What price Democracy? When it comes to considering the present day cost of a vote, the answer is high. This is in a large part due to the Federal Voting Rights Act (VRA) passed by Congress in 1975. This act requires that an area with a certain minority percentage of population be required to use the primary language of the minority, as well as English, in the election material. In the case of Texas, that language is Spanish.

An example of the cost per vote getting out of hand is found in this month's issue of "The Cross Section," the monthly publication of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District. The article recounts that the cost per vote in the District's election conducted in January of 1975 was \$4.16 per vote. In the election held in January 1977, the figure was \$38.74 per vote.

Yes, had more votes been cast, the cost per vote would come down considerably, yet the latter figure is so much higher that it will be impossible to ever bring the cost down to anywhere near the 1975 election figure. Incidentally, no person with a Spanish surname voted in the District's 1977 election.

Farwell C of C Banquet Set Thursday Evening

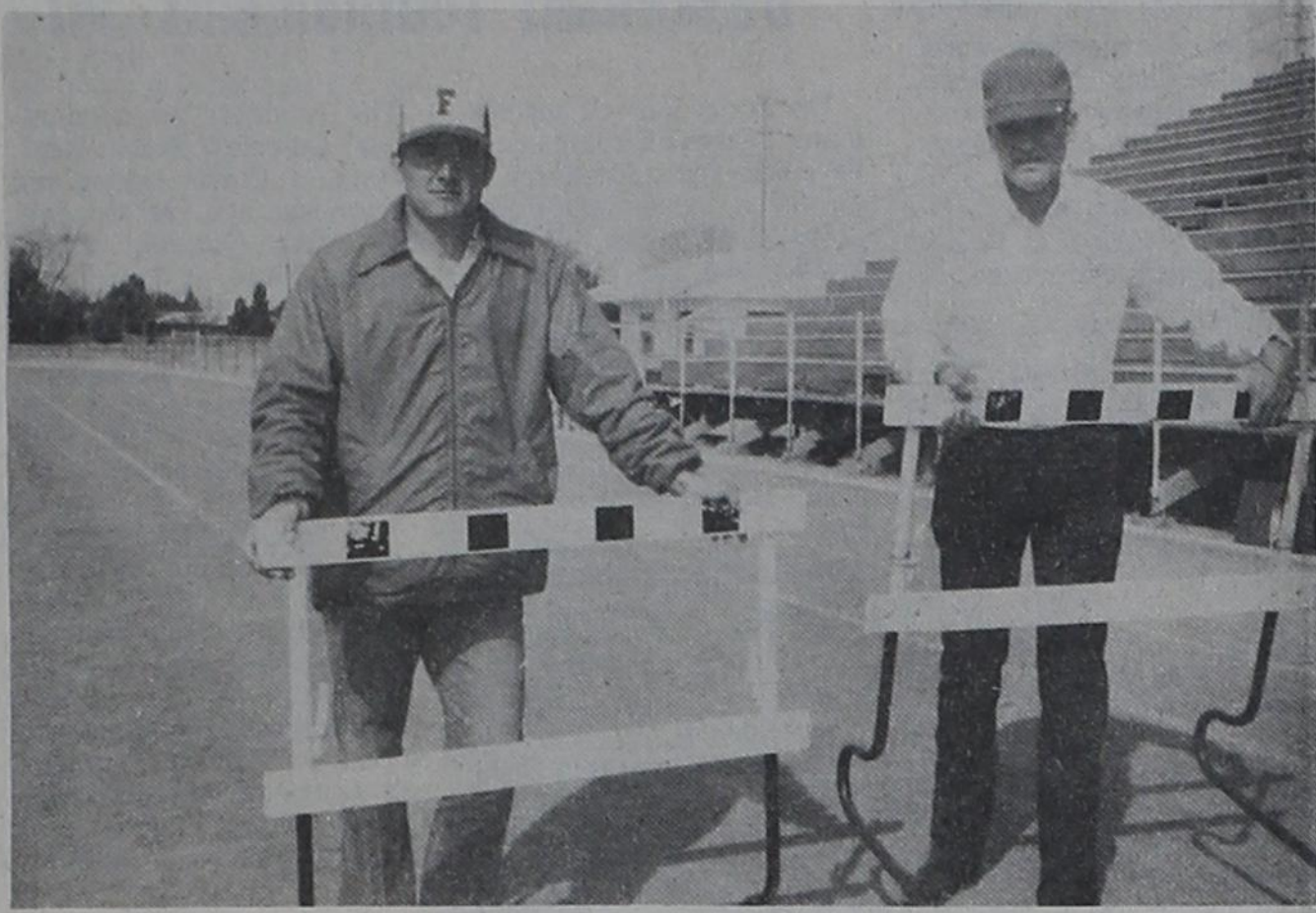

Texico Council Discusses Pool

Texico City Council met Tuesday night to consider the plight of the city's swimming pool which the city, in conjunction with the Texico Woman's Club, is seeking to reopen.

Last week a special meeting was held at the site of the pool and representatives of the council, woman's club and the Environmental Improvement Agency in Clovis discussed the facilities and what needs to be done. The result of that meeting outlined a few basic things which must be done before the pool can be opened for public use. Besides a general clean up and fresh coats of paints,

the sagging cement between the pool and the dressing areas must be repaired.

After discussing the issue, the Council authorized Clara Wehl, city clerk, to contact Larry Fallis of the Eastern Plains Planning Council regarding the acquisition of necessary funds to construct a new swimming pool.

Two Texico citizens appeared before the Council to voice separate requests which were approved. Walter Crocker who lives on Kindred Avenue asked that a street light and sign be placed there near his residence. The Council noted that at the present time no street

