she explained.

"However, I do believe," states Mary Ellen, "not only must a homemaker possess good mechanical skills, but she must also have a philosophy or framework in which to practice her skills."

"Creating a good moral and religious background for the members of the family in the home is essential," she emphasized. "This can strengthen a family in times of trouble or disaster. Having lost a small child and having had cancer, I have learned just how much such strengths mean to a homemaker and her family."

"I try to enjoy each day as it is, without worry," stresses Mary Ellen, "trying to learn and improve all that I can in that 'one day at a time.'"

The McKillips are members of the Farwell Church of Christ. Mr. and Mrs. McKillip are active members in the Friona Eastern Star Chapter. The family is associated with the Masons, as McKillip is a Mason in the Farwell Lodge that meets at Bovina.

Mary Ellen Barker married Truitt McKillip in 1959 when they were both students at Lubbock Christian College. The couple was involved in various types of farming during the early years of their marriage in northern New Mexico, Missouri and Desdemona, Tex.

The couple moved to Farwell in 1963 where they have since remained. Truman owns a local dirt contracting business. "Farwell was not exactly a strange place to us," commented Mary Ellen, "as my husband grew up here. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. L. E. McKillip, lived in the Farwell

area until 1958 when they sold their Ford Motor Co. business to a Friona dealer and moved to Missouri."

The couple has two children, Diann, 11-years-old and in the sixth grade, and John, seven, in the second grade.

The following recipes are three McKillip favorites that Mary Ellen prepares. The first recipe is from her mother-in-law and the other two are her own creations.

STRAWBERRY PIE

3/4 c. water
2 c. strawberries (fresh)
3/4 c. sugar
3 tbsp. corn starch
1 tsp. real lemon juice
1 pkg. of Dream Whip

Bake regular pie crust and let cool.

Put 3/4 cup water and 1 cup strawberries together in pan and bring to a boil. Remove from stove and add sugar and corn starch. Return to medium heat and cook until thick, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and add lemon juice. Let mixture cool, pour into baked pie crust and then add 1 cup strawberries on top of this base mixture. Serve Dream Whip on top to set off flavor.

BLUEBERRIES SALAD

1 pkg. lemon gelatin
1 c. blueberries
1 can pineapple
1 pkg. Dream Whip

Drain blueberries, saving juice in a sauce pan. Bring blueberry juice to boil, add gelatin, stir well and add pineapple juice. Remove from heat and let set in refrigerator until syrupy. Then add 1 pkg. Dream Whip, whipped, to the above mixture. Add the fruit. Let set in refrigerator until cold and firm.

CRACKERJACKS

4 qts. popped popcorn
1 c. peanuts (optional), unroasted

1 c. brown sugar
1/4 c. corn syrup
1 stick oleo
1/4 tsp. soda
Pinch of cream of tartar

Salt to taste

Set aside popped popcorn and nut mixture. In sauce pan mix sugar, oleo and sugar. Boil five minutes, stirring gently, remove from heat. Add salt, soda and cream of tartar. Beat mixture well. Place popcorn

and nut mixture into large baking pan and pour cooked mixture over it. Coat all dry ingredients. Bake about one hour at 200 degrees, stirring mixture every 10 minutes or so and making sure the popcorn and nuts are all coated. Cool. Makes four quarts.

Lloyd W. Vaughns Named 'Farm Family Of The Year'

The award, "Farm Family of the Year" came as a complete surprise to the Lloyd W. Vaughn family of Hereford. They were notified last week that they were to be honored by the Texas Farmers Home Administration, for the year 1974.

In addition to farming in the Hereford area, Vaughn farms rented land northeast of Farwell.

This past year had its ups and downs and was a year of worry and uncertainty for the Vaughn family, as it was for most farm families, but it was a year they will not soon forget.

Vaughn says the Lord has been good to him and, "I owe much of my success to Him, even the award." He spent long days working on his 800 acres of farmland.

Chosen for the award from among 18 Farmers Home Administration families around the state, the Vaughns still find it hard to believe. The award, an annual award, goes to one district nominee who is selected from entries of "farm families who have made outstanding success through the use of Farmers Home Administration credit in developing a family farm, while at the same time contributing to the betterment of agriculture and their community," a Farmers Home Administration release said. This is the fifth year the Agency has selected a state winner and the Vaughn family is the first winner from the High Plains area.

Even though he has been in the farming business all his life, Vaughn feels it is probably one of the biggest risks one can get into, "but with the help of a strong faith, everything can usually come out alright," he said.

Vaughn began his farming career with his father in the Muleshoe area. For awhile he

worked on other farms and finally rented land to farm himself in 1965, with help from the Farmers Home Administration in Muleshoe. This first farm was rented from Edd Ramm, whose property is located in the West Camp community south of Farwell. After six years, he moved his family to Hereford, where he runs a 323-acre farm two and a half miles north of Westway. He also farms about 440 acres of rented land near Farwell.

The Farwell farm is owned by Mrs. Richard Snow (the former Mary Sharp) and is located three and a half miles northeast of Farwell.

Wheat and milo are his principal crops, giving him experience in the laws of supply and demand as prices during the year fluctuated constantly and weather and worldwide grain shortages dictated distributions.

As he looks to the future, Vaughn plans to implement new facets to the farm as far as operations are concerned. He plans 50 acres of improved grasses, cross fence and a cow-calf operation.

Doing things together, including a common interest in music, provides much enjoyment for Vaughn, his wife Glenda Rae and children Gerald, 14, Steven 11, and Travis, 4.

