Deaf Smith County Health Fair will be at the Bull Barn in Hereford on Tuesday, Sept. 13, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. This event, which is sponsored by Deaf Smith County Family Living Committee and Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is free of charge and open to the public.

Health related agencies and

organizations will set up displays and exhibits, including films providing health information. Water safety demonstrations will be given at 11 a.m. and 2 p.m., and exercise demonstrations are scheduled for 10 a.m. and 2:30 p.m.

Several free tests will be run on individuals who so desire. These tests include diabetic screening, tuberculin skin test, blood pressure, blood typing, glaucoma screening, and height and weight.

**Farm Equipment Dealer Attends Sales Meeting**

James and June Montgomery of Plains Equipment Co., an Allis-Chalmers dealership located in Clovis, attended a National Sales Meeting August 22 - 23 put on by the Allis-Chalmers Corp. at Kemper Arena in Kansas City, Mo.

**Deadline Near For Farmers To Apply For Drought Loans**

Farmers in Parmer County who plan to apply for federal emergency loans to help them recover from drought losses should file applications no later than September 30, at their county office of the U.S. Farmers Home Administration (FmHA).

FmHA County Supervisor, Billy R. Boling issued this reminder that terms of the special Drought Impact emergency loan program, for which Congress appropriated extra loan funds this year, carry the September 30 deadline for loan application.

The rule applies in counties where farmers' eligibility for loans is based on Drought Impact designations made by the federal Interagency Drought Emergency Coordinating Committee. Parmer County is under that type of designation.

Boling said estimates of loan amounts needed under applications filed by September 30 can be revised if necessary in the course of loan processing. In some cases, production loss this year may not be finally determined until later than September 30.

FmHA, the credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, makes farm emergency loans to cover losses resulting from designated natural disasters and help farmers restore production to pre-disaster conditions.

Under new legislation signed into law by President Carter Aug. 4, loans not exceeding \$250,000 to offset production loss from disasters occurring since last July 1 are made at an interest rate of 3 percent. Loss to offset that portion of actual loss exceeding \$250,000 are made at an interest rate of 5 percent. Additional financing for production purposes, or for making major adjustments in farming operations is at a higher rate. Applicants must show that necessary credit is not available to them from commercial lenders serving their localities.

Farmers may obtain further information or file applications at the FmHA office serving Parmer County, located at 208 Avenue D, Farwell.

## Texico, Farwell Recruits - -

### Area Navy Recruit Company Graduates With Top Honors

The Navy's first basic training recruit company comprised exclusively of Texas Panhandle and eastern New Mexico area men graduated recently (Aug. 19) with top honors from the Naval Recruit Training Command in San Diego, Calif.

Collectively known as "Golden Plains Company 153," the special area group of 73 sailors, including two Farwell men, a Texico man and ten Clovis area men, virtually rode away with the five major training awards in intensive four-week periods of competition with 10 other recruit companies.

Included in this group are Rudolph (Rudy) Sanchez, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Sr., of Farwell, Doyle Kent Goldsmith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Goldsmith of Farwell, and Ray Zachrel, son of Mrs. Anita Zachrel of Texico.

During half of the overall eight weeks of varied mental and physical training designed to provide each enlistee with knowledge and skills basic to all people in the Navy, the Golden Plains men excelled and won weekly awards in academics, infantry drills, barracks cleanliness, aerobics (special physical fitness), and overall efficiency.

"I think these special area recruit training companies are a great idea," said Navy Counselor Petty Officer First Class William K. Spears, 31, one of the two recruit company com-

manders and himself a Texas City, Tex., man. "We're bound to do better because many of the recruits know each other and already have the team spirit instilled in them. Also, since 75 per cent of the company are Texans, and they know I'm a Texan, it makes it a lot easier for me."

Spears, who previously ran an all-Hawaii company, was chosen to head the unique group along with 36-year-old Navy Machinist Mate Chief Petty Officer Glenn D. Crawford of Kirtland, N.M. Both men have been responsible for a number of recruit honor

companies and were chosen for their current job from a long list of volunteers.

Crawford said that the all-state and all-area recruiting concept has resulted in a higher quality recruit who can make the transition from civilian to Navy life easier than his counterparts.

"Because it takes between six months and one year to sign enough individuals for a special recruit company - many on the Navy's delayed entry program (sign up but not report for up to nine months) - we are receiving more high school graduates

and generally sharper people," explained the New Mexican. "They are already motivated by the time they reach here, and since they come from the same area, there is less of a culture shock. The men seem to pick up things faster because the comradery is already there."

Many of the "things" which Crawford refers to have changed "for the better" since he graduated from the same recruit training command in 1959. "There has been a shift to about 90 per cent academics and no rifles," he said. Of the 73 graduating re-

ruits, 69 of the Golden Plains Company men will be attending Navy class "A" schools for individual technical training in their chosen job profession prior to assignment to fleet and shore stations throughout the world. The Navy provides them opportunities in more than 60 career fields including the advanced electronics field, nuclear field, and advanced technical field. They will enter separate jobs or ratings such as boiler technician, mess management specialist, gunner's mate, or aviation electronics technician. All 73 graduates enlisted through Navy Recruiting District Albuquerque.

