# Local Chapters Observe National FFA Week

Texico and Farwell FFA Chapter members are joining with over 500,000 other FFA members across the United States in observance of National FFA Week February 19-26. Theme of this year's ob-

servation is "Agriculture's New Generation." National FFA Week is traditionally scheduled in February to include the date of George Washington's birthday, in observance of the first president's leadership in promoting

scientific farming practices. The FFA (Future Farmers of America) is an organization of students studying vocational agriculture in public secondary schools. The motto of the FFA is "Learning to do, doing to learn, learning to live,

living to serve." Eddie West is advisor to the Texico FFA while serving as agriculture instructor in Texico High School. Richard Montgomery holds the same position at Farwell High. (Continued on Page 2)

We have read conflicting statements about the effect the Florida freeze will have on the price of citrus fruits. We feel that the strong possibilities are that a hefty price raise is in the offing.

This seems to be the trend in many lines. If any vagaries of nature occur, it is seized upon as a reason to increase prices. It occurs to us that the candy bar is an example of a price increase being imposed when sugar was so extremely high, yet no decrease followed when the sugar prices plunged to near-record lows.

We suspect that when the coffee companies realize that they can get \$4.00 a pound with no decrease in sales it will remain at that level.

This is the thing that always amazes us: the government constantly tells everybody how poor they are, yet buyer resistance to many price raises is practically nil.

This indicates to us that the vast majority of people still have the ability to buy and pay for what they want. Ergo, there really isn't as much "poverty" as our government would have us believe.

Well, if it weren't for "poverty" in the USA we probably could balance the Federal budget. But who wants a balanced budget? Certainly not our bureaucrats.

We are fast coming upon the time when we will elect a new City Council for Farwell. At this date only one person has filed with the City Clerk. We have heard rumors of several other would-be candidates but have nothing official.

It has been a problem over the years to induce folks to serve on the City Commission, yet it is a vital and necessary public service. We note that in our exchange papers most of our area neighbors always have a rather spirited race for their local city and school board positions.

We have often wondered about this. Why doesn't Farwell have more civic-minded citizens running for the necessary offices? We do not know. Do you?

Did you hear that the Federal Energy Commission for years has been hoarding a huge supply of natural gas, stored in a big hole in the ground in the East? Yet when the demand for this stored gas arose this winter it wasn't there.

This proves that most government agencies don't know their gas from a hole in the ground.

## Three Elections Set At Farwell

Three local elections are coming up April 2 for qualified Farwell voters. Citizens will go to the polls to elect a mayor and two city commissioners in the city election. They will also be voting for two members to serve three-year terms on the board of Farwell Independent School District, and will also select five members for the Farwell Hospital District Board.

Except for the school board election where six persons have been nominated for the two positions, (see separate story) interest has been slim in the races, with Jerry J. Yows being the only person to file thus far for the mayor's post and no one having filed for the commissioners' places.

Four of the five incumbents have filed for re-election to the hospital board. They are Pudge Rose, Jim Berry, Prentice Mills and Maxine Williams.

Filing deadlines for anyone interested in running for any of the above offices are March 2 for the city offices; March 3 for the hospital board; and

March 4 for the school board. Further details about polling places and times of the elections will be announced later.

### Six Nominated For School Board Places

Six persons have been named by a nominating committee to run for the two places on the board of trustees of Farwell Independent School District in the April 2 election.

Selected to run for the places of members whose terms are expiring are Billy Mayfield, incumbent; Gary Foster, Troy Christian, Jim Walker, Jerry Darby and Joe Schilling. Besides Mayfield, the other member whose three-year term is expiring is that of R.J. (Jeter) Garner

who chose not to seek re-election.

Any person interested in running for the board posts may file by obtaining an application at the office of school superintendent James Perkins. Applications must be filed at his office no later than 5 p.m. Friday, March 4.

The election for school board members and members of the Farwell Hospital District Board will be on the same day, April 2.

