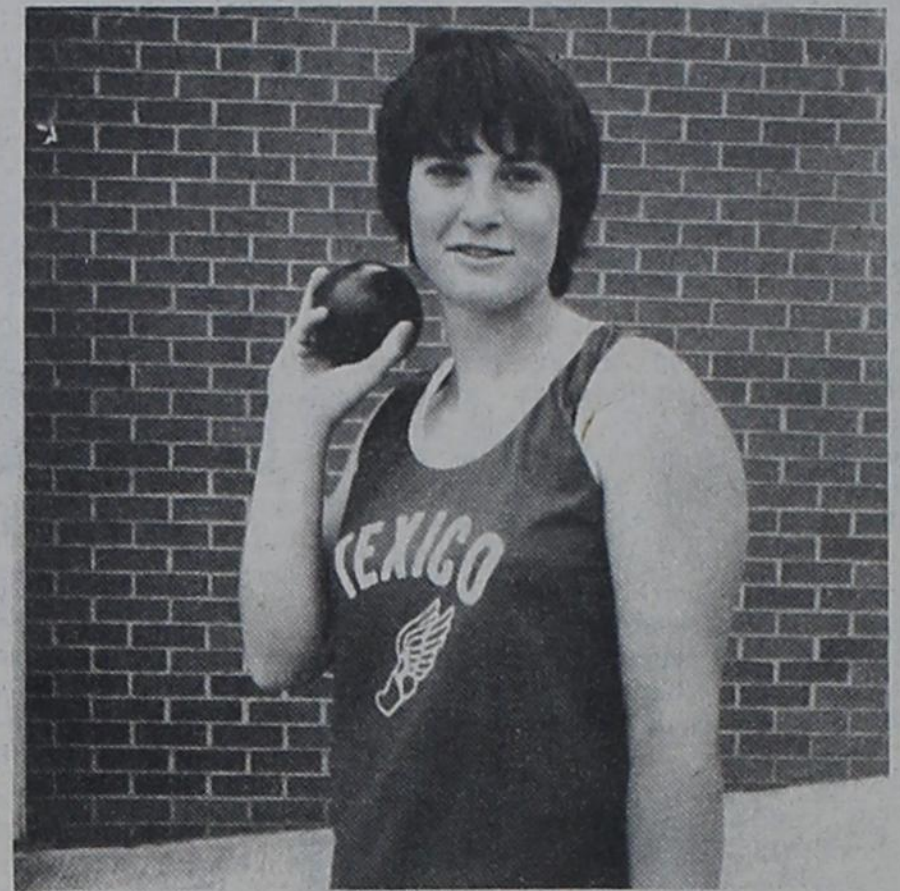

**Farwell Golf Champions**

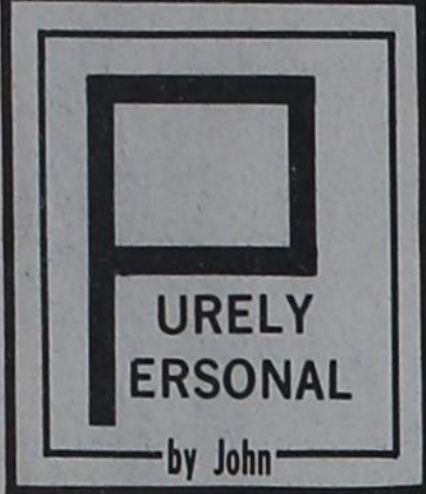

We don't have any figures at our finger tips, but it does seem to us that our Spring has been a bit warmer and wetter than usual. We read a cattle report the other day and the correspondent from Mississippi said that it was the warmest April in 29 years in that part of the country.

The parched baldies can always stand rain, although sometimes we would that it was better spaced out. So far our immediate area has not been hit with the "hard" rain and for this we can be thankful.

Let us hope that as the hard winter increased our demand for energy, a beneficent summer will come along to lessen our use of this ever cost-increasing necessity.

We are in a section of the country that is particularly suited to the evaporative air cooler. This type cooling is based on the cooling effect of changing a liquid to vapor. We, generally speaking, have a low relative humidity reading prevailing and this condition enhances the effect of this principle.