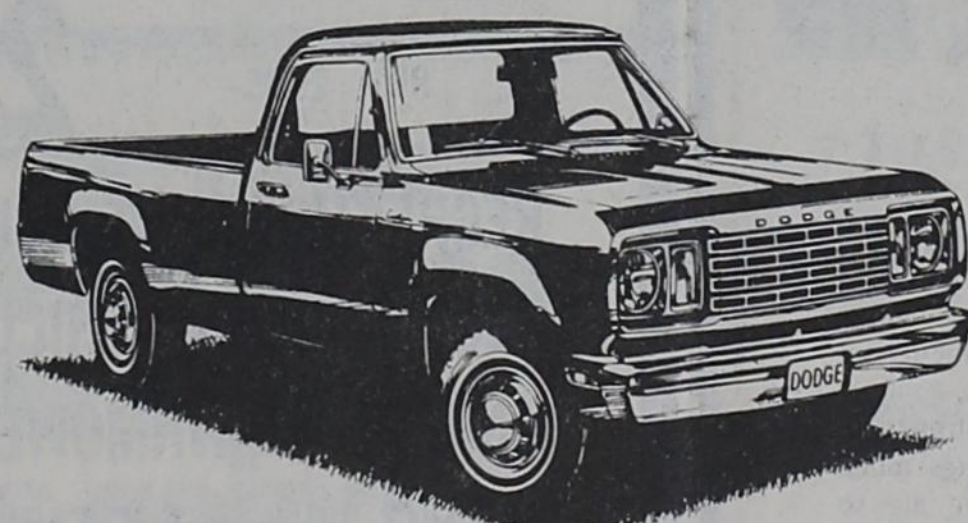

## Brandon Announces For State Senate

James E. Brandon, an Amarillo C.P.A. and attorney, has announced his candidacy for the State Senate representing the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle, to fill the unexpired term of office to be vacated by Senator Max Sherman.

Brandon served as Chairman of Ronald Reagan's campaign for the 33 counties of the 13th Congressional District of Texas and was elected a Reagan delegate to the Republican National Convention in Kansas City, where he served as a floor leader for the 100-member Texas delegation. "If I had to pick one American today who clearly expresses my views on the issues and the role of government in our lives, it would be Ronald Reagan," stated Brandon.

"We are headed for a state income tax unless excessive state spending is halted," Brandon suggested. "The Texas legislature has increased its expenditures from \$8 billion to \$16+ billion in its last three regular legislative sessions. It's time they realized it's our money and quit spending every dime they can get their hands on."

"The statement being made that there are no new taxes is but a half-truth because there has been a tremendous increase in the old taxes. Since I could never support a State income tax, I would devote my best efforts to reducing State spending.

"Our number one priority is to get all levels of government off the backs and out of the pockets of its producing citizens. The best mileage in a dollar has always been obtained by the worker who produced it. The Federal government should not and cannot be allowed to interfere with those aspects of life which can best be dealt with at the state and local level.

"The entire energy problem can be placed at the doorstep of the Federal government because it has placed price controls and unnecessary restraints and regulations on our oil and gas industry and other energy sources. We will solve our energy problems when and only when a free market is restored and a free people allowed to do that which it can do best -- solve its own problems.

"Lawmakers may change the rules, but one fundamental economic law does not change -- savings

(capital) always migrates to the highest return commensurate with the risk and its long term prospects.

"In my judgment, Texas has prospered because it has retained an environment favorable to the worker, savings and business. The working man, investor and the business community have all shared in this prosperity. As a State Senator, I would strive to protect that environment and to see that Texas does not repeat the mistakes of England and New York City.

"Having been involved in cattle feeding, oil and gas production, real estate, and associated with people engaged in farming and ranching, I am personally acquainted with the serious problems facing major segments of the Panhandle economy."

Brandon was elected to the Amarillo College Board of Regents in 1970 and has served as secretary, vice-chairman and chairman. He was re-elected for a six-year term in 1976.

He holds a degree in Accounting from North Texas State University and a Law degree from the University

of Texas at Austin. He was a teacher while pursuing graduate studies at these universities.

"Considering that over one-half of our State budget concerns public education, I believe my time spent as a teacher, seven years as a college administrative board member, and nine years as a college student affords me some insight into the educational problems facing Texas."

Brandon and his wife, Peggy, are both native Texans, residing in Amarillo for 22 years. They live at 3001 Teckla with their two sons, Joe and David.

He holds membership in the American Business Club, Texas and American Society of CPAs, Texas Bar Association and Texas Society of Attorney-CPAs. He and his wife are members of Berachah Bible Church.

