

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New Parental Notification Requirement for Texico Schools As Required By HB-212

As provided by House Bill 212, parents may obtain information regarding the professional qualifications of their children's teachers, instructional support providers and school principals.

A. At a minimum, the information shall include:

1) whether the teacher has met state qualifications for licensure for the grade level and subjects being taught by

2) whether the teacher is teaching under a teaching of assignment waiver.

3) the teacher's degree major and any other license or graduate degree held by the teacher, and

4) the qualifications of any instructional support providers if the student is served by educational assistants or other instructional support providers.

B. A local superintendent shall give written notice to the parents of those students who are being taught for longer than four consecutive weeks by a substitute teacher or by a person who is not qualified to teach the grade or subject. C. The local superintendent shall:

1) ensure that the notice required by this section is provided by the end of the four week period following the assignment of that person to the classroom;

2) to ensure that the notice required by this section is provided in a bilingual form to a parent whose primary language is not English;

3) retain a copy of the notice required pursuant to this section; and

4) ensure that information relating to teacher licensure is available upon request.

'Notice of claim' filed in hostage situation

Several governmental units, including Parmer County, have been notified by Friona attorney Kathryn Gurley of a "notice of claim" resulting from a hostage situation in Friona earlier this year.

Mrs. Gurley explained that this is being done not to sue lots of folks, but because it is necessary to preserve any claims against insurers, such as the Texico Municipal League, which insures the city of Friona.

Due to state statutes, the notice of formal claim needed to be filed within six months of an incident, which has been done.

- 2. City of Lubbock.
- 3. Parmer County.
- 4. Bailey County.
- 5. City of Amarillo.
- 6. Texas Department of Public Safety.
- 7. City of Muleshoe.

8 The Texas Rangers

The injured party is the First Baptist Church, who is the owner of the residence at 1207 West 9th Place, Friona, Texas, currently occupied by Reverend Mark Stovall and family.

The occurrence giving rise to this claim took place March 20, 2004 beginning about 4 p.m. and ending at 2 p.m. on March 21, 2004 at 1207 West 9th Place, Friona, Parmer County, Texas.

The incident occurred in the following manner:

The Texas Highway Patrol was involved in an attempted traffic stop in Hale County, Texas, when the driver of the car attempted to flee. Shots were allegedly fired at the officer, and a chase ensued. Agents from numerous Panhandle Police Departments became involved in the search for the driver of the fleeing vehicle.

The driver of the car evaded police and arrived in Friona, Parmer County, Texas sometime in early evening hours of March 20, 2004. He stole several vehicles, and, when spotted by the Friona Police Department, fled on foot. He entered the residence of Rev. Mark Stovall at approximately 9 p.m. on March 20, 2004, and held Rev. Stovall, Mrs. Stovall, and their daughter hostage.

Several law enforcement agencies were involved in the incident. Included are the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Texas Highway Patrol, the Muleshoe and Friona municipal police departments, the Parmer and Bailey County Sheriff's offices, the Texas Rangers, and SWAT teams from Amarillo, Lubbock Austin, Texas. The Texas Rangers allegedly contacted the Amarillo SWAT Team. Additional SWAT teams from Lubbock, Texas and from Austin, Texas were brought in as well. Late Saturday night, March 20, 2004, Rev. Stovall's daughter was released. Mrs. Stovall was released some time later. Rev. Stovall was finally released at approximately 2:30 a.m. on March 21, 2004. At the time of Rev. Stovall's release, no damage had been done to the residence.

On March 21, 2004, the Lubbock SWAT Team initiated an attack on the residence with the firing of multiple rounds of tear gas into the house, resulting in substantial damages to the property. Damages were also caused by gunfire that erupted.

IV.

The occurrence giving rise to this claim was a direct and proximate result of the actions of the City of Friona, pending in county court, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Lubbock SWAT team, and Parmer County in the unlawful taking and/or the destruction of property for public use. Further, the occurrence was the result of intentional actions by the agencies involved. Alternatively, the occurrence giving rise to this claim was a direct and proximate result of the negligence of the City of Friona Police Department, the Parmer County Sheriff's Department, the City of Lubbock SWAT Team, the City of Amarillo SWAT Team, the Texas Department of Public

Safety, and the Texas Rangers as follows:

1. In negligently operating the weapon used to fire the tear gas canisters into the residence, resulting in damages to the residence.

2. In failing to adequately protect the residence from damages caused by the actions of the police.

3. In allowing the unprovoked firing of the tear gas into the residence.

V.

Texas Department of Health will be in Farwell on Oct 20.





No stopping the Wolverines!

It was a battle of two unbeaten teams. Two teams that haven't played each other on the football field, until now. Two teams with very different offensive styles. Santa Rosa runs a single-wing offense. Texico runs a variation of the wishbone. The Lions try to beat you with misdirection and ball fakes. The Wolverines beat you by running over you.

