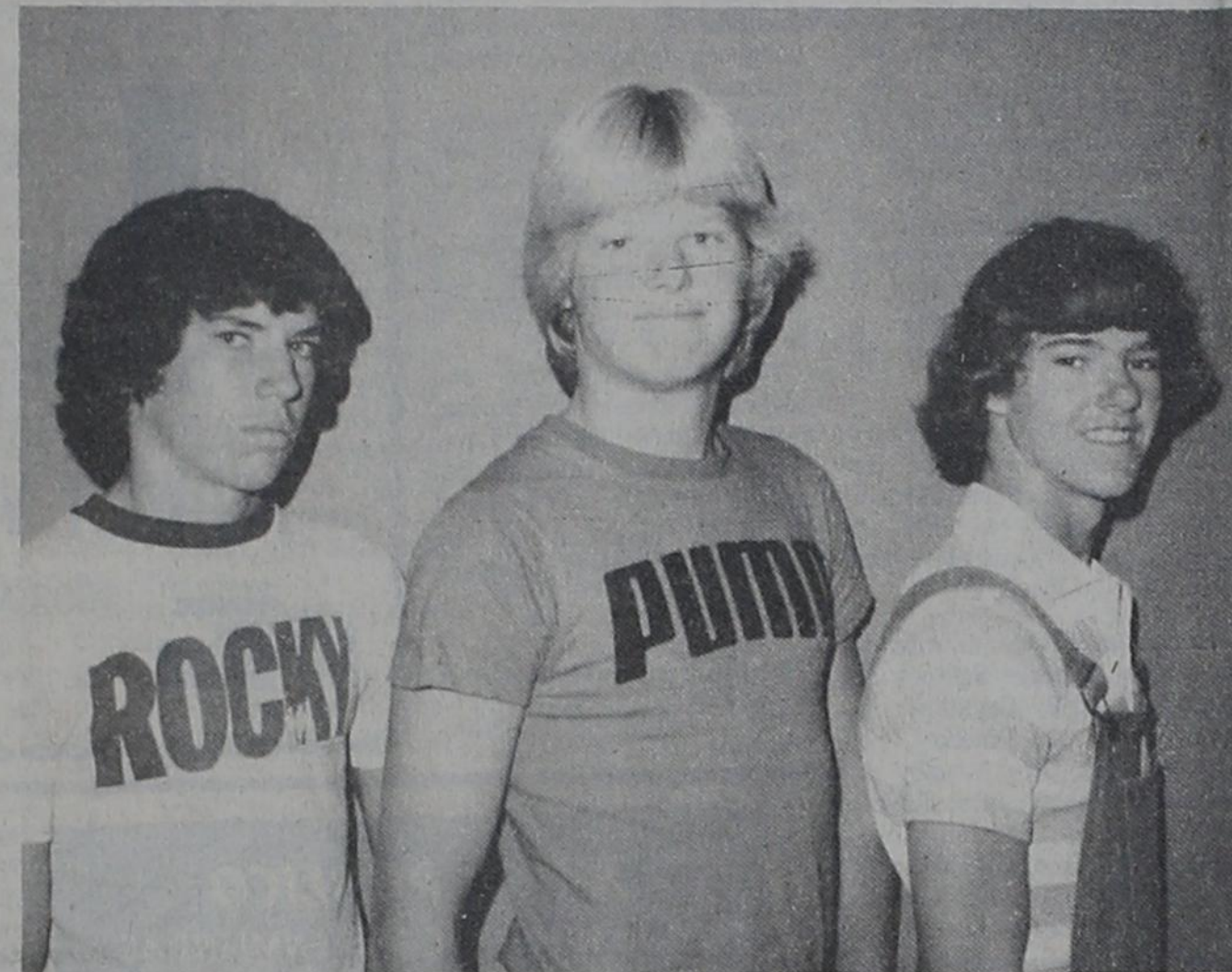


**Queen Candidates**

## Texico Council Discusses Future Paving Projects

Texico City Council discussed future paving projects at its Tuesday night meeting. City Attorney Harry Patton was authorized to proceed with the groundwork for drawing up the necessary legal papers so that City Engineer Richard Pettigrew can start evaluating which streets need the work done first. According to Clara Wiehl, city clerk, all the avenues in town are in "need of work."

Mrs. Wiehl said the paving project will be financed through a special assessments program. However, she said the actual project is "still in the early stages" and that it "might be quite awhile" before anything is done about having the avenues repaved. Pettigrew will also obtain

copies of a map of the Texico water and sewer system from the Santa Fe office of the state Environmental Improvement Agency. Mrs. Wiehl said the original map which was kept at the city hall was lost several weeks ago. Once the city has a copy of the map they will proceed with its feasibility study, reports the city clerk.

Through an agreement reached with the Texico Municipal School System the Council decided to reimburse the school system for installing new water lines at the football field by subtracting the sum of \$1400.15 from the school's water bill.

A similar arrangement was made with W.D. Howard who will be reimbursed for \$1961.77. The Council also approved

the purchase of 12 water meters, replacing several old and worn ones which are still in use.

Jimmy Marks of Espanola, N.M., met with the Council concerning the rates charged for palm readers. According to city ordinance 129 a monthly fee of \$160 was to be assessed. However, the Board amended the ordinance and reduced the fee to a yearly rate of \$50.

City employee Garlan Edge reported that illegal dumping has been occurring at the city dump grounds. It was pointed out that anyone caught dumping trash at the city dump will be fined.

The Council also discussed changing the city office hours to 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., but no action was taken.

## County Corn Harvest Producing Low Yields

Corn harvest is underway in Parmer County and it is expected to be in "full swing" by the end of this week or the middle of next week, reports Mack Heald, county extension agent, and area elevator operators.

### Around The Twin Cities

Farwell Hospital District Board will meet Tuesday, Sept. 20, at 8 p.m. CDT at the Convalescent Center.

Farwell City Council meeting originally scheduled for Monday night was postponed. Next regular meeting will be conducted September 26, at 5:15 p.m. CDT at the City Hall.

However, with approximately 10 per cent of the county fields harvested the early yields look bleak. Heald said current yields are running about 2000 to 3000 pounds less per acre than last year.

The county agent blames the lower yields on three primary problems. "The severe hot and dry weather which plagued us during the tasseling and pollination stage prevented some fields from pollinating normally," Heald said.

