District Food Show Slated In Lubbock

Seven Parmer County youths, who already have won top honors in county competition, will match their skills and knowledge in food preparation against those of youths from 19 other counties Saturday, Dec. 11, in Lubbock.

The occasion is the annual District 2 4-H Food Show to be held at Texas Tech University. About 150 youths are expected to participate. Theme of this year's show is "Gourmet Foods."

Three seniors and four juniors from Parmer County are competing, says County Extension Agent Jana Pronger. The seniors are Linda Gohlke, Farwell; Joan Carson, Bovina; and Lisa Darby, Farwell.

Juniors from Parmer County include Robbie Moody, Bovina; Johanna Mesman, Farwell; Devera Rhodes, Friona; and Maureen Jesko, Lazbuddie.

Competing in four food classes, the seniors will be trying for the right to represent the 20-county Extension District 2 in the State 4-H Food Show in June at Texas A&M University. There is no further competition for junior winners beyond the district level, Miss Pronger said.

According to District Extension Agent Catherine B. Crawford and food show chairman Sherry Etheredge, judging will begin at 10 a.m. Public viewing is at 2 p.m. in the University Center Ballroom, and the awards program will follow at 2:30.

Members of the District 2 4-H Council will present ribbons to all contestants and special awards to top winners.

Judging will focus on knowledge of nutrition, meal planning, food buying and meal service as well as on ability to prepare food, Miss Pronger said.

