Bill Hardage Guides Track Team Success

Dr. Bill Hardage, versatile young track coach and head of the physical education department at Wayland Baptist College, Plainview, has just completed one of his most successful and busiest track seasons.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Lacy Hardage of Muleshoe

and a graduate of Lazbuddie High School, Dr. Hardage accompanied the WBC track team to a two-day meet in Durango, Mexico, in late May where the Pioneer thinclads won seven firsts and completely dominated the meet over North Texas State and five Mexican teams. After a brief stopover at home, Hardage and the tracksters were off to Arkadelphia, Ark., and another meet.

According to Danny Andrews, sports editor of the Plainview Daily Herald, the Wayland track mentor now plans to spend considerable time recruiting athletes to fill the "big holes created on the team by graduation." Andrews quoted Hardage as saying at the beginning of the year that he thought the team could break six school records and they wound up breaking eight of them.

"With five All-Americans, they know who we are on the national scene," Hardage said.

He commented that he thought the WBC athletes competed very well in Mexico, considering the difference in climate etc., noting that the temperature was over 100 degrees and the altitude was like that at Denver. He said that they were treated very well while in Durango, a city of some 150,000 population that doesn't seem to him to be as commercialized toward tourism as many of the Mexican cities.

According to the Plainview newspaper, Wayland has been invited back next year to a similar tournament to be held in Mexico City.

In addition to teaching a summer session course at Wayland, Dr. Hardage has found time to participate in one of his favorite hobbies, flying an airplane. He recently competed in the spring hamburger cook-out and fly-in at Laney Airfield north of Hale Center. Some 25 aircraft competed for prizes in the event which was sponsored by the Plainview Experimental Aircraft Association.

Flying an Ercoupe, Dr. Hardage took first place in spot landing and first in ribbon cutting.

Hardage and his wife, Susan, have two children, Tim, age 10, and Cindy, 7.

On The Farm In Parmer County

I have an update on the mosaic problem seen in parts of Parmer County. On June 20, I sent two samples to Dr. Robert W. Toler, plant virologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Texas A&M University. I received his report on June 24, stating that the samples showed positive MDMV infection. He stated that possibly another virus was present, but wasn't for sure. I sent him more samples on June 27, which hopefully will shed more light on the problem.

At the present time we don't know how much yield loss will be seen from the infected fields. In most fields the infected plants are continuing to grow, which is encouraging. When ear set is complete we should be able to determine more about this situation.

Until then I will keep you posted on any new developments that arise. On June 17, Dr. Robert Berry, Extension Pathologist and I determined the percentage of MDMV infection on 150 commercial hybrids and experiment station crosses. There are some popular, commercial hybrids that are showing resistance so far. More of these ratings will be made throughout the growing season and made public this fall.

ROTHE TO RETIRE - Joe H. Rothe, who has served with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service for the past 30 years, most recently as associate director, will retire on August 31. Rothe has also served as assistant director, State Agricultural Agent, district agent, county agent and assistant county agent. 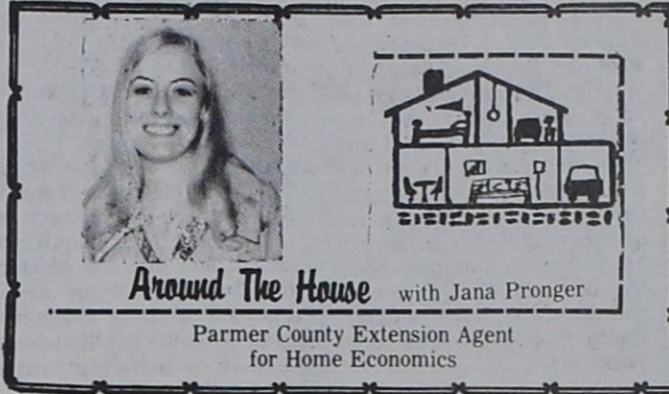
Susan Meeks Attends LCC Music Camp

Parmer County Extension Agent for Home Economics

With the new smooth top cooking surfaces so popular I thought some of you could use this information.

Cooking on smooth-top ranges works best in pans that have a wide, flat bottom - and are made of materials with a high heat-conducting ability.

A variety of cookware fits that description - from stainless steel with an aluminum clad bottom to certain glass ceramic pieces.

In recent research by the

Ohio State University College of Home Economics, two different glass ceramic pans performed comparably to a stainless steel utensil with an aluminum-clad bottom. However, the stainless steel, aluminum-clad utensil performed most effectively when all types of ranges were considered.

During the studies, researchers used five different types of pans - to test heat distribution patterns, the interior bottom surfaces - and the time necessary to heat water and to heat oil.