Other problems plaguing area corn farmers were mites and disease which caused "quite a bit of damage."

Heald estimates that "barren no wet weather" the fields should be harvested by November 1.

The corn harvest began a

few weeks earlier than last year with local elevators receiving their first loads on August 26 this year.

Fred Chandler of Sherley-Anderson-Pitman in Farwell, described the present yields as "sorry," adding that they are averaging "60 percent less than last year."

Chandler said the average weight is 54 pounds per bushel and current prices (as of Wednesday morning) were \$3.27 per 100 weight. He said it was "up slightly," but the general feeling among the local elevator operators is that the "prices are way down."

Asa Smith of Sherley-Anderson Grain Co. of Lariat reports that the corn received there thus far has had a "dry moisture content" because of early maturing and lack of

The purpose of this ploy is to deprive the board members of being able to have the school system pay for their legal defense.

This concept, were it to take root on law, would effectively unravel a big section of the warp and woof of our local governmental system. This could expose every member of a school board, city council, county court, etc., to severe personal loss.

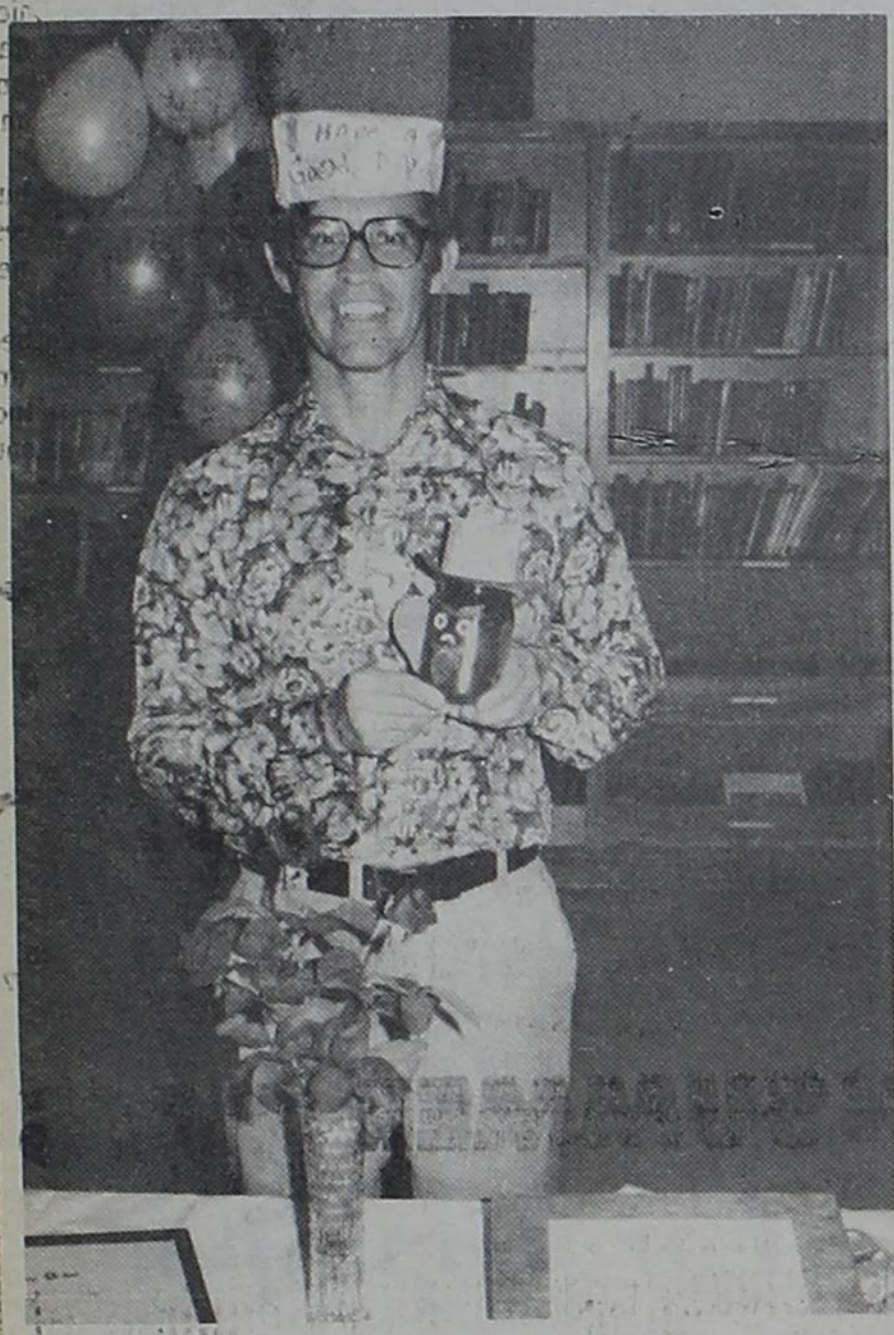

## Clayton Announces - - Weather Modification Permits Terminated

State Representative Bill Clayton said last Wednesday (Sept. 7) he had been informed by the Texas Department of Water Resources of the immediate termination of permits for weather modification operations in target areas of Atmospheric, Inc. and Plains Weather Improvement Association.

The cancellation of the permits is the result of elections held in the permit areas. The election ballots were tabulated by the Department of Water Resources and the results were finalized last Wednesday. Clayton said the election results are the finalization of the controversy which has been associated with the weather modification operations.  
 "The elections provided for by legislation passed last spring, have given the opportunity to the people of our area to finally settle the long standing dispute over state regulation of hail suppression. 'The people have made their wishes known and the Department of Water Resources is informing the companies involved of the people's decision by letter,' Clayton said.

The counties affected by the order in Clayton's legislative 74th district include Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Olton and Parmer.  
 Other High Plains counties in which permits were cancelled include Bristo, Crosby, Floyd, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock, Randall and Swisher.  
 For the first time in seven years there will be no hail suppression program in the High Plains area.

## PUBLIC NOTICE SUMMARY OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS GENERAL ELECTION NOV. 8, 1977

### NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 18)

S.J.R. 18 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to provide for expanding the Court of Criminal Appeals from its current membership of five judges to nine judges and to permit the court to sit in panels of three judges.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges."

### NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

S.J.R. 13 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances."

### NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 3)

Under current Texas law a person charged with a felony offense who has previously been convicted of two felony offenses may be denied bail. S.J.R. 3 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution which would also result in the denial of bail, for a limited time and subject to appeal, to a person accused of committing a felony while on bail for a prior felony for which the person has been indicted, or accused of a felony involving the use of

### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

S.J.R. 19 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the formation of associations authorized to collect certain refundable assessments from producers of poultry, livestock, and other raw agricultural or marine products and validating the 1967 law regarding the formation of such associations. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

### NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 49)

S.J.R. 49 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution to permit the legislature to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking privileges by use of electronic devices or machines located at such places as may be provided by law and authorizes the sharing of such electronic devices or machines among banks on a reasonable, non-discriminatory basis.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines."

### NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 30)

S.J.R. 30 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and making several changes in its powers and procedures. The most significant change would authorize the Commission to suspend from office judges and justices under indictment.

### NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 5)

S.J.R. 5 proposes an amendment to the Texas Constitution authorizing the legislature to grant exemptions or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property designated for the preservation of cultural, historical or natural history resources.

### NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 19)

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical, or natural history resources."

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products."

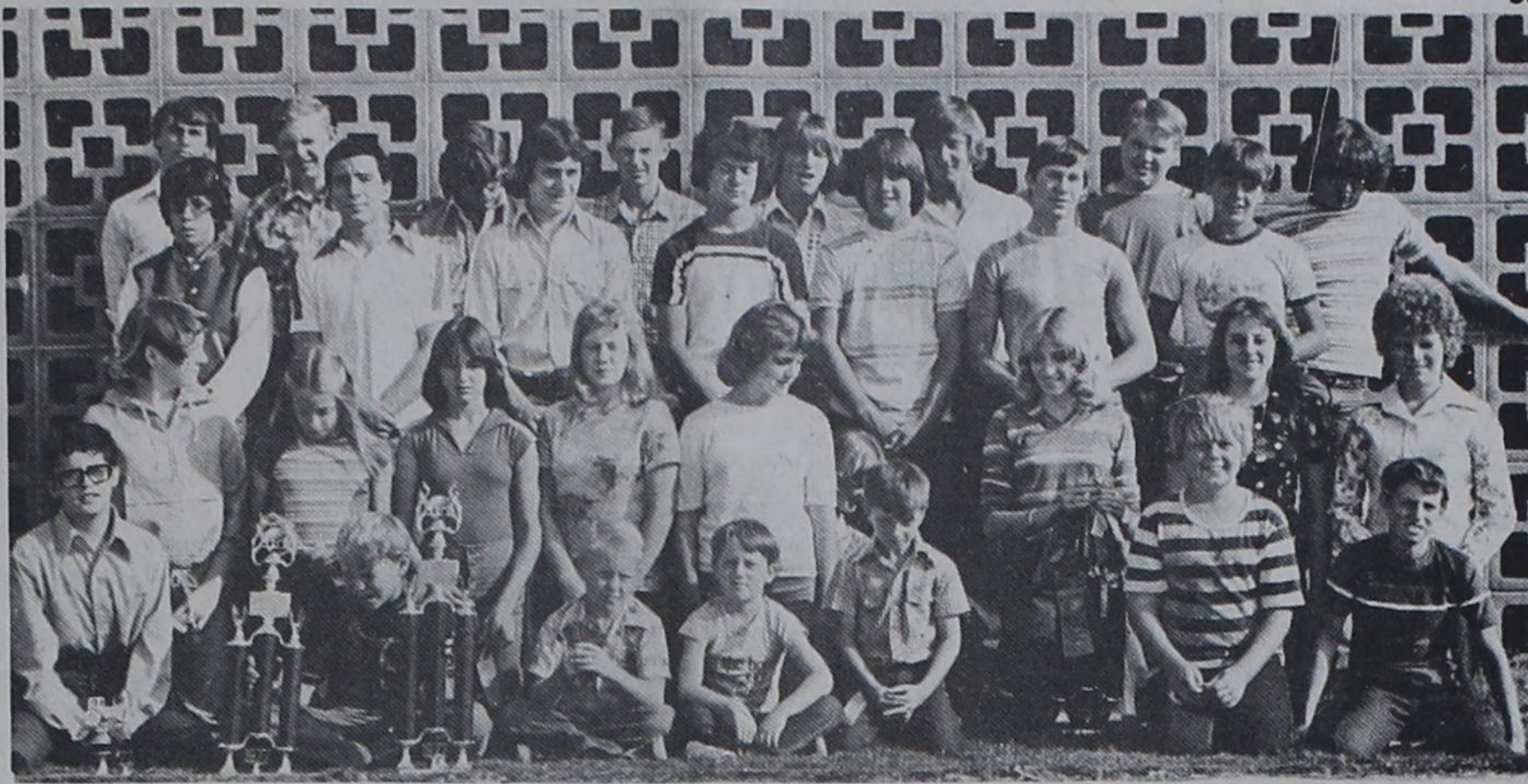

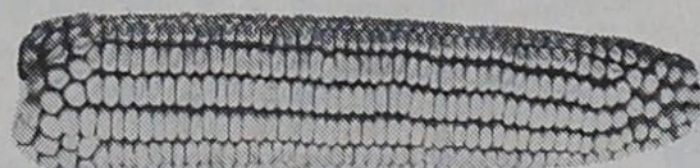

The Gulf Coast area of Texas has potential for growing a \$2 billion cotton crop with the use of newly developed varieties, according to Dr. Luther Bird, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. He based his projection on a crop of 5.5 million acres, lint yields of 700 lbs. per acre, a price of 50¢ per pound. Dr. Bird stressed that the new MAR varieties allow farmers to reduce inputs, such as insecticides, fungicides and fertilizer... the threat of disease, insect problems and environmental extremes. The new MAR varieties usually outyield conventional varieties. Most MAR varieties mature 2-4 weeks earlier than current varieties. The research station's effort now is to breed plants to control boll weevils and bollworms. He also said drilling the new cotton varieties in two rows on a 40-inch bed can substantially boost yields.

