Absentee Voting Begins This Week

Absentee voting for the special November 8 election began Wednesday, announces Bonnie Warren, Parmer County Clerk.

According to Mrs. Warren, all registered voters are eligible to vote in the election and may do so by casting their absentee ballots at the courthouse between the regular 8:30 to 5 p.m. CDT office hours.

She said the absentee voting will continue until November 4.

The special election was called for two reasons. First, voters will decide who will fill the state senatorial vacancy created by Max Sherman who recently resigned to assume the presidency of West Texas State University.

Five candidates are seeking the position, including Democrats Bob Simpson, Burk Whittenburg and Mel Phillips, Jr. The two other candidates are Republicans Bob Price and Jim Brandon.

Voters will also be asked to decide the fate of seven proposed constitutional amendments.

No 1: The constitutional amendment increasing the size of the Court of Criminal Appeals to nine judges, and permitting the court to sit in panels of three judges.

No 2: The constitutional amendment to provide for an

additional \$200 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund and to allow surviving widows of veterans to purchase tracts under certain circumstances.

No 3: The constitutional amendment permitting denial of bail to a person charged with a felony offense who has been theretofore twice convicted of a felony offense, or charged with a felony offense committed while that person was admitted to bail on a prior felony indictment, or charged with a crime involving the use of a deadly weapon where there is evidence such person has been convicted of a prior felony offense; providing for a 60-day limit to that person's incarceration without trial; and providing for that person's right of appeal.

No 4: The constitutional amendment authorizing tax relief to preserve certain cultural, historical or natural history resources.

No 5: The constitutional a-

ment authorizing the formation of agricultural or marine associations which may mandate the collection of refundable assessments for improvement of production, marketing, or use of their products.

No 6: The constitutional amendment to give the legislature the power to authorize state and national banks to exercise banking and discounting privileges by use of electronic devices or machines.

No 7: The constitutional amendment changing the name of the State Judicial Qualifications Commission to the State Commission on Judicial Conduct and relating to the commission and the powers and proceedings of the commission, a master, and the Supreme Court, or court of Civil Appeals justices serving in place of the Supreme Court, for the suspension, censure, removal, or involuntary retirement of a justice, judge, or justice of the peace under certain circumstances.

City Council Accepts Tank Maintenance Bid

Farwell City Council, at its meeting Monday night, accepted a bid of \$6700 from Water Tower Service and Maintenance, Inc. of Abilene for work to be done on two water tanks. The work includes sandblasting and coating the insides of the two tanks.

A breakdown of the total figure includes \$4,800 for the 400,000 gallon ground storage

tank and \$1,900 for the 30,000 gallon elevated tank.

Dee Hammit, water superintendent, reported that this same company did the work on one of the water towers several years ago, adding that they did a fine job. He said the sandblasting and coating job needs to be done every five years to all the water tanks in town.

The Council okayed the at-

tendance of Jackie Landrum at a Landfill School October 25-26 in Lubbock. Registration fee is \$20 and the course counts 16 hours toward landfill certification.

Attorney Charles Aycock and several representatives of the Volunteer Fire Department, Joel White, Lee Hutchins, Smokey Gast and Curtis Smith, met with the Commission concerning the volunteer firemen's fund which the state is asking all cities to establish.

Aycock clarified several points which had been in doubt. After reading the proposed plan, Aycock said he determined that the city could exempt itself from the plan if so desired, adding that it did not have to come up with an alternate plan. The deadline is Nov. 1.

He also said the state of Texas would not pay anything into the Firemen's fund except to keep it actuarially sound. Aycock said he would check further into the matter and report back to the Commission at its next meeting.

Since a quorum will not be present October 31 for the next regularly scheduled Council session, the city fathers decided to meet instead on Wednesday, Oct. 26, at 5:15 p.m. CDT.

Attending the session were Mayor Walter Kaltwasser, Commissioners Fred Chandler and Johnny Curtis and city employees, Ronnie Mitchell, Janie Bowerly, Jackie Landrum, Doug Landrum, Dee Hammit, as well as Aycock, White, Hutchins, Gast and Smith.

The court decided to have the county judge's office and the adjoining county courtroom carpeted.

