## BTD Plans Shaping Up; Many Activities On Tap

Border Town Days is just two weeks away and several Twin Cities civic and community organizations are hard at work making preparations and plans for the two-day event which will kick off Friday night, July 29, with the initial performance of the rodeo at Farwell Arena, beginning at 8 p.m. CDT. The final performance of the rodeo will be Saturday night at 8 p.m.

The Farwell Jaycees are sponsoring the rodeo for the second year in a row. It is a High Plains Rodeo rather than an AJRA rodeo as have been put on here in the past.

All entries for the rodeo competition are to be mailed to P.O. Box 1531, Clovis, N.M. 88101 and postmarked no later than 5 p.m. MDT Thursday, July 21. Any student of good standing who was not over 18 years old as of January 1 may enter competition. However, no 1976 high school graduate may enter, regardless of age.

High School dropouts will not be allowed to enter according to HPJRA rules. No late entries will be accepted and no entries will be taken over the phone. All contestants may enter any three of the four events listed in their respective age group.

Besides the entry fees (which vary for different

events), a stock charge and administration fee will also be assessed each contestant. The administration fee is \$2 for HPJRA members and \$5 for non-members. The stock charge has been set at \$2 per calf, \$3 per steer and \$7.50 per bull or bareback.

Boys in the 16-18 category may enter bareback bronc riding, tie down calf roping, bull riding and team roping competition. An entry fee of \$15 will be charged for each event.

Contestants in the boys 13-15 division may choose from bareback bronc riding, tie down calf roping, junior bull riding or team roping. Entry fee for each event is \$10.

Entrants in the boys 12 and under category may participate in calf touching, steer riding, breakaway roping or team roping. An entry fee of \$7.50 will be charged for each event.

Girls in the 13-15 and 16-18 divisions may choose from barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying or breakaway roping. The entry fees are \$10 and \$15, respectively.

Participants in the girls 12 and under category may enter barrel racing, pole bending, goat tying and flag race. The entry fee is \$7.50.

Girls and boys in the 8 and under division may enter barrel racing compe-

tion. The entry fee is \$5.

Other BTD activities besides the rodeo will include a parade, old fiddlers contest, watermelon feed, and other family activities. A special highlight of the two-day celebration will be the parade which is to begin at 2 p.m. Saturday. The parade route begins in Texico and will continue to the eastern edge of Farwell.

All riding clubs, civic organizations, businesses, bands or music groups, churches and individuals are encouraged to enter floats and vehicles in the parade. Prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 will be awarded by Texico-Farwell Lions Club to the three top entries in the parade.

According to James Pierce, president of the Texico Chamber of Commerce, they will prepare and enter a float in the BTD parade.

At the close of the parade the final BTD events will get underway at Farwell City Park. An old fiddlers contest will be

staged and top money prizes of \$50, \$25 and \$15 will be awarded to the top three winners. Sponsors of the money prizes are State Line Tribune, Roberts Insurance Agency and I.W. Quicquel and MONY, respectively.

Besides the old fiddlers contest and other musical presentations the Jaycees will also sponsor a dunking board. Diane Actkinson, president of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority, said they plan to sell iced tea and punch at the park during the parade and the supper which is to begin at 5 p.m. (Continued on Page 2)

### Texico Baptists To Host Revival

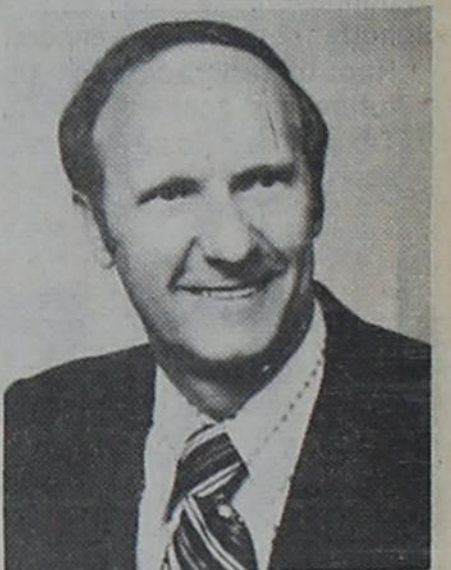
First Baptist Church in Texico will host a revival July 18-24 with daily services at 10:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. MDT.