The efficiency of the evaporative cooler will be increased by placing the unit in the direct sunlight rather than keeping it in the shade. Of course, this type of cooling has its limits in terms of absolutely dropping the temperature. As we recollect an efficient unit can be expected to lower temperature approximately 20 degrees over the prevailing temperature.

A number of years ago this seemed like a very comfortable differential. With the coming of the mechanical refrigeration unit, we became spoiled with temperature drops of up to 30 degrees over the outside. We pay for this increased cooling by a much greater drain of our energy reserves. This summer's high prices on electricity and other energy forms may cause a lot of folks to go back to the "Ole Swamper" for their summer comfort.

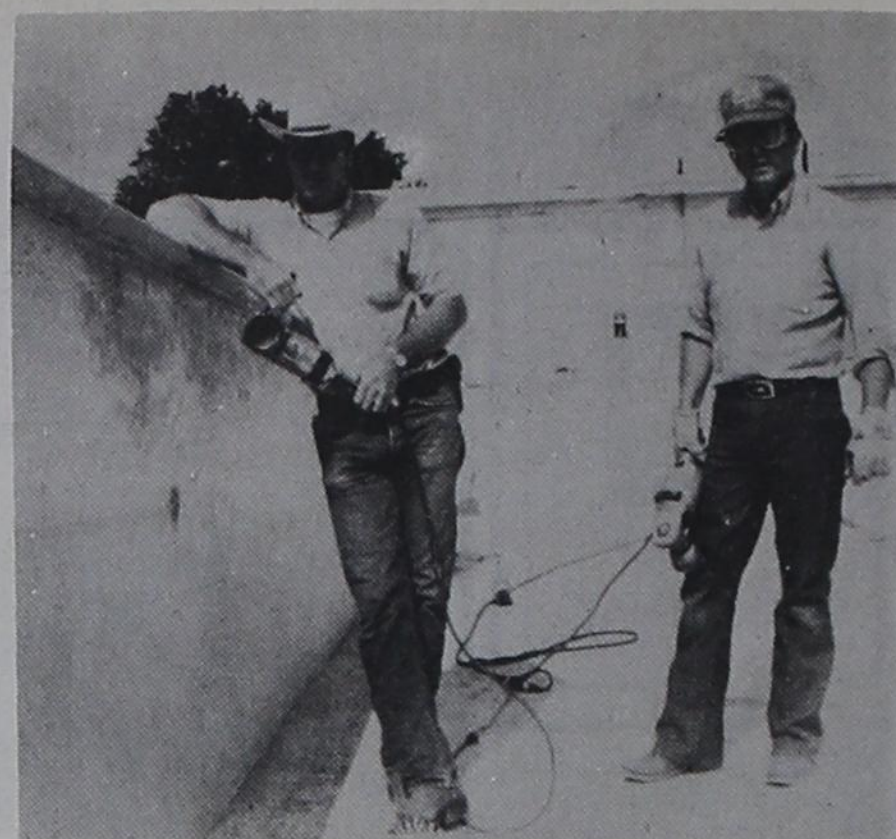
She indicated that Saturday that Llano Grande Kiwanis Club would begin breaking up

## Court Allocates Funds For Bookmobile

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday morning to consider a short agenda. The Court approved the allocation of \$5,238.25 from the General Fund to be paid to the City of Muleshoe for the operational expenses of the Bookmobile. The Court also approved payment of \$123.97 to the Bailey County judge for the renewal of the insurance premium on the Bookmobile vehicle.

County Agent Mack Heald and District Agent Bill Gunter met with the Court for a general discussion relative to the Extension Service in Parmer County. Gunter gave the general background of the Extension Service and elaborated on current projects. It was pointed out that a general rule of time spent would be 30 to 40 per cent on 4-H programs, with the balance of the time being spent in education activities with farmers and farm projects.

Further discussion was held relative to low-capital outlay projects for youngsters who are unable to handle large projects. The agents agreed to furnish the Court with some proposals at a later meeting relative to these projects. Charlotte Pierce has been

designated as the new secretary to the county attorney replacing Jesse Landrum who will retire May 31.

