



Know the facts.

In the spring of 2004, the Texas Department of State Health Services surveyed 135,662 students in grades 7-12 from 78 Texas school districts. Among the findings:

· Alcohol continues to be the most widely used substance among Texas students with 68% of students reporting they had used alcohol at some point in their lives.

Binge drinking, defined as having five or more drinks on one occasion, was reported by 23% of students.

• 24% of seniors said they had driven a car after having a good bit to drink at least once during the past year. This represents 80,000 impaired drivers on Texas roads each year.

Marijuana remained the most commonly used illicit drug among students. 30% of all 7-12 graders in 2004 reported having smoked marijuana at some point in their lives.

• 50.4% of students in 2004 reported that at least a few of their close friends used marijuana

Cocaine and crack use remained a problem among Texas students. In 2004, 7.9% of secondary students reported they had tried cocaine or crack, and 3.2% reported using these substances in the month before the survey

But the Longhorns not only hung in there, but won the second half.


Motley County was ahead 44-12, while the Longhorns outscored them 38-36 in the 2nd half.

You get a check, you cash the check, and then you give the other person the money. In this case, they send a check and you wire transfer the money back to them.

For your troubles you get to keep some of it.

Estimates vary wildly as to how much you get to keep. It depends on how much of a sucker the crook thinks you are. It could be \$10, or it could be thousands.

But the game is played well by them, because a wire transfer takes minutes to process, and a check can take up to several days to be posted. That means they have several days to stop payment or just close the account.







There are many different signs that point to drug addiction. The most obvious is a need to have a particular drug or substance. Changes in mood, weight, or interests are other signs of drug addiction.

If you think you - or a friend - may be addicted to prescription drugs, talk to your doctor, school counselor, or nurse. They can help you get the help you need. It's especially important for someone who is going through withdrawal from a depressant to speak with a doctor or seek



medical treatment. Withdrawal can be dangerous when it's not monitored.

If a person has become addicted to prescription drugs, there are several kinds of treatment.

Behavioral treatments teach people how to function without drugs - handling cravings, avoiding drugs and situations that could lead to drug use, and preventing and handling relapses. Pharmacological treatments involve giving a patient a special type of medication to help him or her overcome withdrawal symptoms and drug cravings.

Students participate in leadership workshop



The Bovina School Board on Monday discussed whether to consider keeping the utilities at the ag barn "on."


The board decided to since one family (the Terrones family) is keeping show animals at the barn.





Bovina opposes **SPS** rate hike

The Bovina City Council held a special meeting on Friday to consider a request for a rate increase from SPS.

The council unanimously voted against it. This means the rate hike request now goes before the state's Public Utilities Commission.

SPS has filed a statement of intent with the city on May 31 to increase rates by about \$47.9 million for its entire system.

Bovina is acting in concert with several other cities, known as the Alliance of Xcel Municipalities (AXM), in opposing the rate hike.

If SPS's request is approved by the state, it means the average residential lightingenergy bill for a Bovina customer would increase about \$5.30 during the summer months (5.99 percent hike over the current rates) and about \$3.89 during the winter months (4.60 percent hike).

For residents with space heating with water heating, the increase would be about

\$18.07 a month during the summer (24.36 percent rate hike) and \$14.66 a month during the winter (20.31 percent hike).

For those with residential heat pump with water heating, the increase would be \$15.72 for the summer months (20.54 percent hike) and \$12.71 during each of the winter months (17.15 percent hike).

For folks with residential space heating, it would be an extra \$5.82 during each of the summer months (6.79 percent hike) and \$17.41 during the winter (25.33 percent hike).

For those with residential heat pumps, it would be \$6.48 during the summer (7.48 percent hike) and \$15.47 during the winter (21.41 percent hike).

And for those with general service-energy, it would mean a decline of \$2.25 for each summer months (a decrease of 2.15 percent) and a decline of \$7.08 for the winter months (a decrease of 7.12 percent).

As part of AXM, the cities have hired experts to review SPS's case. These experts have determine that:

-- The request seeks an excessive return on equity of 11.60 percent.

-- The request seeks an excessive equity ratio of 51.13 percent.

--The request seeks excessive levels of depreciation in rates.

Bovina may expand water, sewer lines to 2 areas

On Oct. 23, the Parmer County Commissioners will receive a request from the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission to approve up to a half-million dollar project to provide water and sewer lines to two small communities bordering Bovina, said Bovina City Manager Ernest Terry.

The communities are about 12 homes bordering Lakeside Drive at Bovina's eastern edge, and about 10 homes on North County Road 1731, at Bovina's northern edge.

Currently, 1" water lines are provided the two areas, but no sewer lines. PRPC is proposing to put in sewer lines plus larger water lines.

Terry said there would be no cost to the county, that PRPC is paying for the whole project. And there would be no city annexation.

The benefit to Bovina is that about 22 new customers would be added onto city utilities.
