Briscoe's brass collar attitude has got him in this fix already. He was one of the first state governors to come out for Jimmie Carter and campaigned aggressively for Carter. One of Carter's first programs was the energy program that hurt Texas. Briscoe went to Washington to protest and apparently came away with his ten gallon hat full of ordure. This has reduced him to the unfunny state of running around Texas complaining about his candidate's program while tacitly admitting he is ineffectual in influencing his

candidate. If the Governor is too dumb to see the folly of blindly following a party instead of looking out for the people of his state, he does not deserve another term as the Texas chief executive.

At this juncture of time we do not have to work over the Texas Legislature as the magazine Texas Monthly in its July issue gives a run down on the ten best and ten worst legislators.

Appearing on the Best list are John Bryant (D-Dallas), Ronald Coleman (D-El Paso), Ray Farabee (D-Wichita Falls), Lance Lalor (D-Houston), Lynn Nabers (D-Brownwood), Jim Nugent (D-Kerrville), Wayne Peveto (D-Orange), A.R. "Babe" Schwartz (D-Galveston), Max Sherman (D-Amarillo), and

John Wilson (D-La Grange). Rated as Worst legislators are Tom Creighton (D-Mineral Wells), Bob Davis (R-Irving), Charles Evans (D-Hurst), DeWitt Hale (D-Corpus Chisti), Glenn Kothmann (D-San Antonio), Tom Massey (D-San Angelo), Chris Miller (D-Fort Worth), Bill Presnal (D-Bryan), Joe Tom Robbins (R-Lubbock), and Clay Smothers

(D-Dallas). You will note that our State Senator Max Sherman is listed among the best. The magazine says of him, "Max Sherman, 42, Amarillo, Conservative Democrat. The unanimous choice as the best member of the Legislature: a walking Boy Scout motto. Completely open and without malice, guile or misplaced ego - almost too good to be true."

The magazine traditionally does not consider the head of either house for either list, but of House Speaker Bill Clayton, it says, "Clayton solidified his reputation as a fair Speaker, working the House hard, but letting issues be resolved without arm twisting. - Clayton's most serious deficiency is that he is a politician of

limited vision.' The last statement we can't agree with. We think Bill's vision will eventually take in the Governor's chair.

A rodeo, parade, old fiddlers contest, watermelon feed, and other family activities will be featured in the 1977 edition of Border Town Days scheduled July 29-30 in Texico-Farwell.

The two-day celebration will be kicked off by the first performance of the rodeo at the Farwell Arena Friday night, July 29, starting at 8 o'clock CDT. The rodeo, being sponsored by Farwell Jaycees, is a High Plains Rodeo rather than an AJRA rodeo as have

been put on here in the past. Details concerning entries for the performances will be announced later.

Another performance of the rodeo at 8 o'clock Saturday night will climax a day of activities for all members of the family.

At 2 p.m. Saturday the Border Town Days parade will unfold, beginning in Texico and continuing to the eastern edge of Farwell. All riding clubs, civic organizations,

businesses, bands or music groups, churches and individuals are encouraged to enter floats or vehicles in the parade. Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be awarded by Texico-Farwell Lions Club to the three top entries in the parade.

Immediately following the parade, activities will continue at Farwell City Park where an old fiddlers contest will be staged to get things underway. The State Line Tribune will present a \$50 prize to the top

winner in the fiddlers contest; Roberts Insurance Agency will present the second place winner a \$25 check; and I.W. Quickel and MONY will present \$15 to the third place winner.

In addition to the old fiddlers contest and other musical presentations, there will be a dunking board sponsored by the Jaycees. It is hoped that other civic groups in Texico and Farwell will set up booths for entertainment and money-



In the matching funds grant, the city would have to come up with a like share of the \$33,450 figure; however, it was pointed out that the Jaycees have volunteered the labor for constructing the building and the land has been appraised at \$28,000; so with only a few pledges and donations, the

matching funds would be met.

Site of the proposed community center is east of the Baptist Church and south of the Convalescent Center. Charles Aycock, Farwell, reportedly owns most of the lots involved and is said to have agreed to sell the land for his cost for this community proj-

The city agreed to re-submit the application for the grant, redesignating it from tennis courts to community building, then attempt to fulfill the grant terms by June 1, 1978, without any additional funds from the city.

In other business Lee Hutchins, Farwell Fire Chief, reported that the annual firemen's training school at Texas A&M University, College Station, is to be held the final week of July and asked the city for assistance in sending two firemen to the school. The city agreed to pay registration costs, plus \$200 expenses to send the men to the school. The fire department is sending Randy Kelley and Al Lopez to the sessions.

It was agreed that the city would have an authorized person in Amarillo on July 14 to sign the PRPC matching funds grant application for a new ambulance for the city. The \$240 monthly subsidy the city receives from the county for ambulance service could

costs of the city's part of the grant. The new ambulance would have all the equipment required by the department of health, and the two-way radio in the present ambulance would be transferred to the new vehicle. Cost of the vehicle would be approximately \$14,000 - \$15,000 of which the

city would pay 40 per cent. The city will sign the application and will determine later when the vehicle is available (about six to eight months) whether or not a need

for a new ambulance exists. A bid from Lee's Electric was accepted for remodeling the overhead lighting in the city hall.

Hamlin Overstreet complimented the city employees for their efforts in cleaning the Olivette Cemetery located south of Farwell on the State Line Road. Overstreet said. that the late Judge Hamlin was responsible for the location of the cemetery; however, it is uncertain as to who

actually "owns" the facility Overstreet suggested that the city take over the cemetery property and perhaps sell lots in it and oversee its upkeep. Mrs. Bowery, Earl Roberts and Dee Hammit are those who have been responsible for the present clean up tasks at the cemetery and were commended for a job well done.


The city took no action on the proposal by Overstreet, and will look into the matter before making a decision.

Starting next Tuesday, July 5, cattle producers here and all across the United States will begin voting on the Beef Referendum. Voter registration has been going on since June 6, and to be eligible to vote, a person must have registered with his local ASCS office. The actual voting will

appointed if the vote is favorable and the board will consist of not more than 68 also be done at the ASCS members from across the nation. They will be selected from the ranks of beef producers by the Secretary of Agriculture as nominated by their producer organizations.

Representation on the board would be proportional to the number of cattle produced in each state or geographical area. Based on its cattle production Texas will have seven producers on the board.

If producers approve the program it is possible that the board might meet late this year; however, it would probably be sometime in 1978 before a research and information program could be developed and first assessments begin on cattle sales.



On The Farm Parmer County

I have an update on the mosiac problem seen in parts of Parmer County. On June 20, I sent two samples to Dr. Robert W. Toler, plant virologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Texas A&M University. I received his report on June 24, stating that the samples showed positive MDMV infection. He stated that possibly another virus was present, but wasn't for sure. I sent him more samples on June 27,

At the present time we don't know how much yield loss will be seen from the infected fields. In most fields the infected plants are continuing to grow, which is encouraging. When ear set is complete we should be able to determine more about this situation.

more light on the problem.

Until then I will keep you posted on any new developments that arise. On June 17, Dr. Robert Berry, Extension Pathologist and I determined the percentage of MDMV infection on 150 commercial hybrids and experiment station crosses. There are some popular, commercial hybrids that are showing resistance so far. More of these ratings will be made throughout the growing season and made public this fall.