A general discussion was held concerning individual precinct problems and possible solutions. It was pointed out that a communication had been received from Senator

John Tower pertaining to SB1132 which would prohibit forced busing where there is not proof of deliberate racial discrimination and that such rulings would be removed from the federal courts to the state courts. Members of the Court mutually agreed to support the bill.

Tammi Lovelace, Dennis Dollar, Bowie Howard and Janene Berry.

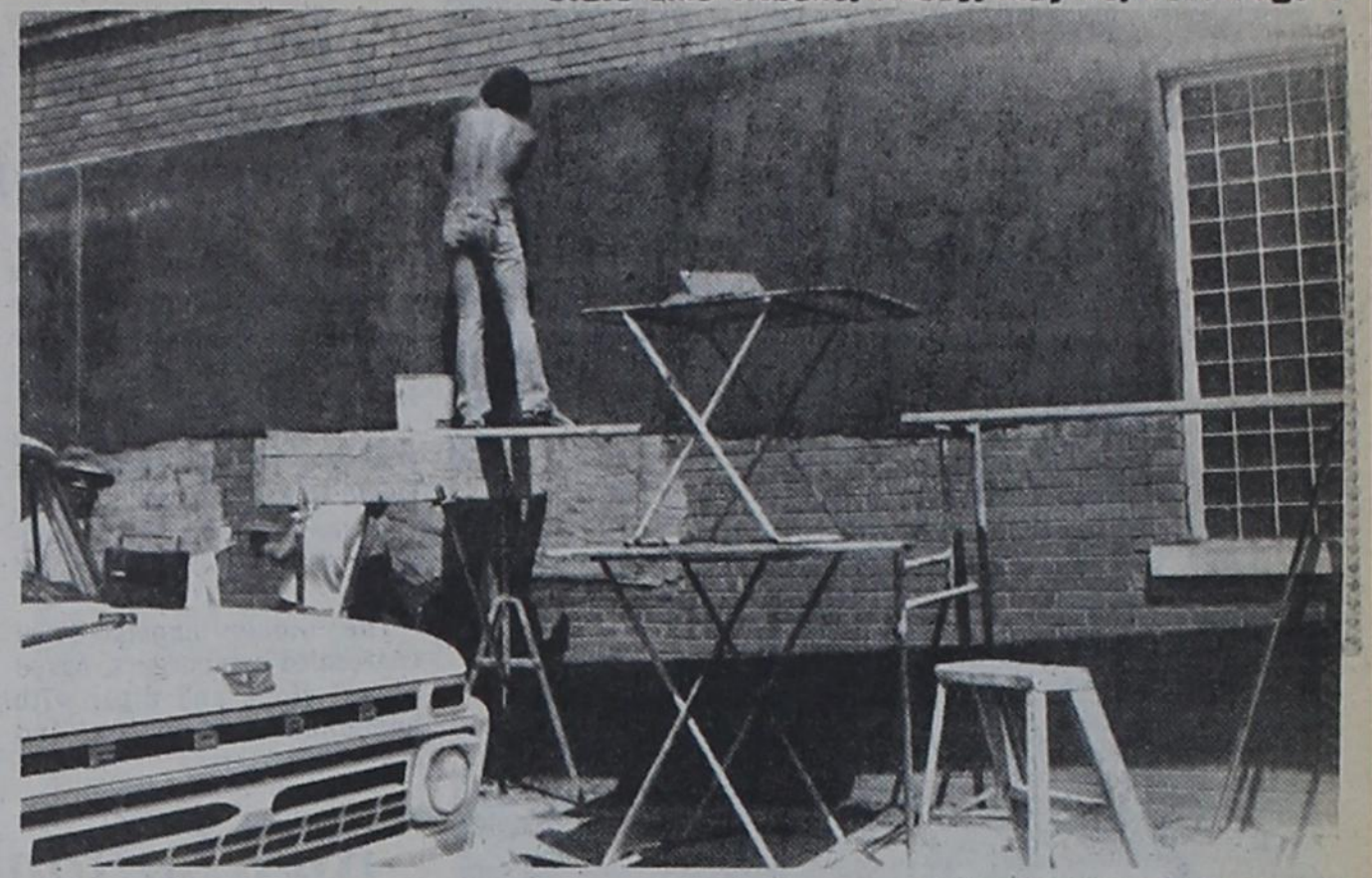
James Craig, junior high principal, and members of the school board will present diplomas. Following commencement, there will be a banquet for the graduates at a restaurant in Clovis.