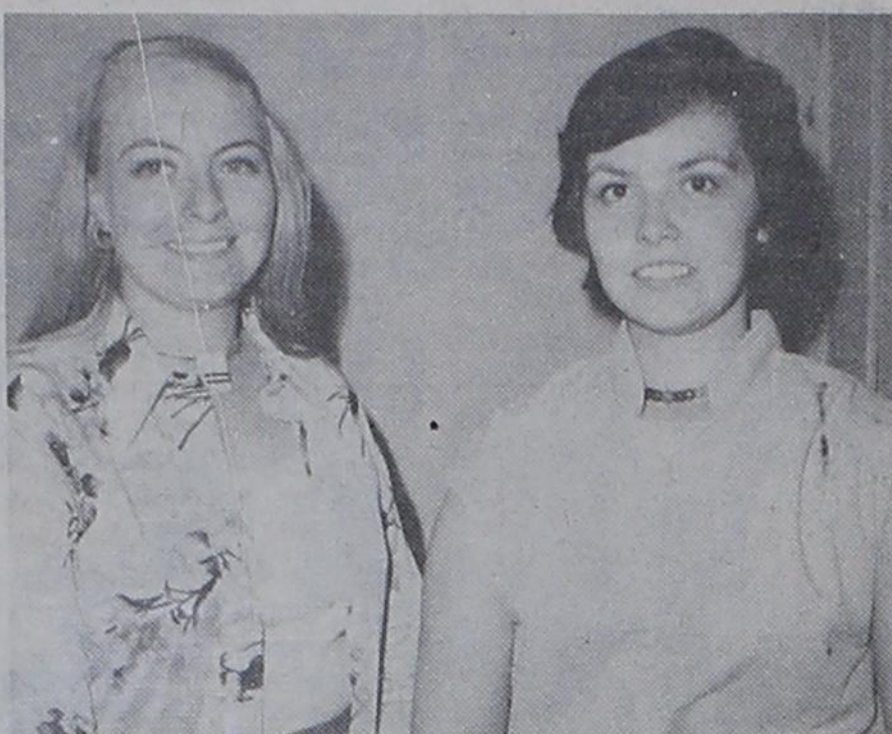

## Recipe Correction

### FIESTA CORN

2 eggs  
1 c. yellow cornmeal  
1 can (1 lb. size) cream corn  
1/4 c. milk  
1/2 c. margarine melted  
1/2 t. baking soda  
1 t. salt  
1/2 lb. shredded cheddar cheese  
1 can (14 oz.) green chiles

Beat the eggs lightly in a medium size bowl. Stir in cornmeal. Add the corn, milk, margarine, baking soda and salt. Grease a six-cup casserole dish with oil or margarine. Place one-half of the corn mixture in the casserole dish. Add one-half of the cheese and the chilies (cut into chunks). Add remaining corn mixture and top with remaining cheese. Bake at 350 degrees for 45 minutes or until set. Time depends on shape of casserole. Cut into wedges and spoon out.

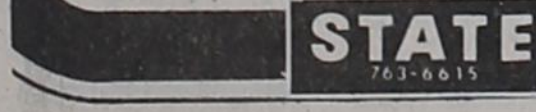

Two Wolverines have been singled out for special "Wolverines of the Week" honors due to their performances last Friday night in the Lazbuddie tilt which left the Green and White on the short end of the 7-0 score. Steve Turner, senior tailback and defensive end, received accolades for his efforts as a ball carrier and a wide receiver. Jimmy Reid, junior linebacker and guard, was accorded defensive kudos by virtue of recovering one fumble and making nine unassisted and six assisted tackles.

It was a long night in Texico last Friday as the visiting Lazbuddie Longhorns sneaked away with a slim 7-0 victory. The Wolverines are now 0-2 for the season while the Horns have upped their standing to 2-0.

Breaks were the name of the game as each team committed a significant number of mental errors and miscues. But the real break came Lazbuddie's way early in the first quarter when they capitalized on a blocked punt to score the only touchdown of the game.

A frustrated Wolverine offense once again failed to maneuver the pigskin across the goal line, remaining scoreless in two games.

The Green and White won the toss and Steve Turner returned the opening Lazbuddie kick for short yardage. Four plays later Texico attempted to kick the ball away. But an alert Lazbuddie defense pounced on the Texico punt to take possession of the ball on the host team's 19-yard line. Several plays later quarterback Charleston Steinbock went in for the only score of the game. Dennis Steinbock's kick for the PAT was good and Lazbuddie took the lead, 7-0.

From that point on the grid contest turned into a seesaw battle with each team attempting to cross the goal line to no avail.

Penalties also played a role in the game as in the first quarter the ball was moved about 45 yards through mistakes perpetrated by both teams.

Halftime activities took on a new wrinkle as Green and White cheerleaders and fans formed a victory line for the players to run through. Another new feature at Texico games is that fans are now also able to vote for the defensive and offensive player of their choice. At the end of each home game fans are to use the ballots stapled into the programs to vote for the player of their choice. Ballot boxes are provided at the stadium.

As second half play got underway Lazbuddie fumbled a Wolverine kickoff, but managed to recover the ball. However, four plays later they again fumbled the pigskin and Texico recovered. Several plays

later Charleston Steinbock batted down a Homer Ashley pass to Robert Lacy to kill the Green and White's scoring hopes.

With five minutes left in the third stanza Doug Scioli recovered a Lazbuddie fumble, but once again Texico was unable to capitalize on the mistake.

Texico defenders Don Duncan and Dusty Casey united to stop a Charleston Steinbock run. Three plays later Steinbock was shaken up and was temporarily replaced by Andy Rogers.

