


Doing Things Together

I'm For the Upper Dog "I have just about reached the end of my tolerance for the way our society now seems to have sympathetic concern only for the misfit. the pervert, the drug addict, the drifter, the cronic criminal and the under-achiever.

"It seems to me that we have lost touch with reality and become warped in our attachments. I feel it is time for someone like me to stand up and say, "I'm for the upperdog!

"I am for the achiever - the ones who sets out to do something and does it; the one who recognizes the problems and opportunities at hand, and endeavors to deal with them; the one who is successful at his immediate task because he is not worrying about someone else's failings; the one who doesn't consider it 'square' to be constantly looking for more to do, who isn't always rationalizing why he shouldn't be doing what he is doing; the one, in short, who carries the work of his part of the world squarely on his shoulders.

City Of Farwell To Keep Tax Rate

to keep the present tax rate of 100 per cent valuation at 33 cents, at its Monday night meeting. The Council also agreed to use the National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA) book of values to determine the wholesale rather than the retail value of taxable vehicles.

In other business the Council discussed the street seal recommendations drawn up by Lydick Engineers and Surveyors of Clovis. According to the plan, which was adopted by the Council, 32,600 square yards of city streets will be repaired during the first phase of the five-year plan.

Streets to be included are Third Street: south line Avenue A to north line Avenue F; Fifth Street: south line Avenue for no later than July 19. She A to south line Avenue C; said the meeting has to be Doug Landrum. Fifth Street: South line Avenue I to Highway 292; Sixth

Early Reports Good - -

Harvest Underway Throughout County

County stepped into high gear this week. Mack Heald, Parmer County Extension Agent, said the harvest "got under-way last week" and was expected to be in "full swing" by today (Friday), provided it did not rain.

According to Heald, a "spot check" of fields indicated that the crops were ready to be cut. He added that it was too early to make comparisons between this year's and last

year's wheat harvest. The County Agent commented that the harvest would probably last about two weeks. He said that irrigation wells are running county wide, adding that some crops need rain now. According to Heald, corn, grain sorghum, vegetables, and soybeans would benefit from wet weather while cotton and sunflower fields need dry weather.

Last week the first loads of wheat began arriving at the local elevators. Fred Chandler of Sherley-Anderson-Pitman in Farwell said they received their first load June 10. He said the earliest indications are that dryland fields are yielding about 2-21 bushels per acre, adding that he does not have any figures on irrigated fields as yet.

> Chandler also commented that the moisture content of the crop is about 11 per cent. He said that barley is also "beginning to come in," adding that it is dry and has a good, heavy test weight.

Texico Council Passes Street Ordinance



It was reported that each department of the city will submit an inventory of all machines and equipment to the New Mexico Department of Finance in Santa Fe, N.M.







New Pastor, Family Busy Settling In

Farwell's newest residents are Rev. and Mrs. Russell Martin and Justin, formerly of San Jon, N.M. Rev. Martin has been appointed pastor of Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church and assumed his new duties June 2.

The young family is now at home in the Methodist Church parsonage and are very much involved with the process of moving in and getting acquainted.

The new pastor has been a minister for the past seven years. He studied at the University of Texas at El Paso and the school of theology at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. Rev. Martin said it takes about 10 years to become a Methodist minister. He added that he completed the final phase last year.

According to Rev. Martin, he felt the "call to preach and be a minister" after graduating from high school. He discussed the matter with other ministers before he decided to study for the

After serving as a student intern at Clayton, N.M., for several months, Rev. Martin was appointed as pastor of the San Jon and Grady Methodist Churches. He served the congregations for three years before moving to Farwell.

the needs of other people in the community. He says he tries to provide the spiritual and physical uplift that people need sometime.

A major interest and hobby of the new pastor is solar energy. He has an extensive library pertaining to the subject and last year constructed solar energy heating facilities for the parsonage at San Jon.

The device cost about \$400 to build and saved about \$200 dollars in heating bills. To begin with, Rev. Martin collected 1800 cans, cut off one third of each can, painted them black and attached them to a board. Several inches above the cans, a plastic cloth was placed to help draw the heat. A fan was installed to distribute the solar heat which collected by day. The device was housed in a shed near the parsonage and underground ducts piped the heat into the home. Rev. Martin said the temperature was maintained at a constant 69 degrees. He added that rocks were needed to help contain the heat better, but he had not had time to install them before moving. He went on to explain that the solar energy facility acted in the reverse during hot summer weather to keep the place cool. Before moving from San

12 c. sugar 12 c. shortening

12 t. salt

Mix until batter is lukewarm. Add 1 package yeast that has been dissolved in 1/2 c. of water. Then add 2 eggs, beaten, and 4 cups flour.

Mix well. Cover and place in refrigerator. Will keep for a week. When ready to use, make out rolls, let rise and bake at 400 degrees for 10-12 minutes.

4 c. cracker meal



larger than average litters. To be spayed, females should be six months old, not in heat or pregnant. If they have produced litters, wait until the young are weaned, then allow 2 weeks before spaying.

Animals are crying, Do you hear? Animals are dying, Do you care? Since the city finances the catching and destroying of surplus animals, wouldn't they be ahead financially to finance the spaying of females, and thereby control the birth rate -After a few months the cost of operating such a program would be practically nil. This should be of interest to everyone, why not act to get such a program underway?

She explained that the schedule was originally set up that way because neither of the schools had enough teachers to warrant a full time school nurse.

Mrs. Lockhart says that in 1959 Farwell reached its quota -- but because the other schools had not -- services continued to be shared. During the last few years she served Bovina and Farwell mainly and helped Lazbuddie in an advisory capacity only. Until her recent retirement she visited Farwell schools on Mondays, Thursdays and Fridays and Bovina schools on

Tuesdays and Wednesdays. The retired school nurse has Both Mrs. Anderson and always enjoyed working with pupils and helping them. Mrs. Lockhart's tasks were varied and were always designed to administering first aid treatment when necessary, she also screened students for potential health problems, always seeking the proper avenue of help

Mrs. Lockhart commented that one of the earlier superintendents had recommended that she not wear the stiff white uniforms which characterized nurses, as school-age children might be unnecessarily frightened. As a result all these years.

Things began to change rapidly when a roommate fell quite ill and Mrs. Lockhart tended to her every need. Later her friend convinced Mrs. Lockhart that nursing was the life for her. She complied and earned her nursing degree at what is now called Mary Hardin College at Belton, Tex.

Her first job was as a private duty nurse in Dallas when it was not unusual for a nurse to work 12-20 hour shifts. Later Mrs. Lockhart went to work for the old Baptist Hospital in Clovis. After Clovis Memorial Hospione time the old home tal was built, it was torn

It was while working in Clovis that Mrs. Lockhart met her future husband.