One of the floods expected late this spring is to come from a deluge of votes cast by cattle producers from all over the nation. At long last the voting on a referendum which will make or break the Beef Research and Information Order is right around the corner. Every beef producer is encouraged to vote on the measure, which if passed, would provide some 30 to 40 million dollars a year of the cattlemen's money for research and promotion. Cost to the individual producer would be three cents for every ten dollars worth of beef sold. Funds would be administered by a 68-member Beef Board representing all cattle producing regions. Registration for this special national referendum must be completed in advance of voting day. The place to sign up is the local ASCS office.

## Intermittent Rains Fall In County

The immediate Farwell area has only received about one-tenth inch of moisture since sparse intermittent rains began last Saturday night and continued Monday afternoon, says Mack Heald, Farmer County Extension agent. Heald said that after planting is completed more rain will be needed county-wide. He described the present moisture level as "adequate," but stressed that we did not have a "surplus supply of water." Heald remarked, however, that there is more water located underground than was evident a year ago.

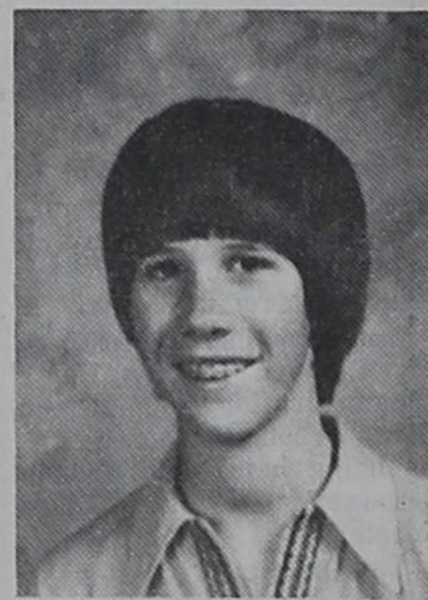
## Pet Clinic Set Today

# Farwell School Board Sets Retention, Promotion Policy

Monday night Farwell School Board approved the development of a uniform policy concerning the retention or double promotion of students. The following statement was issued by James Perkins, superintendent:

"The following policies and guidelines have been developed to help facilitate determination of retention of students at all levels.

"In grades one through six, progress of the student in the basic areas, particularly in reading and mathematics, will determine whether or not he should be retained in a grade level. Parental conferences

concerning the welfare of the child will be held and information from the parent will be considered. However, final determination of whether to retain the student or not will be made solely by the school administration upon recommendation by the teacher or teachers involved with the student.

"In grades seven and eight, retention shall be considered in all academic areas with major emphasis in the fields of language arts and mathematics. Failure in two areas of the basic academic courses will constitute consideration for retention. Any recommen-

ation for retention will be reviewed by the school administration, all teachers involved with the student, and the parents. Final decision will be made solely by the school administration upon recommendation of the teacher with the best interest of the student in academic and social development being the primary factors for retention or non-retention. If a student is retained at this level, every effort will be made to place the student in a higher level of course work in the areas where he has done well.

"In grades nine through 12, the following formula will be in effect beginning with the 1977-78 school year:

A student will be considered to be in the ninth grade if he has earned zero through eight quarter units. He must have earned at least nine quarter units to be considered as a tenth grade student, at least 22 quarter units to be in the 11th grade, and at least 33 quarter units to be classified as a 12th grade student. The quarter units referred to in the formula are in solid academic areas only.

"Concerning double promotion, no student will be allowed to complete two grades in school in any given one year period without the recommendation of the teachers of that student, the counselor, and the administration. In addition, no student will be double promoted without the consent of the parents."

