## Texico Chamber Honors Woman, Man Of Year

Highlights of the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet Tuesday night was the presentation of the man and woman of the year awards. This year the special honors were awarded to Bill Thigpen and Louise Engram. Thigpen is local manager of Worley Mills, Inc., and is the fire chief of Texico Volunteer Fire Department. Mrs. Engram is the postmaster of Texico Post Office.

A capacity crowd filled the Texico School cafeteria Tuesday night for the annual Texico Chamber of Commerce Banquet. Theme for the special occasion was "Remember the Past, Live in the Present, Prepare for the Future."

Highlights of the event included presentation of the man and woman of the year awards and an address by Bruce King, former governor of New Mexico.

Outstanding man and woman of the year honors were awarded to Louise Engram, postmistress at Texico Post Office, and Bill Thigpen, manager of Worley Mills Inc., Farwell.

Mrs. Engram was born in Del Norte, Colo. She and her husband lived, farmed, and raised a family in Texico. Mrs. Engram has been involved with every phase of community and civic work and was appointed postmistress in 1965.

Thigpen was born in Pettit, Tex., Sept. 1, 1941, and moved to Texico in 1945 where he has lived ever since. As a young boy he always wanted to join the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. He served as assistant fire chief in 1963 and was fire chief in 1965. Thigpen resigned in 1966 and was re-elected in July 1976. He has also been active in many other local activities.

Former Governor King touched on six points during his sometimes serious, sometimes funny talk. He spoke highly of the agriculture industry, saying it must "prosper if everyone else is to prosper."

According to King, the key to the system is the family farm operation. King said government must be a "good partner" with the farmer by doing a good job of finding markets for the crops to enable the "farmer to get something for all the efforts, etc., he puts forth."

He cited children as an asset to any community, adding that New Mexico must "progress rapidly" in improving educational standards and finding jobs for young people or

be "left behind." King also said he is a strong advocate of vocational education.

In commenting on crime prevention, King said police departments must be improved to better enable them to combat crime in the streets as well as rural and city communities and white collar crimes.

Better preventative drug programs must also be established, King said, adding that law enforcement and families must work together to improve conditions and to prevent young lives from being wasted on drugs.

Another area deserving of attention, according to King, are roads and highways. "They must be inspected, and chug holes etc., must be repaired if a high quality of transportation is to be maintained," King said.

King also stressed that good management of the New Mexico permanent fund to prevent it from being depleted or diverted away from the original purpose, as set forth in the enabling act, must be carried out by officers of the government of the state.

King also said that the situation in the cattle industry was "leveling out" and cattle producers and feeders were "learning to live with it." King was born in Stanley, N.M., on April 6, 1924. He married Alice Marie Martin of Moriarty, N.M., and they have two children, Bill and Gary.

King is a rancher and feeder and part owner of King Butane Co., in Stanley. He graduated from Stanley High School and attended the University of New Mexico before serving in a field artillery in World War II. King is a member of Stanley

Union Church where he serves on the Board of Directors.

He is a member of the Santa Fe Chapter of American Red Cross and is on the Board of Directors of the Federal Intermediate Bank of the 9th District and also the Farm Credit Bank in Wichita, Kan.

Thigpen gave a report on the progress made in Texico during the year 1976. He said it was "less than anticipated," but indicated that future progress in the community during 1977 was already evident.

According to Thigpen three new businesses have opened in Texico during the past year, including Teresa's Mercantile (gift shop), J.O. Irrigation Service, and Talico Ceramics.

The city has also issued a permit for the establishment of a mobile home park. The K.K. (Continued on Page 2)

## Farwell Steerettes Regional Golf Champs

Farwell Steerettes, two-time defending state golf champions, rolled to a 48-stroke victory in the regional meet last week at the Golden Acres Country Club in Odessa. Farwell fired single-day totals of 350 and 345 for a meet total 695 to outdistance second-place Rankin which ended the meet with 743.

Carol Vinton led the Steerettes with a 164 and finished in a third place tie in medalist competition. Defending Class A state medalist Tina Foxwood of Memphis fired a 158 for medalist honors. Jamie Gossett of Rankin finished with 161 for second and Beverly Winters of Vega tied Vinton for third with a 164.