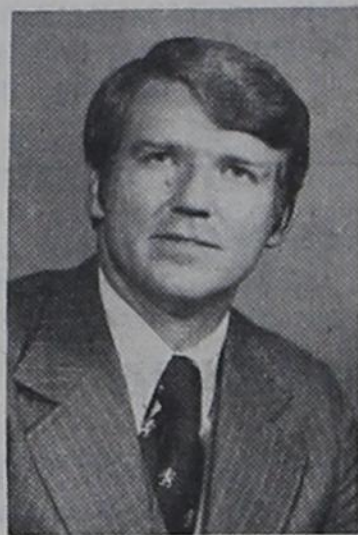

## Simpson Announces Senate Candidacy

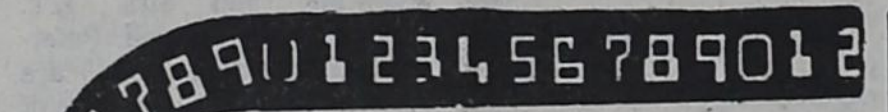

## Texico-Farwell Booklore

A section foreman for the old Pecos Valley and North-eastern Railroad named Ira W. Taylor, who arrived after 1900 and obtained a 160-acre homestead near the depot, has been called Texico's first settler.

The source of this information is *New Mexico Place Names, A Geographical Dictionary*, edited by T.M. Pearce and published by The University of New Mexico Press in 1965.

Material in this volume was collected between 1936 and 1940 by workers of the New Mexico Writers' Project.

A post office designated as Texico, a portmanteau word which blends syllables from Texas and New Mexico, was established in 1902.

However, the railroad was built through here in 1899. Some abstracts of Texico property go back even further to 1889.

It is also stated under the Texico item in *New Mexico Place Names* that the appellation of Escavado was given this XIT Ranch area, adjoining the Texas border.

The English pronunciation of Escavado approximates the Spanish pronunciation of Escarbada.

A site known as Las Escarbadas (Spanish for "The Scrapings"), headquarters of

the Escarbada Division of the huge XIT Ranch, was located in southwestern Deaf Smith County, Texas.

Nearby was Tierra Blanca Creek, sometimes called Escarbada Creek, where early-day travelers found water by scraping or digging holes in the dry creekbed.

Also of interest to local residents are origins of three other names recorded in *New Mexico Place Names*.

Pleasant Hill, N.M., situated about ten miles north of Texico near the crossroads of NM 108 and 77, was named in 1910 by Lee Barnes for Pleasant Hill, Tex.

There was a school in this rural community for many years before its consolidation with Texico School.

Hollene, a rural community about thirty miles north of Texico, was named for Hollene Thompson, small daughter of a Texico man who sold town-site lots there in 1906 and 1907.

Hollene had a post office from 1907 until 1953.

Grady, a few miles west of Hollene, is the only community in northern Curry County that still has both a school and post office.

It was founded in 1906 and named for Mrs. Pearl B. Grady, who owned land in that area. At one time, the Gradys lived in Texico. - C.C.C.

### Farwell City Marshal's Report

Farwell City Marshal Ronnie Mitchell reported he arrested Charles Clements, now of Bovina, on a driving while intoxicated charge late Saturday night. ## Blood Services Fees To Get Adjustments

Blood service fee adjustments will go into effect October 1, according to John Richmond, Executive Director for South Plains Blood Program.

Richmond explained, "We are determined to continue to provide the highest possible quality blood service for patients in area hospitals. Since our service fees are our only source of income, these fees must be consistent with the provision of such high quality blood services."

"There will be no increase in the service fees for fresh frozen plasma (used for burn victims and patients with fluid loss) or cryoprecipitated antihemophilic factor (a blood component needed by hemophiliacs to help control bleeding). We are pleased to be able to hold the line on these service fees since patients needing these blood com-

ponents frequently require large quantities over extended periods of time."

Richmond continued, "However, past and current economic conditions force us to implement a service fee increase of \$4.00 for whole blood, \$2.00 for red blood cells, \$10.00 for washed red blood cells, and \$1.00 for platelet concentrate - the only increase in the last four years."

