

We received a communication from Bill Clayton, our State Representative and also Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives. In his letter Bill speaks of a new wrinkle in the introduction of bills to the legislative process of the House.

This year there is a prefiling system in effect so that bills can be filed early, can be sorted, referred to the proper committee, and public hearing can begin early. This is a commendable step by our Speaker in expediting the crush of legislation that always swamps the lawmakers. This inundation of the Legislature always produces some bad laws and this may be a step in easing the burden on the citizenry of the State.

However, also in the letter is the information that probably some 500 to 600 bills will be filed early and that altogether some 4,000 bills will be introduced in the next session. This figure manages to astound us and dismay us at the same time. Considering all the laws, good, bad and indifferent, on the statute books, we are at a loss to figure out why any group of supposedly sane citizens would think we would need another 4,000 laws.

Speaker Bill, we are pleased at your efforts to inject some degree of order in the Texas House of Representatives, but how about setting a limit on the number of bills to be considered during any legislative session? Or better yet, why doesn't the Legislature require a bill's sponsor to pay the cost of introducing and considering a bill in the event it doesn't pass? Anybody with a lick of sense knows that all 4,000 prospective bills are not introduced with the thought that all of them will become law. Beyond a doubt, most of them are special interest bills, bills of a frivolous nature, and bills introduced to make the solon look good to some vocal pressure group. So . . . if the legislator introducing the bill were held financially accountable for the bill in its filing, handling, hearing, etc., there might not be so many heedless bits of prospective laws jamming the legislative hopper. Anyway, Speaker Bill is to be commended on even this halting step toward making order out of chaos in the legislative process.


Walker added that one of the machines has eight headphones which allows those using it to adjust the volume to suit their needs.