In overall standings in the meet, Penny Hughes finished in fifth place with 169, Kathy Booth shot 179 to end in 12th place, Lisa Hughes finished in

13th place with 183, and Deana Williams fired a 195 to take 16th in the field of 70 golfers. Memphis finished third in team competition with 765; followed by Stratford, 778; Vega, 790; McCamey, 802; Sanford-Fritch, 821; Stanton, 828; Jim Ned, 881; Knox City, 894; Lorenzo, 899; Hawley, 899; Seagraves, 986; and Clarendon, 1044.

The Steerettes will next compete in the state meet in Austin on May 5-7. This will be the third year in a row they have competed in the state meet, and have won the Class A championship the two previous years.

In other regional competition last week, Farwell totaled four points in the track competition by taking fifth place in the 880 run and the mile run.

Sherril McCully recorded her best time of the year in the mile run to take fifth in 5:59.1, while Kathy Booth recorded a 2:28.2 in the 880 run.

Judy Hardage, D'Lynn Eubank, Vicky Vinton, Sherry Perkins, and Missy Taylor also competed in track events but failed to place in the finals.

In tennis competition, doubles team Jana Berry and Sherril McCully won 6-2, 6-3 in the first match before losing by default in their second match. Kris Magnus and D'Lynn Eubank lost in their first match 6-1, 4-6, 4-6.

Singles competitors April Coffman and Jayme Berry lost in first round action 3-6, 0-6 and 2-6, 7-5, 4-6, respectively. The tennis tournament was single elimination competition.

## Farwell Chamber Discusses Membership, BTD Activities

Maybe we ought to consider some of these intangible side benefits when we give consideration to the Country Club and its present financial plight. It provides a very fine setting for the instructional and recreational use of our priceless young people.

"You did not come to this university to become a welfare recipient or freeloader - when you accept food stamps, you accept an unearned handout that other people are paying for - you do not earn food stamps or welfare payments. The price you pay for something for nothing may be more than you can afford - if you don't have the finances to complete your education, drop out a semester and go to work and save. You will have preserved your self-respect and initiative.

"Wisdom comes with experience and struggle - not just going through a university matriculation.

"Federal programs such as Medicare, Medicaid, and food stamps were socialistic devices to re-distribute the wealth. Compulsory benevolence is not charity - today's socialists - who call themselves egalitarians - are using the federal government to re-distribute wealth in our society, not as a matter of voluntary charity, but as a matter of right - the dole demoralizes man and weakens his God-given initiative and character."

Oh Ezra, what a mouthful you delivered - how few heard you - how many less will understand you.

It's not the season, but what do you need to kill a sitting duck? A quack shot, of course. What do you serve a sick duck? Soup and quackers, naturally. What do you call a duck sued for malpractice? A quack quack.

Farwell Chamber of Commerce met Tuesday at noon at Clara's Restaurant with 11 members in attendance. Chamber president Johnny Actkinson called the meeting to order after the meal and the minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

In the first order of business, Actkinson reported that the date for the 1978 Chamber of Commerce banquet had not been set. A discussion was heard concerning dates for next year's banquet.

After the discussion, the Chamber voted to hold the 1978 banquet in April. Dutch Quickel was appointed chairman of the banquet committee, with Dr. Lee Clayton and Otis Huggins as members. The committee will set the exact date for the banquet and will coordinate all the banquet details.

The Chamber noted that the Bordertown Days Rodeo will be July 29-30. A discussion was heard concerning the activities the Chamber may sponsor during the annual celebration. It was pointed out that parades are well liked, as were the activities at the City Park during last summer's Bicentennial Celebration. Chamber members will contact other civic groups to determine what the other clubs are planning for the Bordertown Days celebration.

It was reported that there are 35 paying members in the Farwell Chamber of Commerce. Actkinson said there should be at least 60-70 members and he would like to start a membership drive. Everyone is eligible to become a member, there is no age limit, and potential members do not have to be businessmen to join.

Actkinson reported that Southwestern Public Service will publish a free brochure to help recruit businesses to Farwell, listing benefits and good points of locating in the city, if the Chamber of Commerce agreed. The Chamber decided to update the old city brochures instead.

