

# BULLETIN! ESTRACA NABBED

Following a strange turn of events, Raymundo Estraca, 27, of Bovina was apprehended Tuesday night by Albuquerque City Police. He was one of two escapees from Deaf Smith County jail in Hereford and a suspect in last summer's assault of a rural family north of Farwell.

## City Council Raises Water, Garbage Rates

Beginning with the January 1 billing Farwell residents will pay more for water and garbage collection. That decision was reached last Thursday night at the City Council meeting.

When the new ruling goes into effect, the water rate will be increased to 40 cents per

1,000 gallons after the first 4,000 gallons. The rate for the first 4,000 gallons will remain at \$4.25.

According to a study discussed prior to the decision, it costs the city 24 cents per 1,000 gallons to produce water. The 15 cents per 1,000 gallon increase will generate approximately \$11,000 additional income each year.

Effective with next month's billing, garbage collection rates will be increased to \$3 per month for residential customers and \$4 per month for business customers. It was reported that prior to the rate increase the city was only collecting \$1,132 per month while the actual cost of trash pickup is \$1,250.

Also on the agenda was a discussion of the repairs needed for City Marshal Ronnie Mitchell's police vehicle. It was decided to have Doc Stewart Chevrolet and Buick Inc., to install a new

engine in the car at a cost of \$1200.

Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Galvan came before the Council to ask for a variance to zoning in block 18 to allow them to park a mobile home on lots 9-12 in said block. Before this can be allowed a public hearing must be held to allow persons living and owning property in that block and the adjoining block an opportunity to agree or disagree. City

Clerk Janie Bowery was instructed to draw up the necessary papers.

Gilbert Miller appeared before the Council to ask for an adjustment to water billing, but no action was taken.

Present for the meeting were mayor Walter Kaltwasser; commissioners Fred Chandler and Johnny Curtis; city employees Mitchell, Dee Hammit, Doug Landrum and Jack Landrum.

## Two Area Men Bound Over For Grand Jury

Examining trials were conducted Friday for three area men who were recently arrested and arraigned in connection with two separate cases. According to Parmer County Judge Paul Fortenberry, who presided over the hearings, Fulgencio Ortiz of Farwell and Barty Bartlett of Bovina were bound over for grand jury action.

The two men were involved with separate cases dealing

with violations of marijuana laws. Ortiz was arrested and charged with felony possession marijuana following an undercover narcotics investigation sponsored by the City of Farwell.

Bartlett was charged with possession of marijuana over four ounces following the discovery of a marijuana field growing 12 miles north of Farwell. Similar charges were

also brought against Bartlett's father, Houston Bartlett. According to Fortenberry, Houston Bartlett was not bound over for grand jury action at this time.

The county judge explained that in an examining trial all the evidence and other information scrutinized and if it is considered to be sufficient then the suspect is bound over for grand jury action.

# McFarland Gets Top Prize; Owen Going To Sun Bowl

Rusty McFarland and Jerry Dee Owen sweated out the weekend of gridiron play and as playoff favorites fell by the wayside, hopes rose and fell as the two top contenders in the Area Merchants Football Contest awaited the outcome.

Although the two Farwell men did win the annual contest, they missed more than the usual amount of games in this week's guessing.

McFarland, by virtue of being closer on the tiebreaker scores, won his choice of tickets to the Cotton Bowl or Sun Bowl plus \$50. He chose the Cotton Bowl tickets.

A strange circumstance gave the victory to McFarland outright as he and Owen both wound up with 112 points on the season. Owen had failed to enter a score on the tiebreaker game in the first week of the contest, thus giving McFarland the edge.

Owen wins two tickets to the Sun Bowl plus \$25 for his efforts.

McFarland, a senior at Farwell High, has held the number one slot in the contest since the second week of competition. Owen, a teacher at Farwell High, has been

breathing down his neck for several weeks, trailing by two games for a time, then pulling up to one game off the pace for four weeks, then last week, finally catching up to tie McFarland going into the final chapter of this year's guessing game.

McFarland and Owen guessed only six games each this week while the weekly winner managed to call nine of 12 correctly.