lights exist in that area. However, they gave tentative approval to the project contingent on funding, agreeing that the city would "try to correct the situation in the next few months."

A.A. Gonzales of Florence Street was given permission to park a railroad boxcar at his residence for storage purposes.

Mayor Manfred Turnbough called a special meeting for next Tuesday, Mar. 15, to survey the conditions of the city. A tour will also be conducted of the city's facilities. The appraisal is a preliminary step in attempting to

City Race Tops - -

Farwell Elections Stir Candidate Interest

When Farwell voters go to the polls on April 2, they will be faced with the names of 16 candidates vying for the 10 offices to be decided by the elections.

Citizens will be casting their ballots in the Farwell city election, and the Farwell Independent School Board District and Farwell Hospital Board election all on the same date.

After the votes are counted, either Walter Kaltwasser or Jerry Yows will be the mayor of Farwell for the next two years as Mayor Gil Patschke has decided not to seek re-election.

Two places on the city commission will be decided between the three candidates

who have filed for these positions. Incumbent Fred Chandler, Johnny Curtis and Truman McKillip are seeking election to the two two-year terms which expire this year. Incumbent Ralph Franse has also chosen not to seek another term.

The Farwell Independent School District Board of Trustees will also have two new members after the votes are counted as six people have joined the race to fill the two three-year terms just ending. Troy Christian, Gary Foster, Jim Walker, Jerry Darby and Joe Schilling, along with incumbent Billy Mayfield, are seeking the expired terms. Incumbent R.J. Garner decided not to seek re-election.

The results of the Farwell Hospital District Board will be less of a question as the five incumbents are running unopposed. Seeking another two-year term each are Maxine Williams, Bob Anderson, Pudge Rose, Prentice Mills, and Jim Berry.

"With response from 51 per cent of the club's members, 41 per cent of our goal has been reached," says Walter Hughes, president of the Farwell Country Club Board.