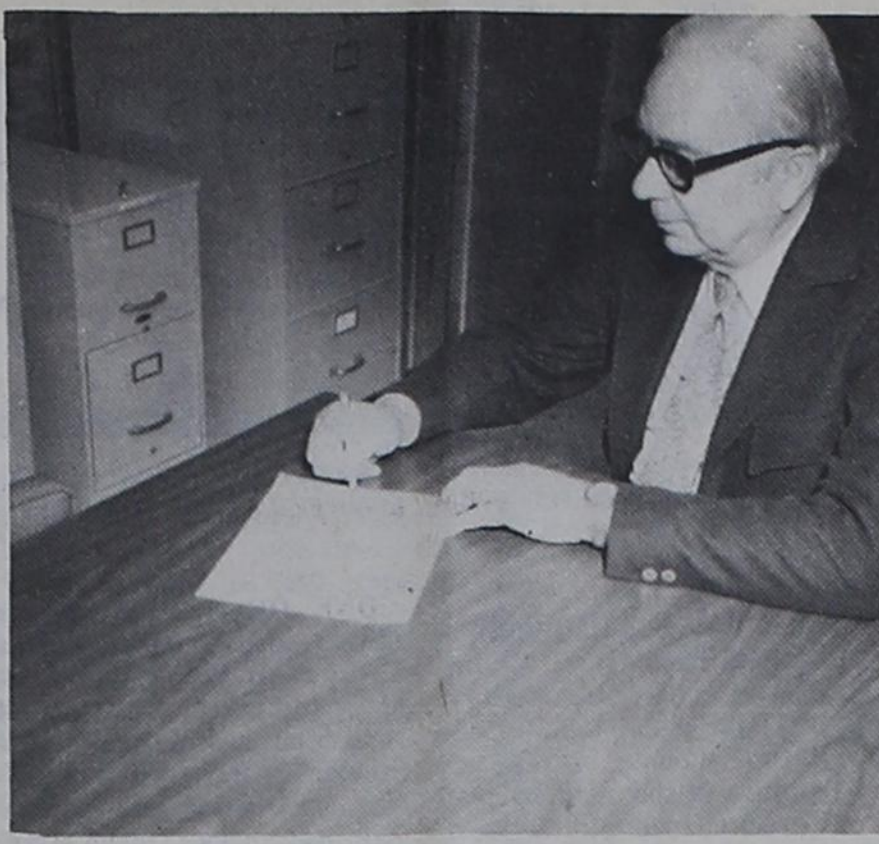
In other business a board of equalization was appointed consisting of Walter Hughes, chairman; and Joe Jones, J.B. Sudderth, J.W. Herington, David White, Troy Christian, and Don Williams. The Board will meet from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. CDT July 11 in the office of the superintendent.

Among other business board members approved the senior trip to Colorado Springs, Colo., and established rules and regulations for that annual event.

Willie Roberts also met with the board to discuss upgrading insurance coverage on all the school buildings.

Resignations were also accepted from Tom Adamson and Katherine Lockhart.

Perkins also released a tentative school calendar for 1977-78. He commented that a bill presently being considered by the Texas legislature might limit the number of days in the school year to 170 school days and ten in service days. "If that happens," Perkins commented, "We will adjust our calendar accordingly."

## Texico Accepts Bids On Obligation Bonds

Texico City Council met Tuesday night to consider a lengthy agenda. The bids were submitted for the purchase of general obligation bonds in the amount of \$23,000. The Council accepted a bid from Farmers Home Administration of Clovis at five per cent interest. Clara Wiehl, city clerk, explained that the Clovis company will put up the money for the city street repairs and that the city in turn will pay them interest on the money.

It was reported that the Eastern Plains Council of Government was raising yearly dues to 10 cents per person living within the city limits. No action was taken Tuesday night. Mrs. Wiehl explained that they were going to wait and see if Clovis was going to renew membership in the Council before acting on the matter. She added that Texico would be hurt if Clovis did not renew membership and in that event Texico would probably also let its membership expire.