Pudge Rose reported that the Farwell Hospital District Board is in "full swing" to locate a new doctor for Farwell. Rose said one prospective doctor has already visited the city and two more doctors will visit here in the near future. Rose indicated the Chamber could help in the recruitment by updating the city brochures as soon as possible.

In other action, the Chamber

discussed the possibility of building a new city park across the street east from the Farwell First Baptist Church. Johnny Curtis noted that the city has one year to obtain a matching-funds grant to build the park.

Bob Anderson said the Farwell Youth Commission is

## City Gets Garbage Truck

Farwell City Council met Monday afternoon at the City Hall with Mayor Walter Kaltwasser and Councilman Johnny Curtis in attendance. Councilman Fred Chandler was out of town.

It was reported that an advance of \$100 had been paid to city employees Ronnie Mitchell and Doug Landrum who left Tuesday to go to San Angelo to pick up a garbage truck to be used by the city. The truck is a surplus vehicle from an air force base and is free to the city.

The Council reported on a meeting they had attended with the Parmer County Commissioners in which the commissioners had approved a subsidy of \$240 per month to finance an ambulance for the City of Farwell. The Council

approved for the subsidy to be put into certificates of deposit toward the purchase of a new ambulance.

Councilman Curtis reported that the City of Farwell has made application with the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission (PRPC) for an ambulance and is on the waiting list for a matching-funds grant from the federal government to purchase the ambulance.

In other action, the Council agreed to hire an engineer to determine which city streets are in the worst need of repair and to establish a five-year plan to repave and sealcoat all city streets.

D.E. Hammit, Farwell water superintendent, reported that the city wells are in good shape for the summer months.

Banquet program covers featured a sketch of a young woman clad in the "roaring '20's" period. The drawing was taken from the early drawings Maurine Caywood made as a young girl.

Thigpen was born September 1, 1941, in Pettit, Tex., near Levelland. He moved with his family to California in July of 1942, and lived there until August 1945.

He arrived on the Texico scene in 1945 and has lived here ever since. Thigpen spent 12 years in the Texico School system, graduating from Texico High School in 1959.

As a young boy, the 1976-77 man of the year always wanted to belong to the Texico Volunteer Fire Department. He came by this desire naturally as his father was chief of the department for 17 years. The young man soon learned the science of fire fighting, and became a member of the department at the age of 16. He has been an active member of the group ever since.

Thigpen was elected assistant fire chief in October 1963 and was named chief in July 1965. He resigned as chief in December of 1966, but was re-elected to the post in July

1976. About 14 years ago, he began working for one of the largest manufacturing and grain handling companies in the state of New Mexico. Thigpen was named local manager of Worley Grain, Inc., in September of 1970.

Thigpen has been active in many local civic activities. He is a member of Texico City Council and is a charter member of the Texico Community Planning Commission. He also belongs to the Texico Kiwanis Club and is an active member of First Baptist Church in Texico.

Thigpen and his wife, Glenda, have two daughters, Sonya, 13, and Schree, 6.

Mrs. Engram was born in Del Norte, Colo., and later moved to Alamosa, Colo. She has been a musician, an executive, a newspaper reporter, and a high school track star.

The Alamosa Daily Courier, where Mrs. Engram worked as

a reporter, and the Alamosa radio station, where she played the guitar and sang, served as employment while she attended Alamosa High School.

It was during the senior trip that the current "woman of the year" met her husband.

The newlyweds moved to Texico but later returned to Alamosa. In 1953 they returned to Texico to farm and raise their family.

Involvements in every phase of civic and community work in Texico has been a way of life for Mrs. Engram. She has served as president of Texico Woman's Club and corresponding secretary of District III of New Mexico Federated Woman's Clubs. She is secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, a member of the Texico Planning Commission and is a member of Kingswood United Methodist Church in Clovis.

In 1955, Mrs. Engram joined the Texico Post Office and she was appointed postmaster in 1965.