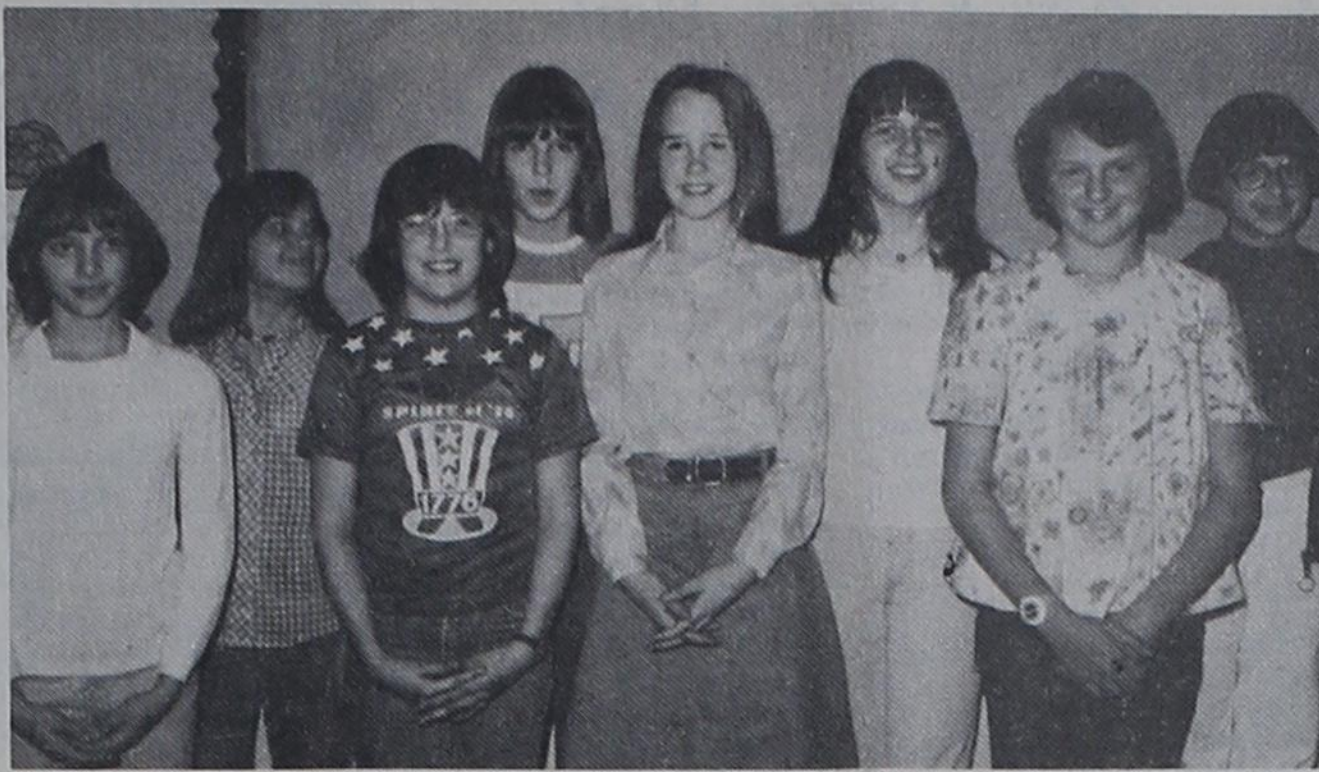
The country club last week initiated a fund drive to raise \$126,631.50 to alleviate the club's indebtedness to the

School Board Approves Re-organization Plan

The re-organization plan for the Farwell School District was approved at the Monday night meeting of the Farwell School Board. These services will be conducted daily at 10 a.m. and 8 p.m. Sunday services will be at 10:45 a.m. and 6 p.m.

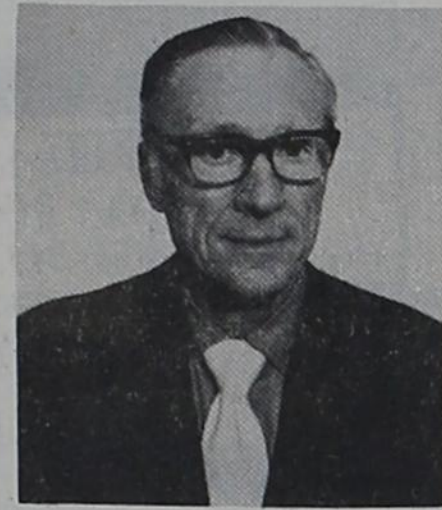
Included in the meetings will be congregational singing and Bible-centered messages by Mickey.

