We feel that this is something that everyone positively should know how to use when an emergency of this type arises. You can very well save the life of one of your dearest relatives or friends.

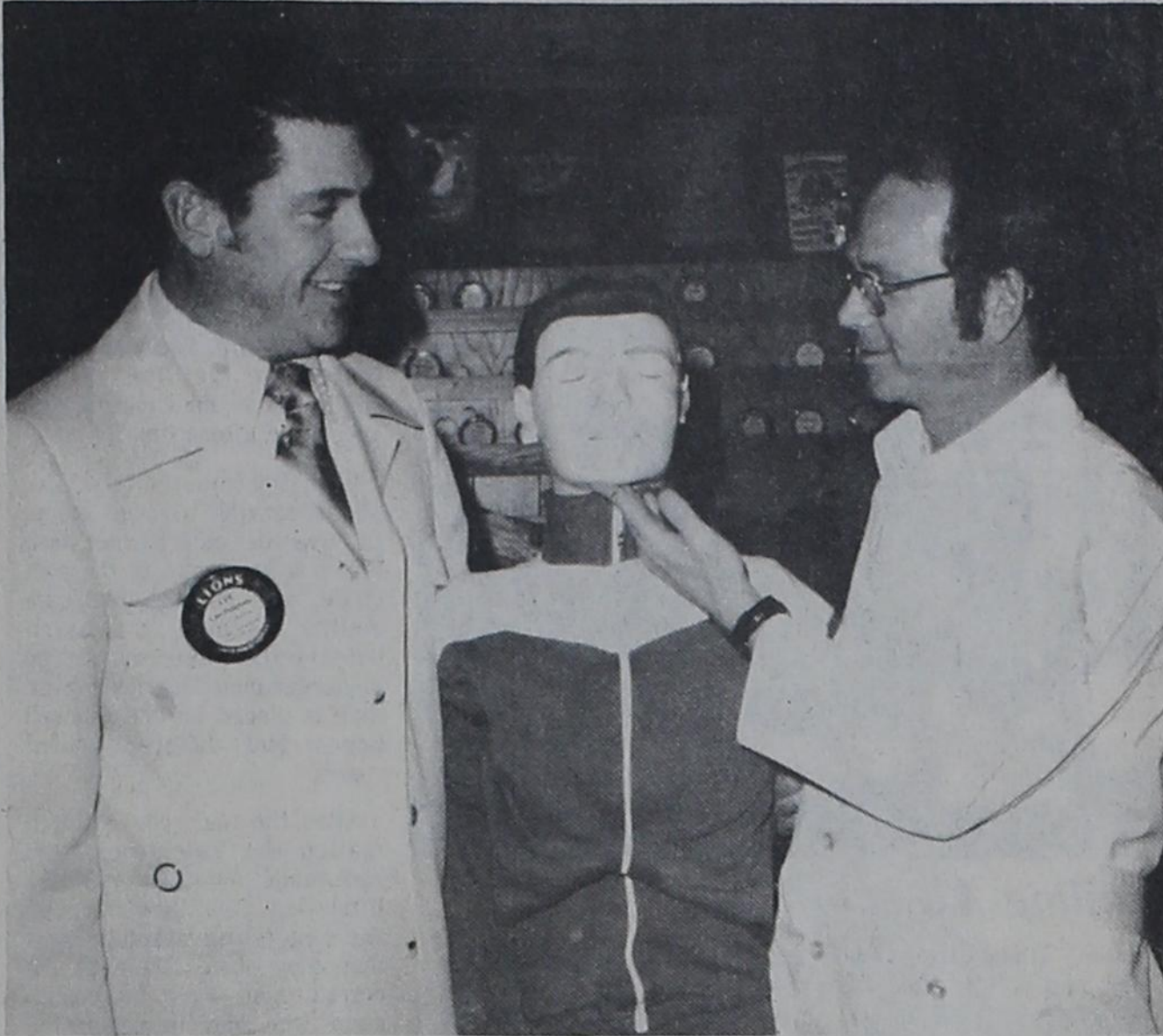
How tragic it would be to stand helplessly by and watch a death occur when the simple procedures of CPR could have saved that person.

Country Club Faces Financial Problems

The fate of Farwell Country Club will be decided at a meeting of club members and any other interested citizens Monday night, Feb. 28, at the country club. The meeting, to which all club members and other area residents are urged to attend, is to begin at 7:30.

Letters announcing the meeting and advising members of the financial status of the club were mailed this week, and the club board feels that members must show an interest, one way or another,

by attending the meeting and trying to help solve the problem. Non-members are invited to express their opinions also, says Walter Hughes, board chairman, who adds that although they may not have a vote on the situation, they might have an idea for the solution to the problems being faced.

The board of directors last week received notice from the district director of Farmers Home Administration advising

the club that a more consistent payment plan be developed and requests that a lump sum payment be made now to reduce the debt considerably, in addition to continuing a more systematic monthly payment plan.

The letter, in part, says, "The least FmHA can accept is \$4250.00 lump sum payment, and resume making monthly payments starting in March based on a projected reamortized payment. The lump-sum amount was calculated based on the difference of the amount you paid and the amount you should have paid in 1976."

According to Hughes, the club has made 12 consecutive payments; however, the total amount paid on the loan is still so small in comparison to what is owed, that the monthly payments will be increased considerably.

A decision must be made immediately since the lump sum payment must be made by March 2; therefore, Hughes says, it is imperative that club members attend this meeting to decide whether or not the community will be able to retain its recreational facilities at the country club.

Pet Clinic Set Today

All Twin Cities area residents are asked to bring their dogs and cats to the rabies clinic which is being conducted today (Friday) 1 p.m. - 5 p.m. MST at the Texico City Hall.

Dr. B.L. Russell, a Clovis veterinarian, will be in charge of the afternoon clinic. According to Dr. Russell, rabies shots will cost \$3 and the distemper shot will be \$5.

New Mexico state law requires that all pets be vaccinated at three months of age. A Farwell city ordinance also requires that all pets be vaccinated when they are six months old.

Pets must also be licensed, according to the ordinances of both cities. Tags may be purchased at Texico City Hall for \$1 and at Farwell City Hall for \$2. According to Farwell City Clerk Janie Bowers, Farwell's ordinance requires tags for both dogs and cats.