## Brent Green Shows Champion Barrow At County Show

The 30th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show was held Feb. 17-19 in the Friona Community Center. A record number of 374 animals were entered by 4-H and FFA members from throughout the county. Ideal weather, bordering on springtime, prevailed during the three-day event.

The barrow show kicked off judging activities on Friday morning with 194 barrows being judged by Jim McManigal of Happy.

Lazbuddie's 16 year winning streak in the barrow division was ended when Brent Green, Farwell 4-H youngster, won grand champion barrow over all breeds and crosses with his champion Duroc.

In a highly competitive barrow show, Friona and Farwell youngsters had four of the five breed winners, two each. Only in the cross breed division did Lazbuddie manage a champ, and that entry, shown by Mickey Powell, was reserve champion.

Green's Duroc was the first non-Lazbuddie shown barrow to win the county show since E.C. Wilson of Friona won it with a Poland China in 1960, reports Mack Heald, Parmer County Extension Agent. The last time a Farwell youngster won a show was in 1959 when Dickie Gerles won it with a Berkshire.

Brent Inman, Farwell FFA, had the champion Hampshire with his medium weight entry. Friona youngsters had the champion Chester White and the champion Poland.

The lamb show followed in the afternoon with over 100 animals being shown to Travis Allen of Vancourt, Tex. This year's show featured several more lamb classes within the

breeds than in past years, said Heald, as well as a grand and reserve grand champion over all breeds.

Youngsters from each of the four schools won breed championship honors, but Lazbuddie FFA members won grand and reserve. Randy Smith showed the grand with his champion medium wool and Mike Windham showed reserve grand with his reserve champion mediumwool.

Tammie Smith, also of Lazbuddie, had the champion

finewool cross. Kelly Mitchell, Farwell FFA, exhibited the champion Dorset. A Bovina youngster had the champion Southdown and a Friona FFA member exhibited the champion finewool.

Dr. John McNeil of Amarillo judged the steer show on Friday night. David Lust, Lazbuddie 4-H member, exhibited the grand champion steer with his 1125-pound heavyweight Angus. This was the first time since 1965 that an Angus steer had won this

show, Heald reported. The reserve grand champion steer was shown by Danny Powell of Lazbuddie. All six steer classes were won by Lazbuddie youngsters.

Other Farwell winners included, steers: Joe Haseloff, second place lightweight, and fourth place medium lightweight; Kim Marsh, fifth place lightweight; Gary John Haseloff, sixth place heavyweight; and fifth place light heavyweight.

