Texico may start mandatory water conservation

More than likely, the City of Texico will be going to a mandatory water conservation in the near future. A decision likely will be made at the next City Council meeting on July 25.

Texico Street Supt. Darrell Stanton told the City Council on Tuesday that one of two water wells that supply the city is currently under repair. It has been found to be at only 42 feet deep, below what the city had expected. Stanton asks that Texico residents start voluntarily conserving water immediately, and pointed to Clovis' conservation program as a place to start.

In their proposed system, homes will only be able to water their lawns three days a week. If your street address ends with an odd number, you can water on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, and if you have an even numbered street address, you can water on Wednesday, Friday, and Sunday. No one would be allowed to water on Monday. This would allow the water to build up for the rest of the week.

Interim City Clerk Carolyn Johnson pointed out that the average water bill for each residence in Texico last month was \$91 -- well over the base cost of \$46.89.

Fire Chief Lewis Cooper brought a proposal to buy water rights for Texico from land directly south of the city across the state line from Farwell. He said that the Ute Water Project is currently on hold to find out if they can get federal funding, which could take a year or more for a decision, and the city needs water whether the project goes through or not.

A decision on this also may come at the next council meeting.

In other business, the council:

- Heard from City Building Inspector Terry Martin. He said there was a question involving his legal status. He

Lazbuddie school board for next six months

The Lazbuddie School Board held a special meeting on July 6 to accept the resignations of board members Scott Hicks and Terry Parham.

This was necessary so that the board could hire Tiffany Hicks as a 3rd grade teacher. Tiffany is Scott's wife and Terry's daughter. If Scott and Terry stayed on the board, due to being close relatives, Tiffany could not be hired.

So past school board members Donnie Coker and Daniel Shacher agreed to rejoin the school board for the next six months, until the November school board election.

That's correct -- the school board election will be in November, due to new state laws, said Supt. Karl Vaughn.

And the board must decide on when the other school board posts will run out -- whether to add six months to their terms or deduct them. Previously, school board elections were held in the spring.

On Tuesday, the board reorganized after Schacher and Coker were sworn in. Terry Jesko is president; Chris Timms, vice president; and Randy Smith, secretary.

Two resignations were received -- Donald Gillitt, ag teacher, who is going to Ropes, Texas; and Vinnie Gomez, Spanish teacher, who is going to Plainview.

But all staff positions have now been filled, reported Vaughn:

is also an inspector in Clovis, which he said has no problem with him doing both jobs. Martin said the state is looking into whether it is legal to be a building inspector in two cities at the same time.

He also pointed out that in Clovis an inspector that is certified to check plumbing, mechanical, and electrical work, like he is, can only work in one area. It slows down the process in cases where you have to have several different things checked; you have to wait on two or three different inspectors to come in and do their inspections. He is lobbying the state to change the policies, but it takes time.

Martin also spoke on behalf of Martin Nieto and Rene Rodriguez.

Nieto wants to move his trailer at 106 Griffin to one lot and put another trailer facing it on the lot next to his. Both trailers would be for his personal use, and not for rental. The council voted to allow the change.

Rene Rodriguez, 200 Garwood, has a house on two small lots. He wanted to know if he could put a trailer behind his current house for a family member to live in. The council will look into a variance at their next meeting.

Farwell adds third 3rd grade classroom

The Farwell School Board hired a third 3rd grade teacher on Tuesday, Kelly Tipton, of Clovis.

Expected are 45 3rd graders this year, and the maximum for a class is 22, according to state guidelines.

The board also hired Tra Hall as a social studies teacher.

Two resignations were received.

Mona Bermea has resigned as a special education teacher at the junior high.

Nanette Anglin, who had been hired a couple of months ago to teach high school English, decided instead to take a junior high teaching job at Muleshoe. She is the wife of new Farwell athletic director Mark Anglin.

Farwell has two positions still open -- junior high special ed teacher and high school special ed aide.

In other business, the board:

-- Heard Supt. Larry Gregory report on the budget. Property taxes are going down due to new state legislation. He estimates that last year's \$1.42 per \$100 assessed valuation rate will be closer to \$1.30 in the coming year. The school is still awaiting final appraisal figures.

-- Heard that two new buses, seating between 16 and 18 passengers, have arrived. Federal law ends the use of 15-passenger buses, effective Sept. 1.

-- Made changes in the Student Code of Conduct regarding cell phone use.

At the high school, use of cell phones is prohibited during instructional time and during lunch time in the cafeteria.

For grades kindergarten through 8th, cell phones are prohibited at school. If a student needs one, they must give it to the school secretary at the start of school, then pick it up at the end of the school day.

Cell phones are allowed to be used during high school extra-curricular trips if used in an appropriate manner.

-- The next meeting will be Aug. 15.

-- Was rated superior achievement in the state's financial integrity rating system.

Texico hires custodian

The Texico School Board on Tuesday hired Martin Gutierrez as a high school custodian.

In other business, the board:

-- Set the date for the school auction for Sept. 9.

-- Discussed the baseball field plans. Scheduled next are fencing and a sprinkler system.

-- Still is working on policies involving 8th graders playing up.

back flush leading to a loss of water that emptied the city pool and that the pool was being run sometimes by the lifeguards without the manager present. Lions' mobile screening unit coming to BTD

A very special attraction has been added to Border Town Days, thanks to Hal Helton, the BTD parade marshal and a member of the Clovis Lions Club.

It's called "The Eye Van" and it will be stationed at the city park across from the State Line Tribune on 3rd Street.