Last Friday night, it started off more like a run and gun basketball game. Both teams traded scores like they were trading baskets. Santa Rosa scored in two plays after a Wolverines fumble. Texico scored in three. The Lions fumbled and the Wolverines scored again.

The only thing that stopped both teams from scoring on every possession was their own mistakes. Each team had the ball six times on offense in the first half, and both teams scored twice on big plays. The major difference was the time of possession. Santa Rosa controlled the ball for over 16 minutes. Texico had it for just over 7. Not exactly what the Wolverines are used to. At halftime, the score was tied 14-14.

The second half was different. The Wolverines were determined to control the ball longer. They kept it for almost 14 minutes versus 10 for the Lions. They scored on a 14-play 93 yard drive that burned over 6 minutes off the clock. Santa Rosa had only three possessions on offense in the second half. The defense stepped up big time and allowed them only one chance to score, but several fumbles and a dropped pass in the end zone ended the Lions opportunity to tie the game.

The Wolverines (6-0) defeated the Lions (6-1) 21-14 in what could very well be the toughest football game either team has played in several years.

Santa Rosa started on their own 20 yard line to begin the game. The Lions made one first down before Zac Morgan and Chris Phillips stopped the ball carrier for no gain on 2nd down. Tony Clements tackled the runner for a 2-yard loss on 3rd down forcing Santa Rosa to punt. Texico started on the 26 yard line but fumbled on the second play.

The Lions scored 15 seconds later when Joaquin Gonzales broke several tackles around the right end and ran 34 yards for the TD. At the 8:30 mark, it was 7-0. Texico wasted no time on their next possession, when on 3rd and 7 Braden Vaughan found Clements streaking through two defenders. 68 yards later, Clements was in the end zone. With 6:31 remaining in the 1st quarter, Logan Brown's kick made the score 7-7.

The Lions ran 6 plays before fumbling the ball back to the Wolverines highlighted by an excellent stop by Leo Muniz. It then took Texico only one play to score on a 27-yard pass from Vaughan to Clements.

Santa Rosa returned the favor on an 80 yard drive highlighted by a 27-yard pass from Jarred Tapia to Steven Vigil on 4th down. Tapia was in the grasp of Johnny Serrano when he found Vigil alone in the area. Tapia tossed a chest pass to Vigil as he was almost on his knees and Vigil ran it in untouched tying the score

14-14

The Wolverines moved the ball out to midfield on their next drive before they stalled after a penalty and two incomplete passes. They punted to the Lions who took over on their own 18. Santa Rosa appeared to be on their way to another score as they moved the ball all the way to the Texico 22 before a big hit caused a fumble that the Wolverines recovered.

But, three plays later the Lions were in control of the ball again when Gonzales intercepted a pass across the middle. Santa Rosa had one more chance to score as they moved the ball all the way to the 12 yard line. With 5 seconds remaining in the half, the Lions field goal attempt was blocked by Serrano. The score was 14-14 at halftime.

Texico took the second half kickoff and moved the ball out to midfield, but a penalty and a fumble that they recovered forced them to punt. The Lions quickly got 3 first downs and moved the ball across midfield before the defense tightened with Serrano making a tackle for no gain, Vaughan getting a big hit, and Brown deflecting a pass that went incomplete. On 4th and 9 at the 45 yard line, Santa Rosa ran a fake punt, but senior Blake Smith made an excellent open field tackle to stop the Lions short.

Texico fumbled the ball right back to the Lions but the defense forced them to punt after 3 plays when Smith made another tackle in the open field for a 7-yard loss. The Wolverines, starting on their own 7 yard line, put together their best drive of the game. They used 5 different ball carriers and 14 plays to go 93 yards for the score. Serrano ran in from 4 yards out with 7:46 to go in the game and the score was 21-14.

Santa Rosa moved the ball quickly down field after a run of 24 yards and a pass of 33, but they fumbled the ball twice and Vaughan made an excellent tackle to force 4th down. On 4th and 22, the Lions pass split the two Wolverine defenders but the ball was dropped by the receiver in the end zone. Texico kept to their ball control offense and burned off the remaining 4 minutes of the game.

The Wolverines will start district this week as they travel to No. 2 and unbeaten Loving in a re-match of the state title game from last year.





dent with family here, said "If we have no water, we have no town." Councilman Oran Jay Autrey explained that the coun-

cil was pursuing two options: (1) continued membership in the Ute Lake water project and (2) looking into buying water rights at nearby farms.

He said he has been watching the Ute Lake project for 16 years "and I don't see it going." Thus, he felt a strong need to have more water rights here.

He also noted that if Texico wants to keep its membership in the Ute Lake project, other officials have strongly said that Texico had to raise its rates to stay in.

And even if the Ute Lake project succeeds, it would be good for Texico to have extra water rights in case the Ute Lake water level receded, for example.

Several folks asked questions about the proposed


