

The large influx of illegal aliens has come in for some close scrutiny by a number of organizations that heretofore were not interested. This has been due to the "recession" and the claim that these "illegals" are taking jobs away from the legal citizenry.

This may be true, but we sort of suspect that the very large majority of these illegal immigrants are in jobs that the good solid U.S. citizen won't accept. Remember, our "citizens" have unemployment benefits (union unemployment benefits and state unemployment benefits), food stamps, subsidized housing, etc., etc. This means that unless the "job" is a "position", finding persons to fill it is difficult for most employers.

For years we have kept the law of supply and demand out of the labor market. As a consequence, for example, we have \$3,000 autos with \$6,000 price tags. We have any number of labor intensive products that are getting too high for the public to purchase. Another good example is the three cent postage stamp now costing ten cents and going higher.

Well it just might be that these people who have sneaked in the country are the only thing that is keeping us in the labor market at all. It could be that all the hollering about the 125,000 or so Vietnamese is being done by lazy drones who do not want somebody who just might work cheaper coming in and messing up their sine-

A good suggestion might be to turn the delivery of Uncle Sam's mail over to the Vietnamese refugees so we can at least hold on to the ten cent stamp. Here are some of the demands now being proposed by the National Association of Letter Carriers (AFL-CIO). With the starting pay of car-

riers now at approximately \$5.25 per hour and the average carrier, with seniority, coming in at nearer \$6.75, the union demands that overtime pay shall be double time, plus a seven-hour guarantee even if the carrier needs only 16 minutes. This could mean the distinct possibility of an overtime paycheck of \$94.50 for only 16 minutes of work.

You stamp buyers are being asked to pay the entire cost of life insurance, health insurance, dental care and supplemental retirements and disability benefits. Postal workers already get nine holidays a year -- celebrating such tremendous national holidays as Columbus Day. They now have 13 days of sick leave, cumulative, and up to 26 days of vacation. This adds up to a possible 48 days a year off

from work with pay. Now it is proposed to provide them with child care and a recreational fund. If "drunks" or "dope heads" show up, NALC is asking you to dig up the funds to rehabilitate them. Oh yes, there is also the matter of "bereavement leave." A cut off on "bereavement" past the third cousin has not yet been established. They want guaranteed job security with a contract stipulation that nobody be laid off due to technological advancements.

These demands will cost immediate money, but think what this proviso would eventually cost. NALC is demanding "elimination of management's right to determine methods and means of operation"...of your post office.


This type of labor contract negotiations is not unique. We understand that some industries labor under a bigger load than what is being proposed for the United States Postal Service. This, neighbor, is why inflation is rampant in this country. Too many #%\$"* people getting far too much for doing too #%\$"* little.

Let's import a few more peoples from foreign lands who want to work and who will work. The example of a day's work for a day's pay might be the proper answer to our alternating inflation - recession

Our local post office has been undergoing some revamping in its operation that has caused some "conversation." Let's be thankful that there are some in this federal monstrosity who are thinking of the general public and are willing to institute measures that will help hold the line on the cost of postage. Let's support savings, not condemn it.

Student Handbook Violation - -

Farwell School Board Has Hearing

Members of the Farwell School Board met Monday evening, May 12, for a special hearing to consider and decide what action should be taken regarding the Farwell students involved in a violation of part of the Student Handbook dealing with narcotics.

Present for the meeting were school board members Gilbert Kaltwasser, R. J. Garner, Wilbert Kalbas, Billy Mayfield, Joe Hughes, Charles Aycock and Ted Magness. Others attending were Superintendent W. M. Roberts, in-coming superintendent James Perkins, high school principal Jack Williams, and junior high principal James Craig.

Students involved in the violation also attended the hearing along with their parents. George L. Garza, Pablo Lucio, Larry Sutton and David Cantu, students at Farwell High School, pleaded guilty in County Judge Paul Fortenberry's court to charges of possession of marijuana.