One marriage license has been issued by the Parmer County Clerk's office since the last report. It went to William Walter Linville and Maria Elena Estrada.

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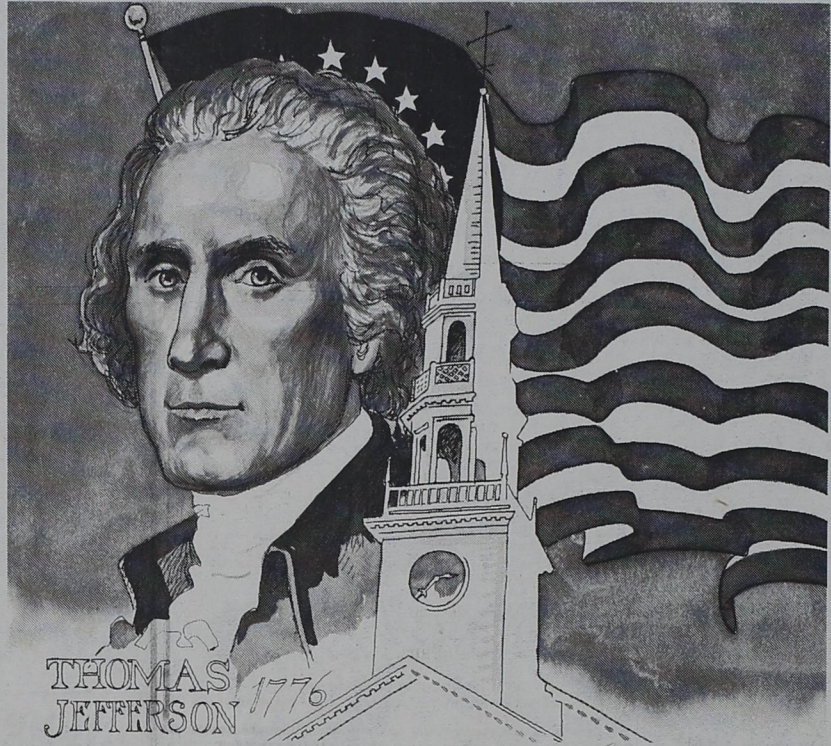

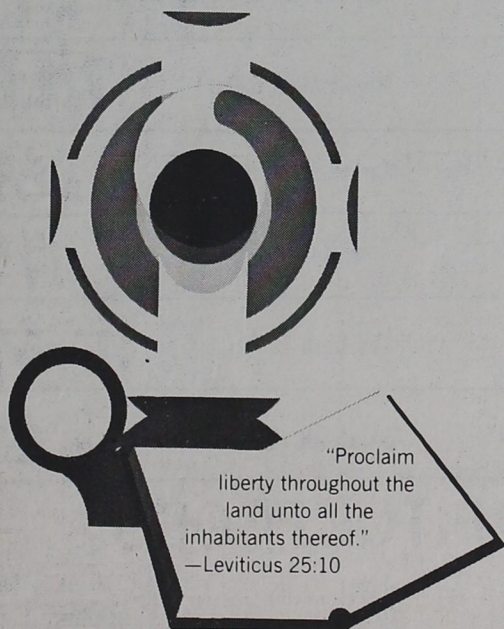

The girls attending had a full week of learning how the

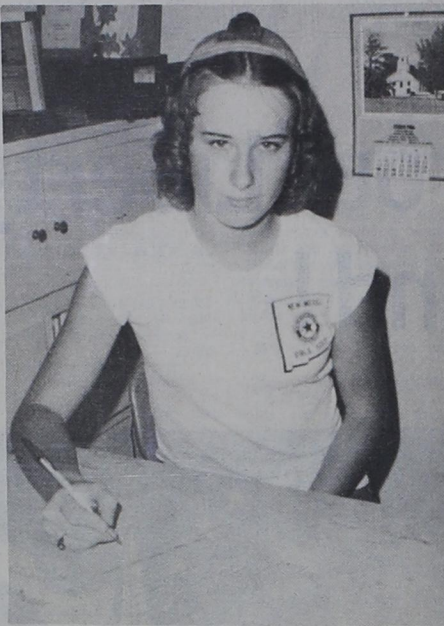
government works. They were exposed to such things as Americanism, Citizenship, Law and Order, World Affairs, Freedom, Bill Passing, and Government in the City, County and State.

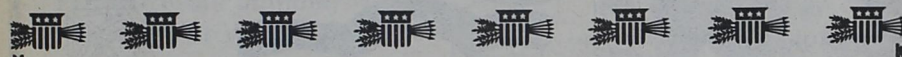