With less than five minutes in the game the Texico offense perked up momentarily and almost reached paydirt. Ashley drilled a pass to Robert Lacy for good gain, but an

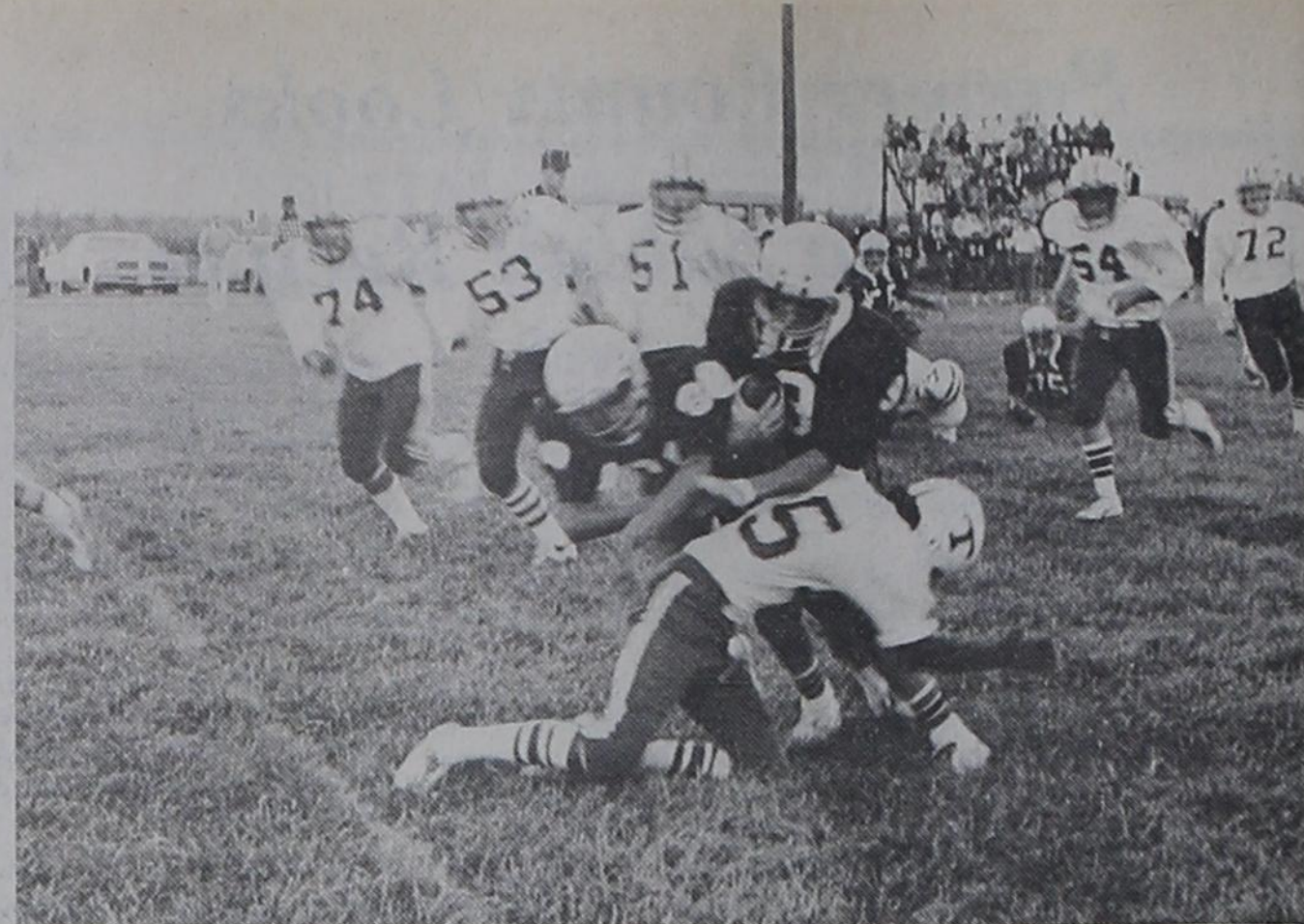
offside penalty pushed the Green and White back five yards and killed the momentum of their drive.

## Inexperience, Injuries Hinder Winless Texico

Texico head mentor Paul Topliff says he is almost - but not quite - at a loss to explain the Wolverines' winless and scoreless season record. Last Friday night before a significant crowd of Green and White boosters Texico once again failed to score.

"Lack of offensive blocking is killing us," laments Topliff, who adds that the situation "must improve if we are to win any games this year."

Another thorn in Texico's side are costly injuries which have caused players to be shifted around to different and sometimes unfamiliar spots.

Players who were new to the positions of tackle, fullback and tight end were attempting to run the "I" which is the primary Texico offense. Also, players were starting on the offense who had never started before in high school gridiron experience.

Topliff said that Duwain Hill, who has been sidelined with a bruised leg, will be back in action tonight (Friday)

for the encounter with Vaughn. Keith Hadley, who strained the ligaments in his knee, is also still on the inactive list. Terry Rolan is expected to be sidelined with a knee injury.

The gridmaster admitted that even at this late date he had "toyed with the idea of changing offensive strategy." But he nixed the idea because they do not have a "sprinter to run the Veer" and the "wishbone is out because it requires three good backs."

According to the second year coach, the offense was good in pre-season practices and workouts, but since then has not improved.

Topliff explained that the offensive line is not enabling Steve Turner to get past the line of scrimmage. "We are missing blocks and that is costing us games," he said.

For now the Texico coach calls Turner "almost a one man offense." "Steve carries for us nine out of ten times and when we pass we have to