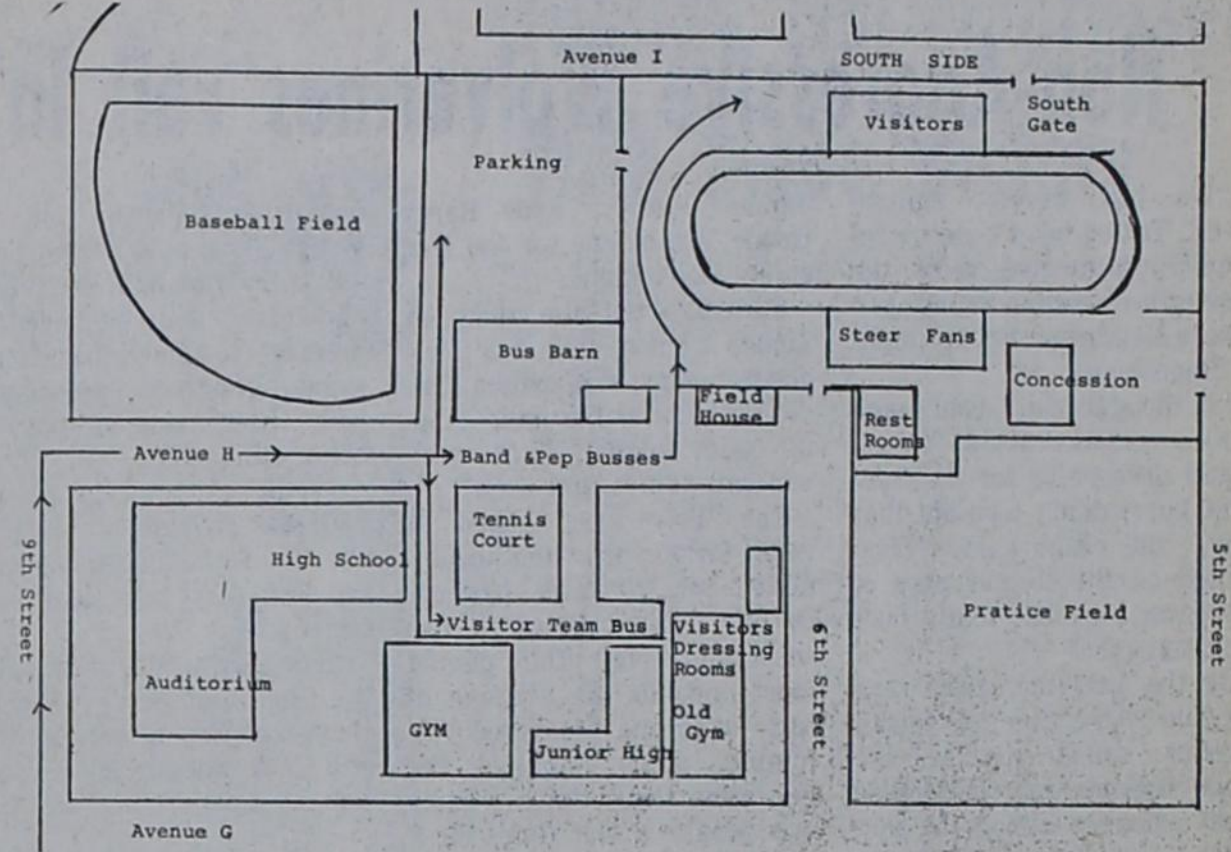
"After these pending fee adjustments go into effect, our local service fees will still compare favorably with those charged by other blood programs across the country," Richmond added.

South Plains Blood Services is a nonprofit community blood program which relies solely on voluntary blood

donations to meet the blood needs of patients in 39 area hospitals.

"Blood services fees are based on the actual cost of recruiting volunteer blood donors and drawing, testing, typing, storing and delivering the blood as needed. No charge is made for the blood itself since it is given freely by members of the community who are willing to share their good health with others," said Richmond.

The blood program, which has been serving this area since 1952, annually draws 18,000+ volunteer blood donors and provides 20,000+ transfusion units of whole blood plus blood components for patients in need of transfusion therapy.



**Parking Area Noted**

To alleviate traffic congestion in the school area during home football games, Farwell High Principal Tom Knoy has prepared the above diagram of the area, designating various parking places. Knoy asks that those attending the games please not park on 6th Street (between superintendent's office and practice field) but to use the east parking lot between the baseball field and the football field. 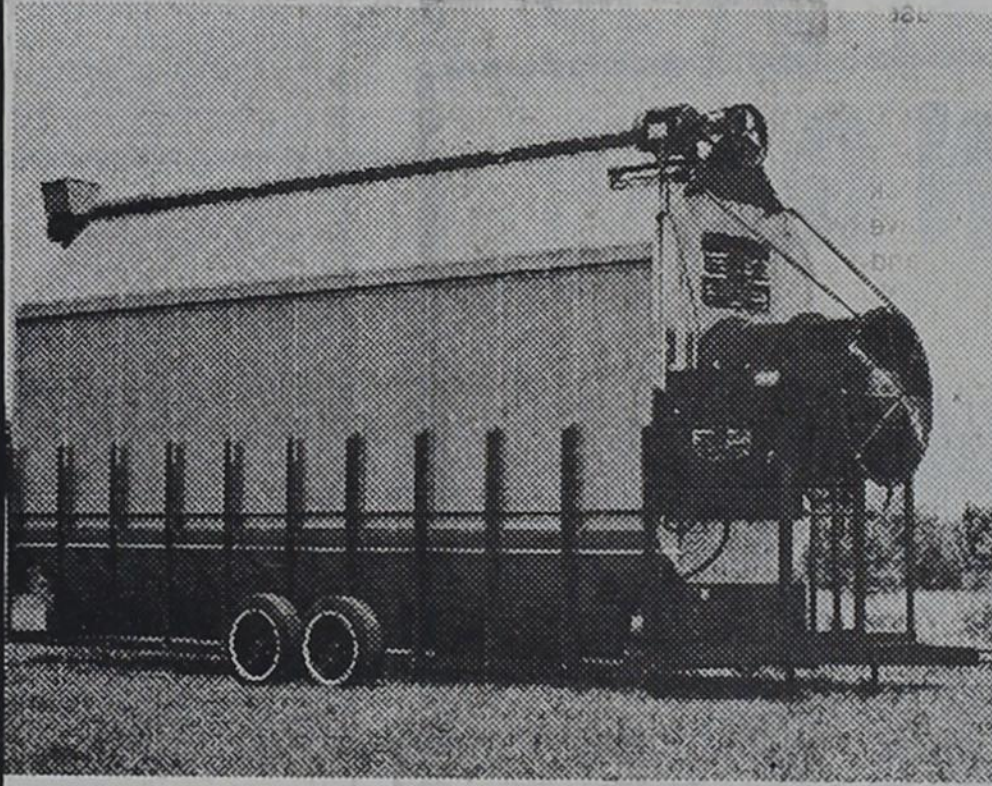
Jim McMorries, an independent tax appraiser, met with the board concerning reappraisal of the school district. No action was taken.