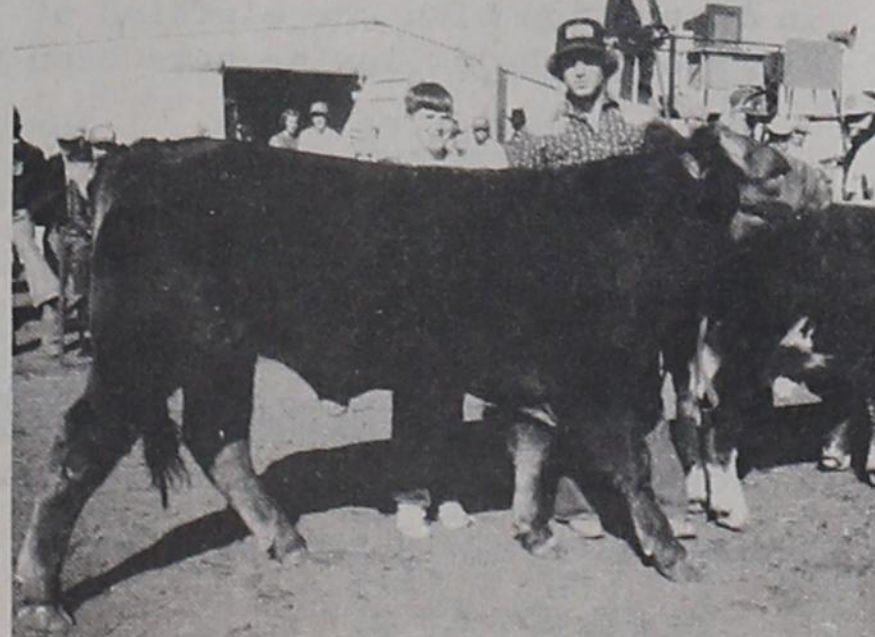

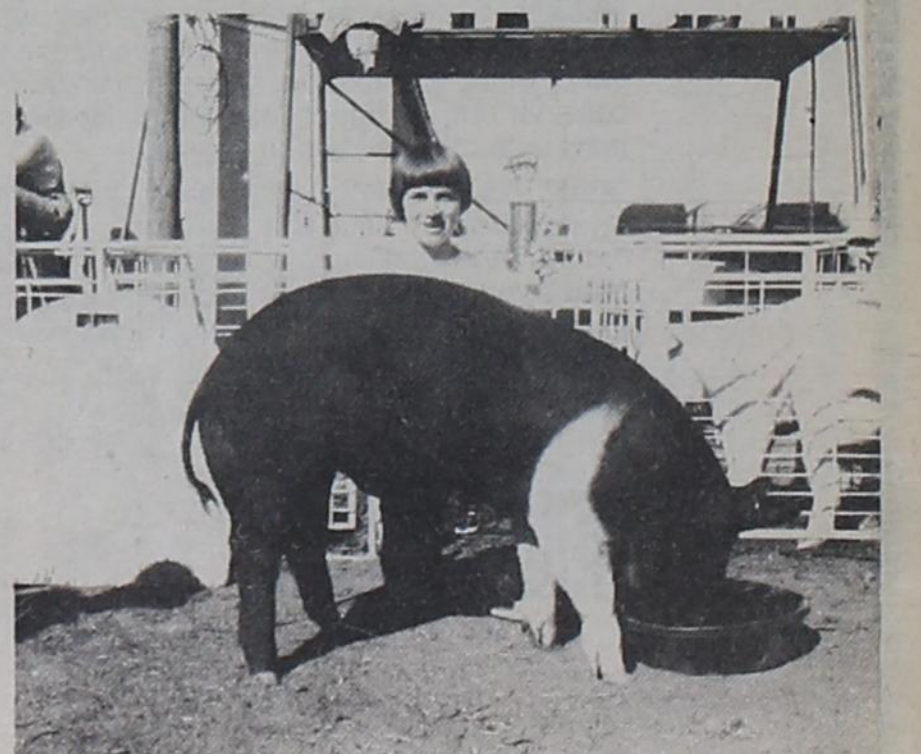

Parmer County - - Jr. Livestock Show Underway

The 29th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show was set to get underway Thursday, Feb. 17, at the Community Center in Friona. A Livestock Judging Contest, which will involve hundreds of 4-H and FFA youngsters from Area I in Texas and from neighboring Eastern New Mexico have been invited to participate.

Weighing in of animals was scheduled to be held from 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. Thursday. All judging in the show will take place today (Friday). Barrows were to be judged beginning at 8 a.m., the lamb judging begins at 1:30 p.m. and the steer judging starts at 6 p.m.

The other two. In the judging contest, the contestants will judge three classes each of steers, lambs and barrows. There will be an FFA and a 4-H division. Awards will be presented to the top five individuals in each division, and also to the top three teams in each division. The awards will be presented at approximately 12:45 p.m.

This year's show marks the debut for the Parmer County Young Farmers organization as sponsors of the show, although many of the show's former officials are helping with the transition. Dwain Menefee is once again serving as general chairman of the junior livestock show. Chief Buchanan is his assistant.

The auction sale for all top animals will be held Saturday beginning at 1 p.m. This year, a change from the previous format will find 50 percent of the animals in each division (barrows, sheep and steers) making the sale, rather than a set number of animals in each one. This was done in order to more evenly distribute the number of animals making the sale from each division. A limit of 140 animals will be sold.

Judges for the 1977 show include Dr. John McNeill, former professor at West Texas State University, steers; Travis Allen, extension service specialist, barrows; and Jim McManigal, former professor of animal science at WTSU, sheep.