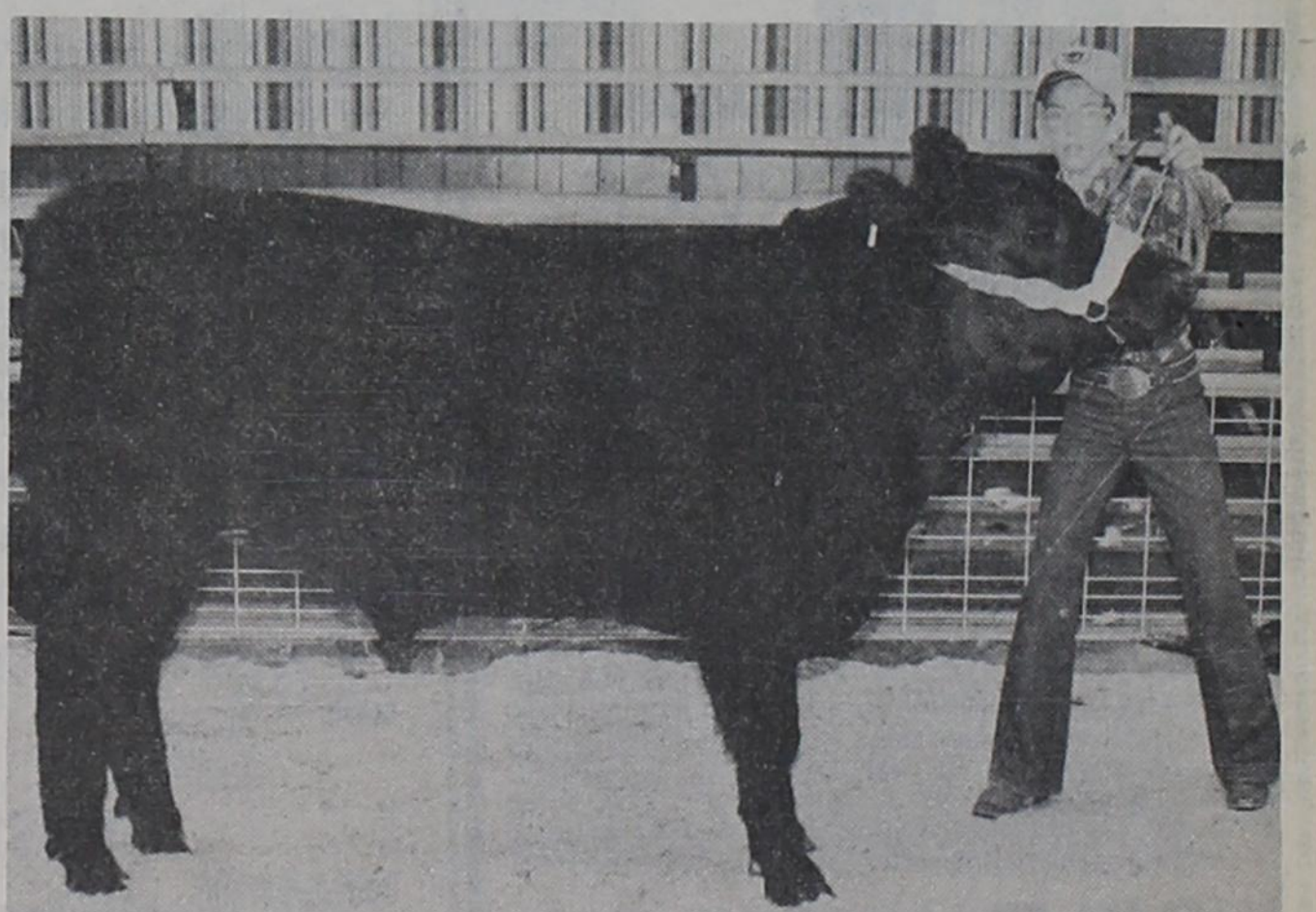
### Lazbuddie School Board Calls Election

The ag classes at Texico are currently involved in working on the new ag farm located near the city dump grounds. FFA members have been clearing the ground and building panels and feeders for the farm.

Judging teams are also practicing for upcoming meets with the livestock team having already participated in a meet at Friona last Saturday. Richard Hadley won fourth place individual honors at this contest. The team will compete at Melrose on March 5.

Farwell's FFA Chapter has also been busy during the year with various projects and activities.

In November the parliamentary procedure team competed

in a contest at Friona. Members of the senior division team were Randy Geries, Tim Bartley, Brent Inman, Ricky Coleman, David Kube, and Mark Miller. FFA Advisor Richard Montgomery says that several boys also worked hard for this activity in the junior division but did not compete. These boys were Troy Coleman, Roger Johnson, William Martin, Theodore Mesman, Tom Mesman, Jack Wardlaw, Alan Warren, Richard Winegeart and Benny Yruegas.

Several FFA members have shown livestock in the recent Farwell Livestock Show and the Parmer County Livestock Show. John Johnson of the Farwell chapter also attended the arc welding course that was sponsored at the high school in January.

They have worked on several money-raising projects, including the sale of fruit and dates in December, and the sale of vests and stadium cushions during December.

Montgomery says that the boys have started to work in the ag shop and that current plans call for building a hog trailer. Several members will be showing animals at the livestock show at Houston starting Monday of next week.

Other upcoming events include the FFA annual banquet which is scheduled for March 19. Judging teams will soon be formed for soil, livestock and possibly wool judging, says Montgomery.

