Hurricane Katrina aftermath: Lazbuddie woman awaits word from missing sister

Johnnie Jones, the wife of Lazbuddie head football coach Don Jones, is a native of New Orleans.

It has been a very difficult time for her in the wake of the Hurricane Katrina tragedy because much of her family still lives there. Or to use the past tense, lived there.

Slidell is just northeast of New Orleans and on the north shore of Lake Ponchartrain. The eye of the hurricane went over Slidell, pushing a surge of water into the community. Johnnie said it took the worst part of the storm.

The day the hurricane hit, one of Johnnie's sisters, a niece and a nephew (ages 13 and 17) went to another of her sister's homes. They barricaded themselves in a bedroom that Monday.

Katrina raged all day long. Finally, on Tuesday morning, water started entering the

house. So the four relatives went into the attic. When the water continued to rise, one sister broke out an attic window. They baled

Alternatively walking or swimming (the water would be ankle high, or stomach high, or even higher than their heads depending on the specific location, the four got to a two-story apartment building -- they swam to a second floor balcony, which shows just how high the water was there.

Later, they again swam and walked from it, and found a boat which they paddled to higher ground. Then they walked four miles to a truck stop on the interstate.

They did manage to check on their properties later in the week. "Both houses are gone," said Johnnie. "Their cars were under water. There were about 8 feet of water in both homes."

The two sisters, and Johnnie's nice and nephew, went to a friend's house in Slidell. The house was on higher ground and is intact. Continued on Page 5

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Whiteface defeats Lazbuddie


The Lazbuddie Longhorns are 0-2 after being shut out by Whiteface last week, 46-0.





LIVE CATTLE: Although cattle prices pulled back this week, most of the negative news was coming from fears that higher energy costs would curtail the demand for beef. Energy prices look like a spike top is taking place, so good movement over the weekend should help to turn prices higher into next week and see a resumption of the current uptrend which should last into October.

FEEDER CATTLE: The market also came under pressure with all the uncertainty over Hurricane Katrina and the impact on energy prices. Although a top may have formed between the \$112-113 last week, prices should be in position to retest these highs going into October. Cash has remained very strong this week, but the market is becoming a little ioverpricedi again when compared to losses cattle feeders have been seeing? We still expect the spreads to narrow over time.

CORN: The market took a hit when it was learned that barge traffic coming down the Mississippi was halted because of Hurricane Katrina. The move to new lows only lasted for a day before turning back higher. Overall, it is still a little too early in the season to see the market collapse. Technically, the market is poised to rally over the near term with resistance between \$2.30-2.40. SOYBEANS: This market also took a hit this week when

barge traffic in the Mississippi came to a halt. Prices seemed to have held up fairly well around the April/May lows between \$5.90-6.00 level basis the November contract. When left to private business, there will be a plan in place and traffic will begin soon. We don't expect the grain industry to wait for the government to come up with plan before moving forward.

WHEAT: Again, barge traffic dropped prices for a one day down before turning back higher. Exports are expected to resume quickly as the grain industry works on ideas to start the movement once again. Grain elevators around New Orleans we in good shape, but there is a need for electricity to unload barges. Expect to see some ideas turning into action by early next week.

COTTON: There are crop tours taking place across the Southeast to determine damage if any. Prices took a jump higher once Hurricane Katrina passed, but very little news has been released. Odds are that world production is still expected to be very large which may keep pressure on prices? Technically, there is still room to the upside, but Dec will need to remain above 50 cents.



Bailey County Electric Cooperative members elect Clawson, Craft

Two board members were elected Tuesday night at the 66th annual meeting of Bailey County **Electric Cooperative at the Bailey County Coliseum in** Muleshoe.

For the District 3 post (Dodd - Synnyside), incumbent Jimmy Craft, who has been a director since 1995, was re-elected over Steve Edwards.

For the District 6 post (Enochs - Bula), Larry Clawson was chosen over incumbent Tommy Kirk, who has been a director since 1978 and was current board vice president.

David Marricle, co-op president/CEO, said 2004 saw continued growth due to the expansion of the dairy industry and that the co-op added over 7,250 horsepower of irrigation load.

Marricle noted that 2004 also brought record amounts of rainfall, with some of the service area getting more than 50 inches of moisture.

"However, this record rainfall level caused the co-op's sales to fall ... a 22 percent decrease in sales; while our overall sales were dropping, our peak demand increased slightly from 62.9 MW's in 2003 to 64 MW's this year.

"These two factors together caused our load factor to drop from 39.8 percent to 30.1 percent,

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which causes the cost to increase. This, plus the fact that natural gas prices also increased in 2004 -and will continue to increase, resulted in a slight overall increase in what you paid for electrici-

"We expect this trend to continue through 2005 and into 2006, because natural gas prices continued to be highly volatile and about 50 percent of our power is generated using natural gas. In spite of these facts, our co-op was still able to finish the year on a positive note."

The co-op's net margin for 2004 was \$1,761,576.