Welcome Showers Fall On Twin Cities Area

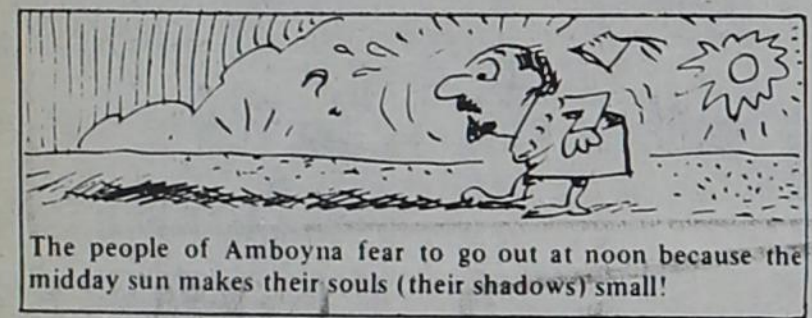

Farwell Kindergarten - - Mail Own Letters Like Grownups

Friday was a big day for Farwell kindergarten students as they visited the local post office to observe first hand how the "big people" mail and receive letters. The youngsters toured the facilities in two shifts, one in the morning and one in the afternoon.

With Postmaster Otis McMillan serving as tour guide, the five-year-olds learned how letters are brought to the post office, sent through the cancelling machine and distributed to the correct slots. The kindergarteners learned where mail is placed for the Farwell boxes and different rural routes.

After the tour, the children mailed the Valentines they had made for their parents. First they sent them through the cancelling machine and then they placed them in the correct slot. For the youngsters who had to reach the highest slots, McMillan provided a necessary lift. The Valentines were hand-

made by the children. After their red paper hearts were mounted on an off-white background, they dipped their hands in poster paint and imprinted their handprints on them. Marcia Cole, kindergarten teacher, said blue food coloring was added to their glue bottles, explaining that the youngsters used the bottle tip to make their own designs around the heart. A mimeographed verse was then pasted under the handprints and each child signed his own name.

The verse read: "You sometimes get discouraged, Because I am so small And get my little handprints On the furniture and the wall."

So here's my little Valentine Showing my hands this way From your child in kindergarten 1977, Valentine's Day."

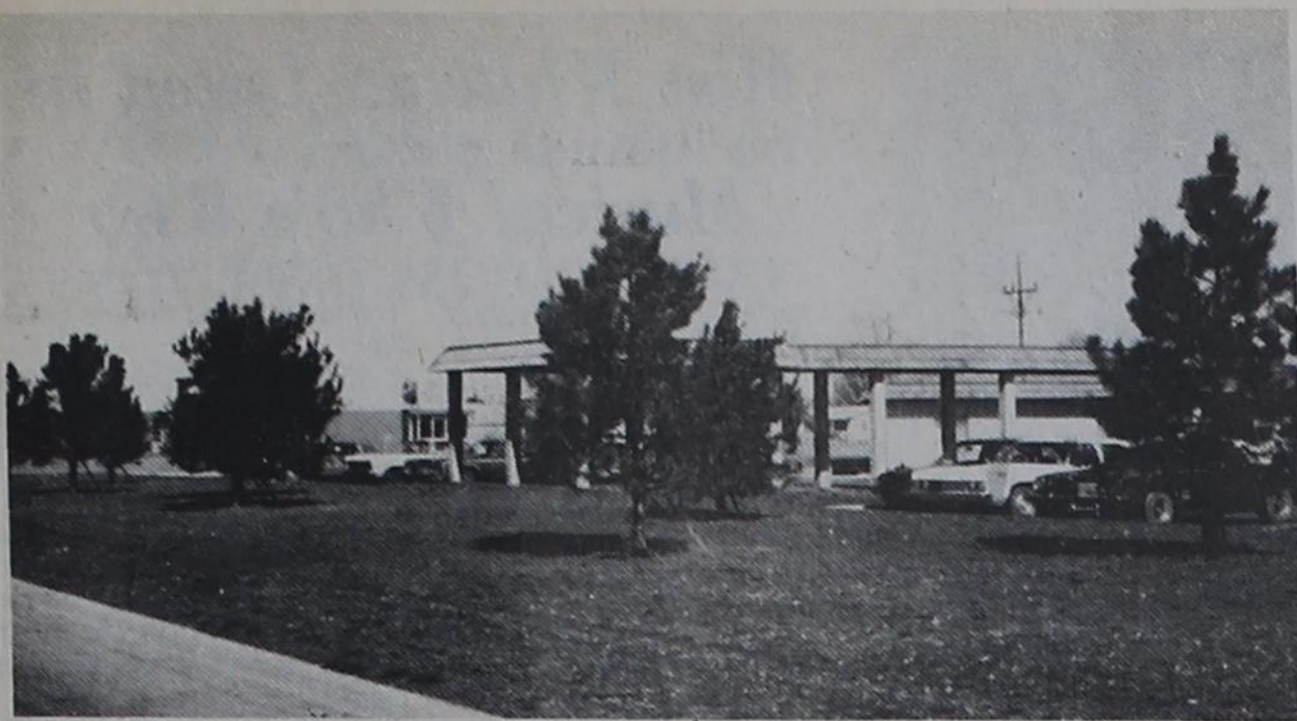

Landscaping Project

Landscaping at Farwell Convalescent Center grounds is progressing rapidly with the planting of many trees around the facility in the past two weeks. The large pines planted in the area in front of the building add to the beauty of the Center. John Armstrong of Farwell has donated 15 of the pine trees to the Center and several other area residents have also donated trees for the project.

Trees Planted - - Community Action Benefits Center

Through community interest, cooperation and hard work numerous full-grown trees are being planted around the Farwell Convalescent Center. The project is expected to be completed in two weeks, with an estimated 30 trees to be planted in all. The majority of the trees have been donated by local citizens. John Armstrong has given 15 pine trees to the Center. A large blue spruce has been donated by James McDorman. He estimated the tree to be about 15 years old, saying that it used to be in the area behind the old laundry