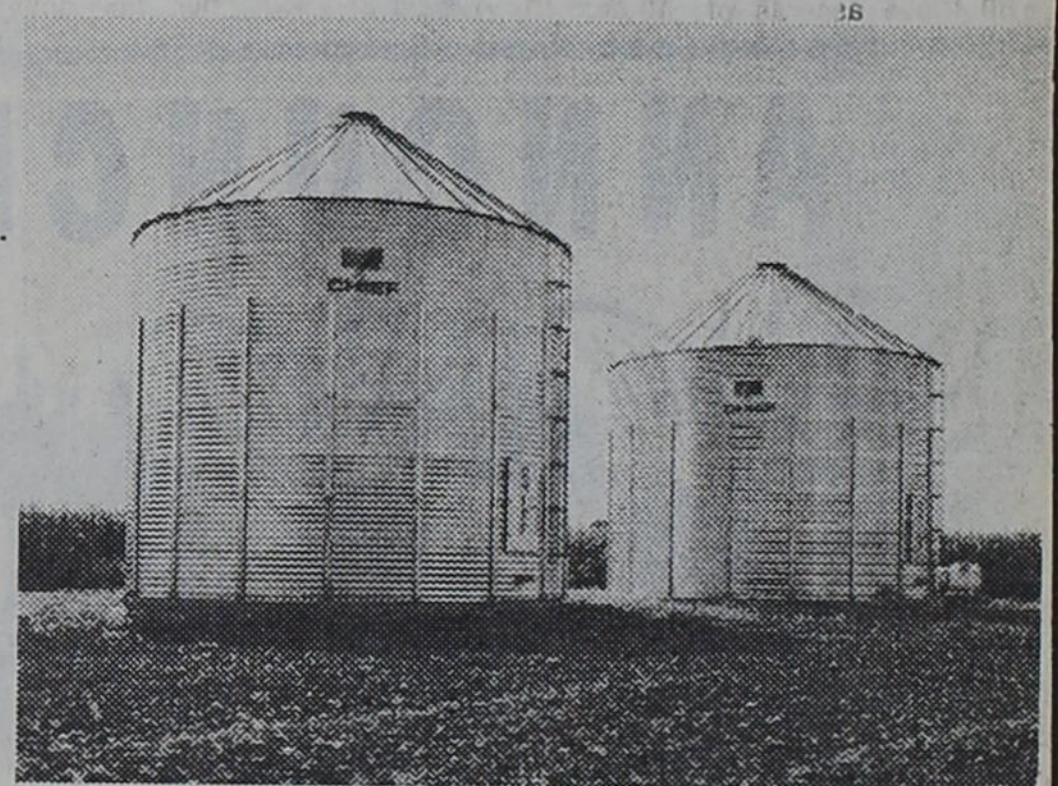
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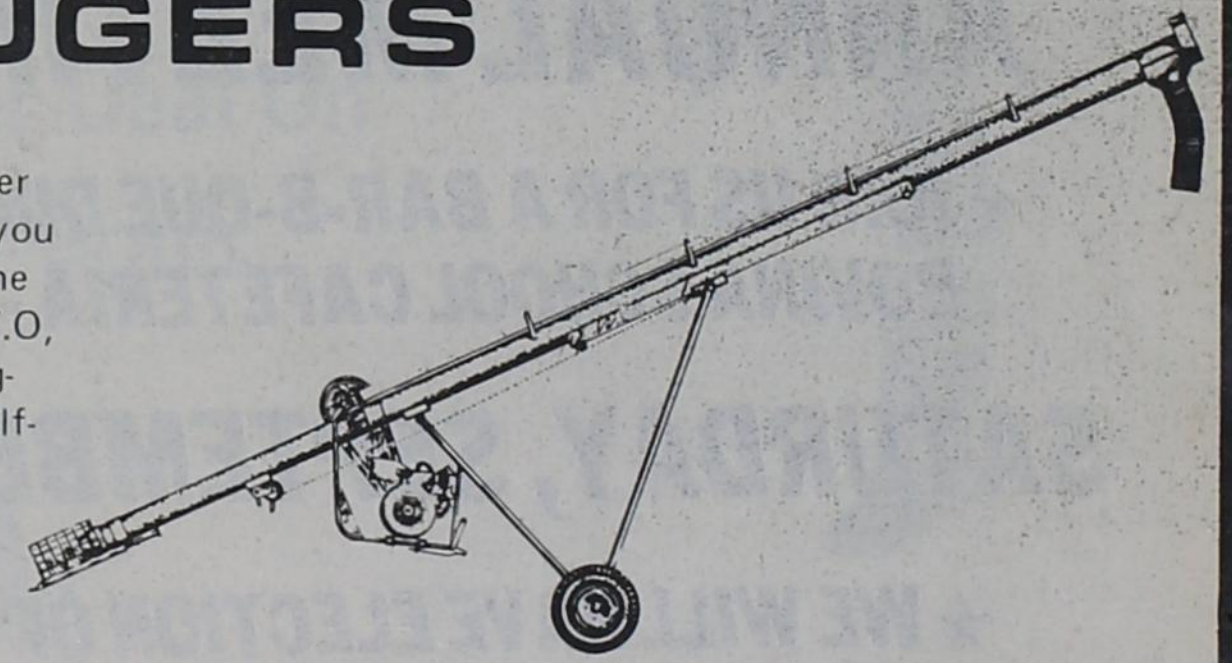
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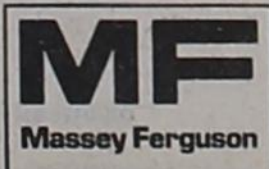