**Country Club Sets Special Meeting**

Farwell Country Club is facing dire financial problems, says Walter Hughes, board chairman, and as a result a special meeting is slated for Monday night, Feb. 28, at 7:30 p.m. CST at the country club.

Letters announcing the meeting and explaining the financial situation were mailed to members last week. According to the club board, members must show an interest by attending the meeting and trying to solve the problem.

Hughes says that non-members are also invited to express their opinions. Even though they may not have a vote in the situation, their possible solutions for solving the problems facing the club will be "welcome and appreciated."

The action by the local board was prompted two weeks ago when they received notification from the district director of Farmers Home Administration advising them

that a more consistent payment plan must be developed. The letter also requested that a lump sum payment be made now to reduce the debt.

Hughes says that even though the club has made 12 consecutive payments, the total amount paid on the loan "has not amounted to very much." Since the lump sum payment must be made by March 2, a decision has to be made immediately. Hughes says it is extremely important that club members attend this meeting as it could decide the fate of the community's recreational facilities at the country club.

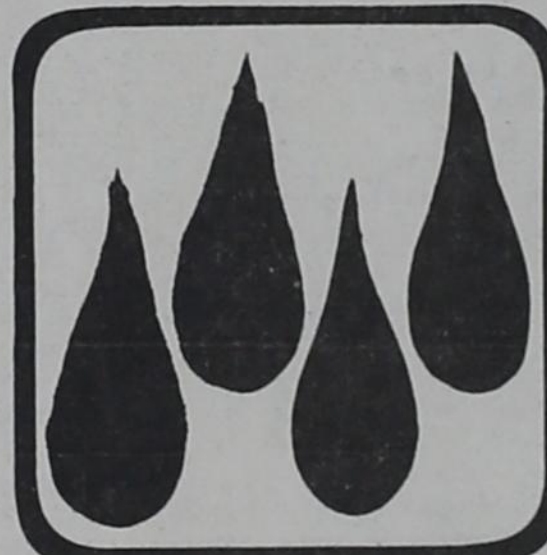

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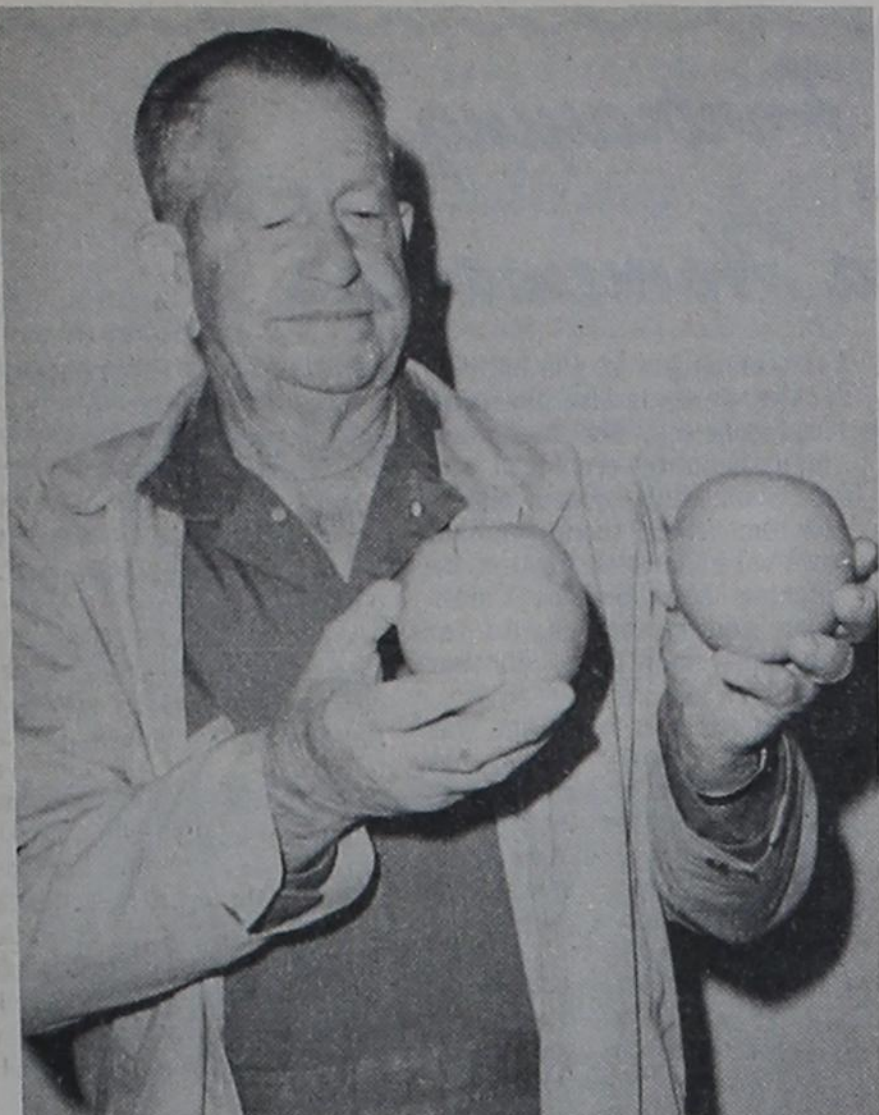
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**Oranges, Not Grapefruit - -**