### Second Man Arrested In Rural Assault Case

Jerry Lee Persons, 24, of Naples, Fla., has been apprehended by Florida law enforcement officers in connection with the terrorizing and assault of a rural family north of Farwell last month, said Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Lovelace says that Persons has signed a waiver of extradition and would be picked up by Parmer County officials in a few days. The local sheriff stated that five charges have been filed against Persons, including two counts of felony assault, two counts of burglary and one count of aggravated rape.

Raymundo Estraca, 26, of Bovina was arrested July 2 and charged with rape, and was arraigned before County Judge Paul Fortenberry July 5. According to Sheriff Lovelace, Estraca has also been charged with two counts of felony assault and two counts of burglary, adding that he has not been arraigned on these charges yet.

Sheriff Lovelace said that all the guns taken from the rural farmhouse at the time of the incident have been recovered, adding that they have also recovered all the items except knives taken from the Adolph Haseloff farm that same night.

In other law enforcement activities, Sheriff Lovelace reported that about \$200

worth of tools were taken from Martin's Auto Repair of Friona. He said that they had recovered a 1962 Chevrolet in the Oklahoma Lane area which had apparently been stolen in Tucumcari. Sheriff Lovelace said the vehicle, which was found abandoned on a dirt road, had been stripped.

Dwayne Obenshain, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harlin Obenshain of Farwell, became the second Boy Scout in the history of Troop 200 to become an Eagle Scout as he received his Eagle Badge during an Eagle Court of Honor conducted Saturday night at Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church in Farwell.

James Wagner of Clovis, program coordinator, opened the Court. The candle lighting ceremony was conducted by Eagle Scouts Rick Garza and Brent Rose. Wagner recited the charge to the Eagle candidate and Obenshain's uncle, Rick Hubbell, who is stationed in Germany, gave his nephew the Eagle Scout Oath of Honor.

Gil Patschke of Farwell was the featured speaker. Wagner honored Mr. and Mrs. Obenshain as parents of the Eagle Candidate, and Dr. Lee Clayton of Farwell recited the official recognition of Obenshain's achievement.

Mrs. Obenshain pinned

the Eagle Badge on her son. Dwayne in turn presented his mother with an Eagle pin and he gave his father an Eagle tie clip. Rev. Russell Martin, pastor, gave the invocation and the benediction. Margaret Aycock was the organist. Selections included "My Country Tis of Thee," "Battle Hymn of the Republic," and "On My Honor." Guy Whitesides led the Pledge of Allegiance.

A reception was held in the parlor following the closing of the Eagle Court of Honor. The reception also honored Obenshain's grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Oris Hubbell of Clovis, who will celebrate their 40th wedding anniversary August 21. Hostesses for the occasion were Debbie Murray and Connie Hubbell.

The white crocheted cloth which covered the serving table belongs to Mrs. Hubbell who says it has been in the family since 1938. It was a gift from her husband's aunt, Maude Voorhees, of Rain-

wood, Okla.

Mrs. Hubbell added that the cloth has been used at the wedding receptions for all her children and on many other occasions. She said the double reception marked the 27th and 28th times that the tablecloth had been used in the last 39 years.

In recognition of her grandson's achievement, Mrs. Hubbell presented him with a special embroidered Eagle quilt which she had made for the occasion.

Obenshain began his scouting in Cub Scout Pack 213 in 1969, with Sally Whitesides as his Den mother. In 1970 he joined Boy Scout Troop 200. Highlights of his scouting career include a trip to Alaska in 1972, and a trek to Philmont, the National Scout Camp at Cimmaron, N.M., in 1974.

At Philmont, Obenshain earned the 50-mile hiking award and the Philmont arrow. He has also earned the God and Country award, an award based on community service and studies in Christian life and responsibilities.