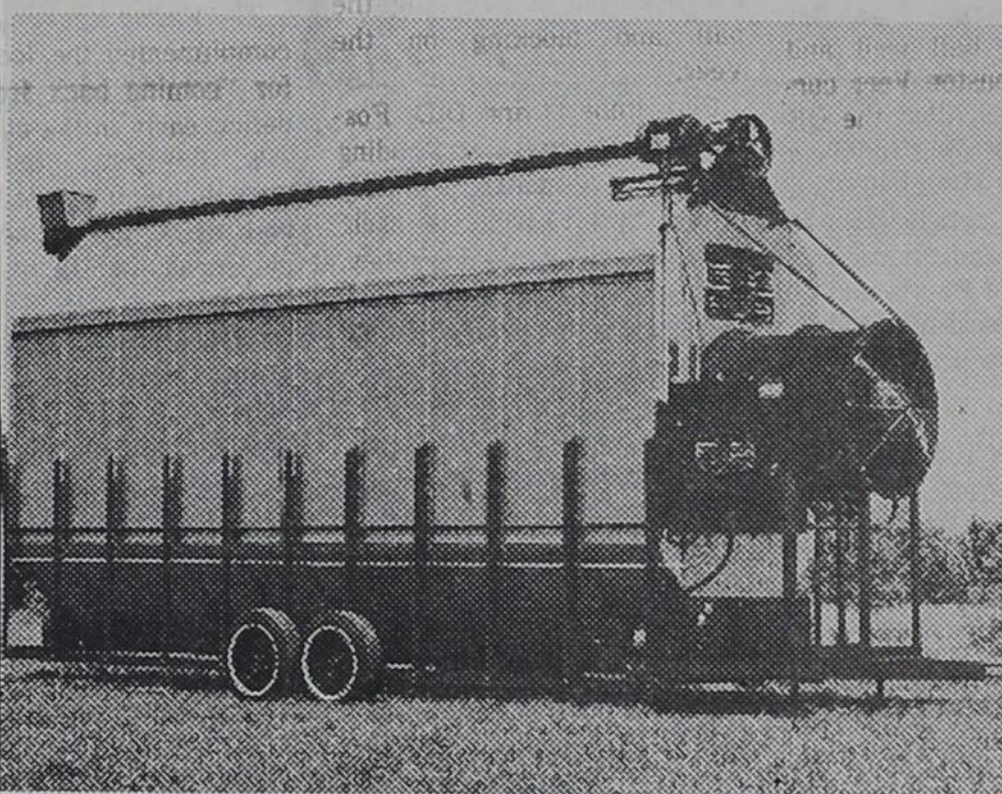

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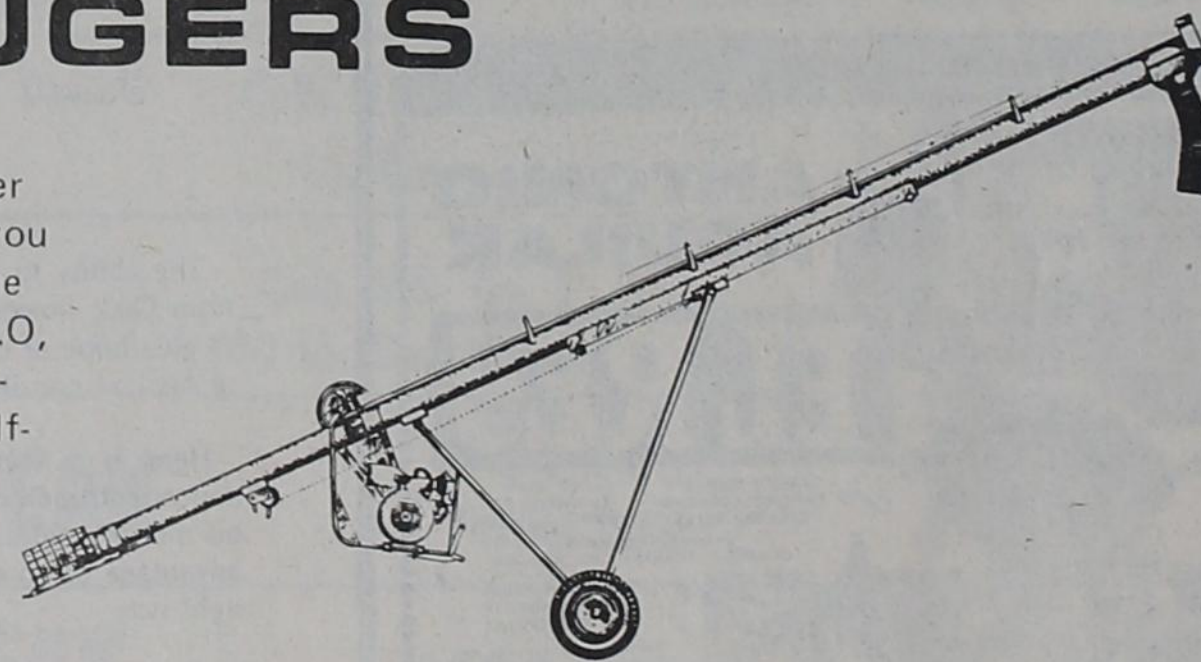


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# Tough-Minded Steers Scalp Morton Indians

Robin Roberts, junior backup quarterback, led the Farwell Steers to a 33-12 scalping of the visiting Morton Indians last Friday night before a thrilled home crowd.

Benny Yruegas took the opening kickoff - booted by Jimmy Jeffcoat - and ran it to the 22 yard line. However, four plays later Keevin Kelley punted as the Steers were unable to put together a sustained drive.

The visiting Indians, led by quarterback Monty Hodge scored on their first possession of the game. Faced with a fourth and four situation, Larry Moore, 200 pound fullback, punched the pigskin in from the 13-yard line. Ty Hall attempted the PAT kick but it was ruled no good and the Indians went ahead 6-0.

However, the Blue and White were not to be outdone as they bounced back with a score of their own. In less than two minutes the Steers put together a scoring drive which culminated when Vick Christian ran 10 yards for the touchdown. Roberts' kick fell short and with seven and one-half minutes left in the first quarter the score was a six-all tie.

Moore took the Roberts kickoff and ran it to Farwell's 39 yard line before being brought down. Hodge completed a pass to Jeffcoat who was stopped by Rowdy Chandler.

Moore carried for another six yards and Lanny Fluitt was stopped for no gain on the next play. A holding penalty pushed the Indians back 15 yards and an incomplete pass was executed on the next play.

Faced with a fourth and 14 situation Hodge tried a keeper, but was smeared by an alert Clay Roberts.

The ball went over on downs and Christian carried for five yards on Farwell's next possession. Tim Norton broke loose for a 22 yard gain and Roberts earned seven on a keeper. A Morton offense penalty gave the home team an added five yards and Norton again scampered for 13. With a first and goal situation Christian came through for five yards and Roberts tried a keeper, but was thrown for a two yard loss. At the five yard line Roberts made a quick pass to Chandler who was all alone in the end zone. With a little over a minute left in the first quarter Farwell had struck again, increasing their lead to 12-6. A bad snap killed the PAT try and the score remained 12-6.

After an exchange of punts, the Blue and White were backed into a hole on their own six yard line. Christian earned nine yards on three carries, but it fell short of the first down and Kelley punted. Moore received the ball but was stopped by Carlos Lucio for no gain.

On the next play Moore carried for six yards and then Roberts dropped Hodge for no gain. Morton fumbled, but recovered the ball and two plays later the ball went over on downs.

Norton carried first for a 15 yard gain to the Morton 49 yard line. Roberts then pitched the ball to Chandler who passed to Max Lonsdale for another six points. Again a high snap thwarted the PAT kick, but a Morton penalty for unnecessary roughness gave the Blue and White another chance. This time Roberts came through with the PAT and the Steers took a commanding lead of 19-6 with a little over six minutes in the half.