He said the history of the oranges is quite unusual as Weslaco had received 40 inches of rain this year, delaying the harvest by about a month. **Council Tackles Lengthy Agenda**

Texico City Council conducted a lengthy meeting Tuesday night. A main topic of discussion was the re-opening of the city swimming pool. A discussion relative to the work which needs to be done before the pool can be opened was conducted by the Council members; two environmentalists from Clovis, Cade Lancaster and Barry Chapman; and James Shaw of Portales, building contractor. Since the consensus was that they needed a "first hand look" at the pool, they all agreed to meet at the swimming pool next Tuesday afternoon at 4:30 MST.

In other business the Council approved the Texico Woman's Club project to replace house numbers in Texico with the kind that glow in the dark, and agreed to help with the cost of the numbers. It was pointed out that many houses have incorrect numbers on them and that it is sometimes difficult for the volunteer fire department to locate the right residence when they are answering a call.

The Council also okayed the request of Shaw to install water and sewer lines in the alley of Block 17 of the G. Clark Smith addition. Shaw said that in the future he plans to build two "fourplexes" in Texico.

The first aid class offered by the Texico Volunteer Fire Department was also discussed. The first four-hour session was to begin Thursday night at the fire hall at 6 p.m. The two-part course will conclude next Thursday night at the same time and location.

In other business the Council okayed the purchase of three-inch fire hose for the fire department. Bids are to be opened at a later date.

Approval was granted to City Clerk Clara Wehl to attend the 1977 Joint Managers and Clerk's Conference to be held April 19-21 at Mesalero, N.M.

The Council also approved Water Superintendent Billy Hammit's request to hire Roland Goforth to help him change several water meters. Randy Gleaton was granted a permit to park his mobile home on South Rose in the Marshal Addition.

Donnie Morris reported to the Council that a 45 calibre slug had been fired into his mobile home which is parked near the Texico-Farwell Lions Club Trap Shoot. He said he dug the bullet out of the wall in his home, adding that it had "passed over the head of one of his sleeping children." Morris indicated that the shot was fired from the caliche pit at the shooting range. He said he has purchased the property where his mobile home is located and did not feel that he "would be able to just pick up and move." However, as Morris has four small children, he says he is concerned about their safety.

Members of the Council shared Morris' concern, but indicated that since the caliche pit and shooting range are located in Texas they have no jurisdiction, however they said they would approach the proper authorities to see if the matter could be straightened out. Texico City Marshal Mickey Fenn said he would photograph the point in the wall where the bullet entered and the surrounding area in order to have "proof" to show to the authorities.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Manford Turnbough; trustees, Marie Christian, Bill Thigpen, Vane Doshier and Max Carter; city employees Billy Hammit, Fenn, and Mrs. Wehl; and Lancaster, Shaw, Chapman and Morris.