It was reported that two 2-ton trucks were available through the Surplus Property Office of Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in Oklahoma City. After a lengthy discussion it was decided that

these trucks should not be released as they do not have dumps or winches and would not be used enough by the county to justify the cost in procuring them.

It was announced that the budget for 1978, including revenue sharing funds, can be inspected any time at the office of the county judge.

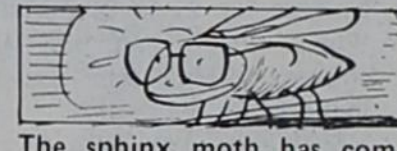

Portraying Area Homemakers

Mrs. Dewey (Alice) Pierce of Texico, our area homemaker this week, grew up in Iowa, attended college in New Mexico and married her husband in Clovis. She is an active mother who believes in staying busy.

The Pierces have three children ranging in age from eight to four years. Jubal, the eldest, is in third grade at Texico Elementary School. Seven-year-old Robin is a second grader, and little Penny, who is four, stays home and helps her mother.

Alice has a degree in home economics education which she obtained from New Mexico State University at Las Cruces. Upon graduation she obtained a position as assistant Curry County extension agent and was stationed at Clovis.

Our homemaker also worked in Roosevelt County. Besides being involved with the 4-H Clubs and other organizations Mrs. Pierce says she also worked with older women. In all, Alice spent five years in the extension service.

Pierce has a degree in vocational agriculture from New Mexico State and a master's degree from Eastern New Mexico University at Portales. After they were married the Pierces lived for a year in Roosevelt County and a year in California before settling near Texico.

Now that Pierce has become a farmer he has given up teaching vocational agriculture, says Alice, because he felt he could not do both. Now, in addition to farming and raising horses, Pierce also teaches general science at Gattis Junior High in Clovis.

Both Dewey and Alice were active during the recent Curry County Fair - he as a roper and she as the superintendent of the canning division. Pierce garnered a trophy for his efforts and our homemaker was very busy booking entries, arranging for judges and releasing entries during the fair.

In addition, Alice is also president of the Pleasant Hill

Homemakers Club. They meet twice a month and work on different crafts and projects at each session. Usually once a year club members take a special trip, says Alice. Last year they toured a historical museum at Lubbock.

Mrs. Pierce loves to cook and bake and occasionally she sews. "Mainly I patch the children's clothes now," she says, adding "they always seem to have a knee out." Sometimes she sews for herself and the children.

The Texico woman keeps a large garden and has spent many hours canning and freezing vegetables. Most recently she put up tomatoes.

When not involved with homemaker chores Alice works around the farm - especially with the horses and cattle. With Dewey in school during the week a lot of the responsibility falls to Alice and Penny who delight in doing such things as fixing fences etc.

Besides horses and cattle the Pierce family has three dogs and 24 cats. "Misfit" is a special pet. He is a small dog who was "dumped" near the Pierce home one day. He made his way to their front door and has been Penny's special pet ever since. Mrs. Pierce says people from town often come to the country to "dump their dogs."

Alice loves living in the country. "A slight disadvantage though," she says, "is that the children are not able to enjoy belonging to organizations etc. because they live too far out."

Television reception does not pose a problem, she says, as they have a tall and effective antenna which pulls in Portales and Amarillo as well as other stations.

The Pierces are members of the First United Methodist Church in Clovis where Alice teaches a Sunday School class.

Our homemaker has three recipes she has consented to share with us.

FIVE-SPICE BEEF AND RICE

1 lb. ground beef

¾ c. chopped onions
1½ t. salt
½ small bay leaf
1/8 t. garlic powder
1/8 t. thyme
1/8 t. oregano
1 can (10 ½ ounces) cream of mushroom soup
1 lb. can tomatoes
1 c. minute rice
3 slices American cheese
Brown meat; add onions, cook until tender. Stir in seasonings, soup, tomatoes and rice. Bring to a boil. Simmer five minutes. Stir occasionally. Spoon mixture into one and one-half quart baking dish. Crisscross cheese over top. Broil until cheese melts. Serves four to six.