Moore ran the kickoff to the Indian 31 yard line. Hodge attempted a pass which was broken up by Lonsdale who jarred the ball loose. Hodge then earned four yards on a keeper. Moore gained a first down but at their own 46 yard line the ball was fumbled and Farwell recovered.

Norton gained 20 yards on Farwell's next possession bringing the ball to Morton's 22 yard line. A holding penalty pushed the host team back to the 36. Roberts threw an incomplete pass and on the next play Christian was thrown for a yard loss. After two more incomplete passes, the ball went over on downs.

Hodge was hit by Richard Yruegas just as he released the ball and Norton stopped Moore for no gain. Two plays

later Morton punted and Farwell fumbled but recovered its own mistake.

Norton and Roberts carried for a total of 19 yards on the next two maneuvers, then Carlos Lucio was stopped for no gain. Norton then carried for six and Christian for one, but the drive fell short of the first down and Farwell punted the ball away. It rolled dead on the Morton 10 yard line.

A 15 yard penalty against the Indians gave Farwell possession with only a few seconds left in the first half. Christian carried for six yards and the Steers set up for a field goal attempt. However, Farwell was penalized five yards for delay of game and did not try for the three-pointer. Christian carried for short yardage as time ran out with the Steers leading 19-6.

Early in the third stanza Morton took possession on the 20 yard line. Four plays later they punted and the ball rolled to the Farwell 33. On a third and 12 Roberts completed a pass to Lucio for a first down at their own 48. A pitchback was fumbled and Morton recovered. However, they also fumbled on the next play and Farwell again took possession of the pigskin. But it was to no avail as Kelley punted four plays later.

Morton took over on Farwell's 35. Lonsdale, an alert Steer defender, intercepted a Hodge pass at the 35 yard line. The Blue and White suffered an offside penalty and a three yard loss by Roberts. Norton carried for three, but it fell short of the first down and Kelley punted. The pigskin rolled to the Morton 26.

Morton fumbled and Farwell capitalized on the mistake to add six more points on the board. With less than two minutes remaining in the quarter Christian scampered 65 yards to put six points on the board. In spite of a penalty for taking too much time, Roberts makes good his kick and Farwell increased its lead to 26-6.

At the start of final quarter action a Steer fumble gave the ball to the visitors on the Farwell 35 yard line. Hodge attempted a keeper but was smeared by Rusty McFarland for a five yard loss.

At the Farwell 38 Lucio leaped high into the air to

intercept a Hodge pass. Several plays later Roberts uncranked a pass to Lonsdale who went in for the score. Roberts kicked the extra point and Farwell outdistanced Morton, 33-6.

After Morton took possession on their own 28 Clay Roberts threw Shayne Duncan for a loss. An incomplete pass followed, but a roughing the passer penalty gave Morton possession on their own 42. Hodge attempted a keeper but was brought down by Steve Hargrove for a five yard loss. Two plays later Hodge completed a pass to Lonnie Bracken.

At the Farwell 36 Dan Geuther sacked the quarterback for a ten yard loss and

Roberts, Hargrove and Yruegas teamed up to stop Hodge on the next play.

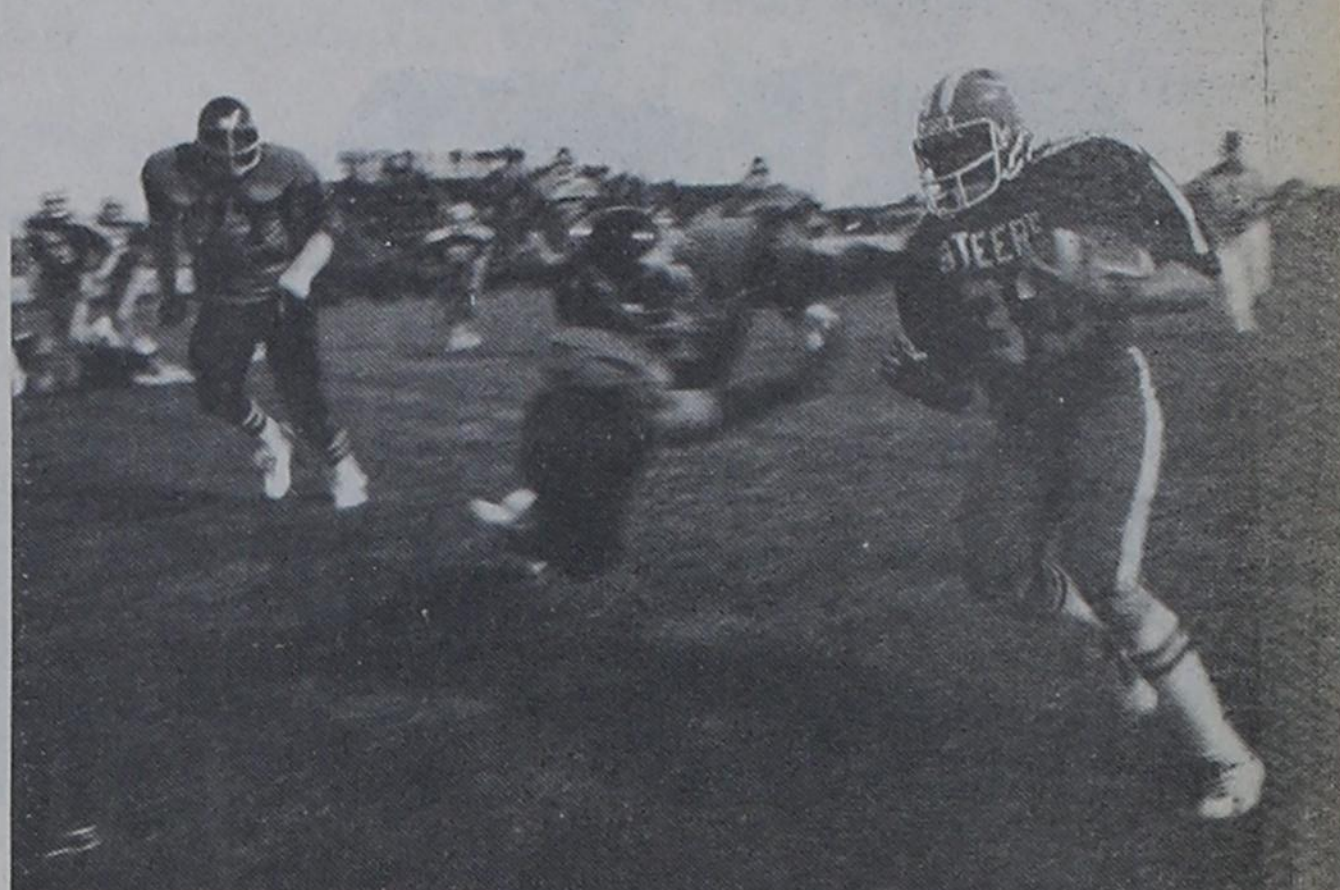
With less than a minute remaining in the contest Morton tried to pass for two extra points but the attempt failed and the score remained Farwell 33 - Morton 12.

