## Jack Scott To Speak At Athletic Banquet

Jack Scott, head coach of the ENMU Greyhounds, will be the keynote speaker at the annual Texico High School athletic banquet sponsored by the Wolverine Booster Club Tuesday evening, May 10, at 7 p.m. in the Wolverine Gymnasium.

Scott enters his seventh season as head coach of the Greyhounds after coming to Eastern in June of 1970. His college record is 99-53-4, while his career record is an impressive 141-59-5. Scott also serves Eastern as an associate professor in health, physical education, and recreation.

Junior high athletes will be honored in a special assembly on Wed., May 11, at 2 p.m. in the gym. Speaker will be Kyle Evans, Clovis High School athlete. The assembly will be followed by a reception for the young athletes.

Among the highlights of the banquet will be presentation of awards to the outstanding high school athletes in each sport. Trophies will be presented to the boy and girl named "Most Athletic."

"Most Valuable Player" awards will also be presented to the girls for volleyball, basketball, and track, while the boys will receive "Most Valuable Player" awards in football, basketball, and track. Athletes will also receive

letters or certificates in each sport in which they have "lettered" this year. Twenty-two football players who have earned their letters will also receive medals.

Cheerleading awards will be presented by Connie Elliott, sponsor, while Drill Team sponsor, Debbie Lyons, will present awards to Drill Team members.

Paul Topliff, head football and track coach, and Kathy Culshaw, head girls coach, and Randy Lyons, head bas-

ketball coach, will present the athletic awards. They will be assisted by Roy King, assistant coach.

"Silhouettes of Athletes" will be the theme for the banquet, and decorations will feature large shadow profiles of each athlete. The Pep Club is in charge of decorations.

The meal will be catered by a Clovis firm and will include sirloin tip roast, green beans, baked potatoes, tossed salad, rolls, strawberry shortcake,

and iced tea. All parents and interested parties are invited to attend the banquet and the Junior High assembly. Tickets for the banquet may be purchased from any Texico athlete. Deadline for buying banquet tickets has been extended through today (Friday.)

## Troy Wayne Frazier Killed In Early Morning Accident

Troy Wayne Frazier, age seven, of Farwell was killed early last Friday morning as he crossed the road south of Texico to catch a school bus.

The youngster, son of Mr. and Mrs. David Byrd, was apparently killed instantly when he was struck and thrown 141 feet from the point of impact. He was pronounced dead on arrival at Clovis Memorial Hospital.

New Mexico State Police W.H. Rickerson and Dorcus Bailey and Texico City Marshal Mickey Fenn investigated the accident. Rickerson said Troy was standing at the east side of the paved road, State Road 348, which runs south from Texico-Farwell, as the southbound school bus approached. Troy's brother, Gary, age 8, and another boy were standing at the west edge of the road opposite Troy.

Rickerson said the seven-

year-old started to cross the road as a 1968 van approached from the south. The van struck the boy, throwing his body 141 feet into the barrow ditch.

The driver of the van, Timothy Price of Portales, told State Police he saw the two boys on the west side of the road and one on the east. The boy on the east side started to cross the highway as the van approached the area and Price swerved to the left. Price told the investigating officers he thought he had missed the youngster, but a passenger in the van, Henry Lee Robinson of Texico, said the vehicle had struck the boy.

The accident occurred in front of the Frazier boy's home, a mobile home located 2.2 miles south of Texico.

At the time of the accident the Farwell public school bus driven by Lynn Burton was still moving south and was ap-

proximately 200 feet north of the point of impact.

Burton and the two boys on the opposite side of the road were witnesses to the accident. (Continued on Page 2)

This is the time of year for great decisions around our house. The big decisions revolve around the question of whether to start the lawn sprinkler or just wait another day for rain.

The report also indicated that the van was moving at a speed of 20 to 40 mph.

**Pet Clinic Scheduled**

All Twin Cities area residents are asked to bring their dogs and cats to the rabies clinic which is scheduled for May 13 from 1 to 5 p.m. MDT at the Texico City Hall.

Dr. B.L. Russell, a Clovis veterinarian, will be in charge of the afternoon clinic. According to Dr. Russell, rabies shots will cost \$3 and the distemper shot will be \$5.

New Mexico state law requires that all pets be vac-

inated at three months of age. A Farwell city ordinance also requires that all pets be vaccinated when they are six months old.

Pets must also be licensed, according to the ordinances of both cities. Tags may be purchased at Texico City Hall for \$1 and at Farwell City Hall for \$2. According to Farwell City Clerk Janie Bowery, Farwell's ordinance requires tags for both dogs and cats.

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

Blizzards in New York, dust storms driven by hurricane force winds across the Plains, lack of snowfall in the Rocky Mountains and a severe drought in the North Central states all can be spelled the same way for producers . . . D-I-S-A-S-T-E-R. Crop and livestock losses from any one of these or countless other occurrences can create losses in the hundreds of millions of dollars for agricultural producers. A natural answer to the problem would be insurance. But, insurance industry officials say the risks are too great . . . premiums would be impossible to pay. Officials in the USDA say that the combination of natural disasters early this year may well result in a federal insurance program that would be applicable to all crops and would include all risks. Agriculture Secretary Bob Bergland says proposals for such a program will probably be coming before the end of the year.

If the woods are wet and you have no dry kindling when you wish to start a campfire, look around for a couple of last year's bird nests. Most birds build their nests in sheltered, rainproof spots in a tree. One or two nests should provide you with plenty of tinder-dry twigs to start a fire.

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

New Kindergarteners, First Graders**

Registration for new kindergarten and new first grade students at Farwell Elementary School is scheduled for Thursday, May 12, at 1:30 p.m. CDT in the elementary school library, announces Jerry Yows, principal.

Yows stressed that if a child attended kindergarten this year it is not necessary for parents to come to this special meeting because that child is already pre-registered.

The principal said that parents of new kindergarten and new first grade students

must bring the birth certificate and immunization record of their child to the meeting. Yows explained, "These records must be on file in our office and need to be available for state auditors."

A hospital certificate will not satisfy birth certificate requirements because it is not the original document, says Yows. He explained that anyone not having an original birth certificate may obtain one by writing the Bureau of

Vital Statistics of the state in which the child was born.

According to Yows, school immunization requirements state that the child must be immunized for the following: three doses of polio, one measles, one rubella shot and three DPT. Yows explained that one dose of polio and DPT must have been administered since the child's first birthday, adding that the smallpox vaccination is no longer required.




Eighth grade Wolverines who participated include Allen Hall who took fifth place in the shot put event with a toss of 34-4 1/2.

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

 Abimelech, king of Gerar, had taken Abraham's wife as his own, but had done so innocently. Sarah was a beautiful woman and Abraham, fearful for his life, had said: "She is my sister," and Sarah had vouched for Abraham's lie, telling Abimelech: "He is my brother."



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