Winner of this week's first place money of \$7.50 was Mrs. Albert Smith, the only person calling nine games correctly.

Ann Liethen called eight games correctly and predicted the exact tiebreaker score to win second place and \$5. Third place money had to be split between father and son, Doyle and Brent Green, who each called eight games right and were one point each off the tiebreaker.

Winding up in third place in the overall contest was Liz Kaltwasser who was one point behind the first place contenders with 111 games picked correctly.

Fourth place went to Joe Jones who had 110 points.

Guessing a total of 109 games right for fifth place were Carl Dean Goettsch, Ray Norton, Champ Porter and Steven B. Smith.

In sixth place with 108 points were Don Gerles, Dondra Gerles, Leigh Ann Kirkland, Leon Langford and Mark Owen.

David Dannheim, Lorine Dannheim, Greg Hromas, Jack Allan Kirkland and Albert Smith wound up in seventh place by calling 107 games right during the contest.

## Farwell Kindergarten Has Thanksgiving Feast

Learning can be fun. Just ask Marcia Cole and her Farwell kindergarten students. This dedicated teacher, her assistant, Eva Ancira, and their eager morning and afternoon five-year-old students have been busy studying the Pilgrim Fathers and re-creating in some ways their early day pioneering experiences—including the first Thanksgiving feast.

The end result of their efforts occurred Wednesday when children in both classes enjoyed their own Thanksgiving meal, which they prepared themselves. The menu consisted of bread, cranberry sauce, butter, honey, popcorn, apples and raisins, a meal similar to what the Pilgrims might have feasted on centuries ago.

Assisted by Mesdames Cole and Ancira, the kindergarten students prepared and baked their own homemade bread. They made cranberry sauce from fresh cranberries and even churned the butter in a dairy churn.

To get honey for the meal they trekked to the Bill Whitesides home one day and observed first hand the bees in their hives. The five-year-olds also shelled popcorn in anticipation for Wednesday's meal.

Apples and raisins added a fitting touch to the children's re-creation of what that first Thanksgiving meal might have been like.

The kindergarten students also set their own table, complete with linen cloth, candles, silver serving pieces and mats which they wove themselves. In addition to planning the menu and preparing the food, the children also cleaned up everything.

But the Thanksgiving meal is only a part of the story as they have also learned about other aspects of the early day Pilgrims, including the landing at Plymouth Rock in 1620. They even have a replica of the Mayflower—a small boat with paper sails.

