

The large influx of illegal aliens has come in for some close scrutiny by a number of organizations that heretofore were not interested. This has been due to the "recession" and the claim that these "illegals" are taking jobs away from the legal citizenry.

This may be true, but we sort of suspect that the very large majority of these illegal immigrants are in jobs that the good solid U.S. citizen won't accept. Remember, our "citizens" have unemployment benefits (union unemployment benefits and state unemployment benefits), food stamps, subsidized housing, etc., etc. This means that unless the "job" is a "position", finding persons to fill it is difficult for most employers.

For years we have kept the law of supply and demand out of the labor market. As a consequence, for example, we have \$3,000 autos with \$6,000 price tags. We have any number of labor intensive products that are getting too high for the public to purchase. Another good example is the three cent postage stamp now costing ten cents and going higher.

Well it just might be that these people who have sneaked in the country are the only thing that is keeping us in the labor market at all. It could be that all the hollering about the 125,000 or so Vietnamese is being done by lazy drones who do not want somebody who just might work cheaper coming in and messing up their sinecures.

A good suggestion might be to turn the delivery of Uncle Sam's mail over to the Vietnamese refugees so we can at least hold on to the ten cent stamp. Here are some of the demands now being proposed by the National Association of Letter Carriers (AFL-CIO).

With the starting pay of carriers now at approximately \$5.25 per hour and the average carrier, with seniority, coming in at nearer \$6.75, the union demands that overtime pay shall be double time, plus a seven-hour guarantee even if the carrier needs only 16 minutes. This could mean the distinct possibility of an overtime paycheck of \$94.50 for only 16 minutes of work.

You stamp buyers are being asked to pay the entire cost of life insurance, health insurance, dental care and supplemental retirements and disability benefits. Postal workers already get nine holidays a year - celebrating such tremendous national holidays as Columbus Day. They now have 13 days of sick leave, cumulative, and up to 26 days of vacation. This adds up to a possible 48 days a year off from work with pay.

Now it is proposed to provide them with child care and a recreational fund. If "drunks" or "dope heads" show up, NALC is asking you to dig up the funds to rehabilitate them. Oh yes, there is also the matter of "bereavement leave." A cut off on "bereavement" past the third cousin has not yet been established. They want guaranteed job security with a contract stipulation that nobody be laid off due to technological advancements.

These demands will cost immediate money, but think what this proviso would eventually cost. NALC is demanding "elimination of management's right to determine methods and means of operation" of your post office.

This type of labor contract negotiations is not unique. We understand that some industries labor under a bigger load than what is being proposed for the United States Postal Service. This, neighbor, is why inflation is rampant in this country. Too many people getting far too much for doing too little.

Let's import a few more peoples from foreign lands who want to work and who will work. The example of a day's work for a day's pay might be the proper answer to our alternating inflation - recession cycle.

Our local post office has been undergoing some re-vamping in its operation that has caused some "conversation." Let's be thankful that there are some in this federal mostrosity who are thinking of the general public and are willing to institute measures that will help hold the line on the cost of postage. Let's support savings, not confdemn it.



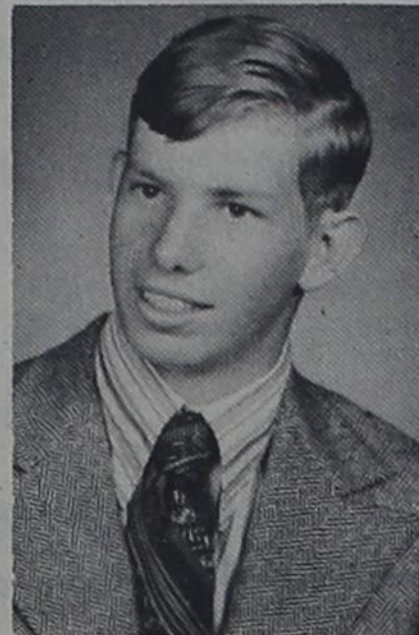

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## Student Handbook Violation - -

# Farwell School Board Has Hearing

Members of the Farwell School Board met Monday evening, May 12, for a special hearing to consider and decide what action should be taken regarding the Farwell students involved in a violation of part of the Student Handbook dealing with narcotics.

Present for the meeting were school board members Gilbert Kaltwasser, R. J. Garner, Wilbert Kalbas, Billy Mayfield, Joe Hughes, Charles Aycock and Ted Magness. Others attending were Superintendent W. M. Roberts, incoming superintendent James Perkins, high school principal Jack Williams, and junior high principal James Craig.

Students involved in the violation also attended the hearing along with their parents. George L. Garza, Pablo Lucio, Larry Sutton and David Cantu, students at Farwell High School, pleaded guilty in County Judge Paul Fortenberry's court to charges of possession of marijuana.