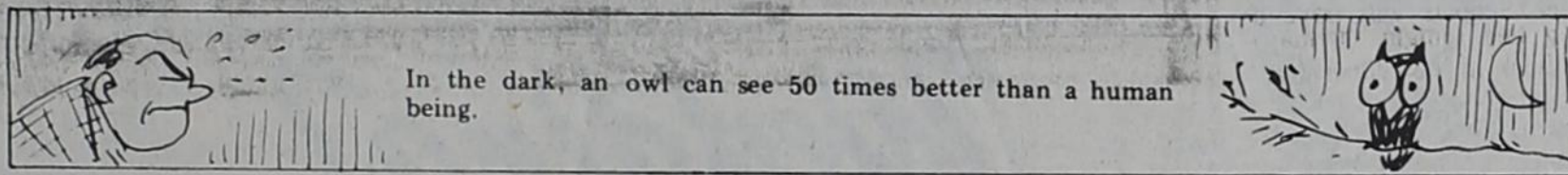
Mickey is no stranger to Farwell having preached here in 1968, 1970, 1971 and 1974. Leonard Harper, minister of

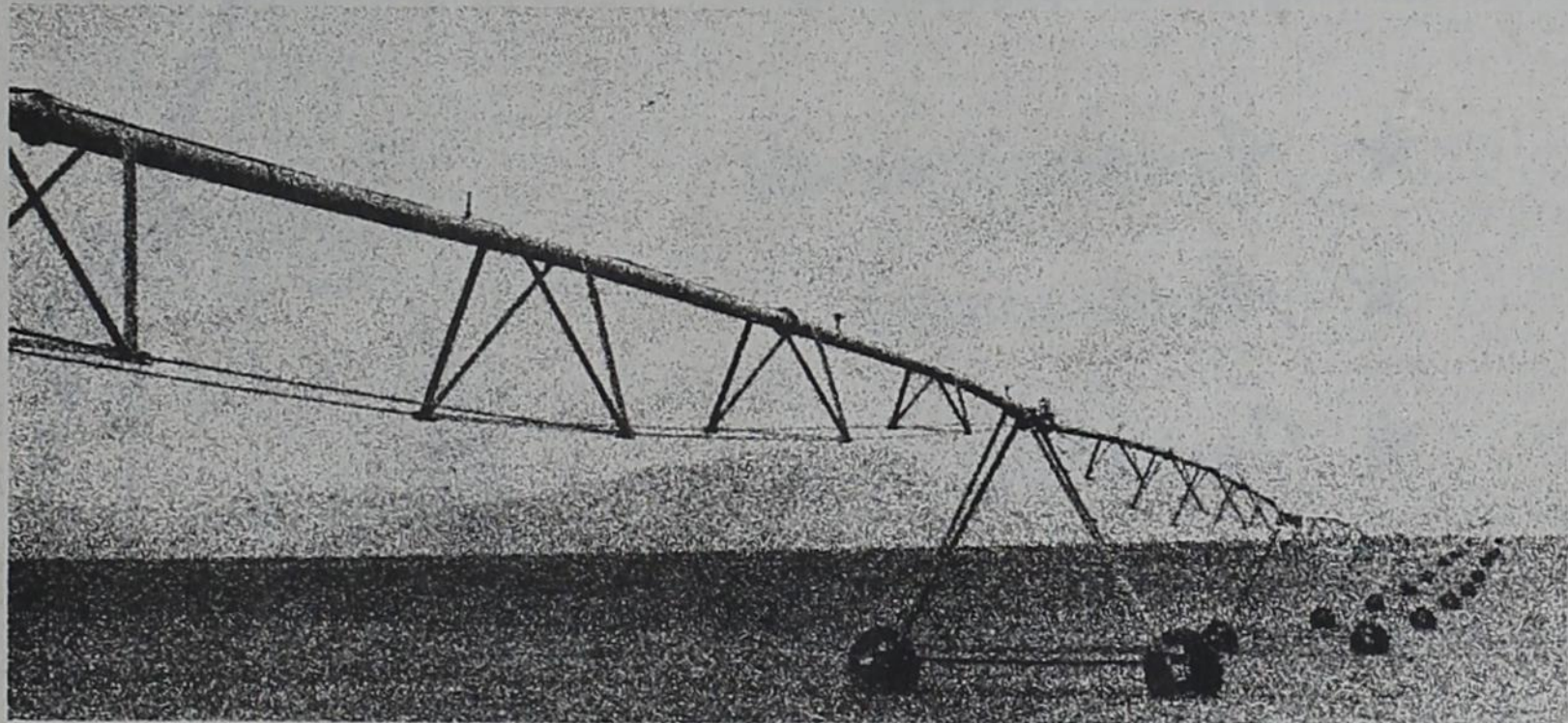

She has been married for 18 months and has lived all her married life in this area. Jan met her husband in a "round about way" while attending Mansfield State College in Pennsylvania. Larry was a vocational agriculture student at Texas A&M University at the time.

"We met in a rather complicated way," Jan explained. "My husband's best friend married my cousin and Larry was the best man. We became pen pals," continues our homemaker, "and in due time we decided to get married."

Jan was a third year student majoring in English education when she discontinued her studies to become Mrs. Jones. She explained that she chose English as her major because she always liked to read and write. "It always seemed to come easy to me," she said, "at least a lot easier than math and science."

Jan also liked photography and regrets not having been able to take the course at college. "It was a small school and the course was only open to seniors," she said. "I probably could have gotten in the year I left," she explained.

Our homemaker has three recipes which she consented to share with our readers.

APPLE CRISP

2 c. sliced apples
1/2 t. cinnamon
1/2 c. water
1/2 c. sugar
3/8 c. sugar
1/2 c. shortening
3/4 c. flour
1/4 t. salt

Wash, pare, core and slice two cups of apples. Place into a greased baking dish. Add 1/2 t. cinnamon, 1/2 c. water and 1/2 c. sugar.

Mix 3/8 c. sugar with 1/2 c. shortening, 3/4 c. flour and 1/4 t. salt until mixture is crumbly.

Sprinkle crumbs over the apples and bake at 350 degrees for about one hour.

TUNA NOODLE CASSEROLE

one can cream of mushroom soup
1/2 c. milk