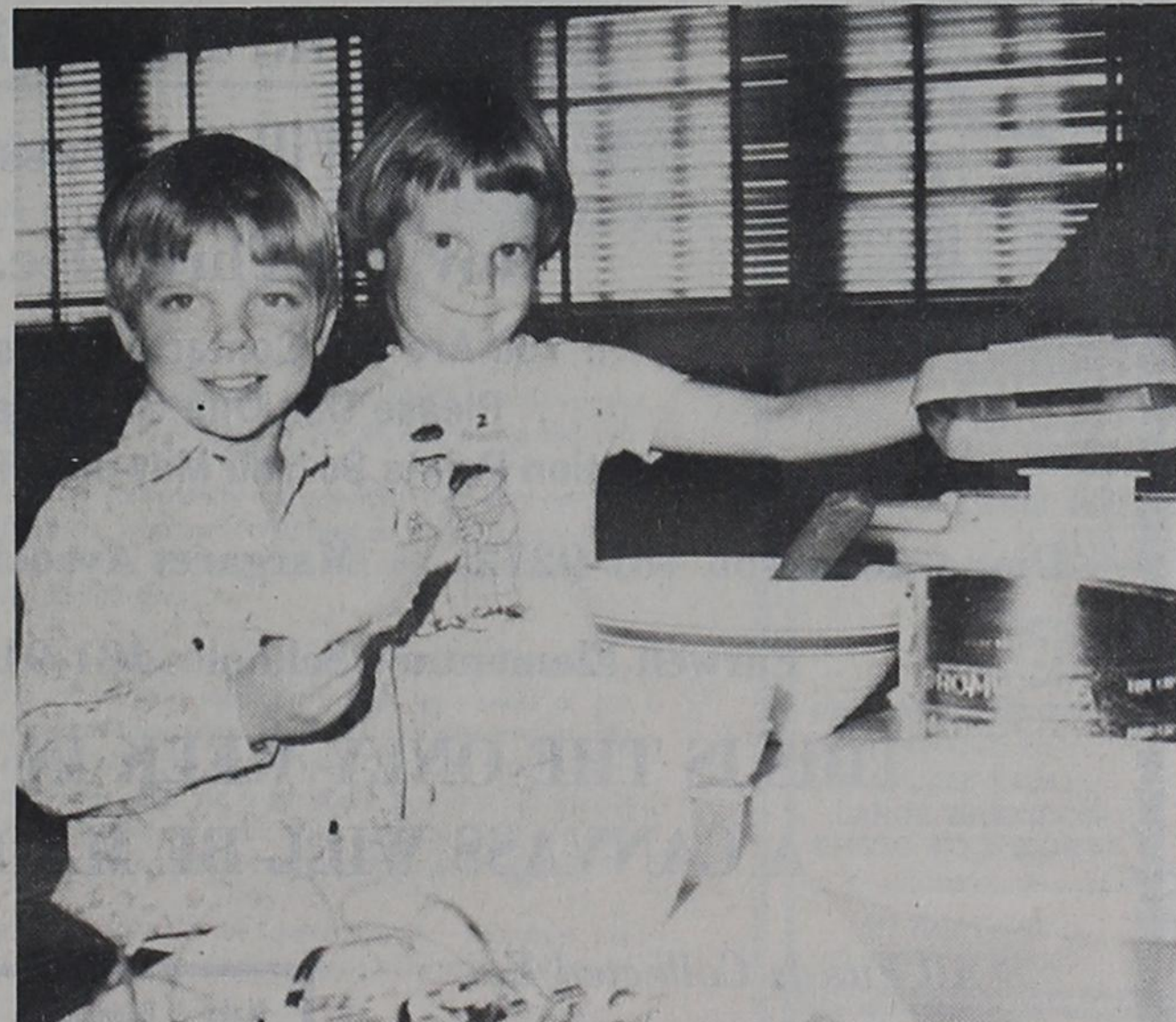
Another feature of the classroom is a table on which is depicted the Mayflower crossing the Atlantic Ocean and the subsequent settlement which was built following the first landing. A log cabin and other buildings also dot the table—courtesy of the students who decided to construct their own Pilgrim's Home.

A special attraction is the Pilgrim kitchen which the students constructed to look just as the original might have looked back in the 1600's. The fireplace was made with paper bricks and Mrs. Cole furnished the kettles and other authentic

cooking utensils.

A wooden rifle, similar to the weapons used by the Pilgrims to hunt game also hangs over the fireplace.

In addition to building the kitchen, preparing the meal and setting up the table (Continued on Page 2)

Last week's escape and chase episode has been the basis of a lot of conversation in the Farwell area. One question that has been asked us is, "Why were the two Parmer County prisoners in the Deaf Smith County jail?" We visited with Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace and this is his explanation to us for this circumstance.

The Parmer County jail just does not have enough room to house prisoners of the various categories. This sounded funny to us as we knew that there was, what appeared to us, plenty of cells in the local slammer.

However, under recent federal regulations our jail is limited as to how many prisoners can be held at one time. For example, those held on misdemeanor charges cannot be put in with those held on felony warrants. Prisoners without a conviction cannot be placed in with inmates with prior convictions. Juveniles must be separated from adults. Women must be kept out of sight and hearing of men prisoners, etc., etc.

So, when prisoners are separated by category the available space becomes quite limited. Also, treatment, feeding, medical care and general care of prisoners is rigidly prescribed by federal fiat. An example is that in the past local prisoners were fed two substantial meals a day. Not any more. Prisoners must be fed three times a day.

To insure that all the federal ukases are followed the Sheriff in the local case will be held personally responsible that all these prisoner requirements are followed. There are inspection teams constantly going around the state seeing that local pokeys are up to federal snuff.

So, no matter what you and I might think is adequate attention and confinement of prisoners, we don't count. The feds, usually a federal judge, calls the prisoner treatment tune.