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# Steers Upend Swifts In Season Opener

Farwell Steers took a 28-18 decision over the Nazareth Swifts Friday night at Nazareth in the season opener for both teams. The Blue and White were almost "caught napping" as the Swifts rallied late in the game to score twice. But the Steers held on to claim their first victory of the season.

Junior quarterback Robin Roberts started the game in place of the ailing Russ Jones.

Derwin Huseman ran the opening kickoff back, but the Swifts fumbled the ball two plays later. Farwell recovered, but was unable to generate any offense as the ball went over on downs.

"Fumbleitis" continued to plague both teams throughout the game. Late in the first quarter the Swifts capitalized on a Steer fumble to earn their first touchdown of the game. However an alert Steer defense blocked the PAT and Nazareth took the lead, 6-0.

As second stanza play got underway Russ Jones took over as quarterback and gained a yard on a keeper. Vick Christian ran 40 yards for a first down at the Nazareth 26-yard line. Three plays later Jones completed a pass to Chandler for Farwell's first touchdown. Robin Roberts kicked the first of his four for four extra points and the Steers took a 7-6 lead.

Nazareth's attempt to run back the Farwell kickoff was

stopped dead by Carlos Lucio. Neal Wilhelm earned a first down for the Swifts but two stops by Chandler prevented them from utilizing the gain to their advantage.

After an exchange of punts Nazareth resumed possession of the ball but was unable to gain a first down. They punted to Christian who took the ball on the Farwell 35 and ran 65 yards to paydirt. However a clipping penalty nullified the score and after four plays Farwell punted again.

Due to a mixup the Blue and White left the field at the half thinking time had run out. However they were called back to the field as enough time remained for Nazareth to execute one play. The Swifts failed on a 30-yard field goal attempt and the Steers took a slim 7-6 lead to the dressing room.

The Blue and White started the second half with a bang as Tim Norton galloped 22 yards for six points. Roberts added the point after and the Steers went ahead 14-6.

Huseman took the kickoff for the Swifts but was stopped by Keevin Kelley. Lucio broke up a pass and the Swifts were forced to punt. Farwell took possession on the 50-yard line.

Nazareth recovered a Steers fumble and advanced the ball to the 44-yard line. Leonel Jaime caught the Swifts carrier for a nine yard loss and the Swifts punted.

But after two plays the Blue and White fumbled the pigskin away. After a series of plays the Swifts were forced to punt.

Late in the third quarter, Christian galloped 39 yards to punch in the pigskin for the score. Roberts kicked the PAT, and Farwell increased its lead to 21-6.

Early in the final stanza, a Jones touchdown pass to sophomore end James Castleberry was voided by a penalty call. Jones then passed to Chandler for the first down but two plays later the ball was fumbled and recovered by Nazareth. Another penalty nullified the play. Farwell resumed possession of the ball only to fumble it away on the next play. Nazareth recovered on their own six-yard line.