The four men, who were treated as adults by the court, were sentenced to three days in the county jail and were fined \$25.00 each plus court costs. The jail sentences were commuted provided the men pay the fines themselves.

Several juveniles who were also involved in the "pot party" were not brought before the school board, as charges against them were dismissed by the judge, so they were not found to be in violation of the Student Handbook.

Specifically, the Student

Handbook of the Farwell Schools, dealing with narcotics, states:

Any student who shall have been convicted of a misdemeanor or a felony for the possession, use or sale of a dangerous drug, a narcotic drug, or intoxicants, while outside of school will be expelled by the Board of Trustees for the current semester, and no credit will be given the student for the semester."

School board president Gilbert Kaltwasser opened the hearing with a discussion of the outline of procedure that would be followed. The students and their parents were given the choice of an open or closed meeting and chose to be heard in closed session.

Students and parents were brought before the school board individually, and at the conclusion of the individual hearings the board again re-convened in open session and discussed the appropriate penalties to assess. All students involved and their parents were present for the discussion.

School board secretary Wilbert Kalbas read a resolution that said:

"Whereas: The board has met this evening with youth and their parents to discuss the violation of these youth from our school system who pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor drug violation; and

"Whereas: The student handbook of our school plainly forbids the use or possession of drugs or narcotics, and places a penalty upon such conviction, even while student is outside the school. (Each pupil of Farwell High School is made aware of this); and

"Whereas: This board has no soft-hearted approach toward these problems in our society, and will at each succeeding violation of these rules probably become more hard-nosed and assess a fuller penalty within the law; but,

"Whereas: This was the first violation to come to the knowledge of the board, and although these students were

fully aware of the ruling of the school and also the penalty involved, yet we feel that they might not have realized the full impact this violation could have upon their life and also their school life; and,

"Whereas: These students have shown due concern and sorrow over this violation, and it is the confidence of this board in believing these young men when they say it will not happen again; and,

"Whereas: It is the contention among these young men that they would accept a penalty for this violation, but do not wish for this penalty to

affect their school credits toward graduation or graduation itself. So,

"Therefore, be it resolved: That the penalty be: These students will be ineligible for any honor award from this evening until graduation, and that they are not permitted to go on the senior trip for their respective class, nor is their class to account them any share of such monies as spent on the senior class trip, only dues paid in full will be returned. And,

"Be it further resolved: That at the acceptance of these (Continued on Page 2)

# Farwell Hires City Marshal

For the first time since its incorporation on May 8, 1950, the City of Farwell has a City Marshal.

City Commissioners met in special session Monday, May 12, for the purpose of creating the positions of City Marshal and Corporation Court Judge and hiring persons to fill these positions.

Ronnie Mitchell of Bovina has been employed by the city to fill the position of City Marshal, effective immediately, at a salary of \$700 per month. The city will equip and furnish him a vehicle.

Marshal Mitchell formerly served as City Marshal for Bovina for eight and a half years. He comes to this new position well qualified, having had 340 hours of college, 240 hours basic police training, 24 hours training in penal code, 40 in major crime, 35 hours schooling in basic law, 35 in general law, 40 hours narcotic training with 15 more hours and short courses in narcotics. He has completed one semester (22 hours) at Amarillo College.

The Marshal and his wife Gaynell, are the parents of four children.

Ray Mears, Justice of the Peace in Farwell, was offered the position of Corporation Court Judge by City Commissioners on May 12 and accepted the job at a salary of \$75 per month. He will conduct this business in his office in the court house.

According to Ordinance No. 77 creating the position of City Marshal, the position of Chief City Marshal is an appointive office of the city and the term of office shall be for two years, corresponding with the term of office of the Mayor. If, at any time, the City Commission feels it necessary to appoint a Deputy Marshal to work with the Chief Marshal, they may do so and this Deputy Marshal shall serve at the will and pleasure of the City Commission.

The Chief Marshal and each Deputy Marshal will be issued

a badge identifying their position.

The City Marshal shall be the chief police officer in the City of Farwell and it will be his duty and that of any other member of the Marshal's Department to preserve the peace within the limits of the City of Farwell. To effect this purpose, he may use all lawful means and may interfere without warrant to suppress or prevent crime.