One reason for the lack of space in the Parmer County jail is that a section of the cell block was not completed at the beginning due to lack of funds. We understand that in the very near future this will be corrected and our local kalaboose will have more cell facilities.

We gather that under the existing federal judicial guidelines small county jails are almost impossible to bring into proper compliance due to the expenses involved.

We have seen this time and time again throughout the country. Federal judges issue orders that cost local taxing authorities immense amounts of money. We almost suspect that the judiciary, in its splendid isolation, has little feeling for the oppressed law-abiding tax payer. Nowadays criminal comfort seems to take precedent over taxpayer relief.

Have you noticed that the television networks have been playing down violence lately? The PTA has been instrumental in this war on TV violence and has been promoting family entertainment.

This has drawn a response from at least one network. They are going to air a tender program about the love of an Alaskan sled dog for his friend, an Irish potato. It will be called Husky and Starch.

With this tender thought we hope you have a lovely Thanksgiving and are getting suitably prepared for the coming holiday's long sessions of football on the boob tube. Go Cowboys!!

## Estraca Captured In Albuquerque

7:30 Texas time on a misdemeanor charge. Albuquerque authorities checked Estraca through the National Crime Information Center computer and it produced the county warrant against the Bovina man on five charges stemming from the assault case which occurred last June, Lovelace said.

He said the Albuquerque police notified him immediately saying "I think we have your boy." To which Lovelace answered, "I can tell you how to be sure right now. Just check his arms and see if a Bible is tattooed on the right arm and a woman is tattooed on the left arm."

The Albuquerque officer did as he was bid and the positive identification was made on Estraca, Lovelace said.

Estraca was to be arraigned in Albuquerque Wednesday morning, according to Sheriff Lovelace. "If Estraca waives extradition he'll be sleeping in Parmer County jail tomorrow night (Wednesday)," Lovelace said. "If not, he will be extradited through the New Mexico governor's office."

Another suspect in the assault case - Jerry Lee Persons, 24, of Naples, Fla., was tried before District Judge Pat Boone, Jr. Tuesday afternoon. According to Lovelace, Persons pleaded guilty to all the charges pending against him, including two counts of felony assault, two counts of burglary

and one count of aggravated assault.

He was assessed a 50-year sentence on charges stemming from the assault of the rural family and a 10-year term for the burglary of a neighboring farmhouse that same night. Lovelace said the terms will run concurrently.

He said he expected Persons to be transported to the state penitentiary in Huntsville right away. He added that Persons might also be charged with jailbreak, robbery and car theft as a result of the jail break and subsequent flight to avoid recapture which took place last week.

The saga of Persons and Estraca began last summer when they were apprehended following two incidents which involved the assault and terrorizing of a county family and the burglary of that home, plus a neighboring farmhouse. They had been incarcerated in Parmer County jail awaiting trial until September 22 at which time they were transferred to the Deaf Smith County jail in Hereford.

Shortly before Lovelace was to return the prisoners to the local jail, they escaped and managed to hide out for a day before a high speed chase between Texico and Clovis resulted in the capture of Persons. However, Estraca fled the area and remained at large until his arrest Tuesday night in Albuquerque.