The Swifts fumbled the ball three plays later and the

Steers took over on the Nazareth 15-yard line. Benny Yruegas gained four yards and Jones earned the first down on a quarterback keeper. The ball was fumbled in the end zone and Jones recovered for Farwell's final score of the night. Roberts added the PAT to make the score 28-6.

But the game was far from over as an aroused Swifts offense scored twice in the last quarter to cut their 22-point deficiency by 12 points.

Nazareth took the ball and Wilhelm gained nine yards before being stopped by a Steers defender. Huseman was stopped for no gain and Kenny Brockman's quarterback keeper play was cut short by Clay Roberts, an alert Steer defender. However on a fourth and five situation Wilhelm dashed across the goal line for six points. The PAT failed and the score was 28-12 in favor of the Steers.

As time ran out Nazareth scored again on a Brockman pass to Jeff Schmucker. The PAT again failed and the final score as the whistle sounded was Farwell 28, Nazareth 18.

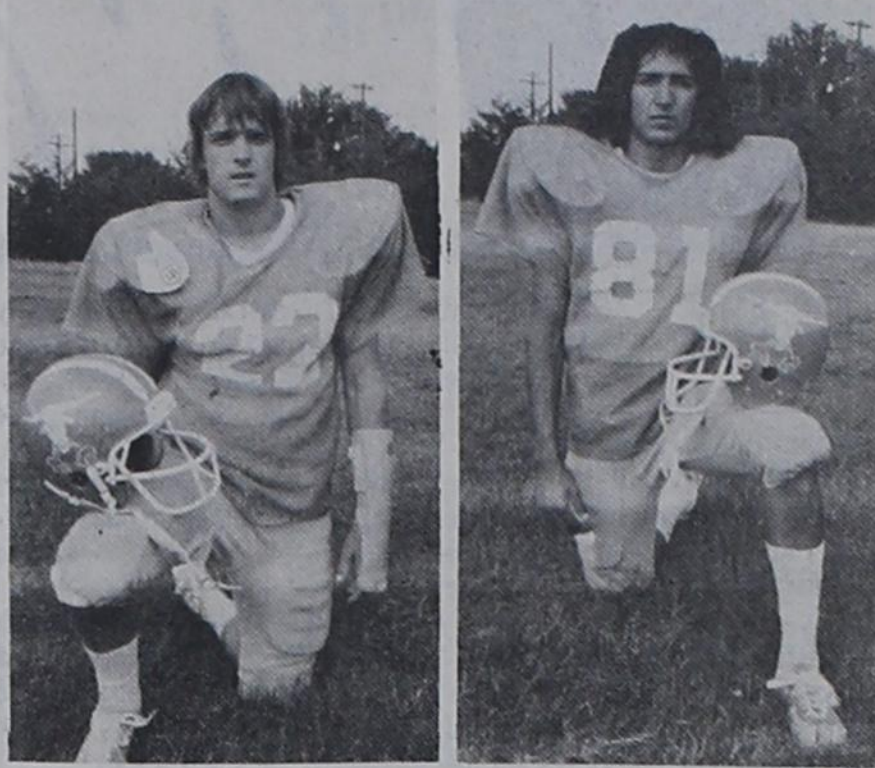

## Whatley Not Impressed With Steer Victory

Even though the Farwell Steers defeated the Nazareth Swifts - their first opponents of the season - by a score of 28-18, Steer head coach Van Tom Whatley was far from happy with the victory.

"I am disappointed in the overall game performance," Whatley commented. "We fumbled 12 times and the Swifts recovered eight," he said.

According to Whatley, the Steers took Nazareth "too lightly." He places part of the blame on himself saying, "I severely underestimated the team."

Whatley also commented that the Steers "just did not get after it." He added that another part of the overall problem was the new Houston Veer offense which they tested for the first time in an actual game atmosphere in Friday's game. "It is a high risk offense and we have to get better at it," he said, indicating that they will "continue to work on the same type strategy during workouts."

Whatley singled out several players for praise, including Carlos Lucio and Rowdy Chandler who were named "Steers of the Week." According to the local coach Lucio was "terrific on defense" and he was also named the "outstanding secondary man." He said Lucio "made few mistakes on defense" and executed three key offensive blocks which led to touchdowns.

The Farwell mentor said Chandler played "super both ways" and was in on "95 per cent of the tackles." He was also named "outstanding forcing unit man."

Vick Christian, who broke a 65 yard punt return for a touchdown which was later called back, was named "outstanding offensive back." He

rushed for over 100 yards. Dan Geuther, "outstanding offensive lineman," performed very well as the offensive center, according to Whatley. The coach said Geuther received a grade of 85 percent.

Other players receiving praise were D. D. Foster and Richard Yruegas who "performed well as guards." Rusty McFarland did "a good job as a tackle," he said.

Next competition for the Blue and White is tonight (Friday) when they take on the Morton Indians at Steer Stadium. Whatley said that Russ Jones is ill and it is doubtful that he will be able to start.