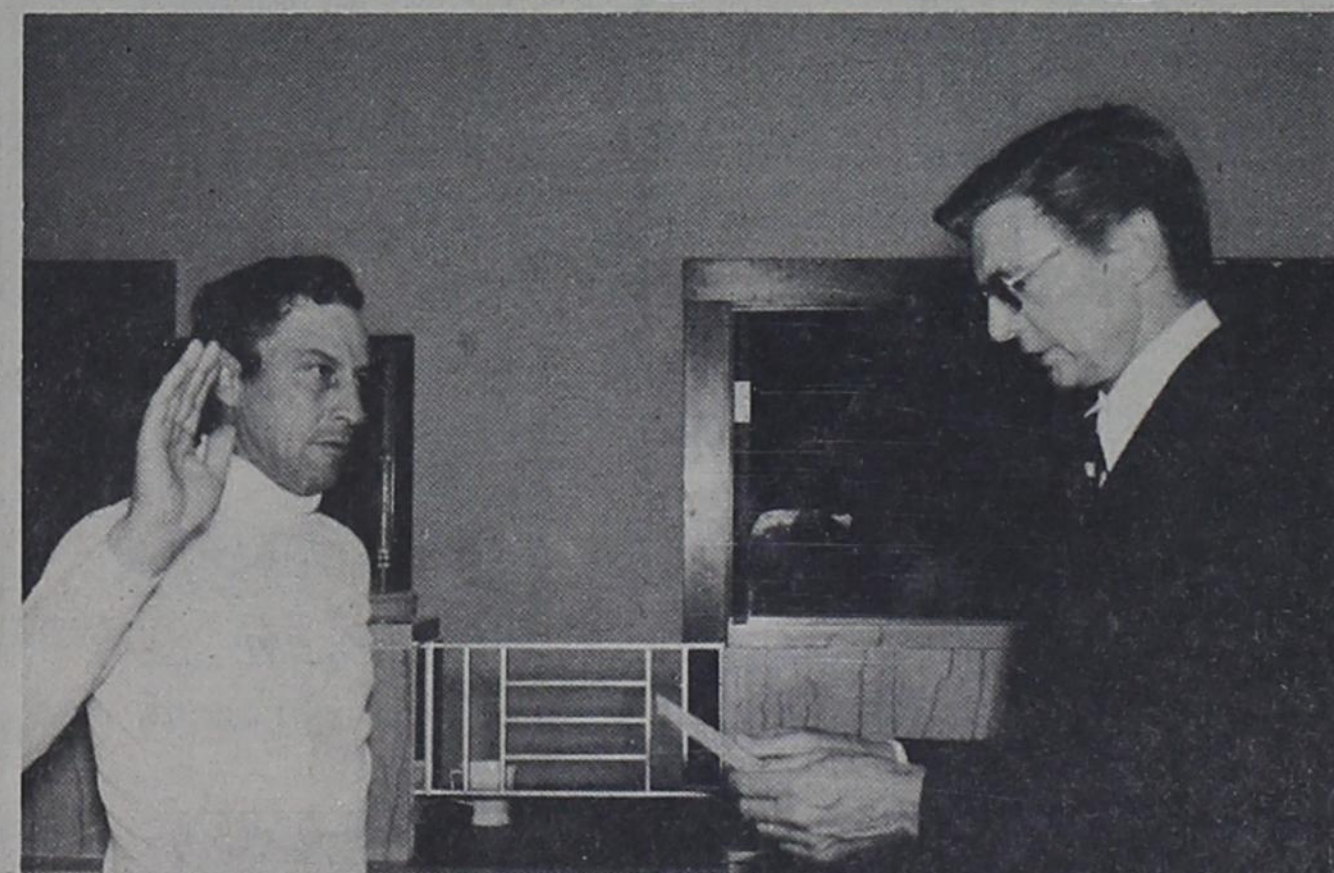
Every member of the City Marshal Department shall have authority to execute warrants or arrest or other process issued out of the Corporation Court in Farwell; to arrest without warrant in all cases where authorized by the laws of the State of Texas; and to arrest without warrant when offenses against the laws or ordinances are committed in his or their presence, or where persons are found in suspicious places, and under circumstances which reasonably show that such persons have been guilty of some felony or breach of the peace, or threaten or are about to commit some offense against the law.

The Municipal or Corporation Court Judge shall also be an appointive office. He shall perform the duties as prescribed by the laws of the State of Texas. The Judge shall be appointed for a term of office running concurrently with that of the Mayor.

Immediately following the swearing in of the new City Marshal by Mayor Gil Patschke, Commissioners Ralph Franse and Fred Chandler and Marshal Mitchell began compiling a list of requirements for the new police car the city will purchase for the Marshal.

The remainder of the meeting consisted of discussion of the duties and functions of both new positions, so that all would have a good understanding of the situation right from the beginning.

Others present for the special meeting were Janie Bowery, city clerk; and Charles Aycock, city attorney. Justice of the Peace Ray Mears also attended

penalties these students will be permitted to finish their schooling as long as their behavior is befitting of a student of Farwell High School. And finally, "Be it resolved: That if these students accept these penalties in good graces and fulfill their obligation of being a good stu-

dent of this high school, this board places before them the challenge of being a good, useful and proud citizen of this wonderful land we live in, and places confidence that they can and will succeed."