CHIPEROO BARS

¾ c. margarine (melted)
2¼ c. brown sugar
3 eggs
2¾ c. sifted flour
2½ t. baking powder
½ t. salt
1 c. nuts
2 c. chocolate chips

Combine margarine and sugar, cream well. Add eggs beating thoroughly after each addition. Sift together dry ingredients. Gradually add to shortening mixture, mixing thoroughly. Add nuts and chips. Spread in well oiled 10½ x 15½ x ¾ pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. When almost cool cut into squares. Makes four dozen 3 inch by one inch bars.

GREEN RICE

1½ c. instant rice
1 small jar Cheese Whiz with jalapeno peppers
1 can cream of mushroom soup
1 10½ ounce pkg. frozen broccoli
½ c. chopped celery
½ c. chopped onion
½ c. margarine

Cook rice. Add Cheese Whiz and soup. Pour boiling water over broccoli and drain. Saute celery and onion in margarine. Combine all ingredients in greased 12 x 7 oblong casserole dish and bake at 350 degrees for 40 minutes. Serves six to eight.

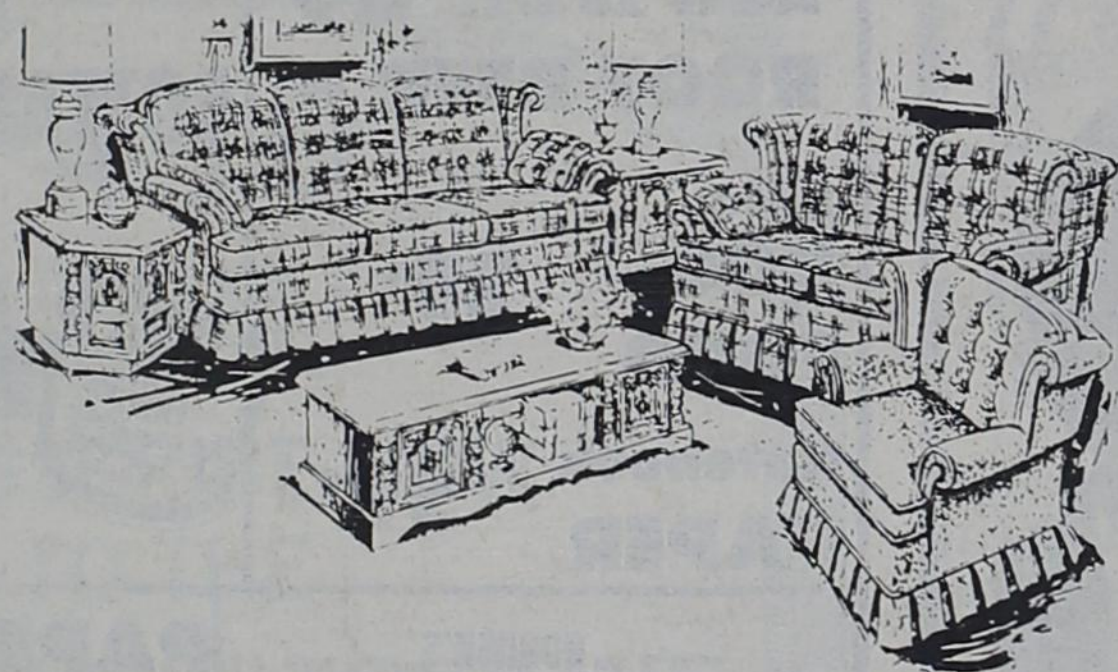

At that point in the second act both defensive units buckled down and neither team was able to score again.