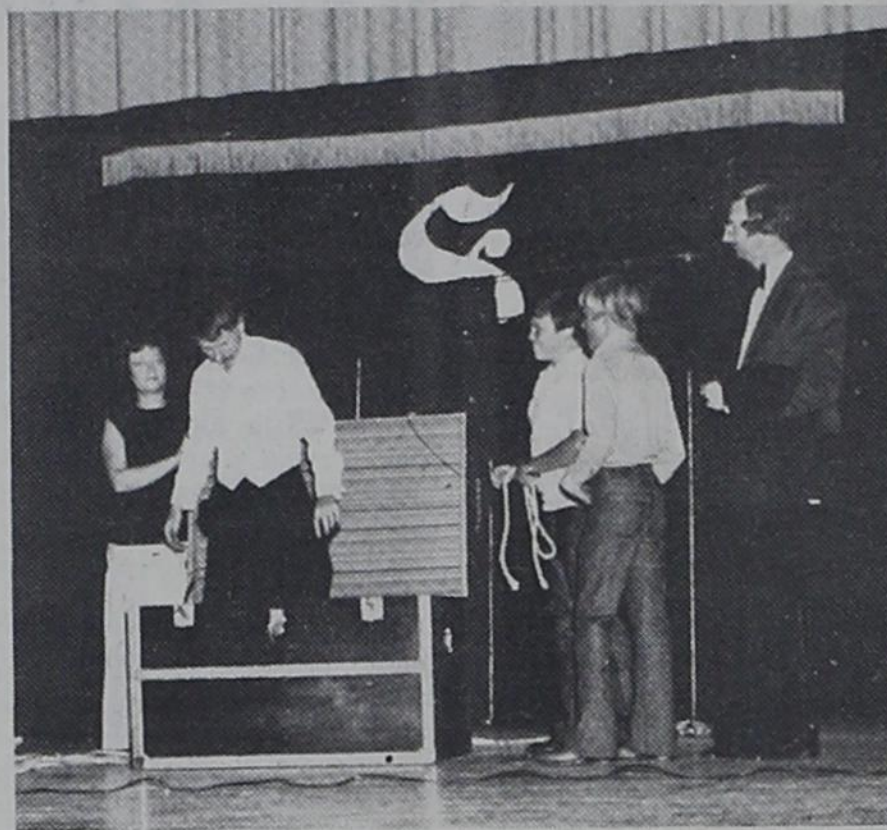

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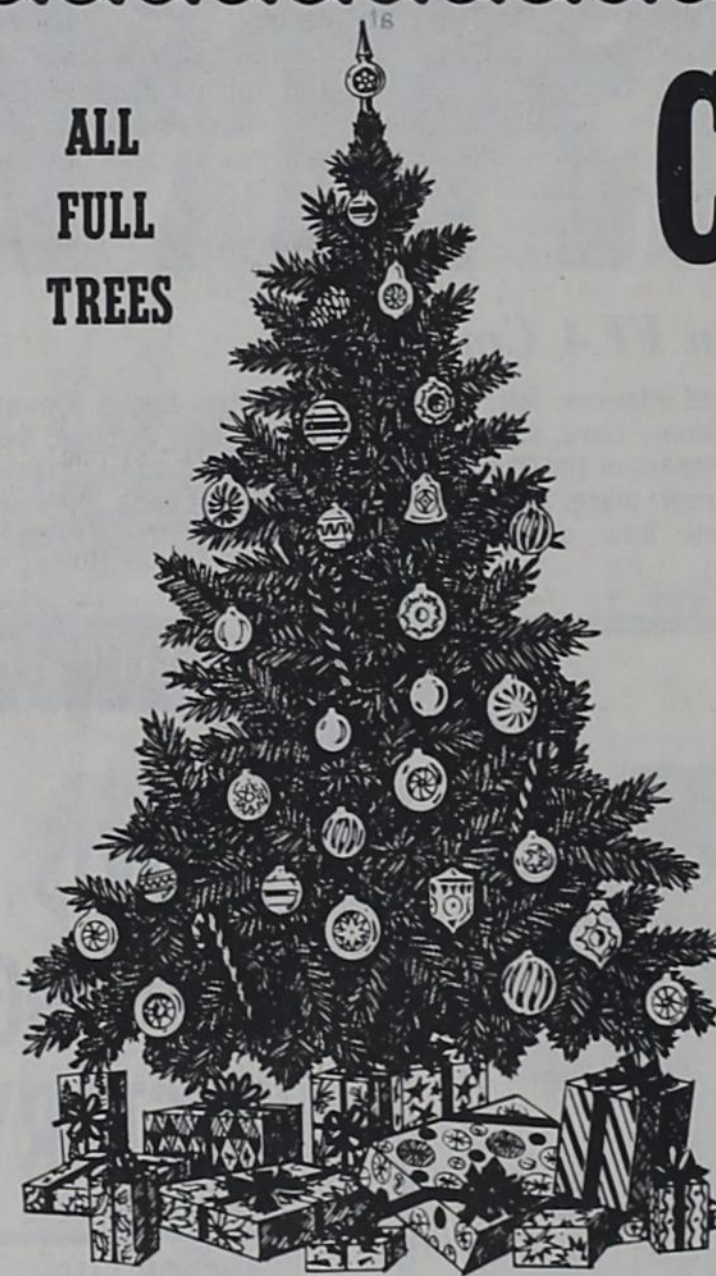