Garza, Lucio and Sutton are seniors at Farwell High School. The student considered to be a junior (Cantu) would be placed on 10 months "probation" and later the board would reconsider his complete re-instatement provided he had not broken any school regulations. Kaltwasser told the parents that if they were not satisfied with the board's decision they had the right to appeal the decision to the Texas Commissioner of Education and then to the Texas Board of Education. There was no indication that appeal would be made.

Board members pointed out that the board is limited to taking action on those students who were convicted of a misdemeanor or a felony and only those four students present fell into that category.

Other adults involved in the "pot party" were not brought before the school board because they are not students in the Farwell school system.

In further action, the board appointed in-coming superintendent Perkins the official textbook custodian, effective July 1, when he becomes superintendent of Farwell Schools. The board set the date of the board of school tax equalization as July 7.

**Texico Marshal To Enforce Dog Laws**

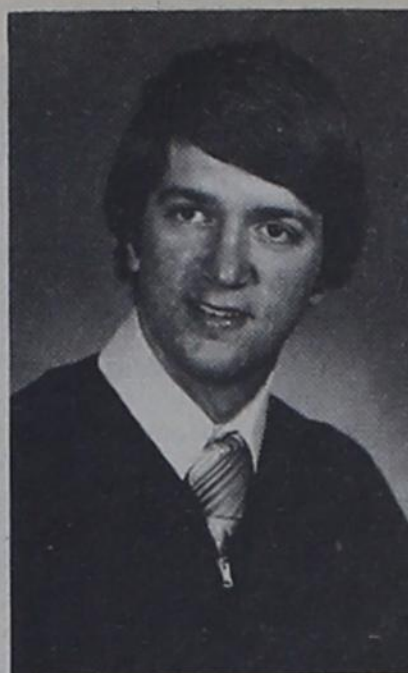

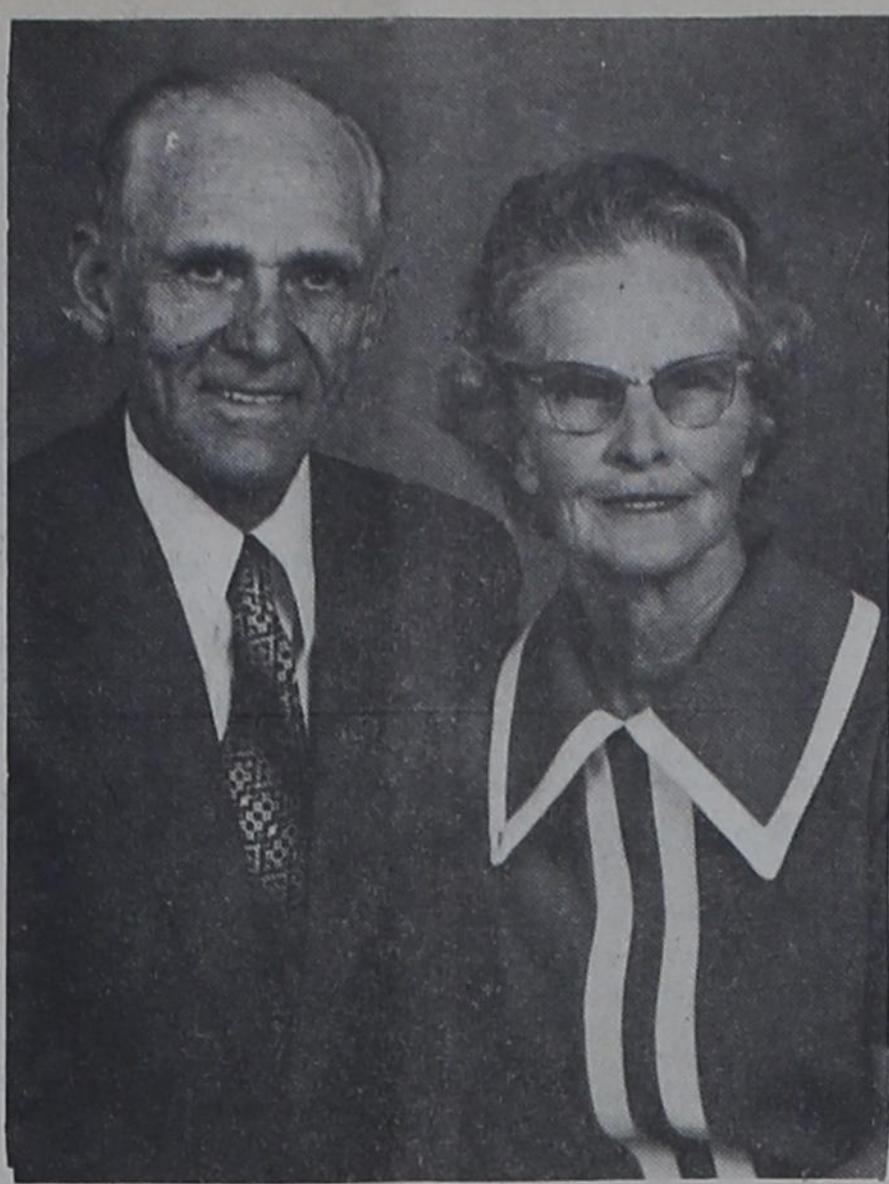

### ORDINANCE #76

AN ORDINANCE PROVIDING FOR FILLING THE OFFICE OF JUDGE OF THE MUNICIPAL COURT BY APPOINTMENT AS AUTHORIZED BY LAW.