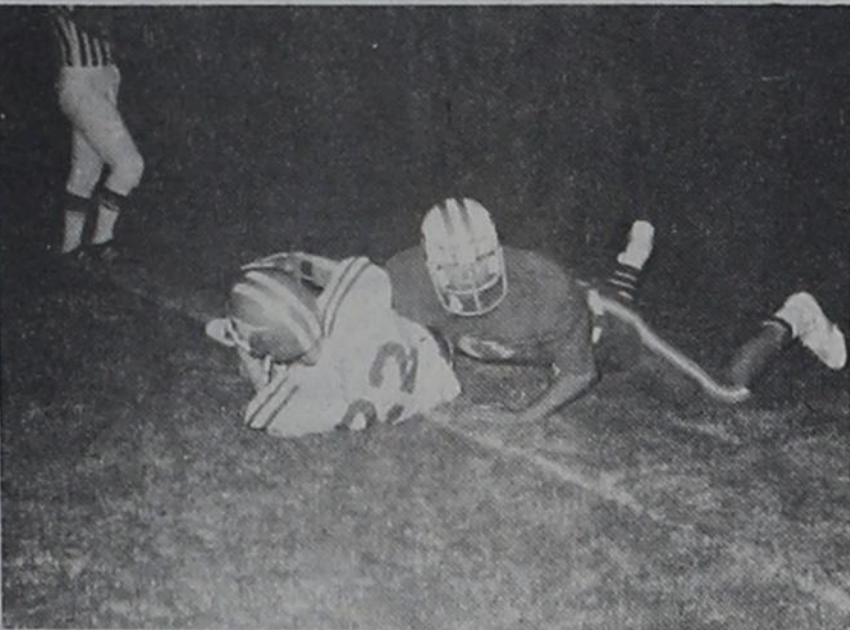

Whatley said Morton is "big and strong and much better than they were last year." He said that even though Plains beat them 30-0 last Friday Morton was still a team to be reckoned with.

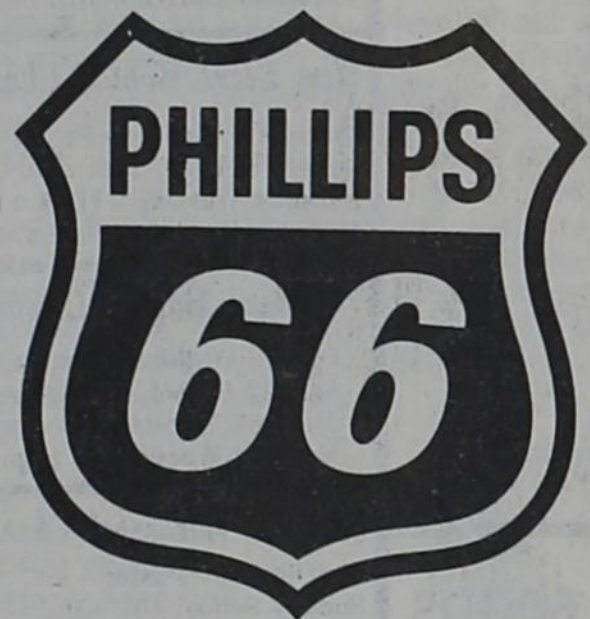
Whatley said they will continue to use the Houston Veer and that eventually they will "learn to run it well." He said they will have to play a good defensive game to defeat the Indians.



**ONENESS WITH CHRIST**

"I am crucified with Christ" (Gal. 2:20).  
Salvation is actually coming into oneness with the Lord Jesus Christ.

"The wages of sin is death" and "the soul that sinneth shall die," but Christ was not a sinner. After having examined Him carefully, even Pilate said: "I find no fault in Him" and "I find no cause of death in Him."

It was therefore not His death that He died at Calvary. It was ours. He had come from heaven to be born into the human race as one of us to die our death.

It is when we view that death at Calvary and say: This is not His death He is dying. It is mine - it is then that, by an act of faith, we become one with Him. His death was ours; the penalty for our sins, but it is not applied to us until by faith we accept His death as ours. Thus the Apostle Paul declares by divine inspira-

tion: "I have been crucified with Christ" and he adds: "the life which I now live in the flesh I live by the faith (the fidelity) of the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me" (Gal. 2:20).

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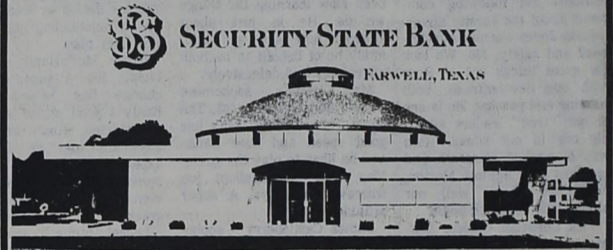
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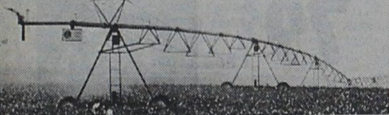
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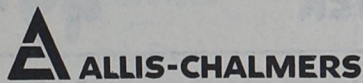
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