2 small or 1 large can tuna fish
2 c. egg noodles

Make a mushroom sauce with cream of mushroom soup, milk and tuna. Cook 2 cups of noodles in salted water

until partially done (about 8-10) minutes. Combine noodles and sauce. Pour into casserole. Bake 350 degrees uncovered in a greased casserole dish for approximately 30 minutes.

MAGIC COOKIE BARS

1/2 c. butter or margarine
1 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs
1 can Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk (not evaporated milk)
1 package (6 oz.) semi-sweet chocolate chips
1 can (3 1/2 oz) flaked coconut
1 c. chopped nuts

In 13 x 9-inch pan, melt butter. Remove from heat. Sprinkle crumbs over butter. Top with chocolate chips, coconut and nuts, press down gently. Pour sweetened condensed milk evenly over all the ingredients.

Bake at 350 degrees for 25 minutes or until golden brown. Cool. Cut into 3 x 1 1/2 inch bars.

Getting the cart before the horse is not a bad way to summarize the problem faced late last year in one of the world's hungriest countries, India. An all-out agricultural development effort combined with the good fortune of ideal monsoon rains produced such a bumper crop of food grains that it forced officials to store nearly 20 million tons. Unfortunately, India's storage capacity is severely limited... so limited that the government is storing about half the grain in the open covered by plastic sheets. Rather than risk the loss of the food grains, officials are seriously considering exporting it. Hopefully the situation will make clear the necessity for adequate grain storage. Development of such systems would protect the temporary surpluses produced in their own countries as well as give them the capacity to purchase imported grain on a regular basis. Preferably from American farmers.