Richard Pettigrew, engineer, met with the Council to discuss the proposed extension of the city limits. He submitted an annexation plat but no action was taken.

Ray Arragon, a representative of the state employment commission, informed the Council that the manpower program would again be operational this summer for all the school children who had applied for summer jobs. According to the program, the state pays the wages for those

students who work for the city.

The contract the city has with George Davis of Clovis concerning the pickup of trash was discussed. Davis indicated that when the contract expires July 1 he will resubmit his bid, but at a higher rate.

A resolution was also passed to balance the budget for 1976-77 fiscal year. Mrs. Wiehl said the budget was presently over extended in the general fund area.

A request to park a mobile home in the 800 block of Garwood was denied. Another request by Jimmy Mosier to remove 14 feet of curbing in order to make room for a driveway was granted, provided that he cements the gutter back the way it should be, said Mrs. Wiehl.

The Council agreed to have assistant city clerk Maurine Baker work a few extra days this month to prepare the new ledger sheets which will be used for the new posting machine which is expected to arrive in the near future.

In other action Mayor Manfred Turnbough signed a proclamation declaring this week to be Municipal Clerk's Week.

The police report for April was approved and bills were also approved for payment.

# Parmer County To Observe Soil Stewardship Week

Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is sponsoring Soil Stewardship Week, May 15-May 22. Soil Stewardship Week is observed nationally each year to emphasize man's responsibility to protect and conserve our soil, water, and other natural resources.

County Judge Paul Fortenberry has signed a proclamation declaring the week of May 15-22 as Soil Stewardship Week in Parmer County. The following provisions were included in the proclamation:

Whereas, the well-being of our people depends upon the production of ample supplies of food, fiber and other products of the soil, and;

Whereas, the quality and quantity of these products depend upon the conservation, wise and proper management of the soil and water resources, and;

Whereas, conservation districts provide a practical and democratic organization through which landowners are taking the initiative to conserve and make proper use of these resources, and;

Whereas, the conservation districts are carrying forward a program of soil and water conservation in cooperation with numerous agencies and countless individuals.

The County SWCD has provided local churches with reference booklets, bulletins and bulletin inserts promoting Soil Stewardship Week. This year's theme, "When We Care," will help each person

to examine his own motives and actions in the conservation of God's manifold gifts.

During this special week it is important to remind ourselves of the origins and history of the Soil Stewardship observance. They stress the allegiance of all men to God and their dependence on His grace for all good things.

The custom of setting aside special days - Rogation Days - for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in the neighborhood of Vienne, France. Crop failures and widespread hunger followed closely behind a period of bad weather and earthquakes. The Bishop of Vienne called for prayer and penance on the three days preceding Ascension Day. The people responded and asked God for help in their sufferings and privation.

Word of what had happened soon spread throughout France and to other countries.

The supplication filled a need in the hearts and minds of the people, and as years went by, Rogation Days were widely observed as an annual custom. The Church formally adopted the custom by the end of the eighth century. Today people the world over on Rogation Days beg the mercy of God and ask that He spare His children the evils of soil and body - and give good increase to the plants of the field.

In our own country it has met an evident need of the people to set aside a week each year to acknowledge before God our gratitude for

His gifts of soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it. The week has become a special time to remind all people that these gifts warrant their best in Christian stewardship.

In America, the Soil Stewardship observance has always traced its origins to the Rogation Days. Throughout parts of the South, earlier this century, churches and their congregations began to set aside the fifth Sunday after Easter as Soil and Soul Sunday.

Eventually this became Soil Stewardship Sunday when, in 1946, the publishers of Farm and Ranch magazine suggested to religious leaders in a few southern states that one Sunday be set aside to remind their congregations of man's duty to be a good steward of the land.

The response of clergymen and laymen was so good that observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday spread steadily to other states. In 1954, the publishers of the magazine suggested to the officers of the National Association of Conservation Districts that a still wider observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday could aid significantly in bringing about a national awakening and recognition of man's obligations to the Lord's earth.