As a member of Troop 200, Obenshain has held the position of Scribe and he is currently serving as the Patrol Leader. He has earned 25 merit badges and several other skill awards. He is also a member of the Order of the Arrow, scouting brotherhood of campers.

Obenshain is 17 years old and will be a senior at Farwell High School this fall. He is a member of the local Methodist church. He is undecided as to what he wants to do in the future, but says he would like to go into the vocational field. He is currently working at Farwell Country Club.

### Albert Kube Buried Sunday In Muleshoe

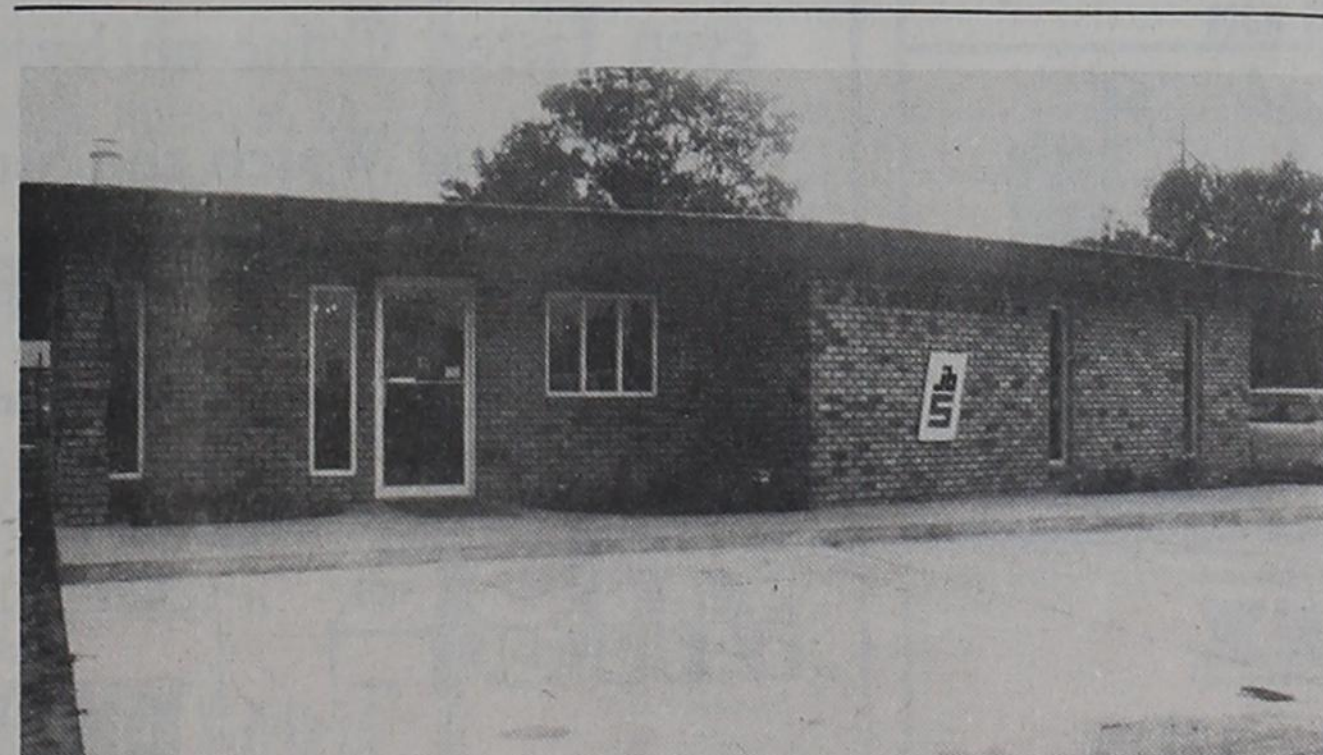

Three weeks ago in this column we brought to your attention the "free breakfast" program bill that had passed the Texas Legislature by a thumping majority and had been signed into law by Governor Briscoe.

We wrote to our representative in the Texas Legislature, Bill Clayton, the House Speaker and speedily received an answer to our inquiry.

Bill answered thusly, "As speaker of the House, I do not vote on bills as a general rule and did not vote on the breakfast bill. However, I wish that I would have cast a dissenting vote on House Bill 136 to which you referred."