At the end of the first quarter Texico's J.V. led 13-8. In the second quarter Texico again led 40-25, and at the end of the third quarter Texico led 50-34. Other scorers were Eddie Chavers with 8 and Don Duncan with 7. Lyndon Donahy, James Barfield, and Jimmy Red, all

made 4 points each. Robert Lacy had 3, while Steve Doolittle, Justin Gaddis, Greg Howard, Dusty Casey and Keith Hadley all had 2 points.

Getting something useful from Washington may sometimes seem unlikely, but here's one suggestion you can't pass up. To know what's coming up this year in the area of food and agriculture policy considerations write the Superintendent of Documents, Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20250, and ask for a copy of *Farm and Food Policy 1977*. The material has been compiled and prepared by the U.S. Senate Committee on Agriculture and gives detailed information on policy considerations coming up this year. Included are such areas as: target price levels, whether a commodity reserve will be established, revision of the Food Stamp Program, questions of disaster insurance, and a number of other subjects most of which will affect all agricultural producers. Cost of the publication is listed as \$2.70.

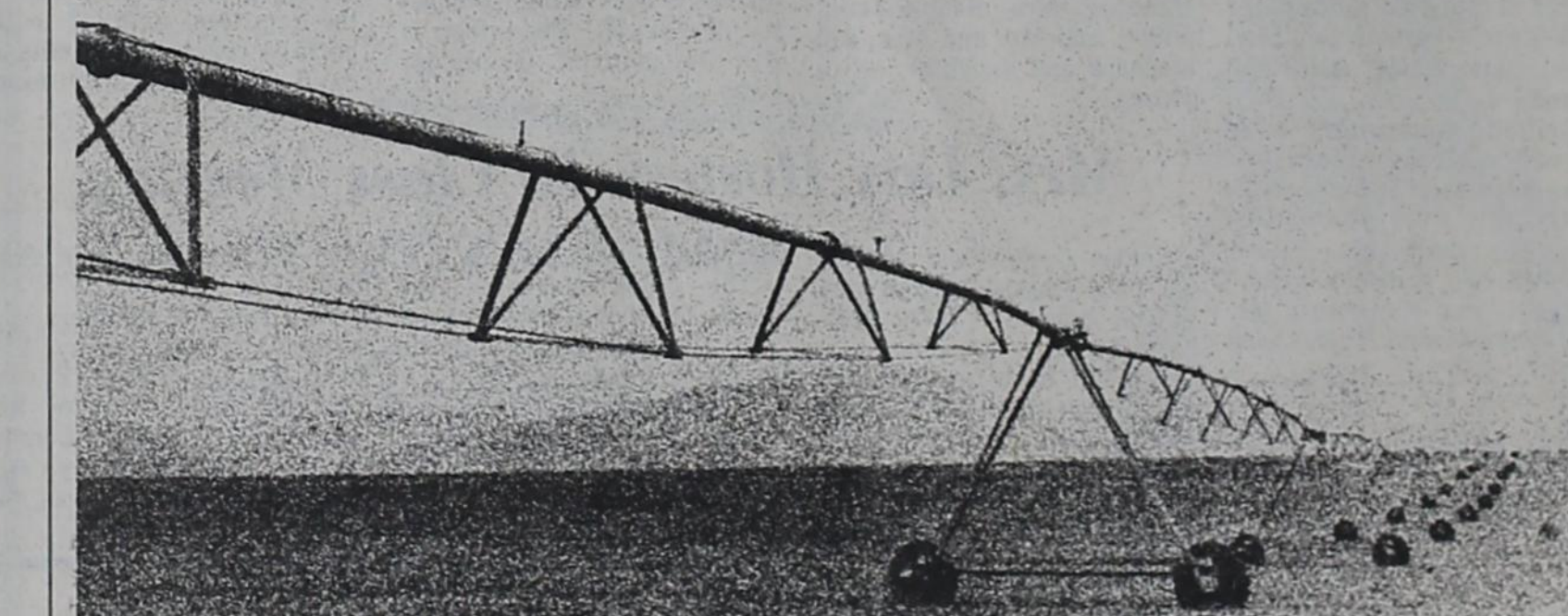

"NUMBERED WITH THE TRANSGRESSORS"