WHEREAS, Article 1197a, Re-

vised Civil Statutes as enacted by House Bill No. 53, passed by the Regular Session of the 53rd Legislature, 1953, authorizes the governing body of cities operating under the general laws to provide for the filling of the office of Judge of the Municipal Court by appointment.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FARWELL, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. After the effective date of this ordinance the office of Judge of the Municipal Court shall be filled by appointment by the City Commission.

SECTION 2. The Judge of the Municipal Court shall perform the duties as prescribed by the laws of the State of Texas.

SECTION 3. The Judge shall be appointed for a term of office running concurrently with that of the Mayor. He shall receive such compensation as the City Commission shall fix by ordinance or resolution and shall furnish such surety bond as may be required by the City Commission, the premium to be paid by the City.

SECTION 4. The effective date of this ordinance shall be the 12th day of May, 1975.

### ORDINANCE #77

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE OFFICE OF CITY MARSHAL FOR THE CITY OF FARWELL, TEXAS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF FARWELL, TEXAS:

Section 1. There is hereby created and established the City Marshal Department for the City of Farwell, Texas.

Section 2. The City Marshal Department of the City of Farwell, Texas, shall consist of one Chief Marshal and such additional Deputy Marshals as the City Commission may from time to time deem necessary and proper.

Section 3. The Chief Marshal and other members of the City Marshal Department shall be appointed by the Mayor, by and with the advice and consent of the City Commission.

Section 4. The Chief Marshal and members of the City Marshal Department shall take and subscribe to the official oath prescribed by the Constitution of the State of Texas,

and shall give surety bond for faithful performance of duties, payable to the City of Farwell, Texas, in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), premium for which shall be paid by the City.

Section 5. After taking and subscribing to the oath of office and giving bond as provided in Section 4 of this ordinance, a Commission shall be issued to the appointee in the following form:

CITY OF FARWELL, TEXAS  
COMMISSION

I, Gil Patschke, Mayor of the City of Farwell, Texas, do hereby, upon authority of the City Commission of said City, appoint the said \_\_\_\_\_ CHIEF MARSHAL in and for said City, with all the rights, privileges, authority and duties of a peace officer conferred by the laws of the State of Texas and the ordinances of said city.

Done at Farwell, Texas, this \_\_\_\_\_ day of \_\_\_\_\_, 1975.

(SEAL)  
Mayor, City of Farwell, Texas

Section 6. The appointment of a Chief Marshal or of any Deputy Marshal shall be made and entered in the Minutes of the City Commission at any regular or special meeting of Commission and the Commission issued to such Chief Marshal or Deputy Marshal shall become effective after the same has been signed by the Mayor, and such appointment has been entered in the Minutes.

Section 7. The position of Chief Marshal is hereby declared to be an appointive office of the city, and his term of office shall be for two (2) years, and until his successor shall have been appointed and qualified, and such term shall correspond with the term of office of the Mayor; provided, that no Marshal elected by the people shall be removed from office by the provisions of this ordinance until the term of office to which he was elected shall have expired. A Chief Marshal appointed at any time, other than at the beginning of the Mayor's term of office, shall hold office only until the end of the unexpired term of office of the Mayor, and, if such Chief Marshal is reappointed, his term of office shall be for two (2) years. Any Deputy Marshal subordinate to the Chief Marshal shall serve at the will and pleasure of the City Commission. The Chief Marshal may make recommendations to the Mayor for the appointment of Deputies, but neither the Mayor nor the City Commission shall be bound by such recommen-

dations. Section 8. A metallic badge, identifying the Chief Marshal and each Deputy Marshal as a member of the City Marshal Department, shall be issued to each member of the City Marshal Department.

Section 9. The Chief Marshal shall be the chief police officer of the City, and as such, shall have supervision over the other member of the City Marshal Department.

Section 10. The members of the City Marshal Department shall receive such compensation as the City Commission may from time to time determine.

Section 11. It is the duty of every member of City Marshal Department to preserve the peace within the limits of the City of Farwell, and to effect this purpose the officer may use all lawful means. He may interfere without warrant to suppress or prevent crime.