The District 4-H Food Show is conducted each year by the

Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

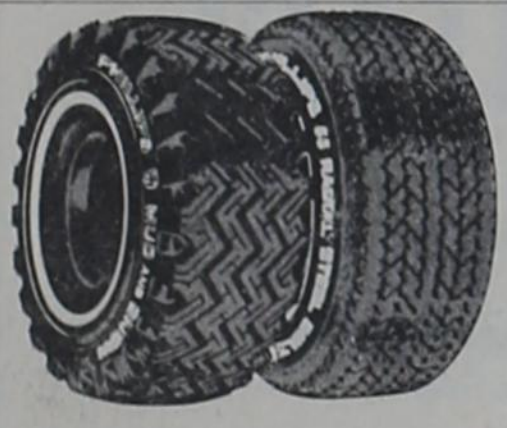

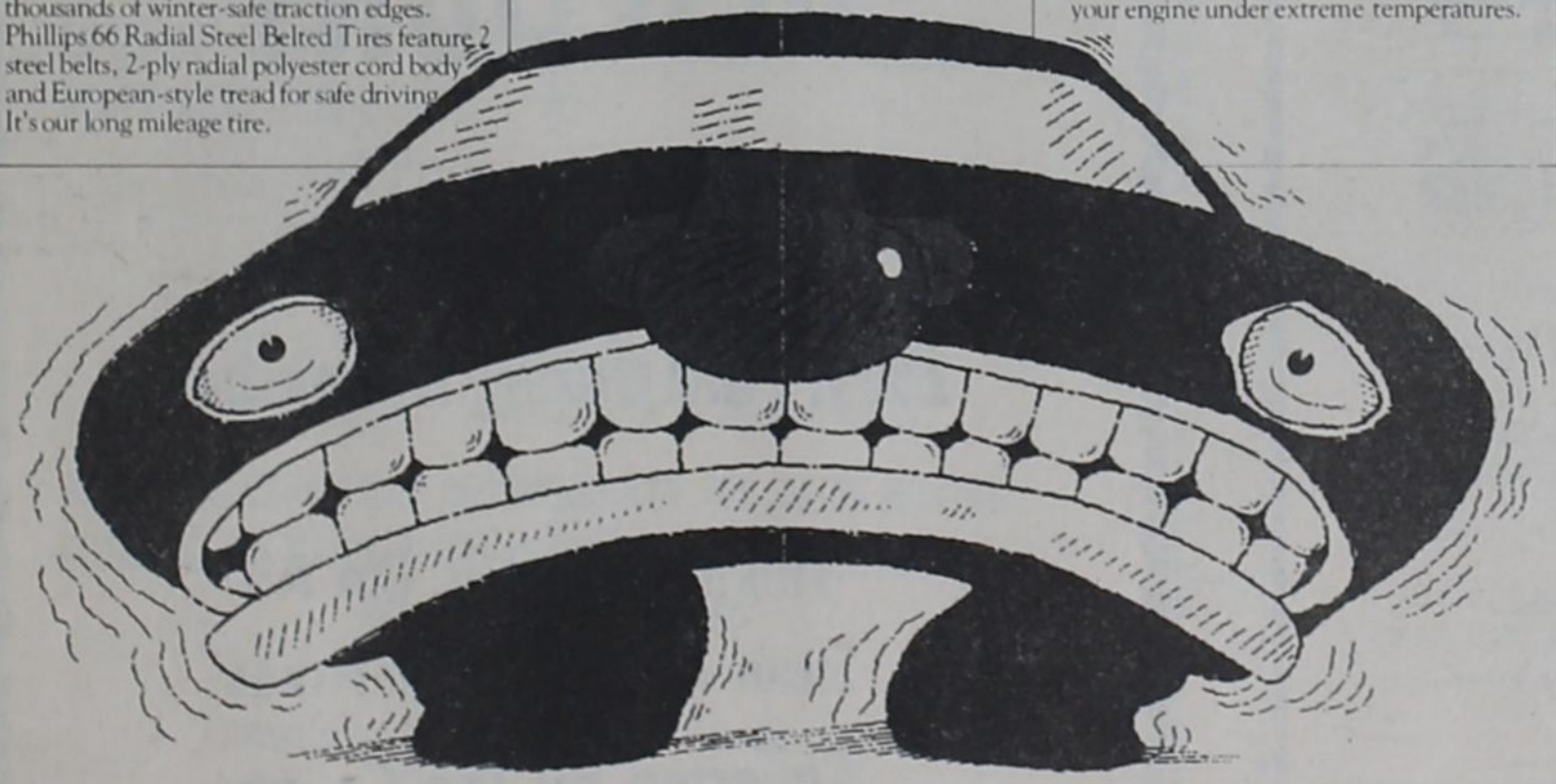

High scorers were Keith Hadley with 14 points and Eloy Ortiz, Don Duncan and Jimmy Reid with eight points each.