The four men, who were treated as adults by the court, were sentenced to three days in the county jail and were fined \$25.00 each plus court costs. The jail sentences were commuted provided the men pay the fines themselves.

Several juveniles who were also involved in the "pot party" were not brought before the school board, as charges against them were dismissed by the judge, so they were not found to be in violation of the

School board president Gilbert Kaltwasser opened the hearing with a discussion of the outline of procedure that would be followed. The students and their parents were given the choice of an open or closed meeting and chose to be heard in closed session.

Students and parents were brought before the school board individually, and at the conclusion of the individual hearings the board again re-convened in open session and discussed the appropriate penalties to assess. All students involved and their parents were present for the

School board secretary Wilbert Kalbas read a resolution

"Whereas: The board has met this evening with youth and their parents to discuss the violation of these youth from our school system who pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor drug violation; and

"Whereas: The student handbook of our school plainly forbids the use or possession of drugs or narcotics, and places a penalty upon such conviction, even while student is outside the school. (Each pupil of Farwell High School is made aware of this); and

"Whereas: This board has no soft-hearted approach toward these problems in our society, and will at each succeeding violation of these rules probably become more hard-nosed and assess a fuller penalty within the law; but,

"Whereas: This was the first violation to come to the knowledge of the board, and although these students were

volved, yet we feel that they Any student who shall have might not have realized the full impact this violation could have upon their life and also their school life; and,

"Whereas: These steudents men when they say it will not happen again; and,

'Whereas: It is the contention among these young men that they would accept a penalty for this violation, but do not wish for this penalty to

incorporation on May 8, 1950, the City of Farwell has a City Marshall. City Commissioners met in special session Monday, May 12, for the purpose of creating the positions of City Marshal and Corporation Court Judge and hiring persons to fill

these positions. Ronnie Mitchell of Bovina has been employed by the city dads to fill the position of City Marshal, effective immediately, at a salary of \$700 per month. The city will equip and furnish him a vehicle.

Marshal Mitchell formerly served as City Marshal for Bovina for eight and a half years. He comes to this new position well qualified, having had 340 hours of college, 240 hours basic police training, 24 hours training in penal code, 40 in major crime, 35 hours schooling in basic law, 35 in general law, 40 hours narcotic training with 15 more hours and short courses in narcotics. He has completed one semes-

The Marshal and his wife Gaynell, are the parents of four children.

Ray Mears, Justice of the Peace in Farwell, was offered the position of Corporate Court Judge by City Commissioners on May 12 and accepted the job at a salary of \$75 per month. He will conduct this business in his office in the court house.

According to Ordinance No. 77 creating the position of City Marshal, the position of Chief office of the city and the term of office shall be for two years, corresponding with the term of office of the Mayor. If, at any time, the City Commission feels it necessary to appoint a Deputy Marshal to work with the Chief Marshal, they may do so and this Deputy Marshal pleasure of the City Commis-

The Chief Marshal and each Deputy Marshal will be issued

The City Marshal shall be the chief police officer in the City of Farwell and it will be his duty and that of any other member of the Marshal's Department to preserve the peace within the limits of the City of Farwell. To effect this purpose, he may use all lawful means and may interfere without warrant to suppress or prevent crime.

Every member of the City Marshal Department shall City Marshal is an appointive have authority to execute warrants or arrest or other process issued out of the Corporation Court in Farwell; to arrest without warrant in all cases where authorized by the laws of the State of Texas; and to arrest without warrant when offenses against the laws or ordinances are committed in shall serve at the will and his or their presence, or where persons are found in suspicious places, and under circumstances which reasonably show that such persons have been guilty of some felony or breach of the peace, or threaten or are about to commit some offense against the law.

> The Municipal or Corporation Court Judge shall also be an appointive office. He shall perform the duties as prescribed by the laws of the State of Texas. The Judge shall be appointed for a term of office running concurrently with that of the Mayor.