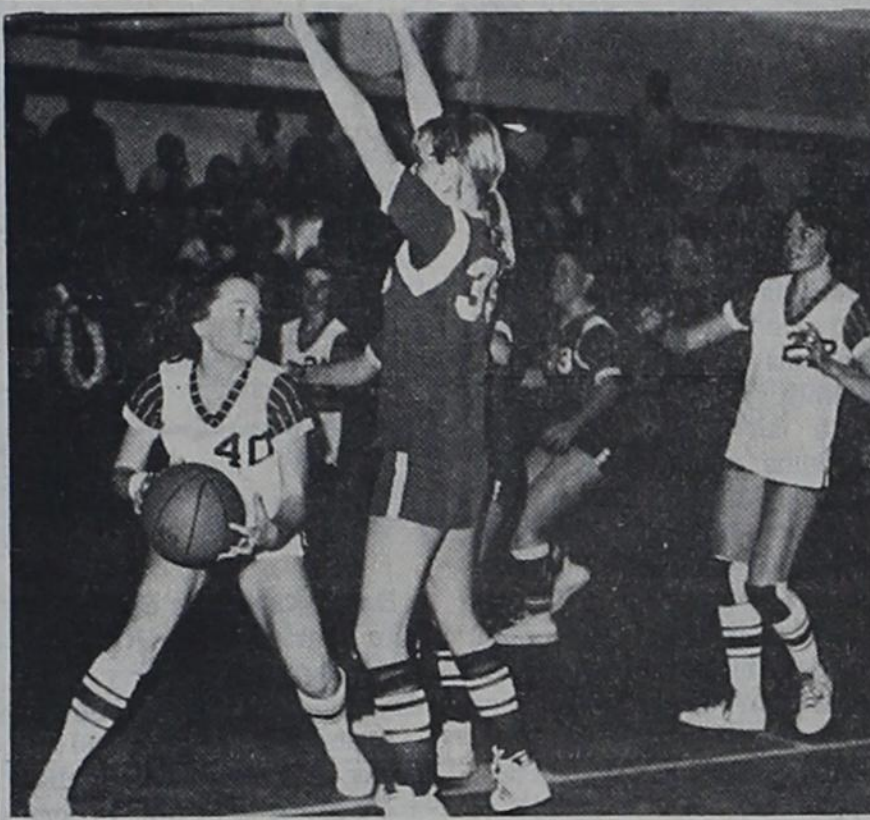
Leading rebounder was T. Harrington with 11. Others

Lori Harrington, sophomore. Lori is the only sophomore on the team and hopefully she will develop into an excellent player.



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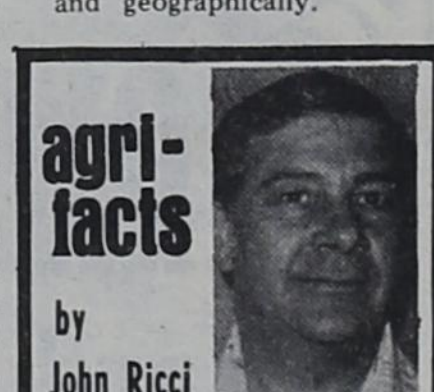

Well, someone finally is trying to do something about the weather. Not change it, mind you, but at least trying to give the farmer and rancher a fighting chance to keep up with it. A national agricultural weather network is being set up, using the states' Extension Service personnel, who will practically hand carry weather information direct to the farm or ranch. The National Weather Service (NWS), Washington, D.C., is expected to get the weather information down to the grass roots level faster and more accurately than ever before. NWS also plans to set up 330 special weather radio stations to broadcast ag weather advisories. The whole radio network should be in operation within 3-4 years, not a minute too soon for most farmers either.