building in Farwell. McDorman explained that the tree was about three feet tall in 1973 and has since grown to be about 15 feet tall. 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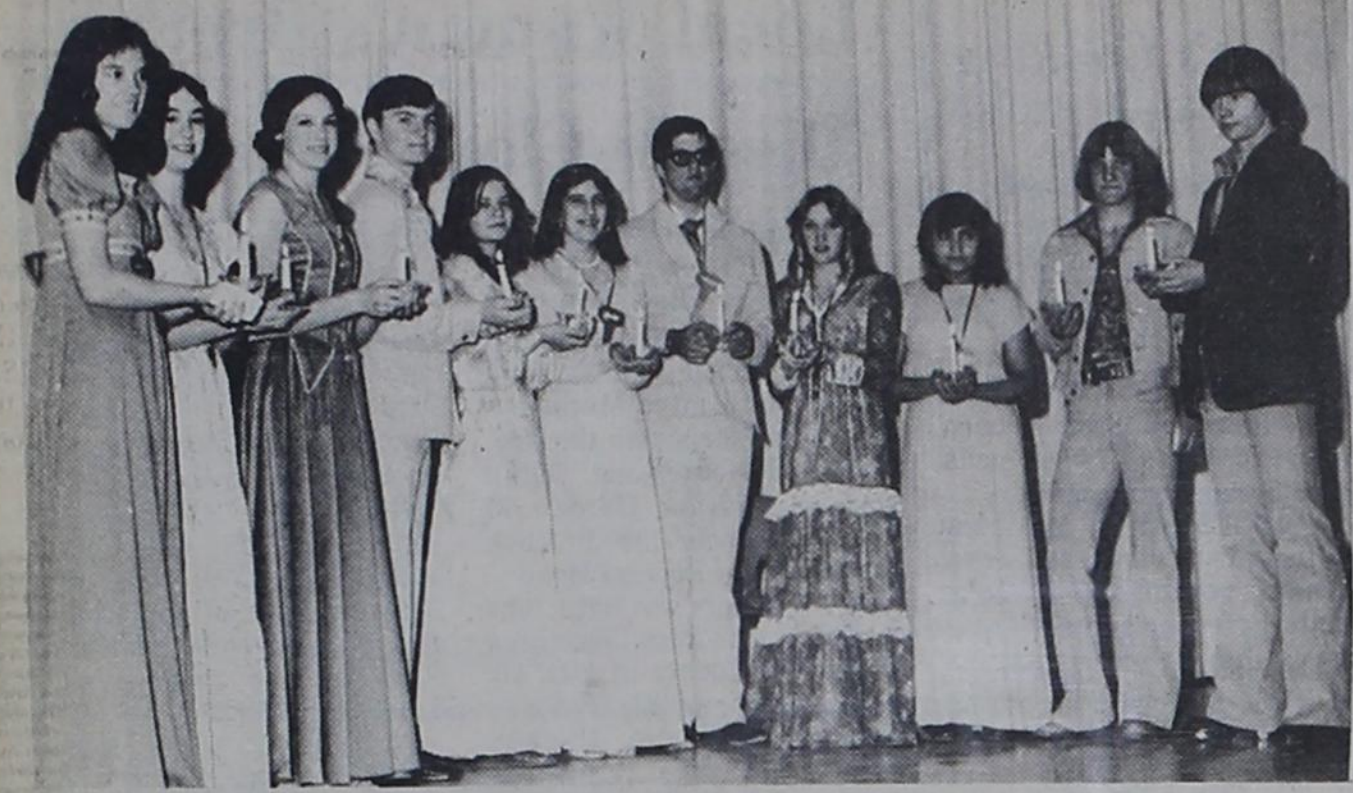

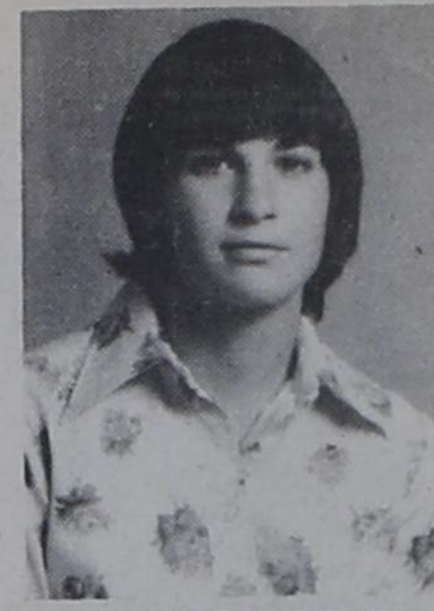
Eleven new members were inducted into the Texico National Honor Society Monday morning in a formal ceremony attended by members of the student body and many parents.

Final plans were discussed for the Valentine Social. Members will treat their husbands to an evening at a dinner theatre in Lubbock tomorrow (Saturday).