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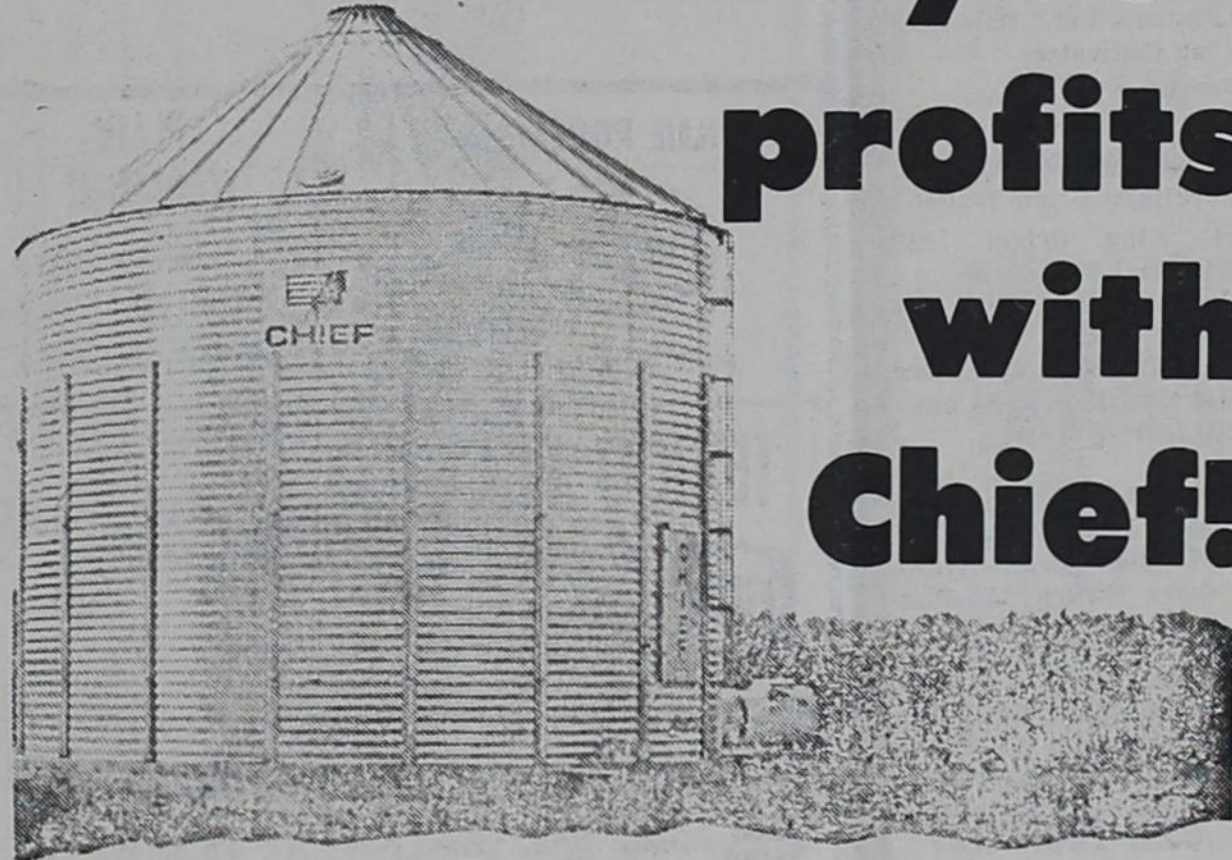

"THE RESURRECTION MOURNING"

"But Mary stood without at the sepulchre weeping" (John 20:11). Why does she weep? Because the tomb is empty! What needless sorrows follow in the wake of unbelief!

Those tear-dimmed eyes did not see the evidence of the Lord's resurrection. And when the angels asked: "Why weepest thou?" She said: "Because they have taken away my Lord, and I know not where they have laid Him." Poor woman! She would rather have found His body there!

But here are two on their way to Emmaus who are no less sorrowful! They are talking together about all that has happened during the last few days and as they communed together and reasoned, Jesus Himself drew near and went with them, but their eyes were hidden that they should not know Him. And He said unto them: "What manner of communications are these that ye have one to another, as ye walk, and are sad?" (Luke 24:15-17).