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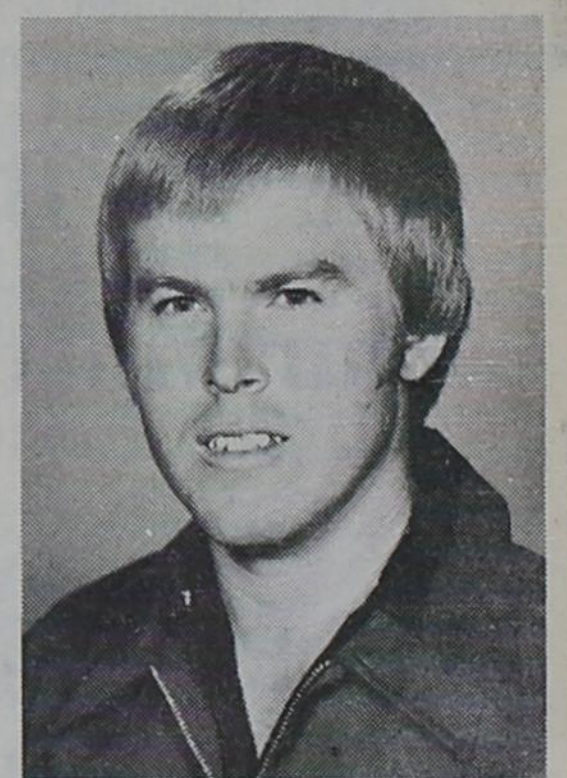

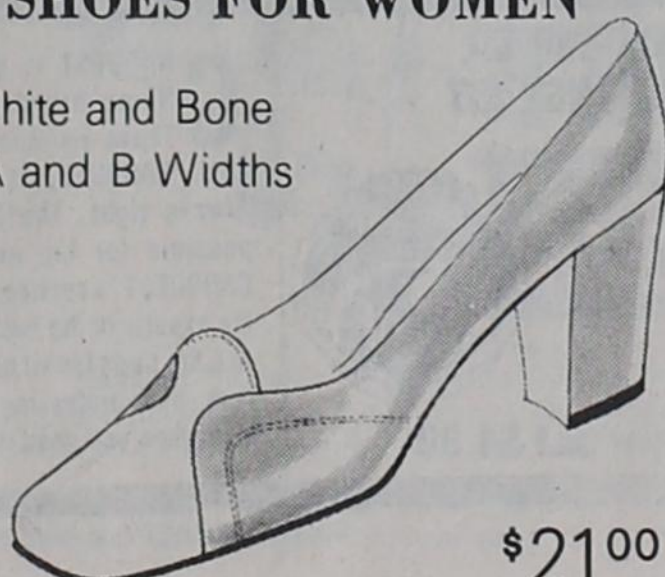

Leading rebounders were Lisa Coffey and Delinda Dun-

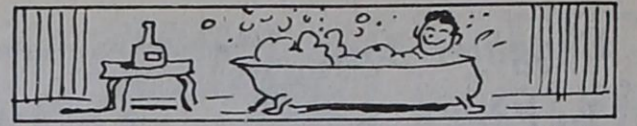

JV Steerette Season Wrap-Up Presented

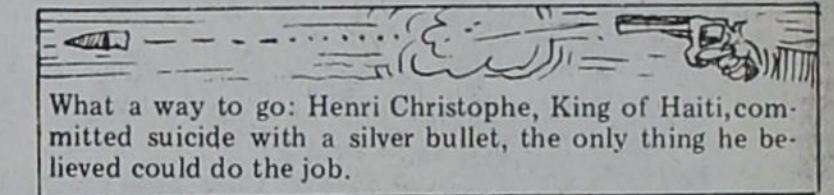
The Steerettes Junior Varsity team ended the 1976-77 campaign with a 9-4 record.