"This bill has many problems -- the possible lack of federal funds to fully finance the program and the infringement on local control are two. Despite the problems involved, the bill passed by a good margin and was signed by the Governor."

"Hopefully, the next legislative session can rectify the situation. Thank you for writing. Sincerely, Bill Clayton."

Thank you, Bill, for answering. However, there are several observations we might make in regard to your letter. Apparently, as House Speaker, you do not vote on legislation. We presume that this is either House law or usage. Whichever, it seems to us that the conservative constituents of your district are being deprived of an "on record" vote or voice in the Texas Legislature.

If, on the other hand, you did not like this legislation you must not have worked very hard for its defeat, considering the margin with which it was approved.

Well, we too say, "Hopefully, the next legislative session can rectify the situation." P.S. We are not going to put off breathing until the Texas Legislature repeals this bill.

The picnic was well attended by members and all their families including children and grandchildren.

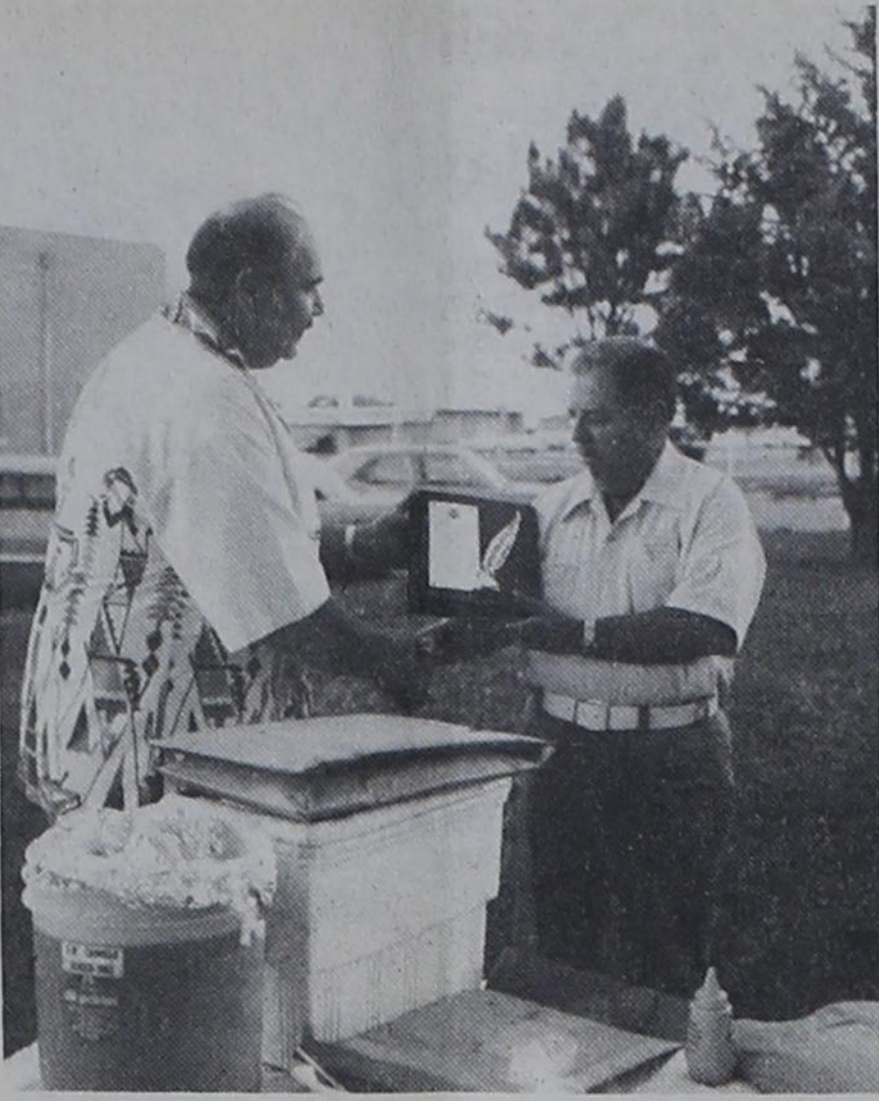

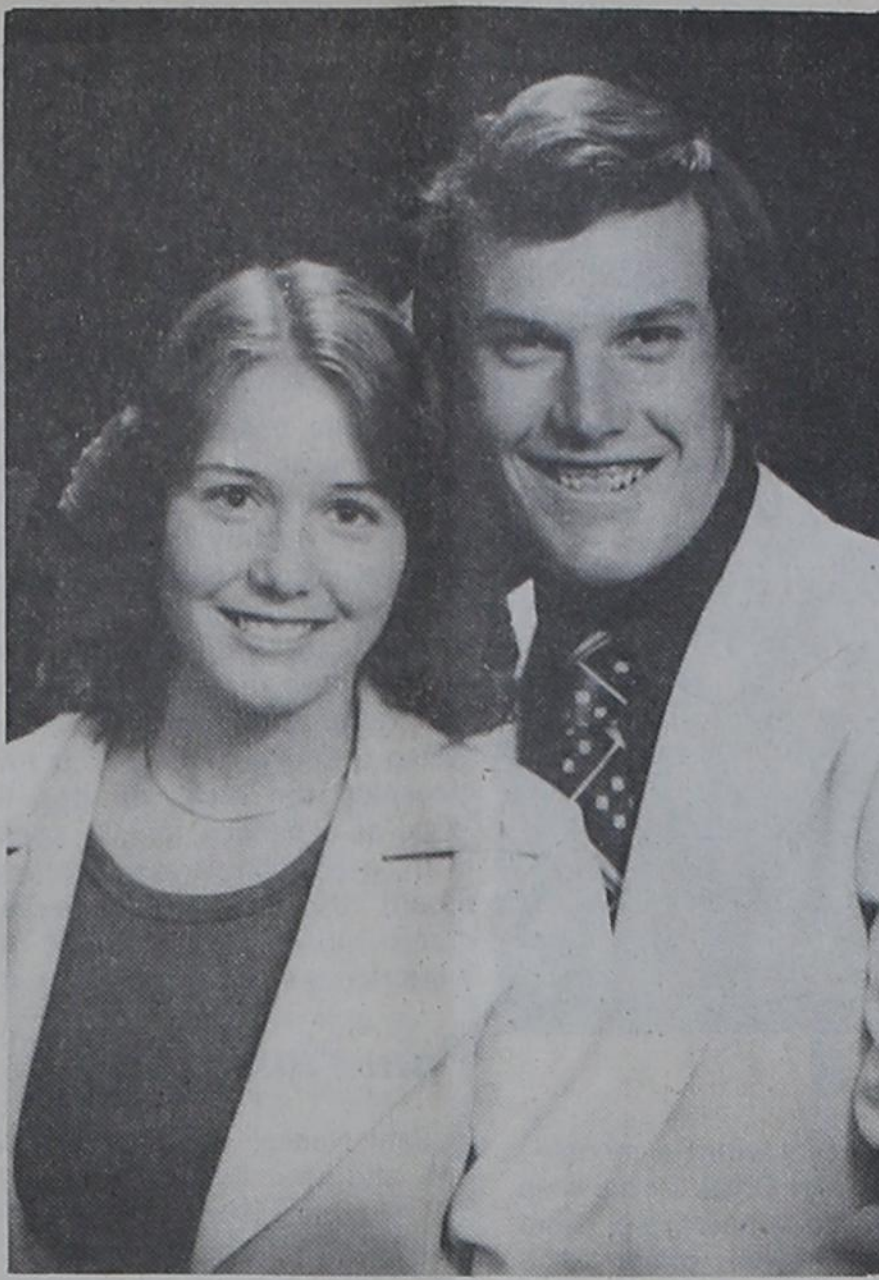

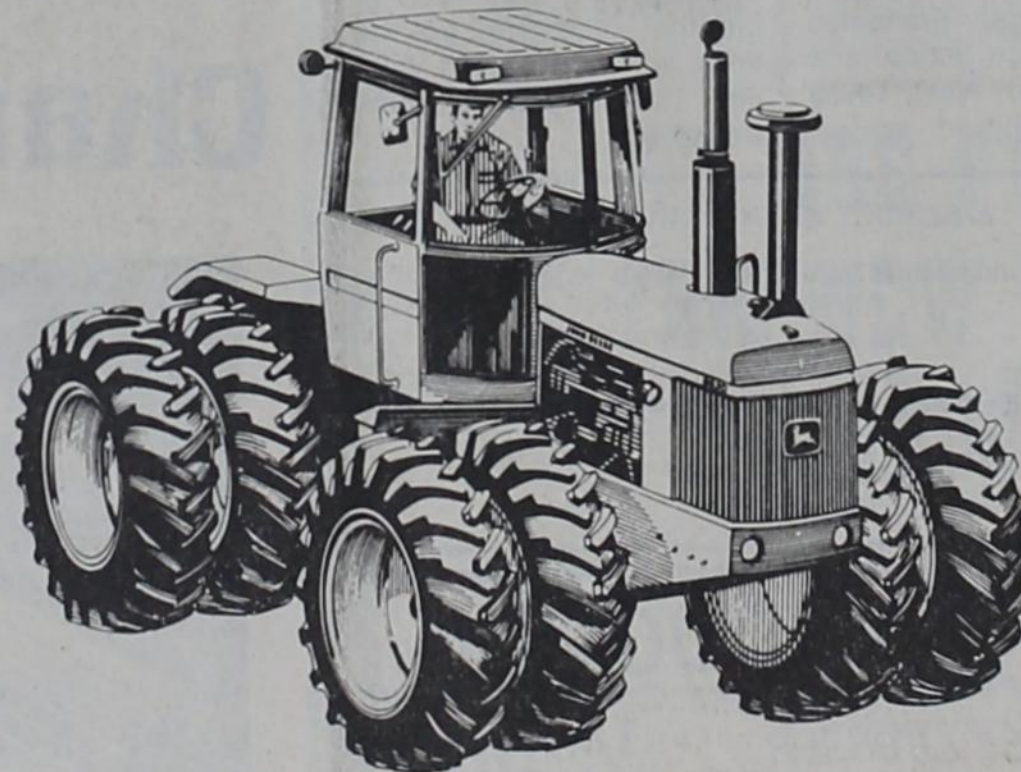

## Council Discusses Revenue Sharing

A revenue funds sharing hearing was to be conducted at the Texico City Council meeting Tuesday night, but no citizens appeared before the Council to discuss the matter, reports Clara Wiehl, city clerk, who added that the Board of Trustees would "utilize the funds as they think best."

The Texico city clerk also announced that the Council will consider raising the sewer, water and garbage rates at the July 26 meeting.

Mrs. Wiehl further stated that a general feeling of the council at this time is that the city "is almost broke." She added that the yearly cost-of-living pay increases for city employees has been postponed, and a request by Walter Crocker to have a street light installed at the corner of Garwood Street and Kindred Avenue was denied due to a "lack of funds in the city funds at the present time."

In other business the Council discussed a special assessments bond issue which would require property owners to pay for the cost of future street paving projects. Mrs. Wiehl explained that the street work will probably begin next year and that only the property owners affected by the street repairs etc., will have to finance the cost of the work. She added that

according to the bond they will have 10 years to pay their portion of the total bill.

Mrs. Wiehl also reported that the Council has authorized City Attorney Harry Patton to file property liens against property owners who have failed to reimburse the city for the clean up work completed earlier this year at the city's expense.

Bill Friday, a representative of the National Cash Register Company, met with the Council to discuss the problems the city has been having with the posting machine they purchased two months ago. He indicated that they would re-program the machine to fit the needs of the city.

The Council also approved needed repairs for the calculator in City Hall; Mrs. Wiehl's vacation which will begin July 28; and Lewis Cooper's appointment as fire chief.

Mrs. Wiehl said she will be attending a revenue sharing seminar in Albuquerque July 27.

The police report for May was approved in the amount of \$96.