BUT NOW

The words "but now" are found in many places in the Bible, but most often in the Epistles of Paul. These two words are most significant, for they indicate a change in program. If my secretary is transcribing some dictation and I say: "But now I would like you to take a letter," this indicates a change in program. So it is with this phrase as we find it in Rom. 3:21: "BUT NOW the righteousness of God without the law is manifested." Prior to this time God's people were under the law. There was no other way to approach or obey Him. But though under the law, they constantly broke the law, so that they stood before God condemned rather than justified. Thus the apostle says in Verse 20: "Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in His sight; for by the law is the knowledge of sin." "BUT NOW the righteousness of God without the law is manifested" (Ver. 21). How can this be? How can a man be declared righteous apart from the law? The answer - the only answer is, by grace through faith in Christ. Though perfect and sinless Christ died for sin. Whose sin? Yours and mine. Thus as Paul declares in Acts 13:38: "By this Man is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins, and by Him all who believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the Law of Moses." "Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith, without the deeds of the law" (Rom. 3:29).

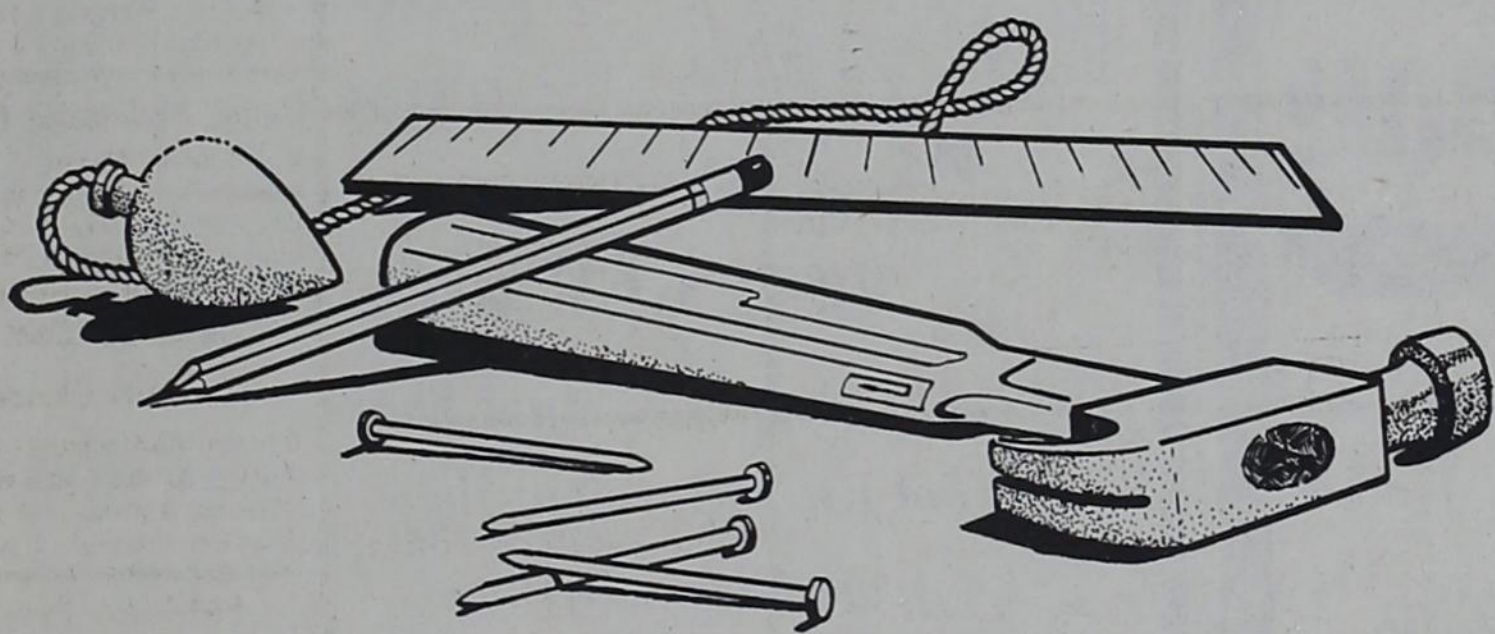

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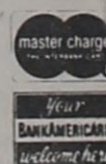
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