"And the Scripture was fulfilled, which saith, And He was numbered with the transgressors" (Mark 15:28).  
The progressive fulfillment of this passage from Isaiah 53 is the amazing story of our Lord's three baptisms.  
First, this prophecy must be applied to our Lord's incarnation. Born a babe at Bethlehem, He was baptized into the human race, becoming, not merely one with us, but one of us, a true human being, though still also "very God." This is how He was first "numbered with the transgressors."  
Later the Lord was baptized again, this time with water, by John the Baptist. John's baptism was unto "repentance for the remission of sins" and those who responded came to his baptism "confessing their sins" (Mark 1:4-5). Little wonder that John at first refused to baptize this sinless One, saying: "I have need to be baptized of Thee, and comest Thou to me?" But the Lord insisted, saying: "Thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness" (Matt. 3:13-15). Thus our Lord joined repentant sinners in baptism and was, in this practical

## Winds Damage Roof

Winds that reportedly gusted at 90 miles per hour roared through the Twin Cities Tuesday, taking a section of the roof of Texico School's new gym with it. The incident occurred late in the school day when only a few persons were inside the building and no one was injured.

The wind reportedly hit 90 miles per hour as recorded on gauges from an area TV weather station at approximately the same time the roof was blown off.

Jim Pierce, superintendent of Texico Schools, said that the damaged area was in the northwest corner of the roof and measured about 25 x 30 feet. Pierce said that insurance adjusters were to be on the scene Wednesday to determine the amount of damage.

## Mahon Asks - -

### More Disaster Aid, Increased Supports

Congressman George Mahon was the lead-off witness at hearings on the new farm program held by the House Agriculture Committee on February 17. In his testimony Mahon stressed the need for improved disaster provisions and an increase in support loan rates. He also advocated an expansion of the Farmers Home Administration loan programs.

"With costs of production in modern farming operations as high as they are today there is nothing more important to farmers in West Texas than a continuation and improvement of the present disaster program," Mahon said. He expressed strong opposition to proposals whereby a Federal Crop Insurance scheme would replace the disaster program.

"The high costs of production also make it imperative that we take steps to expand the credit programs of the Farmers Home Administration," continued the Congress-

man. "Without big agriculture there is no way to produce the volume of farm crops which have made it possible for agriculture not only to meet domestic requirements but to export farm commodities at the rate of about 20 billion dollars a year."

Mahon in his testimony

insisted that any new legislation should contain an ironclad prohibition against embargoes on farm exports, citing the havoc created in the market by grain embargoes of recent years and the fact that grain prices have not yet recovered.

The Congressman conceded that the Committee might

have insufficient time to overhaul the farm program in this session and indicated that he would not have strong objection to a one-year extension of the present program provided that it contained necessary modifications, including an increase in loan rates on farm commodities, particularly feed grains.

The Agriculture Committee hearings are scheduled to continue until March 17.

## Sheriff's Report

Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace reported that four men entered guilty pleas during the Monday district court sessions with District Judge Pat Boone Jr., presiding.

Christopher Webster of Indiana received two probations of four years each-to run concurrently-for two counts of credit card abuse. Alvin Eugene Arnold of Indiana was given four years probation for rape.

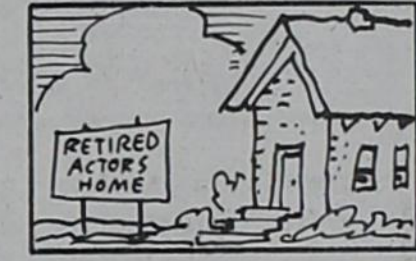