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## Twin Cities Has Four Public Tornado Shelters

Dark, overcast skies, threatening clouds, and recent weather watches have caused Twin Cities residents to wonder about tornado season. The big questions are always, "How do we know we are in immediate danger?" and "Where do we go for shelter?" Should the Twin Cities be in eminent danger of a tornado, the volunteer fire departments of both Texico and Farwell will sound the warning whistles. The tornado signal consists of one full cycle followed

by another full cycle, with no pause between. The signal actually sounds like "one long continuous wail." Once the alarm is sounded, residents are encouraged to seek cover in the nearest basement or other suitable shelter. Farwell has four designated sites, including the rear part of Farwell Elementary school building, the county courthouse, Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Elevator, and Worley Mills elevator. 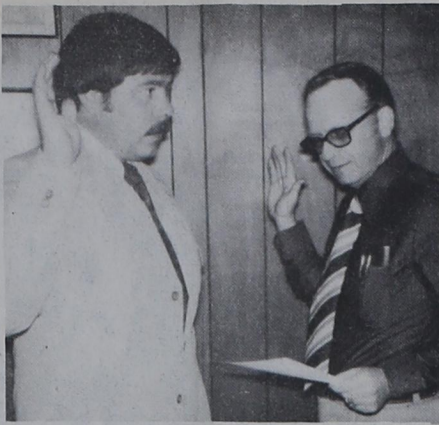
Clerk, said that at one time the old hotel building and Golden West Seed Company were designated shelter sites in Texico. However, according to Lewis Cooper, spokesman for Texico volunteer fire department, Texico does not at present have any shelter sites. "If we were threatened by a tornado," Cooper said, "we would have to use Farwell's locations." Other communities in Parmer County also have designated public shelter sites. The following list furnished by the office of County Judge Paul Fortenberry was compiled in 1973.

Designated shelters in Bovina are Sherley Grain elevator and Macon Grain elevator. Official sites in Lariat and Lazbuddie are the Sherley-Anderson grain elevators. Friona has four sites: Friona Wheat Growers elevator, Continental Grain Company elevator, Friona Junior High, and Friona State Bank. Black has two shelter sites, Black Grain elevator and Tri-County elevator.

# Family Discovers Fun In Making Dandelion Jelly

The C.H. Rose, Jr., family of Farwell has discovered the perfect way to spend a leisurely Sunday afternoon - making dandelion jelly.

One Sunday recently Mrs. Rose and her children, Jack, Charlie and Teresa, found themselves with a lot of time on their hands and a lawn that was overrun with dandelions. To solve the dilemma they consulted the 1977 edition of the "Old Farmer's Almanac" and found the solution printed right there on page 75.

Granted, making dandelion jelly seemed a far-out idea at best, but the Roses decided to chance it anyway. After all, what could be lost, save a little time, effort and a few ingredients?

Jack, however, decided early in the proposed adventure that recycling the little yellow "garden and yard pest" into dandelion jelly was not for him. He bowed out after picking dandelions lest he be infected with dandelion jelly making enthusiasm.

Meanwhile, Charlie felt much the same way. He did not mind picking the "little yellow weed," but definitely had his reservations about the remainder of the operation. As it turned out, though, Charlie did help make the jelly -- by

stirring the pot on the stove. Now the youngest member of the Rose household, Teresa, was definitely smitten by the "dandelion bug" and immediately launched herself wholeheartedly into the project.

Almost in less time than it takes to tell, the Rose children descended on their lawn, stripping it clean of dandelions. Now Mrs. Rose and Teresa were ready to make the jelly.

Here is the recipe they followed as found in the "Old Farmers 1977 Almanac."

### DANDELION JELLY

Pick one quart of bright,

fresh dandelion blossoms. Rinse them in cold water to remove any insects that may be on the petals, and snip off the stem and green collar under the blossom.

In an enameled saucepan, boil the dandelion petals in two quarts of water for three minutes. Cool and strain, pressing the petals with the fingers to extract all of the juice.

Measure out three cups of the dandelion liquid. Add two tablespoons lemon juice and one package of powdered fruit pectin (one and three-fourths ounces).

Bring the mixture to a boil, using a large jelly kettle. Add five and one-half cups sugar,

stirring to mix well. Continue stirring and boil the mixture for two and one-half minutes.

Pour into small glasses and cover with paraffin when the jelly is cool.

Mrs. Rose said the dandelion jelly tasted and looked like apple jelly. For a second batch of jelly, Mrs. Rose said she added two tablespoons of fresh orange juice to create an orange tang.