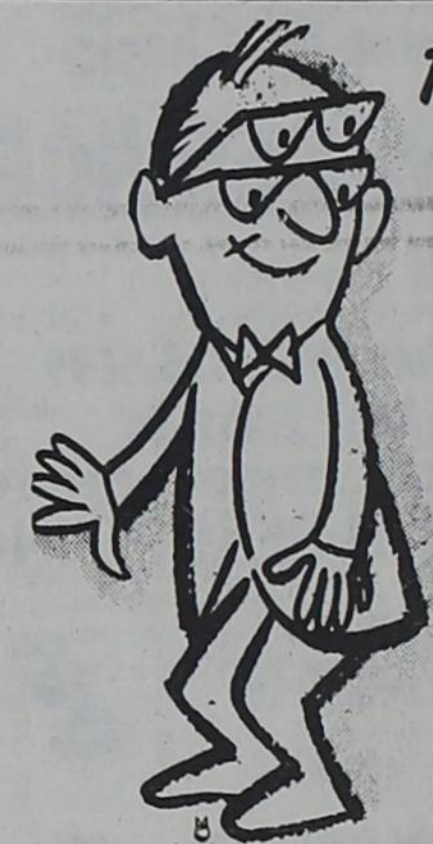
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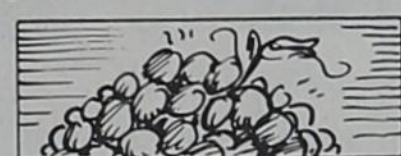
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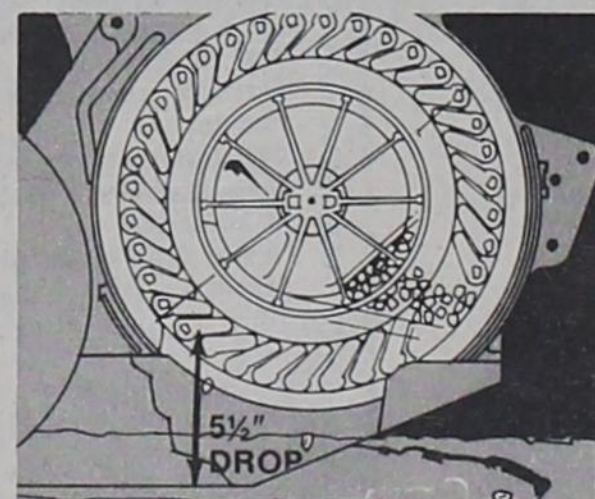

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TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

BY CORNELIUS R. STAM, PRES. BEREAN BIBLE SOCIETY CHICAGO, ILLINOIS 60633

PAUL'S THREE "I AM'S"

Three times in Rom. 1:14-16, the Apostle Paul uses the phrase "I am..." and each one carries an important message for every true believer in Christ.

First, he says in Verse 14: "I am debtor" - debtor to all men to tell them about the saving work of Christ. But why was he indebted to people he had never even seen? For several reasons:

First, he had in his hand what they needed to be saved from the penalty and power of sin. If I see a drunkard lying across the railroad track and I do nothing about it, am I not a murderer if he is killed? If I see a man drowning and I have a life buoy in my hand but do not throw it to him, am I not a murderer if he goes down for the last time? If I see millions of lost souls about me and, knowing the message of salvation do not tell them, am I not guilty if they die without Christ?

Further, Paul felt himself a debtor to others, because the Christ who had died for his sins had also died for the sins of others. As he says in II Cor. 5:15: "Christ died for all, that they which live should not henceforth live unto themselves but unto Him who died for them and rose again."

Finally, the Christ who had died for Paul's sins, had commissioned him to tell others of His saving grace. Thus he says in I Cor. 9:16:17: "Woe unto me if I preach not the gospel! For... a dispensation of the gospel is committed unto me."

Paul could say further what every true believer should be able to say: "Not 'But' but 'SO' as much as in me is I AM READY" (Rom. 1:15). He was ready to discharge his debt, because he had that with which to discharge it - the wonderful "gospel of the grace of God." And he did indeed make this message known to others with all that was in him.

And now the third "I am." 1. "I am debtor." 2. "So, I am ready."