Section 12. Every member of the City Marshal Department shall have authority:

- (a) To execute warrants of arrest or other process issued out of the Corporation Court in said City.
- (b) To arrest without warrant in all cases where authorized by the laws of the State of Texas.
- (c) To arrest without warrant when offenses against the laws or ordinances are committed in his or their presence, or where persons are found in suspicious

places, and under circumstances which reasonably show that such persons have been guilty of some felony or breach of the peace, or threaten or are about to commit some offense against the law.

# Operation Red Ball Begins Sunday, May 18

In an effort to help save the lives of children, invalids and elderly persons, the Jaycees and Farwell Fireboys will canvass Farwell to distribute Operation Red Ball stickers to youngsters to put on their bedroom windows. The stickers indicate the room of a child or invalid or elderly person. In case of a fire, or other emergency, firemen can go directly to these rooms, speeding rescue operations by life-saving seconds.

National surveys indicate that small children usually hide under beds or in closets when fire breaks out instead of evacuating the house. As a result, these children usually suffocate before the firemen have a chance to find them. In the case of an infant, if the parents are unable to reach the room, the child is left helpless until a fireman can reach them.

The Operation Red Ball sticker is a vinyl red ball approximately four inches in diameter and is to be placed in the lower left corner of a child's bedroom window. There should be one red ball displayed for each child occupying a room. That way the firemen will know how many children to look for and will not stop until he finds all of them.