The handy almanac also has a recipe for Dandelion Root coffee which Mrs. Rose says they have not tried to make yet. But at today's high coffee prices it might prove worthwhile to pick a few dandelions and experiment a little.

### DANDELION ROOT COFFEE

When digging dandelions for greens, save the roots to roast and grind for a coffee-like beverage, or to add to ground coffee in the way that chicory is used.

Scrub the dandelion roots, drain, and place on a baking sheet. Roast in a very slow oven, 150 degrees, until the roots are dark and dry, or about four hours. Cool and then grind the roots in a food grinder or blender. Store in a covered jar until used.

To make a coffee substitute, boil one heaping teaspoonful of roasted ground dandelion roots and one cup of water for three minutes. Strain and serve with or without cream and sugar.

To add to ground coffee in the way that chicory is used, brew the coffee as usual, using one teaspoon of roasted ground dandelion roots for each six cups of coffee made. More or less dandelion root may be used, as desired.

A third recipe which might bear investigating is for greens.

### KENTUCKY DANDELION GREENS

Gather one to one and one-half gallons of tender dandelion greens. Crowns and dandelion buds may be included, if wanted. Wash and clean the greens. Refrigerate if not used at once.

Simmer a meaty smoked-ham bone in one and one-half quarts of water for about one hour, until the broth is rich and meat falls away from the bone. Add the cleaned greens to the kettle, cover and simmer gently until the greens are tender and well-flavored (about one hour).

Season the greens with salt and pepper, as needed, during cooking. Serve the greens with the pot liquor poured over them and accompany with cornbread, pot liquor dodgers, or corn meal dumplings which have been cooked on top of the greens.

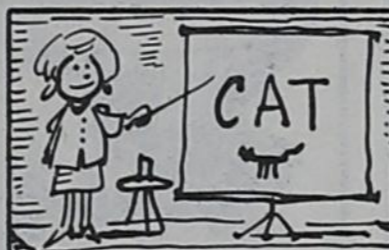

## Area Receives More Moisture

Approximately one inch of rain fell on the Twin Cities area on Wednesday of last week and Monday night of this week.

One of the largest rainfall measurements in the area was reported four miles north of Farwell, where approximately one inch of rain was recorded.

According to Mrs. Herman Geries, who lives 15 miles north of Texico School, the rainfall was spotted in the area. The Geries measured .50 of an inch at their farm, she said. About one and one-half miles further south, .70 of an inch was recorded on the Paul Barnes farm, she said.

Only .10 of an inch of moisture was recorded in Texico. According to Mack Heald, Parmer County Extension Agent, "no more rain is needed now." He indicated that the moisture received during the last two weeks "greatly benefited" the barley and wheat crops, but additional rain at this time "will hinder the corn crop."

Heald pointed out that the corn "needed to be planted this week or at the very latest next week." He added that not all farmers had to delay planting their corn crops due to the additional rain, but "many of them did."

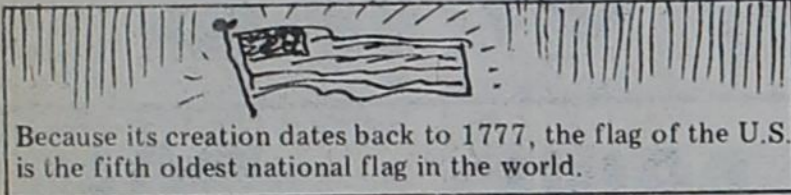
Eddie West, chapter advisor, was given a gift certificate by the retiring officers.

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
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**GO, AND SIN NO MORE**

The self-righteous Pharisees had brought a fallen woman to Jesus and "when they had set her in the midst," they began to accuse her, saying: "Now Moses in the Law commanded us that such should be stoned, but what sayest thou?" (John 8:5).

They were using this fallen woman to embarrass the Lord into agreeing that this woman should be stoned, or else leaving Himself open to a charge of repudiating Moses' Law.

At first He made "as though He heard them not", but, when they continued asking, they got what they asked for! Simply answering: "He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her," the Lord turned away again to let that sentence do its work. They had "set her in the midst." Now He had set them in the midst and, "being convicted by their own conscience," they "went out one by one" (Ver. 9).

And there stood the woman alone before Him: a great sinner and a great Savior. Since none of the Pharisees had dared to cast