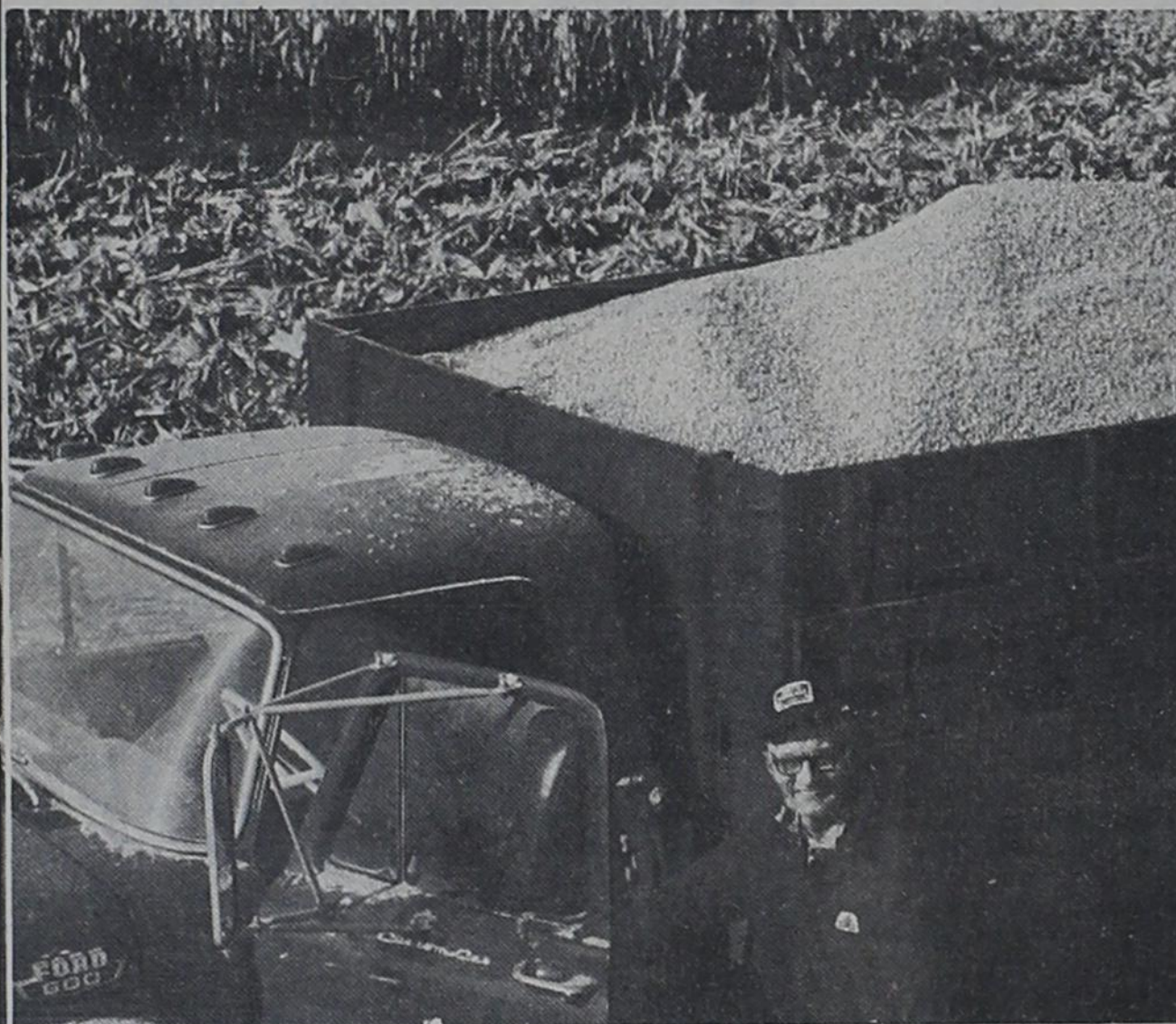

Basketball team defeated the Grady team last Friday night, 44-12. The Pee Wee Clubs were also successful when they won 23-21.

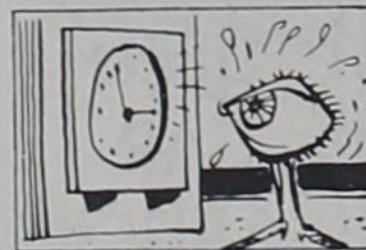

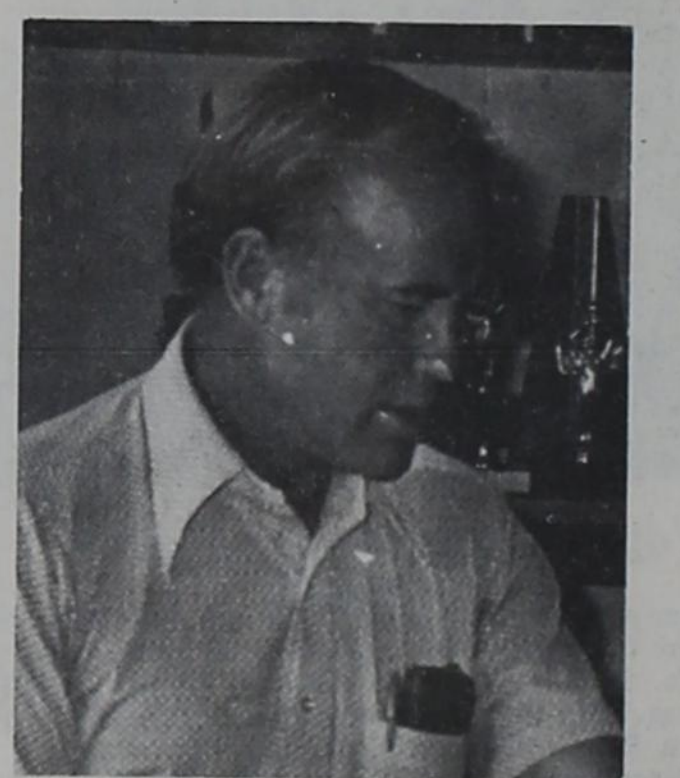

Four of these boys: Billy White, Russ Jones, Mike Goetsch, and Travis Bibbs, ran the mile relay last year and placed fourth or fifth in regional, according to Whatley. He also mentioned that Billy White and Russ Jones both jumped over six feet in

the high jump event last year. All of these boys should be a big asset to the team, he says.

The Junior High boys' track team will be coached by Larry McDorman this season. At press time they only had one meet scheduled, that one being at Hereford on March 17.

Lose Playoff Game - -

Steerettes Win District Tourney

The Steerettes of Farwell, rated number two in the district, and definitely the second-choice team to take district tournament honors, surprised the tournament favorite, Vega's Longhornettes, and soundly defeated them 54-44 to win the 3-A tournament Friday night at Friona and forced a playoff with the Longhornettes, winner of round-robin district play.

Scorers by quarters were 15-12, 31-24, and 43-32.

Second quarter action proved disastrous for the local girls as they managed to score only seven points while Vega was putting in 14.

After the halftime break, the Steerettes came out fighting in a desperate effort to make up the seven-point deficit; and although they played well, they could not gain on Vega's lead by more than one point, that being at the end of the third period when Farwell trailed by six.

Vega's slim margin of victory gained them a bi-district playoff berth and they were to meet Hale Center to determine the regional representative.