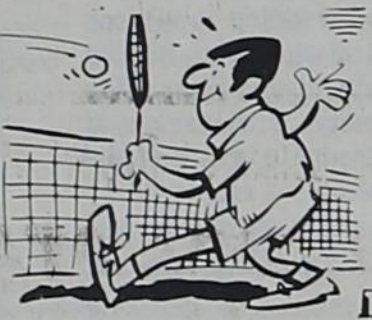

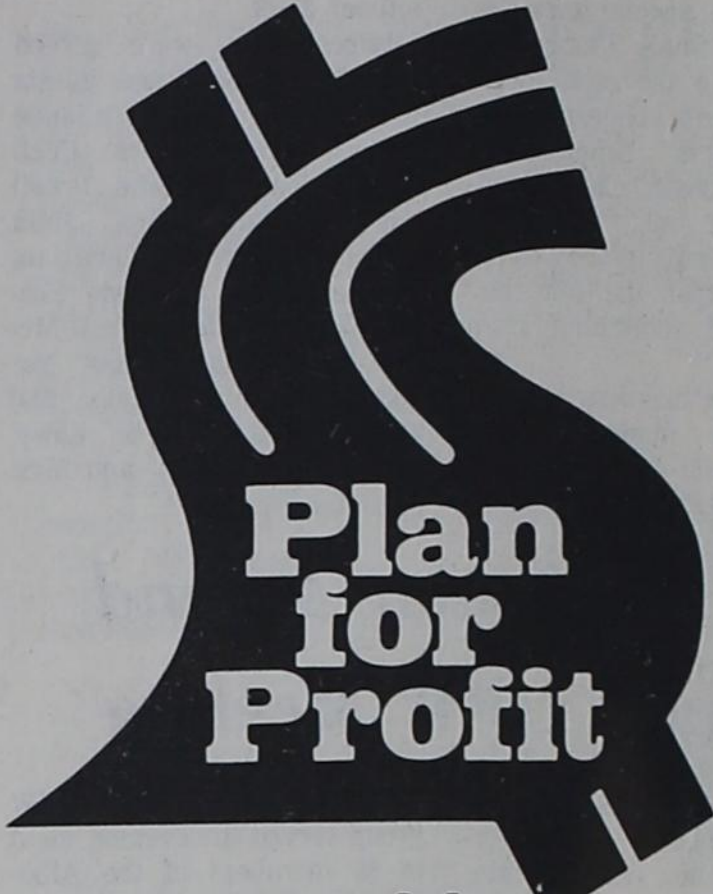
CLAY ROBERTS

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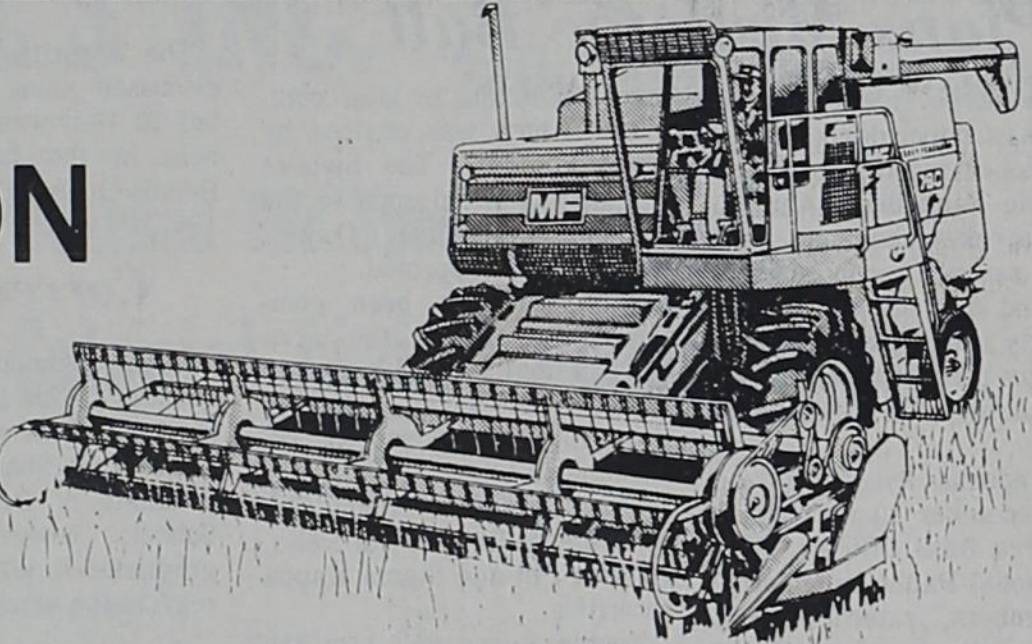

"With only two seconds left on the clock Bovina passed for a touchdown," Coach McDorman said. "We were not expecting that kind of play so late in the game."