3. "FOR I AM NOT ASHAMED of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth..." (Ver. 16). Paul was always proud to own Christ as the mighty Savior from sin. Do you know Christ as your Savior? Are you telling others about Him?

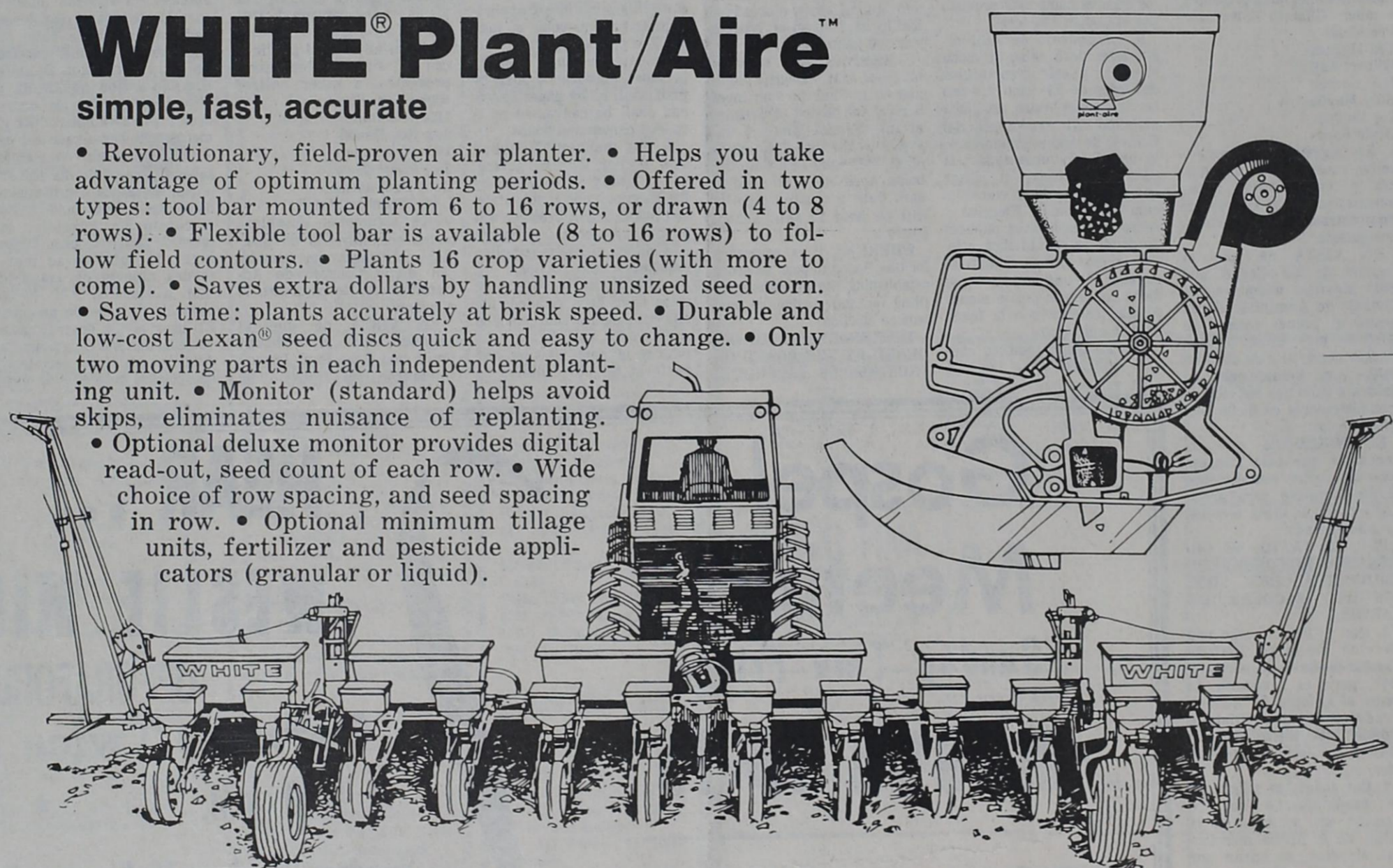
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
