He is the only surviving member of the first board of directors and is a living link to the beginning days of West Texas Rural Telephone.
As he sees it, WTRT is doing the same thing today that it was when he helped it get started back in the 1950s -- striving to get good communications service to Whilesidents who need it.
While still in his 20s, carpenter was solicited by WTRT's original manager, Leo Forrest, to become the very first WTRT director, representing Oklahoma Lane. Leo thought that Oklahoma Lane would be the easiest community to get started toward signing up for phone service. We held a meeting of nearly 200 people the school house. ## Limited annual pre-plant

 soil moisture surveys takenBecause of the extra precipitation last year, High Plains Underground Water Conservation District 1 plans only a limited annual pre-plant soil moisture survey were taken this winter.

Pre-plant soil moisture readings were taken Jan. 17-25 at 40 sites in the district. The average soil moisture deficit, or amount of additional moisture the soil could hold, averages 2.5 inches in the upper five feet of the soil this year.
There was 5.4 inches of soil moisture deficit in January 2004. "This indicates almost three inches more moisture in the soil than last year," said Gerald Crenweldge, USDA NRCS soil scientist.
He added that the average available moisture values, or amounts of plant-available moisture in the soil, shows the same trend. Readings indicate an average of 6.2 inches of moisture in the upper 5 feet of the soil, as compared to 3.2 inches in 2004.
Despite the above-average rainfall last year, the data collection revealed that the noisture did not completely fill the 5 -foot soil profile.