A player piano is just one of a long line of musical instruments the Vaughns have in their well-decorated modern house. The musical collection also includes an antique organ and a modern organ for more continuous playing.

Though Glenda Rae is the coordinator of the family sing-songs, Lloyd joins in with the rest of the family in harmonious unity and says "I love to sing, it's a part of me."

Vaughn makes "people" his hobby as he enjoys the company of good friends.

His wife Glenda Rae however, has a few more hobbies including painting, playing musical instruments, collecting

barbed wire, decorating and making arts and crafts.

Athletics tops the list of "things we like most to do" for the Vaughn boys. Gerald runs track and as a long distance sprinter, won on the state level recently. Steven has participated on some championship baseball teams, a feat he is understandably proud of.

"His time will come," says Vaughn of Travis who is a bit young for sports.

The whole family pitches in and helps with the farming operations.

The boys have worked with their dad at various times, but still keep pretty busy with their own interests. "I want them to do what they want to do first," he said.

Great believers in the good in people, the Vaughns attend the Church of the Nazarene in Hereford.

Vaughn worries some about his farm investment but not to the point of thinking about it all the time. He thinks God will provide as He has in the past and credits Him with what he already has. He says he really feels close to God when he is farming, especially when he feels the moist earth in his hands.

Vaughn is proud to have received the award and looks forward to the national Farmers Home Administration Farm Family of the Year competition, wishing he could win it as it would mean a trip to Washington for he and Glenda. The competition is in April and the national winner is honored in Washington D.C.

It will be conducted much as the state competition with an interviewer coming to the farm for observation.

The Vaughns were to be honored April 10 with a reception and banquet at the Hereford Bull Barn by the Deaf Smith Chamber of Commerce. Mr. and Mrs. Richard Snow were to be among those attending. Steven Wagner, who is employed on the Farwell farm, was also to be a guest.

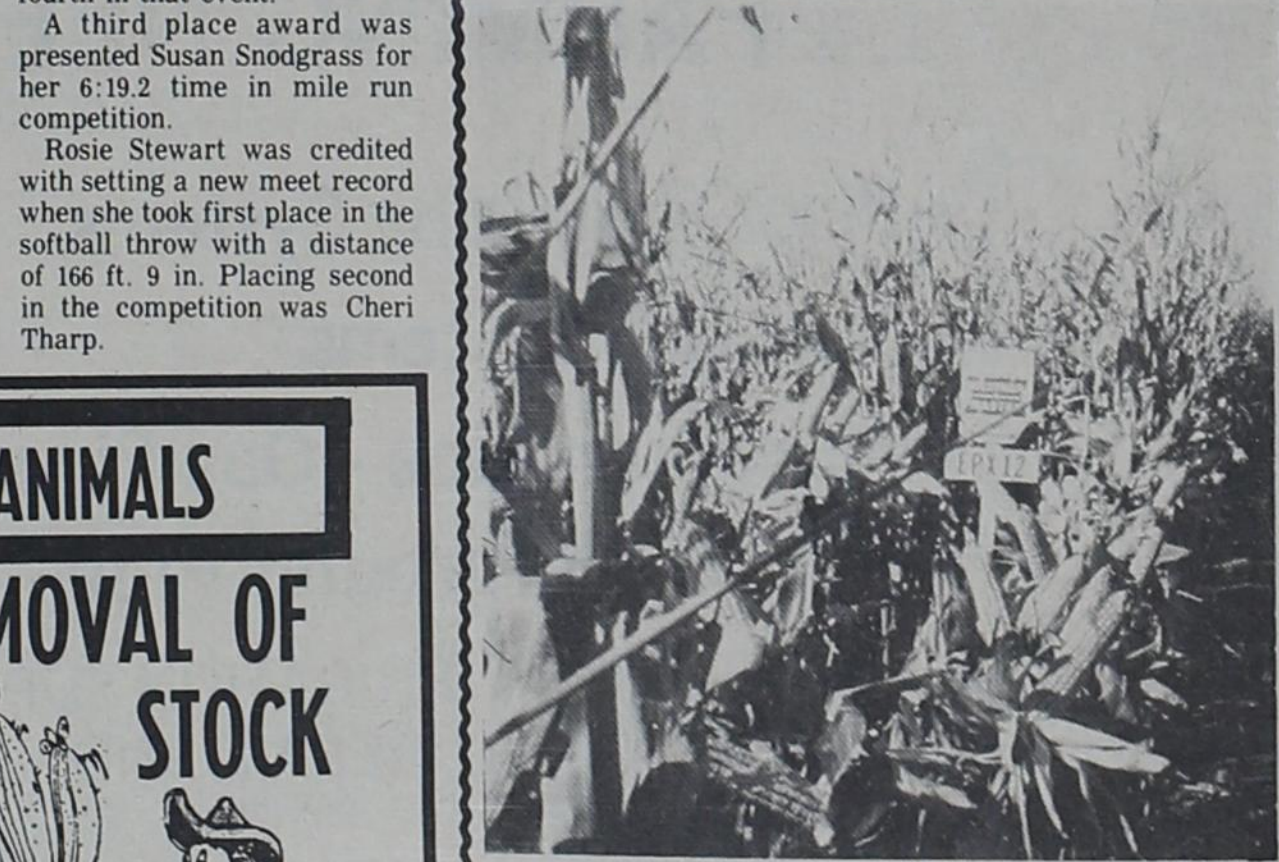
Texico Tracksters Take Fourth Place