Attending the meeting were Mayor Manford Turnbough, trustees Bill Thigpen, Marie Christian, Vane Doshier, and Max Carter, and city employees Mickey Fenn, Billy Hammit, and Mrs. Wiehl.

## Farwell Council Approves Bid For Street Repairs

Farwell City Council at its Monday meeting approved a bid from Jake Diehl Co. of Hereford in the amount of \$10,448 for city street repairs. Work is expected to begin in a few weeks.

Across the board pay increases were also voted for four city employees. The new yearly salaries are City Marshal Ronnie Mitchell and Water Superintendent Dee Hammit, \$9600, and City Clerk Janie Bowery and Doug Landrum, \$9240.

Mitchell recorded purchasing a tape recorder and 35 mm camera with the Council. He said the two items would better enable him to compile evidence and keep records of the cases he investigates. After a brief discussion the matter was tabled until the next meeting.

Mrs. Bowery reported that the matching funds grant in the amount of \$33,450 which had been designated for the purpose of building tennis and shuffle board courts in Farwell could not be

applied toward the construction of a community building center as had previously been believed.

In other business, the city clerk was granted permission to attend a tax school in Lubbock Aug. 15-17. Registration fee will be \$30.

Present for the meeting were Mayor Walter Kaltwasser, city commissioners Fred Chandler and Johnny Curtis, and city employees Hammit, Mitchell and Mrs. Bowery.

## On The Farm In Parmer County

A sunflower tour is scheduled for Monday, July 18, at the Southwestern Great Plains Research Center at Bushland. It is sponsored by the Agricultural Research Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Purpose of the tour is to provide information on production alternatives to conventional crops that are currently decreasing in profitability due to low prices and high production costs. This educational activity is in support of the goals of the Panhandle Economic Program.

Dr. B.A. Stewart, director of the USDA Center, will welcome the group at 9:30 a.m. Trucks will be provided for the tour with research technicians serving as guides. Researchers engaged in various aspects of sunflower production will discuss the results of their research at appropriate stops along the route, and answer questions on sunflowers or other crops that producers may wish to ask.

The tour will conclude at noon. Soft drinks will be provided during the tour by agri-businesses involved in sunflower seed and marketing.

Texas Corn Growers Association has been certified by the Commissioner of Agriculture to hold their corn commodity referendum check-off, with the regular election being held on July 29, and absentee balloting taking place from July 15 through July 26.

You do not have to be registered to be qualified to vote, only a certified corn producer in Texas or owner of any interest in a corn crop.

INSECT SITUATION .....  
The second generation of the Southwestern Cornborer appears to be at its peak with adult emergence around the 18th - 22nd of July. Controls, if justified, should be initiated during this peak. Overall populations of this pest appear to be much heavier in the southern half of our county. Spidermites have increased tremendously with the hot, dry weather of the past week. Chemical control has given erratic results in the past. Best control has been seen in fields that were kept as well irrigated as possible.

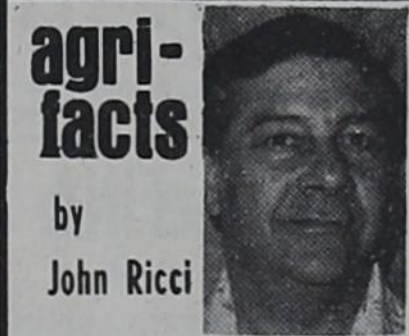
### County Court Sets Hearing

Faced with high feed costs and low cattle prices, feedlot operators are looking with some interest at the efforts of crop scientists to improve the feeding efficiency of grain sorghum. Feedyard managers say an increase of just 5% in feed efficiency of the grain fed would mean an annual savings of nearly \$15 million. The scientists believe waxy and hetero-yellow endosperm sorghums may be one of the answers. When fed to steers waxy sorghums have given 8-20% better feed efficiency than nonwaxy milo, and yellow grain sorghums have increased digestibility in cattle. All this means savings to the feedlot operators and feeders. With several hundred million bushels of sorghum grains consumed annually in the U.S. any increase in efficiency has to be good news to the feeders.