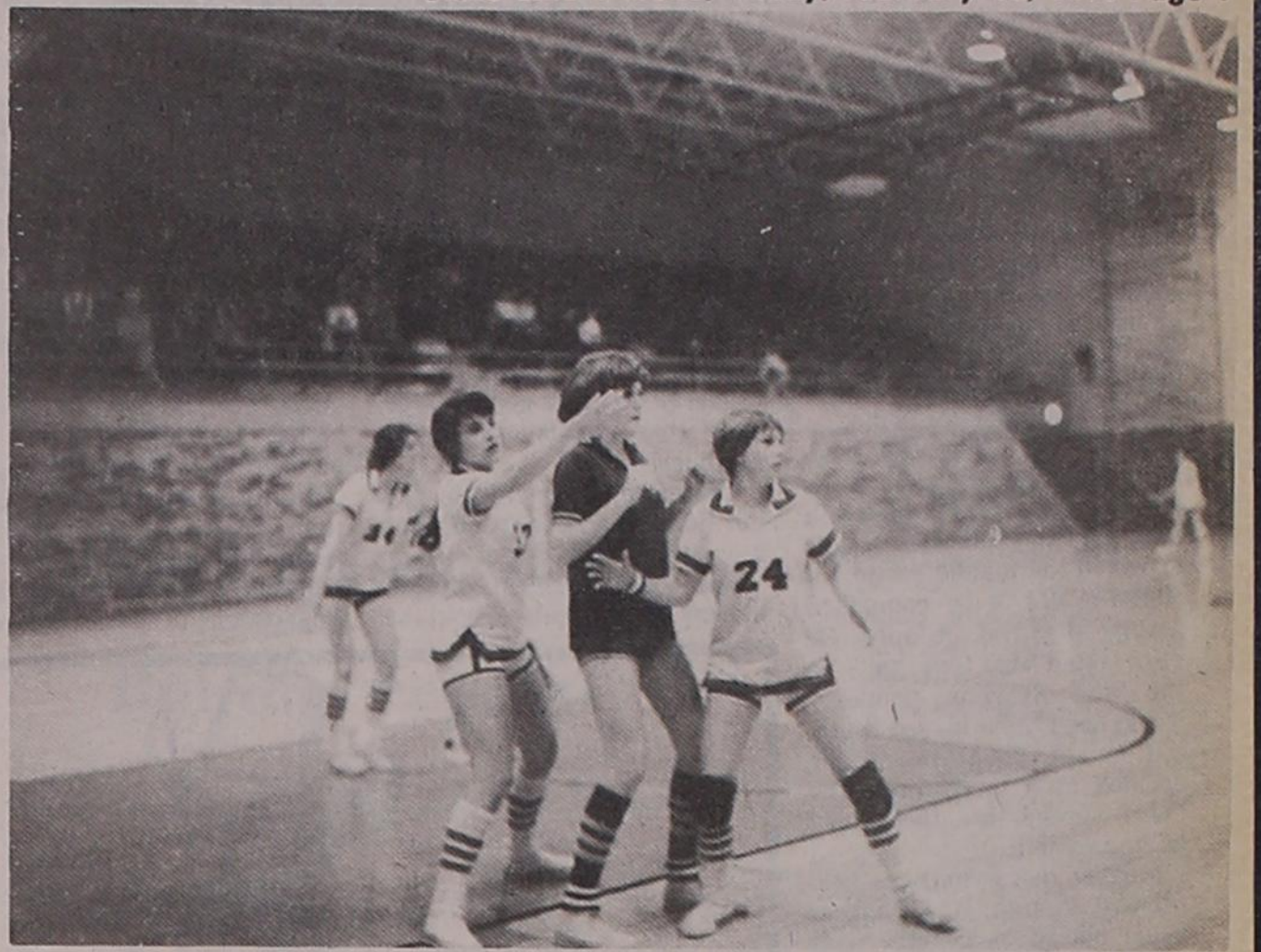

Parmer County Commissioners Court Has Lengthy Session

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday morning to consider a lengthy agenda. The first item concerned accepting bids for a new tractor and backhoe for Precinct #2. The bid from Tucker Equipment Company of Clovis in the amount of \$10,910.00 difference was accepted and the County Judge was authorized to issue a purchase order for same.

In the next order of business, Rhea Bradley from the Highway Department met with the Court and reported that he expected the middle section of Highway 214 to be completed around the first of July. He also stated that one gate on the Sue Stevens property would need to be moved south, the exact location to be decided at a later time. The Court agreed that this would be no problem.

Further discussion was held relative to signs and blinkers being placed on county roads where irrigation water falls. No decision was made as to what should be done here, as there is no standard sign or blinker for irrigation sprinkler water.

The court then approved the application for a gas line for W.M. Pool II.

It was also resolved that upon the construction of Running Water Draw, Lazbuddie Damsite Project, the present road between Section 63 and 64, Kelly "H", be routed two miles north, thence west, if said road becomes inundated by permanent water. Irrigation permits have been requested which would change the principal spillway crest to 3818.5 from 3797.5, which would flood the road referred to above by 3.5 feet of water, before the principal spillway starts to function.

The next order of business had to do with a bank depository for the ensuing two years. Bids were received from all three banks of the county, and it was agreed that

the Friona State Bank be designated as depository bank.

Other discussion had to do with the disposing of any items that the county might possess and want to sell. It was pointed out that there is no set law that specifies any value or any procedure on disposing of county-owned property. It was felt by the court that a policy should be established.

Therefore, after much discussion, it was agreed that any item, regardless of size or value, which the Commissioners Court feels should be

disposed of should be advertised for sale at least one time in the papers within the county. Such advertisement would give the minimum description required to identify such item or items, the deadline for receiving bids for such items or items, and the time and date that bids will be accepted and sale consummated. In case there are no bidders as a result of such public advertising, sale can then be made by private treaty with anyone interested.

Michael Edmiston of the Department of Health Resources of Canyon met with the court in regard to the garbage and waste disposal in the Lazbuddie community. The court generally felt that the site at Lazbuddie was sufficient, and it was agreed by the Commissioner of Precinct 4 and Edmiston that certain items might help the situation. However, since this site is on private property and the county does not have jurisdiction nor the money or equipment to do many of the things Edmiston recommends; therefore, the items agreed on are only the things that could be

done at the present time. Further contact will probably be made at a later date. The last order of business resolved that the Commissioners Court of Parmer County go on record as supporting "Operation Identification" sponsored by the Lazbuddie 4-H Clubs, that the participation of all law enforcement agencies in this operation be supported by the court, and that the "National Neighborhood Watch Program," if, when, and where it is initiated, also be supported by the Commissioners Court.