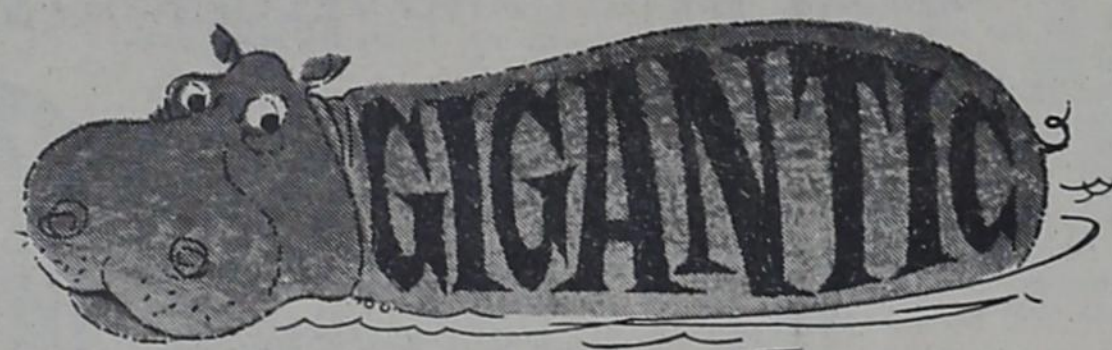

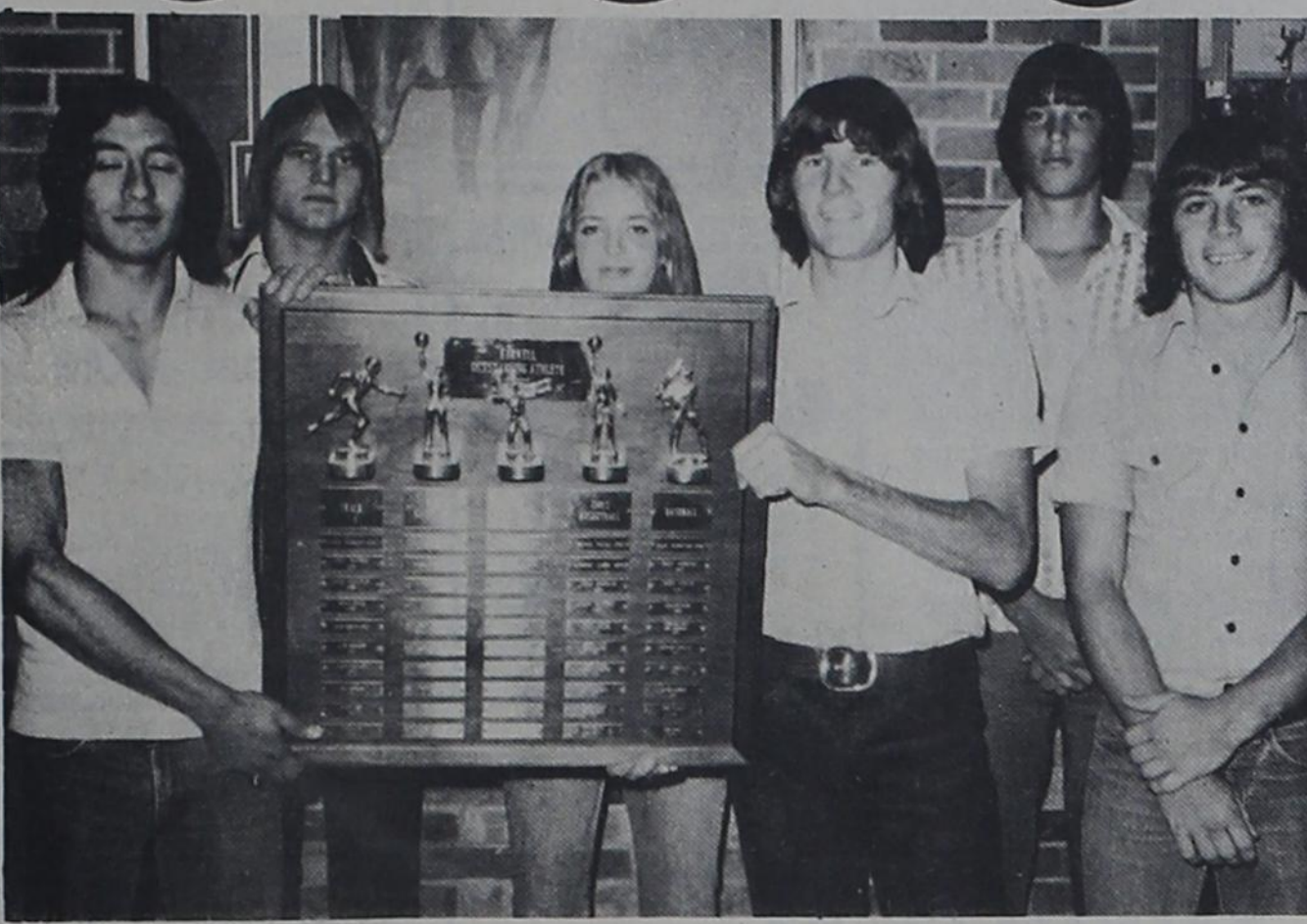

IF HE BE ABLE
"Either his uncle... or any that is nigh of kin unto him of his family may redeem him, or, if he be able, he may redeem himself" (Lev. 25:49)
Under Old Testament law one who had failed in business could sell himself, or be sold, into slavery, his master paying off his debts in lieu of salary. The slave could be redeemed, however, by his uncle or any near relative that could afford to pay off his debts, or says our passage: "if he be able, he may redeem himself." "If he be able!" Significant qualification, for what bankrupt slave was ever able to redeem himself?
In this way God would teach us an important lesson about salvation from sin. All of us have failed in business, as it were. We have amassed a huge debt of sin against God and our fellowman and have become morally and spiritually bankrupt.
We have many "nigh of kin," to us, but they are unable to redeem us because they themselves are bankrupt sinners, but there is One who has an infinite store of righteousness with which to pay our debt and redeem us. Indeed, He did pay the penalty for all our sins when He, the Holy One, died in shame and disgrace as a sinner on Calvary's cross.
He is our blessed Kinsman Redeemer, "for verily He took not on Him the nature of angels, but He took on Him the seed of Abraham" (Heb. 2:16) that He might redeem Jew and Gentile; "made for a little while lower than the angels for the suffering of death... that He, by the grace of God, should taste death for every man" (Heb. 2:9)
There are many, alas, who will not face up to their condition. They somehow think that they can still redeem themselves. To them God says: "Do it, if you are able!" To the rich young ruler who asked "What must I do to inherit eternal life," the Lord said "You know the law... this do, and you will live."
But who of us has perfectly kept the law of God? Who of us is not a repeated law-breaker in the sight of God? Who is able to redeem himself? Why not then turn from self to Christ, our rich Kinsman Redeemer. "In whom we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins, according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).

## Revenue Funds Redesignated

Parmer County Commissioners decided to redesignate the use of Revenue Sharing funds during their regular meeting conducted Monday, May 12. During the session, presided over by Parmer County Judge Paul Fortenberry, the Court voted to redesignate the funds, which will be received for the period starting April 1, 1975, and ending June 30, 1975, to public transportation.

The funds will be used for heavy machinery and its upkeep for maintenance of county roads. Funds are being put into public transportation since the Law Enforcement Center has been completed and the funds were previously being used for the construction of the new center.

Bids were opened regarding paving around the courthouse. Commissioners Court awarded Jake Diel Dirt and Paving Contractors, Inc. the contract for the low bid in the amount of \$14,877.28. Certain designated areas around the courthouse will be paved and the balance of the old pavement will be overlaid.

Judge Fortenberry was authorized by the commissioners to negotiate with certain individuals for right-of-way upon Highway 214. Upon the passage of a Resolution, certain securities were released to the First State Bank of Bovina. Commissioners also agreed to permit Western Geophysics to conduct a vibroseis survey for the City Service Company.

During the course of the meeting, items relating to the Bicentennial Celebration were discussed. Hugh Mosely, chairman of the Parmer County Historical Society met with Commissioners and displayed

some coins.