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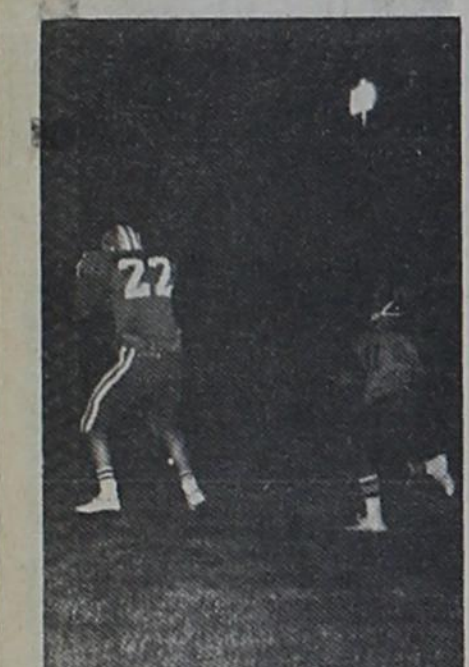

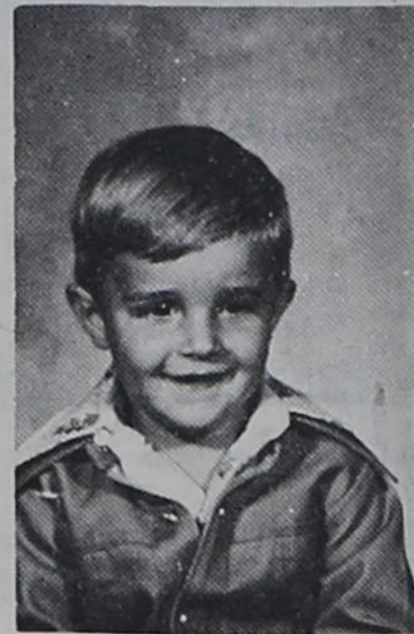

# Bullock Announces Visits To Texas Businessmen

Comptroller Bob Bullock alerted Texas businessmen Monday, Sept. 12, to begin looking for a friendly visit from a Comptroller's enforcement officer sometime during the next nine months.

The Comptroller said that the enforcement officers from his 40 field offices will fan out across the state with the goal of offering personal assistance to each and every Texas business.

A testing of the canvassing program in July showed that 19 percent of taxpayers contacted required assistance or needed permits, he said.

"The theme of this project is taxpayer assistance," Bullock said. "We have found that in many instances only personal contact can eliminate errors that eventually prove costly both to the taxpayer and the Comptroller's Office."

He said his employees, armed with smiles and packages of taxpayer information, will be knocking on doors with the hopes of:

- providing education to taxpayers;
- making sure every business is properly permitted;
- establishing personal lines of communication between taxpayers and the individual enforcement officer responsible for the area;
- updating Comptroller's Office records;
- making certain each taxpayer is filing returns and paying tax properly.

July's sample of 4,702 businesses showed that 97 were operating without needed permits, 766 had changed address or business name without notifying Comptroller's Office and 37 were not paying tax properly, Bullock said.

**KNOWING CHRIST AS HE SHOULD BE KNOWN**

John the Baptist introduced our Lord with the proclamation: "Behold, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand" (Matthew 3:2). Throughout His earthly ministry Christ was known as "the Son of David," the king with whom God had made a covenant to establish his kingdom forever.

### Texico Board Meets

Texico School Board met Tuesday night to consider a lengthy agenda.

Jim Pierce, superintendent, reported that the Board signed an agreement with the Texico town trustees to the effect that the school would be reimbursed for the cost of installing the new six-inch water line for the football field.

A band trip to Carlsbad, N.M., on November 5, was approved. Band students will be competing in the Southeastern New Mexico Educators Association District Marching Contest.

It was also decided to amend the permission slips for trips etc. to include parental permission for the sponsor to take a sick child to the nearest available doctor.

New evaluation forms for the principals to use in evaluating teachers were approved. Principals will evaluate teachers three times a year, Pierce said.

The board also approved use of the high school gym for the annual Texico Woman's Club

arts and crafts fair. Pierce also said that if the swimming pool is open during the fall and the spring, physical education classes may utilize their class periods to teach swimming, provided that a lifeguard is available throughout the sessions.

The board voted not to have a sock hop for the pep club and football players.

Pierce said that in accordance with new rulings by the state of New Mexico they have set aside the 7th grade as the checkpoint for testing the basic skills of students. According to the new requirement all 10th grade students will be given a basic skills test during their sophomore year. If they pass the test it will be so noted on their diplomas.

The new rule also says that a similar test must be given sometime between the grades of kindergarten and 9th grade. Pierce said the board agreed that the 7th grade was the best year to test the basic skills of the students.

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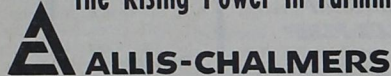
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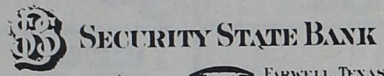
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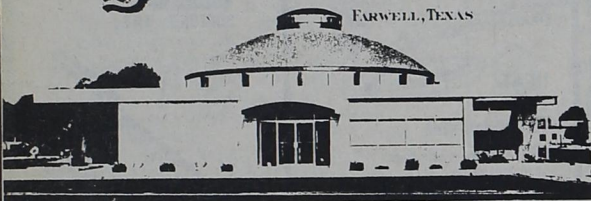
