New Parental Notification Requirement for Texico Schools As Required By HB-212 As provided by House Bill 212 , parents may obtain in-
formation regarding the professional qualifications of their children's teachers, instructional support providers and school principals.
A. At a minimum, the information shall include: 1) whether the teacher has met state qualifications for
licensure for the grade level and subjects being taught by licensure for
the teacher.
2) whether the assignment waiver.
3) the teacher's degree major and any other license or graduate degree held by the teacher, and
4) the qualifications of any instructional support providers if the student is served by educational assistants or other instructional support providers.
B. A local superintendent shall give written notice to the parents of those students who are being taught for longer
than four consecutive weeks by a substitute teacher or by person who is not qualified to teach the grade or subject. C. The local superintendent shall:

1) ensure that the notice required by this section is provided by the end of the four week perio;
assignment of that person to the classroom;
2) to ensure that the notice required by this section is
povided in a bilingual form provided in a bilingual form to a parent whose primary language is not English;
3) retain a copy of the notice required pursuant to this 4) ensure
is available upon request.

## Hearing held on Texico

 planned water rate hikeAbout 20 persons attended Tuesday's Texico City Council session for the public hearing on the proposed water rate hike
The hike will be voted on at the next council meeting. To sum up the discussion, by meeting's end, no one voiced opposition to the rate hikes. Comments included: -- Judy Lekovich said she saw no option to what the council was proposing
-- Ray Autrey, noting he was a longtime Texico resident with family here, said "If we have no water, we have no town.'
Councilman Oran Jay Autrey explained that the council was pursuing two options: (1) continued membership in the Ute Lake water projec
He said he has been watching the Ute Lake project for 16 years "and I don't see it going." Thus, he felt a strong need to have more water rights here.
He also noted that if Texico wants to keep its member ly said that Ute Lake project, other officials have strong
And even if the Ute Lake project succeeds, it would be good for Texico to have extra water rights in case the Ute Lake water level receded, for example.
Several folks asked questions about the proposed rate hike. Here it is in a nutshell:

1. The city will keep the minimum use of 4,000 gallons for users within the city limits at the same rate -- $\$ 16.75$ a month
2. It will keep the minimum use of 4,000 gallons for users outside the city limits at the same rate -- $\$ 21.05$ a month.
3. The rate for usage over that figure will go to $\$ 4.18$ per 1,000 gallons.
The average Texico residence uses about 7,000 gallons a month, it was said. Autrey said this means an increase of about $\$ 25$ a month to $\$ 29$ a month
But the rate hike means more to heavy water users. For example, Autrey said Texico School last month paid
$\$ 3,895$
That brought up several complaints about Texico School "wasting" water. How the school used its sprinkler system, such as on the football practice field, came under attack.
One resident said he saw the sprinklers on during the recent heavy rains.
Councilman Jerry Bradley urged that everyone write
the school about "too much water being wasted.
In other business, the council:
-- Put off discussing the annual contract renewal with city building inspector Terry Martin again because he wasn't at the meeting.

- Heard councilwoman Sharon Askew report that the owner of the Playorama property said he plans to tear down the building.
Heard Mayor Jerry Cunningham report he has talked wplitting the cost of a dogcatcher.
City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter said this could be done if an "independent contractor" was hired who would split his time between the two cities and both cities would pay him a fee. Cunningham said he will continue discussions with Mace about the cities working together on this project.
Cunningham said Farwell planned to close down its dog pound, from what Mace had told him
-- Heard Autrey say that city limit signs would be put up now that it has been ascertained where the west edge of the city was -- 642.73 feet west of the Port of Entry.