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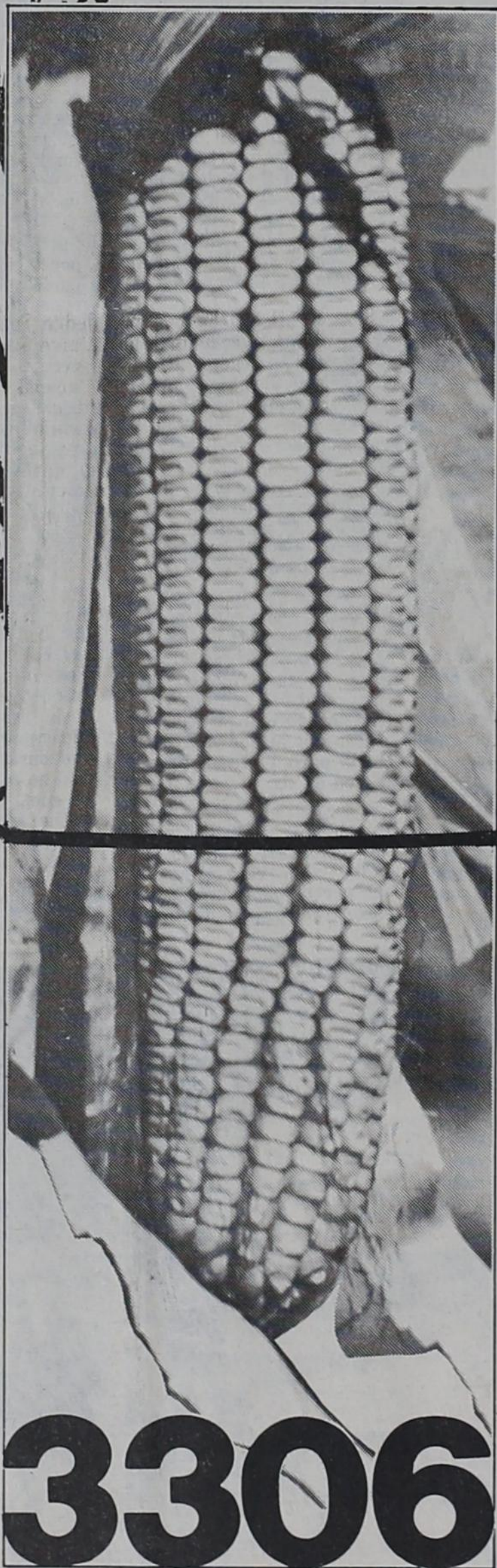

Bob Selmar Berland is likely to be one of the household names around most of the country's farms during the next few years. The new Secretary of Agriculture is a 48-year-old farmer-cum politician from Roseau, Minnesota. (Roseau, by the way, is so far north that 10 more miles and Berland would be a Canadian.) To this point in time there are a whole lot more questions than answers about the policies of the new Secretary; however, a few points are agreed on by most observers. One . . . Berland is a strong advocate of the family farm as opposed to the corporate farm operation. Two . . . he will move for the institution of some sort of grain reserve system, probably emphasizing on-farm storage. Three . . . he will start the ball rolling for higher target price supports for wheat and corn. Other policy questions will not be answered until his feet are more firmly on the ground.

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SHERIFF'S REPORT

Several cases of thefts and vandalism have been reported by the Parmer County Sheriff's Department. Sheriff Charlie Lovelace said that Robelete Jarier of Bovina reported that \$400 had been taken from his room.

mittee will also be appointed for the Annual Meeting to be held in 1978.

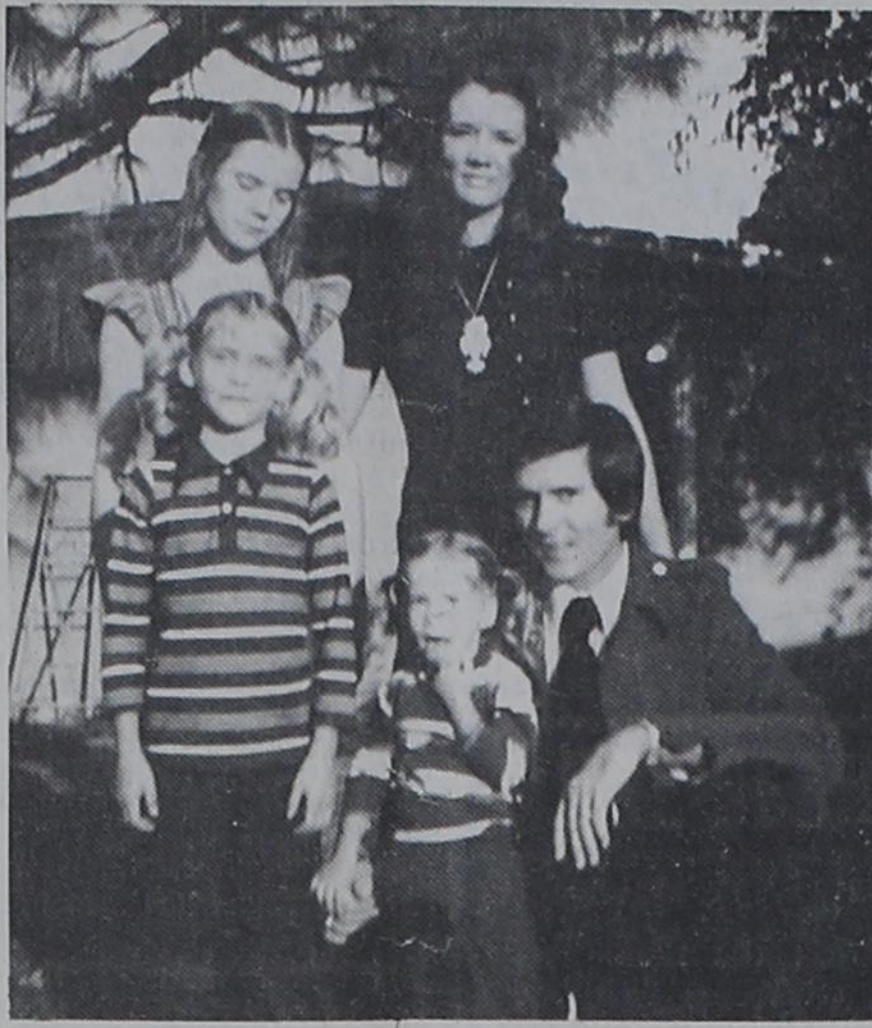
Other matters that might be presented will also be considered at the meeting.