All services are free of charge. However, it is important to understand that the van is just a tool for people to use. If they find out they have a problem, then they must go to a doctor for treatment. No prescriptions, glasses, etc., will be given out at BTD.

What can the van do for you? Qualified optometrists Dr. Crume and Dr. Barker, both of Clovis, will be at the van to give free eye exams. The services they offer not only check to see if you are near sighted or far sighted, but they also can check blood pressure, and test for glaucoma and cataracts.

Also, organ donation cards will be available to those who want to become a donor.

"The last eye van we set up in Clovis had about 40 people come through," said Helton. "One man came in with his wife and was reluctant to see a doctor. He ended up taking the exams and found the he had cataracts."

The exam time is about 10 minutes and services will be given from 12:30 to 4 p.m. on July 29. The van is financed by donations from Lions clubs throughout New



Mexico, eye van raffle tickets, and individual donations.

Helton added, "We are asking those who have used eye glasses, unwanted sun glasses, or hearing aides to bring them to the van. We will be collecting them to

pass on to folks who need them in Mexico. Thanks, and we look forward to seeing you soon."

Also, it's important to bring along someone to drive you home.

Rules enforced for dairy calves going to N.M.

New Mexico livestock health officials have implemented and are enforcing animal identification requirements for dairy calves shipped into their state to assist in tracking potential disease introductions, particularly cattle tuberculosis (TB).

New Mexico requires dairy calves to be individually identified with an official USDA ear tag, or a commercially produced ear tag that shows the state and premises of origin, if the calves are not imported into the state as part of a cow/calf pair. If commercial tags are used, the

original owner's name, address and an individual animal number must be imprinted on the tag, and the commercial tags must be pre-approved by the New Mexico Livestock Board.

The New Mexico Livestock Board may be reached at (505) 841-6161.

New Mexico requires dairy and beef cows and bulls from all states to have a negative TB test within 30 days prior to importation, and these animals are tagged.

Terry: it's budget time and city's in good financial shape

From City Manager Ernest Terry:

It is budget time again for the City of Bovina. The staff at City Hall and the City Councilmen have worked very hard on putting together a balanced budget for FY07.

That budget will be presented to the public at an open meeting of the City Council on July 13 at 7 p.m. at the EMS Building on 3rd Street. Everyone is invited. Comments from the public will be welcomed.

The budget, in its final form, will be voted on in August. At that meeting, the proposed tax levy will be discussed. Once again, public comments are welcomed, and the final tax levy or property tax will be voted on in September.

Now, what does the budget look like?

The city is in good financial shape. As on July 1, there is \$79,102 in the General Fund, \$300 Cash On Hand, \$253,221 in Savings (\$169,238 in a fund to pay the sewer debt), \$73,751 in CDs for

the Cemetery and the Meter Fund, \$19,130 in the Economic Development Fund, and \$1,581,763 in Escrow for the new sewer construction.

Also, we have an approved grant of \$250,000 to pay for the lift station portion of the new sewer project.

Without increasing any utility fees, expected revenue from all sources will be \$919,333, plus transfers from savings of \$1,969,417, brings total revenue to \$2,888,750.

Capital improvements planned for fiscal year 2007 total \$280,096, which includes a new police car, new PAC 25 radios, street sealing, water tank repainting, and our annual TWDB loan payment.

The construction on the new sewer and lift station should be completed. This

brings the expenditures to \$3,050,881, and still puts another \$221,800 back into savings. At the end of FY07, we should still have \$115,753 in the General Fund, \$286,633 in Savings, and \$73,751 in the CDs.

At this time, there is no recommendation to change the property tax. Last year's levy was \$0.58 per \$100 value on the city's \$24,993,741, which brought in about \$144,964.

This year's tax value is expected to be about \$26,978,157. With the same \$0.58 levy, that will mean approximately \$156,473 in tax revenue, an increase of \$11,509. That's about what we expect fuel prices to increase for the city.

Bovina prepares to harvest the wind

Alternative Energy Institute, of Canyon, was contracted by the Bovina Economic Development Corporation (BEDC) to install wind data equipment that will measure wind speed and wind directions.

AEI will monitor the data for two or more years. Jim Bob Swafford, BEDC coordinator and general manager of Premium Wind Coalition, will oversee this project in conjunction with the city.

This wind data project is part of the Bovina Economic Development Board's long range goal to develop wind farms on city and area properties. Swafford explains that there are limited wind data collection stations in our area. Therefore, the BEDC has taken the initiative to collect wind data that is compatible for wind turbines.

There are several wind farm developers interested in our area. By having raw wind speed information available, it will enhance chances to attach these wind farm developers.

Anemometers have been installed at three levels on a 400-ft. tower in Bovina. Each month, this data will be collected by AEI and reported to the BEDC.

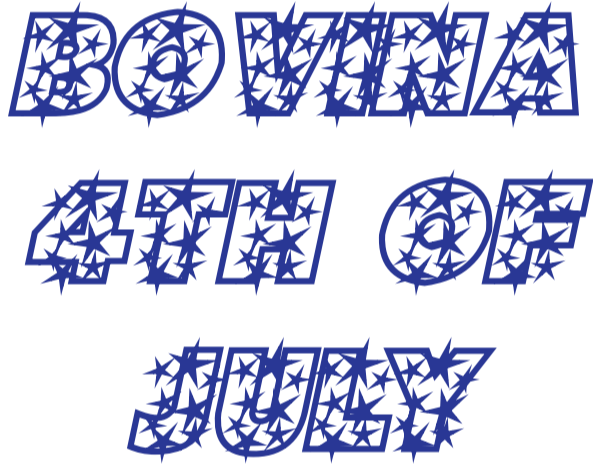