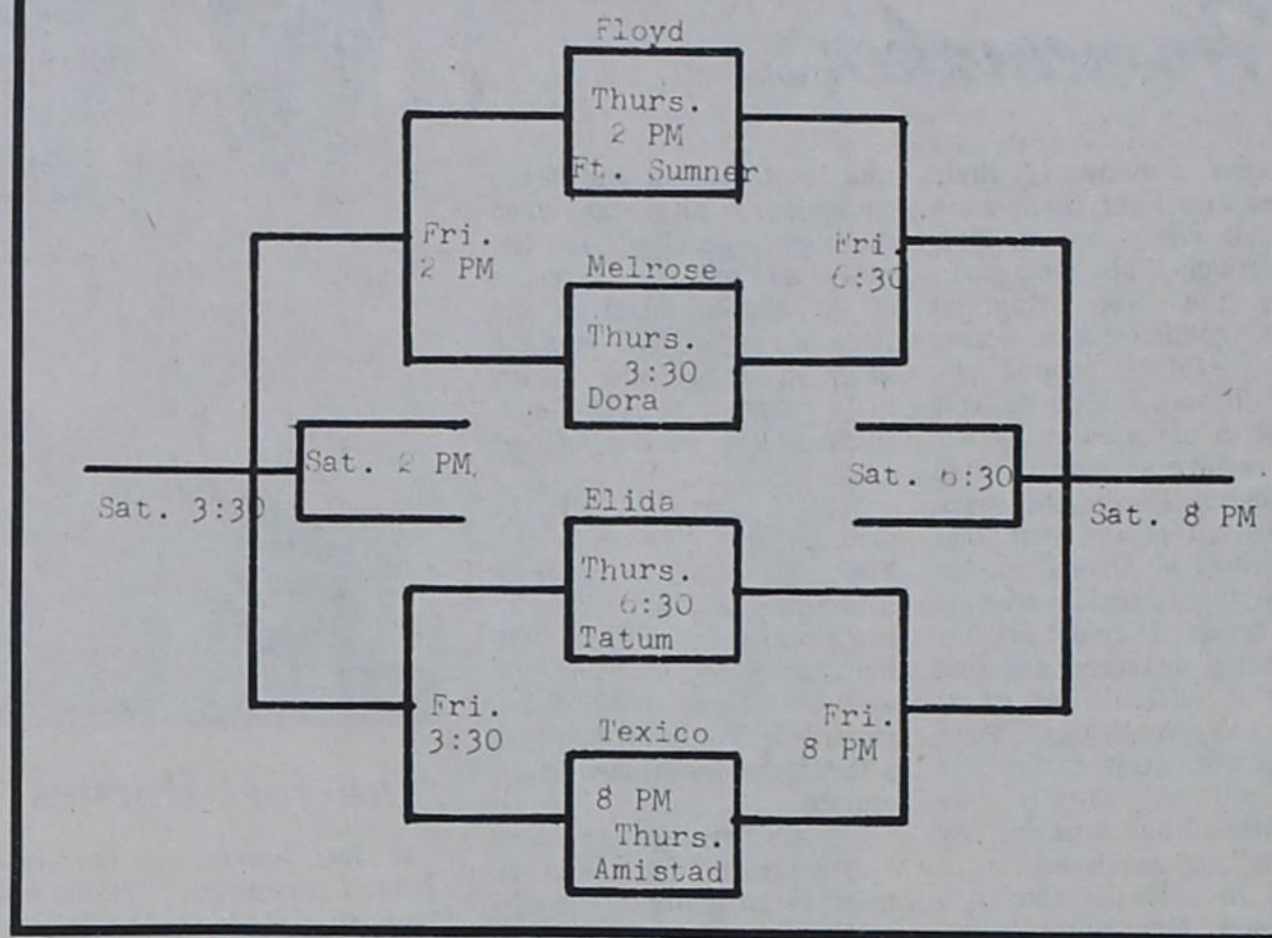
Varsity

SHERIFF'S REPORT

The theft of hydraulic lifts from a truck parked in a barn at the Royce Gene Welch place, eight miles east of Friona, is being investigated by the Parmer County Sheriff's department this week. Sheriff Charlie Lovelace commented that this is the 16th such theft since September.

The American Legion Hall in Bovina was burglarized November 30. Sheriff Lovelace reported that only a "slight loss" was incurred.

Vandals broke the door window of a pickup belonging to Dee Owen of Farwell, reports the local sheriff, adding that the window was shattered.

The sheriff's department is also investigating an incident

which occurred at the Wayne Jones farm, 10 miles east of Friona. Sheriff Lovelace said that someone apparently entered the home and used a .38 caliber pistol to "shoot up the place!" He did not cite any damage figures but estimated that the damage to the television set alone would probably be quite extensive.

The local sheriff also reported that the culprits who burglarized the country club in Friona made away with about \$75 in cash and a case of liquor.

Sheriff Lovelace says they are still investigating the street signs incident in Farwell which was reported last week, but so far no leads have turned up.

Texico Junior High Loses Two Of Three

Texico's Junior High Wolverines met the Ft. Sumner Foxes at Ft. Sumner, Nov. 30, but were victorious in only one of three matches.

In the first game, the seventh graders were defeated by the Foxes 30-17. The Wolverines fell behind in the first quarter as the Foxes made 10 points to the Wolverines' four. The Wolverines had trouble in the second quarter when they hit only two shots, and Foxes held their lead 27-8 at the half.

The Wolverines ran a press on the Foxes in the third quarter, and they did not score, but the Green and White team added five points for themselves, ending the quarter at 30-13. The final quarter was also in the Wolverines' favor when the Foxes were again scoreless,

but their drive was still not strong enough to overcome the Foxes' early lead. The game ended 30-17.

Leading scorers for the Wolverines were Jeff Day and Kent Harding with four points each. James Kelley had three points. Leading rebounders were Kelley with six offensive and two defensive rebounds; and Sammy Garcia with one offensive and six defensive rebounds.

Texico's only win came in the second game when the eighth graders defeated the Foxes 36-20. In the first quarter the Wolverines had control, racking up 10 points to the Foxes' two. The second quarter also belonged to the Wolverines with the Foxes scoring four points and Texico scoring seven. At halftime, the Wolverines led 17-6.

The Foxes were scoreless in

the third quarter while the Texico team scored 10 more points. Playing their strongest quarter, the Foxes added 14 points to the Wolverine's nine points in the final score, but at the final buzzer, the Wolverines were still out in front 36-20.

Herbert Bibbs and Ricky Foreman were high scorers for Texico with 12 and 11 points, respectively. They were also leading rebounders. Bibbs made 10 offensive and four defensive rebounds while Foreman had four offensive and two defensive rebounds.

Texico freshmen were defeated in the last game by Ft. Sumner freshmen 61-42. The first quarter was an even game with the Foxes scoring 14 points to the Wolverines' 13 points. In the second quarter, the Foxes started a scoring drive that added 20 more points to their score while the Wolverines managed only 10 points. The half ended with the Foxes ahead 34-25.

In the third quarter the Foxes ran away with the game, scoring 17 points to the Wolverines' 6 and they were ahead 49-31 at the end of the quarter. The final quarter was equal while the Foxes added 10 more points and the Wolverines scored 11. The game ended with the Foxes, 61 Wolverines 42.

After one quarter of play, the 7th girls trailed 10-4. However, they came back strong in the second stanza to assume the lead at halftime, 24-16. The local girls earned 17 points in the second half to clinch the victory.

Janene Berry was high point scorer with 16 points. Others who scored were Ginger Ellison, 10; Karen Magness, 9; and Tracy Williams, 6.

The 8th girls carried a 30-16 lead to the dressing room at halftime, but a strong third quarter effort by Vega tied the score at 32 all. As regulation play ended the score was deadlocked at 43 all.