The matter of purchasing a trophy case for the front hall of the courthouse to house the coins was also discussed. It was suggested that a quotation be asked for as to the cost of this item and that both the matter of the coins and trophy case be tabled until a later date when the Commissioners have the cost estimate.

Commissioners present for the meeting included Jimmy Briggs, Cecil Atchley, Charlie Jefferson and Tom Lewellen.

Rumors that the swimming pool would not open this year in Texico were squashed during the meeting of the Texico Board of Trustees Tuesday, May 13. There are a few items that must be taken care of before the pool is opened however, according to Barry Chapman of the Environmental Improvement Agency, but the pool will be opened.

EIA Rules and Regulations regarding public swimming pools require that there be no unpaved area within the enclosed area surrounding a public pool. There is presently grass planted in this area at the Texico pool which will have to be paved. Another regulation that must be complied with is the painting of depth markers on the top edge of the pool as well as on the walls of the pool so they can be seen by swimmers.

Chapman also pointed out that there are some windows on the bathhouse that were broken out and need replacing. The doors are in need of repair as are some concrete within the bathing area that was broken and might pose a health hazard. Aside from the paving of the grassy area, there are no major problems preventing the opening of the pool.

A date for opening the pool was not decided upon, but Trustees are planning to make the necessary repairs and changes, and the pool will be opened.

Otis Huggins, representing Southwestern Public Service Company, attended the meeting to go over the street lighting agreement between his company and the City of Texico. The present contract expires June 15 and a new one was signed by Mayor Manford Turnbough during the meeting Tuesday night. The new contract shows a 14.88 percent rate of increase on the existing amount of light the City of Texico presently has.

Dale Patrick, also from the Environmental Improvement Agency, was present for the meeting and discussed the problem of solid waste and disposal regulations and how they apply to Texico. She pointed out that if the regulations, which are presently in Appealate Court, go into effect, Texico would have to change its entire system of refuse collection and disposal.

Texico citizens are presently burning flammable waste, the burnables, and the remainder is being picked up in an open truck and hauled to the dump. If the Court approves the regulations set forth by the EIA, they should go into effect by July 1 and Texico must then either go to a modified land fill or secure a variance. The major problem would be the financial aspect.

Miss Patrick told the Trustees that there is some money available from the county to help defray the cost of installing a modified land fill, though she did not know just how much would be available.

Some of the changes noted were the number of times the refuse must be picked up and how often it would have to be covered with earth; the 55 gallon containers for storage

would have to be changed to 32 gallon containers with lids and the collection truck must not be open but must be a covered vehicle.

In other business, Mrs. Norma Sanders attended the meeting to discuss what she felt was erratic operation of her water meter, showing the Trustees a diary she had kept from meter reading she had made daily.

After much discussion, the Board decided to install a new meter at her apartment house. They had previously installed a new meter, but it seems she was still having problems with the meter readings being what she felt were too great for the amount of water being used at the apartments.

Stanley Ruther, representing Harry Penrose of Clovis who is planning to put in a business in Texico, was present to discuss the necessary steps needed to open the business in Texico.

The Board approved payment of bills and the police report. Trustees decided to donate \$100 to the Eastern Plains Library for the Bookmobile which comes to Texico with books that may be checked out during the year.

Board members also approved Ordinance No. 193 pertaining to the Disposal of Waste Water, amending Ordinance 179 of the City of Texico. This action was taken in order for Texico to obtain federal funds.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Turnbough and Trustees Vane Doshier, Bill Christian and Ruby Goforth. Also present were Clara Wiehl, city clerk; Harry Patton, city attorney; Mickey Fenn, city marshal; and other city employees.

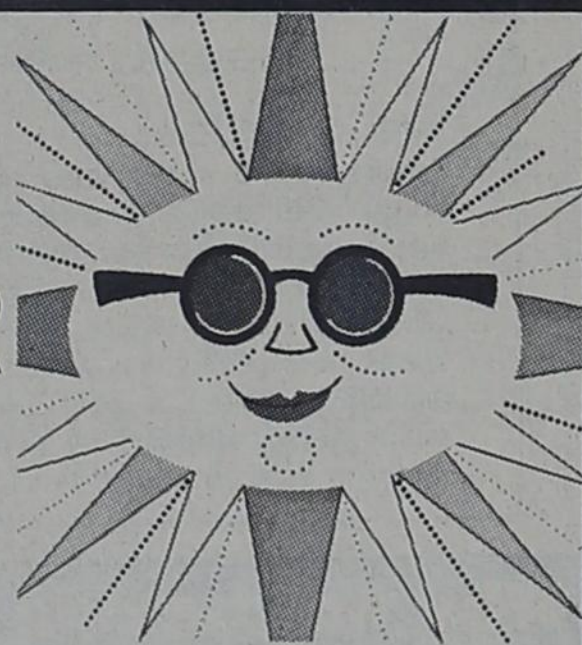
