

2 youths killed in vehicle rollover

A horrific one-vehicle accident occurred about two miles outside the Farwell City limits on County Road 1 (near where the Williams family members live) about 6:20 p.m. on Tuesday.

A suburban traveling at a high rate of speed overturned and rolled over several times, reported Parmer County Sheriff Randy Geries. Why the driver lost control is being investigated.

Two Farwell High School freshmen died. One was the driver, Billy Hernandez, 14. The other was a passenger, Frankie Reyes, 15.

Reves was completely ejected out of the vehicle and Hernandez was partially ejected, said Geries.

Reyes started at Farwell Schools last year and his family lives in the city. Hernandez started Farwell Schools just this week. He is believed to have been living with relatives on the Lubbock highway outside Farwell, and his parents are in Muleshoe.

There were six other youths in the suburban. Two were transported to Lubbock hospitals by helicopter. Colton Capps received external injuries, such as a broken arm, and was upgraded to guarded condition on Wednesday, said Geries. The other, Eric Vasquz, was still in critical condition, and on a ventilator, on Wednesday. Both attend Farwell Schools.

The other four youths were treated at the scene for

minor injuries, said Geries. One of them had a Texico address: the others are from the Farwell area.

Geries said alcohol is not believed to be involved in the accident. He will be interviewing the youths later, but feels that the driver's inexperience may have caused the problem.

A Farwell woman driving to the Kendall Devault house said she observed the surburban, saying it was going at a high rate of speed when it swerved on the dirt road, lost traction and rolled.

In Texas, you cannot get a driver's permit until the age of 15, and a driver's license until you are 16.

"We have had a rash of underage drivers in the Panhandle in recent months who don't have driver's licenses. This is a serious problem." said the sheriff.

By chance the Farwell School Board was having a state-mandated training workshop at the administration office on Tuesday when word was received of the accident.

Supt. Larry Gregory scheduled a special assembly for Wednesday morning for junior high and high school students to address the tragedy. Area clergy and the school's counselor will attend.

Also, Farwell School football games scheduled for Oct. 5 were cancelled.







Mustangs explode past Wellington

The Bovina Mustangs exploded for 29 fourth quarter points Friday night as they rolled to a 43-20 victory over the Wellington Skyrockets.

The win gives the Mustangs a 3-2 record on the season and drops Wellington to 1-4.