The word "walk" here does not mean to walk on but to walk about - to wander aimlessly. They were on their way to Emmaus, but they were so broken-hearted that they did not care whether or not they got there. And it is interesting that the clause "and are sad," is translated in the Revised Version: "And they stood looking sad."

What had caused them to give up hope? Listen to their own words: "We had trusted that it had been He which should have redeemed Israel; and beside all this, today is the third day since these things were done" (Luke 24:21).

They had given up hope because this was the third day since the Lord's crucifixion, yet this was the very day He was to rise from the dead, according to His own oft-repeated promise.

Mary weeps because the tomb is empty! The two disciples are broken-hearted because three days have now passed since His death. We smile at the irony of unbelief.

But what about ourselves? The risen, glorified Christ exercises far greater power and offers far greater blessings to believers now than His followers of old knew anything about.

It was Paul's constant prayer for the believers of his day, and it is God's desire for us that we may know "what is the exceeding greatness of His power to usward who believe... His mighty power, which He wrought in Christ, when He raised Him from the dead, and set Him at His own right hand in heavenly places, far above all..." (Eph. 1:19-21).

How often we, who call ourselves Christians, are bowed down with doubt and grief, when we should be enjoying "the power of His resurrection"! We believe that Christ paid for our sins at Calvary and rose again to prove that our sins were paid for. We have trusted Him for everlasting life. Can we not trust Him for today's problems?

"Oh, what peace we often forfeit! Oh, what needless pain we bear! All because we do not take God at His Word."

# Lazbuddie School Spring Sports Wrap-Up Presented

(Editor's Note: The following is a report of the wrap-up of spring sports activities at Lazbuddie Schools as compiled by the school.)

The Lazbuddie Junior High and High School boys track team capped a very successful season with a competitive performance at the District 4-B meet held at Lubbock Estacado. The junior high boys used strong relays and excellent hurdle depth to accumulate 176 points to claim the team title. The boys point total was twice that of the second place team. They also had the number two and number five doubles teams, including Russell Windham and Stefan Moore and David Lust and Terry Steinbock, respectively.

Lazbuddie golf teams turned in a very productive season for their second year of competition. The girls team consisting of Karen Scott, Darshan Jennings, Tammie Smith, Gina Elliott and Angela Matthews won district over two teams from Amherst by a total of 66 strokes. Karen and Darshan were district medalist and runner-up, respectively, and each competed in the regional meet at Levelland.

The boys golf team defeated Anton by 58 strokes to take the district title. Team members are Charleson Steinbock, Mark Foster, Dennis Steinbock, Jimmy Standridge and Mike Windham. Mark Foster was district medalist for the second year in a row and Charleson Steinbock captured the runner-up slot.

At the regional meet the boys finished fourth out of 17 teams in competition. They shot a final round of 336 for a team total of 697, 26 shots out of first place and only 19 strokes out of the state qualifiers position. Out of the 89 players present Charleson finished 11th; Mark, 14th; and Dennis, 17th. All five boys will be returning for next year's team.

## Lazbuddie Schools Begin Accreditation Study

According to school officials, Lazbuddie School is involved in a self-study for accreditation purposes. A steering committee has been appointed to coordinate the study with the assistance of Virgil Young from the Regional Service Center No. 16 and Nancy Ruff, a staff member of the Texas Education Agency.

Guidelines for the study recommend that questionnaires be sent out to the parents of the 2nd, 5th, 9th and 11th grade students and that the

10th and 12th grade students react to the same questionnaire. There is only one survey that parents of students and ex-students are to answer. This will furnish data to be used in the accreditation study. Anyone receiving a questionnaire from the school is asked to fill it out and return it promptly. School officials say that "the cooperation of everyone will be deeply appreciated."

measles throughout the nation this spring, an immunization drive has been organized. Clinics are being held periodically at Muleshoe and Dimmitt for vaccinating children for measles. The clinic at Muleshoe is the first Tuesday of each month from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. (They are closed for one hour at noon.) The clinic at Dimmitt will be the first Friday of every other month (June 3 and August 5) from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the City Hall.