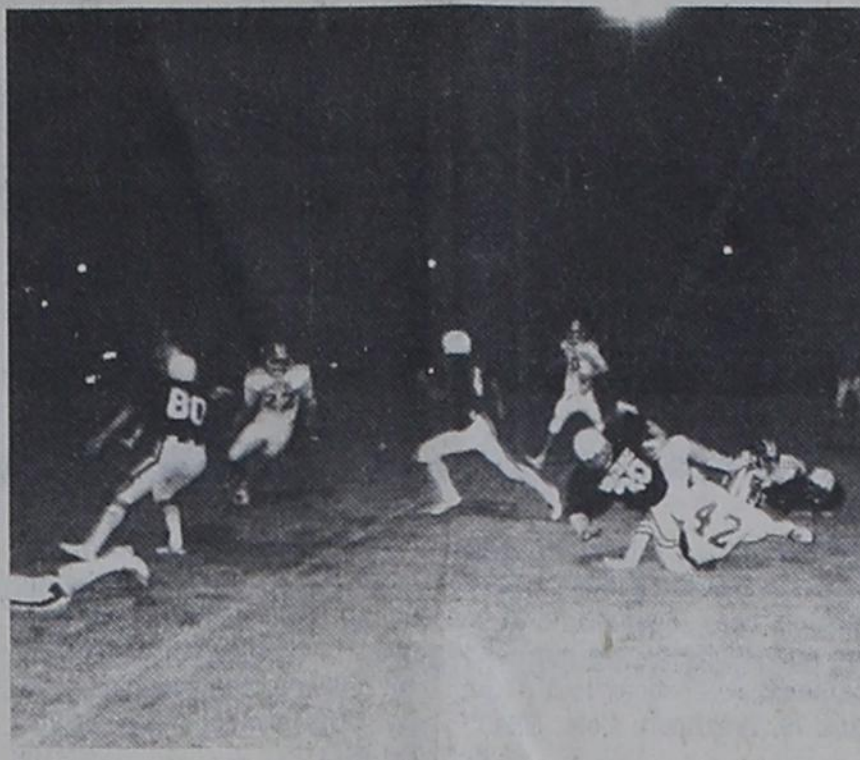
McDorman said they moved the ball all night but were

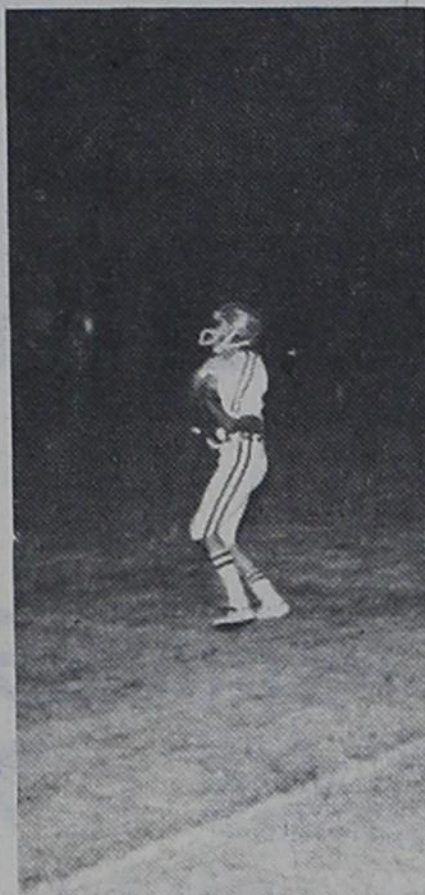

Speech, hearing

AUSTIN, Texas (Spl.) — Speech and hearing disorders are the most frequent handicapping conditions among children, says a University of Texas audiology specialist who advises early treatment for such disorders.

Dr. Frederick Martin says hearing loss has to be looked upon as a language disorder because it affects the development of normal speech and language patterns.

Speech patterns of a child with impaired hearing are developed late and poorly, he says. Children often are diagnosed as being emotionally disturbed or mentally retarded when actually they have language disorders that stem from hearing loss, he adds.