Board Chariman Darrell Stephens noted:

"The word 'cooperate' is often a word we take for granted; the meaning of it, the results of it, the consequences if it is not done. and the elements that make it happen. As I write this message, I continue to contemplate these aspects

The defense played very well in the 4th quarter.







Be aware of regulations before moving cattle

Summer heat continues across Texas, and recent rainfall across much of the state has boosted forage production and pastures. Even so, the days are getting shorter and fall is just around the corner - a time when livestock producers contemplate a change of pasture for their stock.

Cattle producers who are contemplating moving their livestock into or out of Texas in the coming months, for grazing or other purposes, should be mindful of state livestock health regulations, said a veterinarian speaking at a recent regional beef and forage conference.

The conference was sponsored by Texas Cooperative Extension offices in Castro, Bailey, Lamb, Hockley and Parmer counties.

"Tuberculosis regulations are a good example." said Dr. Brad Williams, veterinarian and Panhandle area director of the Texas Animal Health Commission. "Most states in the U.S. were tuberculosis free in November 2000. Texas and California lost their TB 'free' status in 2002, and New Mexico followed suit in 2003.

"California regained its TB 'free' status this year, and New Mexico is now operating under split status," he said. "New Mexico does require a TB test for all Texas livestock. All breeding stock in Texas and other known-TB states have to be tested before they can leave the state."

The Texas Animal Health Commission provides tuberculosis tests on a fee basis for some 850 dairies and more than 2,000 beef herds in the state, Williams said.

Producers who wish to bring New Mexico livestock into Texas should remember these caveats, he said.

- Sexually intact dairy cattle from New Mexico's accredited TB free area (all counties except Curry and Roosevelt) have to originate from an accredited TB free herd or be TB tested negative within 60 days of entry. Neutered dairy stock is exempt. Beef cattle and bison from New Mexico's accredited free area do not require a
- Only Curry and Roosevelt counties comprise New Mexico's modified accredited advanced TB free area.
- Dairy cattle from an accredited TB free herd and animals destined for slaughter from Curry and Roosevelt counties require no TB test to enter Texas.
- Sexually intact and neutered dairy cattle from these two counties that are not from an accredited TB free herd must be officially identified, accompanied by a certificate and show a negative TB test within 60 days of entering Texas.
- Sexually intact dairy heifers less than 6 months old from Curry and Roosevelt counties may enter Texas under a permit that places them under a hold order, and requires that they be TB tested upon reaching 6 months of age.
- Beef cattle and bison from an accredited TB free herd in these two counties or moving directly to slaughter do not need a TB test.
- Sexually intact beef cattle or bison that are not from an accredited TB free herd in these two counties must be identified, accompanied by a certificate and show a negative TB test within 60 days of entering Texas.

"Another consideration if you are moving cattle from Texas or Wyoming is brucellosis status," Williams said. "These are the only two states in the U.S. that are not currently classified as brucellosis free.

"In most cases, breeding cattle older than 18 months have to be tested for brucellosis before they can leave Texas. Before you move any livestock out of Texas, be sure and call the state veterinarian in the destination state to make sure you make that con-

Vandiver: 'There is an abundance of rats in the Northwest Plains of Texas'

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM:

Where is the Pied Piper when you need him? There has been an abundance of rats in the Northwest Plains of Texas. The good news is that the rat in question is the hispid cotton rat which does not invade homes or buildings. This outbreak is due to environmental conditions favorable to the cotton rat (i.e. an abundance of grass and weed growth which provide food and shelter).


The cotton rat is a stocky, medium-sized rat with a sparsely haired tail which is horter than the head and body. They are 10-11 inches long and weigh 3-5 ounces. The hispid cotton rat occurs over most of the southern U.S.

The Hispid Cotton Rat inhabits a broad variety of habitats where suitable cover is present, such as dense grassy fields, weedy fields, roadside ditches, marshy areas, brushy or weedy fence rows; pretty much anywhere there is dense grass or weed growth. Beneath this protective canopy of grasses or weeds, cotton rats develop interconnected runways.

The Hispid Cotton Rat's principal diet is the stems, shoots, and leaves of grasses and sedges, but occasionally it will eat insects, the eggs and young of ground - nesting birds, and even other small rodents. Since they will eat quail eggs, a high cotton rat population may have a detrimental impact on quail nesting success. These rats are active during both night and day throughout the year, but are more nocturnal in the hottest months. They build spherical nests of shredded plant material under logs or rocks, in burrows, or beneath densely matted vegetation.

They may damage a variety of crops, including alfalfa, grains, grasses, vegetables, peanuts, fruit crops, sweet potatoes, and sugar beets but are especially troublesome in sugarcane and melons. The last serious outbreak in Texas occurred in 1958 when millions of these rodents seemed to appear from nowhere and caused serious losses to farm crops, particularly peas, peanuts, watermelons, and cauliflower — as much as 90% loss in some instances.


The first day, they had him teach a beginning hip-hop class. By the end of the week, he was teaching the advanced students.



Bovina was picked to represent this area because the watershed starts in nearby Running Water Draw.


Each school involved will make about a 4- or 5-minute presentation, showing photos and talking about their section of the river.