> Immediately following the swearing in of the new City Marshal by Mayor Gil Patschke, Commissioners Ralph Franse and Fred Chandler and Marshal Mitchell began compiling a list of requirements for the new police car the city will purchase for the Marshal.



ORDINANCE #77

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE OF-FICE OF CITY MAR-SHAL FOR THE CITY OF FARWELL, TEX-

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FARWELL, TEXAS:

Section 1. There is hereby created and established the City Marshal Department for the City of Farwell, Texas.

Section 2. The City Marshal Department of the City of Mayor, City of Farwell, Farwell, Texas, shall consist of one Chief Marshal and such additional Deputy Marshals as the City Commission may from time to time deem necessary and proper.

Published in State Line Trib- Section 3. The Chief Marshal and other members of the City Marshal Department shall be appointed by the Mayor, by and with the advice and consent of the City Commission.

> Section 4. The Chief Marshal and members of the Ctiy Marshal Department shall take and subscribe to the official oath prescribed by the Consti-

and shall give surety bond for faithful performance of duties. payable to the City of Farwell, Texas, in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), premium for which shall be paid by the City.

Section 5. After taking and subscribing to the oath of office and giving bond as provided in Section 4 of this ordinance, a Commission shall be issued to the appointee in the following form:

CITY OF FARWELL, TEXAS COMMISSION

I, Gil Patschke, Mayor of the City of Farwell, Texas reposing confidence in the ability, integrity, fidelity and loyalty of _____, do hereby, upon authority of the City Commission of said City, appoint the __ CHIEF MAR-SHAL in and for said City, with all the rights, privileges, authority and duties of a peace officer conferred by the laws of the State of Texas and the ordinances of said city.

Done at Farwell, Texas, this _____, day of ______, 1975.

(SEAL)

Mayor, City of Farwell, Texas

Section 6. The appointment of a Chief Marshal or of any Deputy Marshal shall be made and entered in the Minutes of the City Commission at any regular or special meeting of Commission and the Commission issued to such Chief Marshal or Deputy Marshal shall become effective after the same has been signed by the Mayor, and such appointment has been entered in the Minutes.

Section 7. The position of Chief Marshal is hereby declared to be an appointive office of the city, and his term of office shall be for two (2) years, and until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified, and such term shall correspond with the term of office of the Mayor; provided, that no Marshal elected by the people shall be removed from office by the provisions of this ordinance until the term of office to which he was elected shall have expired. A Chief Marshal appointed at any time, other than at the beginning of the Mayor's term of office, shall hold office only until the end of the unexpired term of office of the Mayor, and, if such Chief Marshal is reappointed, his term of office shall be for two (2) years. Any Deputy Marshal subordinate to the Chief Marshall shall serve at the will and pleasure of the City Commission. The Chief Marshal may make recommendations to the Mayor for the appointment of Deputies, but neither the Mayor nor the City Commission shall be bound by such recommen-

Section 8. A metallic badge, identifying the Chief Marshal and each Deputy Marshal as a member of the City Marshal Department, shall be issued to each member of the City Marshal Department.

Section 9. The Chief Marshal shall be the chief police officer of the City, and as such, shall have supervision over the other member of the City Marshal Department.

Section 10. The members of the City Marshal Department shall receive such compensation as the City Commission may from time to time deter-

Section 11. It is the duty of every member of City Marshal Department to preserve the peace within the limits of the City of Farwell, and to effect this purpose the officer may use all lawful means. He may interfere without warrant to suppress or prevent crime.

Section 12. Every member of the City Marshal Department shall have authority:

> (a) To execute warrants of arrest or other process issued out of the Corporation Court in said City.

(b) To arrest without warrant in all cases where authorized by the laws of the State of Texas.

(c) To arrest without warrant when offenses against the laws or ordinances are committed in his or their presence, or where persons are found in suspicious

places, and under circumstances which reasonably show that such persons have been guilty of some felony or breach of the peace, or threaten or are about to commit some offense against the law.

some coins. The matter of purchasing a trophy case for the front hall of