Rev. Rick Parker - -

Pleasant Hill Baptist Has New Minister

Just five years ago Rev. Rick Parker, the new pastor of Pleasant Hill Baptist Church, was manager of a bottling

company in Dennison, Tex. But then the little voice which had been telling him for years that something "was not quite

right in his life," finally got through to him and Rev. Parker did an abrupt "about face." The determined young man set his sights on attending the seminary and becoming a Baptist minister.

Tina Parker, wife of the pastor, says that when Rick first told her of his plans, dreams and hopes for the future she thought "the whole idea was silly." "But after I saw the change that had come over him I knew Rick was serious and that it was the right move for us to make," adds Mrs. Parker.

Rev. Parker attended the Southwest Baptist Theology Seminary in Ft. Worth where he obtained his degree in theology. He said the school teaches the fundamentals of being a minister, but each individual has to apply the "tool of the trade" in whatever way he terms best.

The new pastor said his greatest love is "sharing my experiences with Jesus Christ with the people I meet." He adds that he loves ministering to people, preaching and studying about God. During his brief years as a minister Rev. Parker has come to rely heavily on the home visitation approach to ministering to the congregation. His wife Tina accompanies him on these visits.

In a time when the home and family are being threatened by outside influences, inner strife and turmoil, Rev. Parker tries to bring aid, comfort and guidance to married couples, especially young marrieds just starting out. The Baptist minister said that his greatest joy is to be a part of the redemptive program in Jesus Christ.

Mrs. Parker likes to cook and she keeps busy looking after the couple's three daughters. Christy, 4, remains at home, while her older sisters, Rhonda, 14, and Tammy, 7, attend school in Texico. Tina admits that the change in schools is hardest on Rhonda who is in the eighth grade, adding that second grader Tammy "takes everything in stride and has no trouble adjusting to the change."

Living in the farm community of Pleasant Hill is like "coming home," say the Parkers. Tina was reared on a farm and has always lived in the country. The couple has been married for 16 years. They met in high school in Shawnee, Okla.

Rev. Parker would like to continue his theology education, but has no definite plans at the moment for furthering this goal. For the moment the new comers to Pleasant Hill are settling into their new home and congregation and according to them are "very happy to be here."

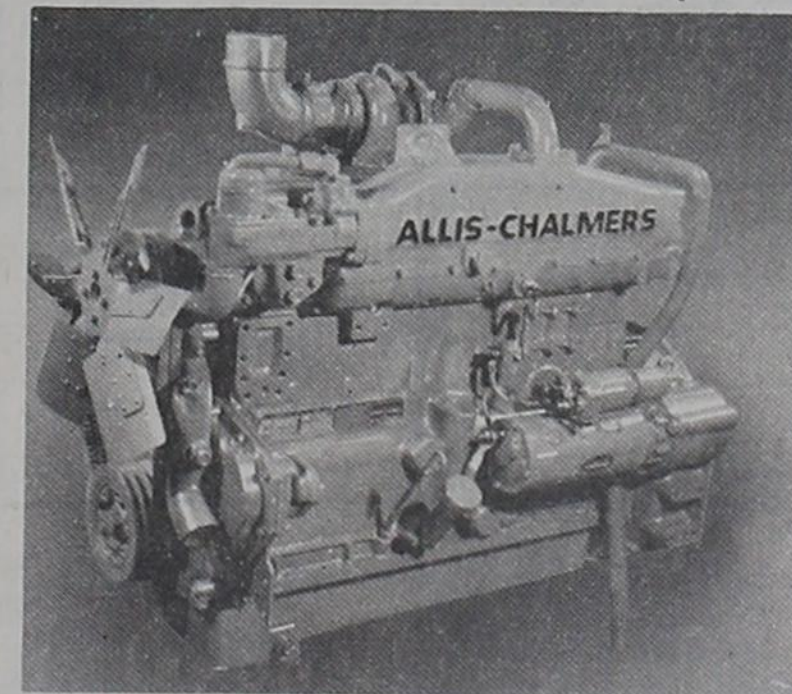

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. BEREM BIBLE SOCIETY CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60635

THE TWELVE APOSTLES AND PAUL

In comparing the ministry of the twelve apostles with that of the Apostle Paul, we must observe carefully:

- The twelve were chosen by Christ ON EARTH (Luke 6:13) while Paul was later chosen by Christ IN HEAVEN (Acts 9:3-5; 26:16).
- Prior to Paul's conversion the twelve had known Christ only ON EARTH (I John 1:1). Even at His ascension to heaven "a cloud received Him OUT OF THEIR SIGHT" (Acts 1:9). But Paul knew only Christ IN HEAVEN, having never seen Him on earth (Acts 26:16; I Cor. 15:8).
- The twelve represented their own nation. The number twelve has no connection with the "one body" of Christ. As we know, Jacob of old "begat twelve patriarchs" (Acts 7:8). From these sprang the twelve tribes of Israel. These twelve tribes had twelve princes over them (Numbers 1:16). Even when Israel was ruled by kings there were still to be twelve

princes — one over each tribe (I Chronicles 27:22). Thus, as He went forth proclaiming "the gospel of the kingdom" our Lord chose twelve princes for the twelve thrones in the kingdom to come (Matthew 19:28).

On the other hand, Paul, as one apostle, represents the "one body," the Church of today (Romans 12:5; I Corinthians 12:13; Ephesians 4:4).

- The twelve were sent to proclaim Christ's kingdom "at hand" (Matthew 10:7) and later to offer its establishment on earth (Acts 3:19-26). But Paul was sent to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24) while the kingdom is held in abeyance.
- The ministry of the twelve was based on covenant promises (Isaiah 60:1-3; Luke 1:70-75; Acts 3:22-26). Paul's ministry was not based on covenant promises, but wholly on the grace of God through Christ (Romans 3:21-28; 5:20,21; Ephesians 1:6,7; 2:7; etc.).

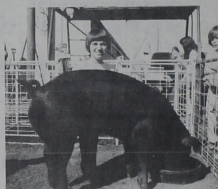
