Texas elections are on tap for next year.

The filing date for local candidates begins Dec. 3 and ends Jan. 3.

Candidates need to file in Parmer County with their party chairmen -- John Armstrong for the Republicans and Robert White for the Democrats.

County Treasurer --Altha Herington, a Republican, will seek reelection.

County Clerk -- Colleen Stover, a Republican, will seek re-election.

County Judge -- Bonnie Heald, a Democrat, will seek re-election.

District Clerk -- Sandra Warren, a Republican, will seek re-election.

Bovina area Justice of the Peace -- Vi Hutto, a Democrat, said she isn't ready to say yet on whether she will run again.

Friona area Justice of the Peace -- Valton Howard, a Republican, will seek re-election.

Farwell area Justice of

the Peace -- Pam Haseloff, a Democrat, will seek reelection.

District Court Judge --Gordon Green, a Democrat, will seek reelection.

Wolverines come from behind to beat Capitan in semi-finals; take on Fort Sumner for state title

Down 16-13 to the Capitan Tigers in the state semifinal with just over 6 minutes remaining in the game last Friday night, the Texico Wolverines faced their biggest challenge of the season thus far.

The Wolverines had already turned the ball over four times and now they were deep in their own territory starting on the 4-yard line with their season on the line. Thoughts of "I don't want this to end tonight" were going through some fans' heads, including mine.

The first play was a QB sneak by Zane Anderson that gained one yard. On 2nd down, Weston Casey ran for another yard. Faced with 3rd down and 8, the tension was rising. Capitan had played a good game all night but their defense hadn't done that much damage to the Wolverines. It was the turnovers that had denied Texico any momentum.

Casey took the 3rd down handoff and broke through the line racing 73 yards to the Capitan 22-yard line. Four plays later, they were in the end zone with a 2-yard run by Justin Garrison and the Wolverines had their first lead of the game 19-16.

This proved to be enough to win as Garrison picked off the Capitan QB to end the game and set up the Wolverines fifth appearance in the state championship game in the past 5 seasons. Texico will play their rivals, the Fort Sumner Foxes, Saturday at 2 p.m. mt at Fort

Texico took the opening kickoff and moved the ball to midfield before the Tigers forced a punt. The punt snap was mishandled and Capitan recovered the ball at the Wolverine 40-yard line. The Tigers went 3 and out after a couple of incomplete passes and a tackle for no gain by Aaron Vaughan.

The Wolverines quickly moved the ball down field to the 6-yard line highlighted by a 39-yard run by Dustin McDaniel. Garrison ran it in from 6 yards out for an apparent score but the referees ruled that he lost the ball on the 1 inch line and Capitan recovered.

The Tigers and Wolverines both went 3 and out on their next possessions. Texico turned the ball over again when the Capitan punt bounced and hit a Wolverine player at the 14-yard line. Carlos Meza knocked down a pass but on 3rd and 10, Capitan QB Tillman Freeman hit a receiver in the end zone making it 7-0 with 7:22 remaining in the second quarter.

Texico quickly answered with a 75-yard run by McDaniel on the first play from scrimmage. The Anderson kick was good and the score was tied at 7-7.

Capitan was forced to punt again after 2 incomplete passes and a knocked down pass by Vaughan. The Wolverines got two 1st downs before they turned the ball over on downs at the Capitan 44-yard line.

The Tigers moved the ball to the 15-yard line thanks to pass interference and roughing the passer penalties but Texico held forcing a 28-yard field goal attempt that was no good.

In the second half, the Tigers wasted no time scoring as they completed a 48-yard pass to the 7-yard line and scored four plays later with a 2-yard pass. The kick failed making the score 13-7 at the 10:13 mark of the 3rd

Again, the Wolverines answered quickly; this time in two plays. McDaniel mishandled a pitch but was able to scoop it up, reverse field, and run for 26 yards. Garrison took it in from 27 yards out tying the score at 13-13 after the kick failed.

Capitan moved the ball to the 10-yard line on pass completions of 28 and 25 yards and a late hit penalty. Ethan McDaniel made a good tackle for no gain and two incomplete passes forced a 27-yard field goal attempt.







LIVE CATTLE: Cash cattle prices jumped higher this veek and traded at \$92 which helped to support the December contract off the open on Thursday. All other Live Cattle contracts did not make new highs on this move and prices dropped about \$3 into Friday's close. Most analysts believe this probably caught the top in cash for the next few weeks? Prices have been flat for the most part and are now expected to test the low end of their trading range around the \$89 level.

FEEDER CATTLE: The market also took another shot at highs made during mid October at \$115 basis the January contract and failed. The market dropped about \$2.50 from Thursday's high into Friday's low. All nearby contracts have failed to make higher highs than the mid October high with the exception of the back months (March, April & May). Expect softer market into Thanksgiving.

CORN: The market saw a little bump up on Friday as nigher soybeans and wheat had helped to support prices. This market should be close to a bottom as harvest comes to an end. Historically, prices don't really begin to move until after the first of the year. The USDA raised production to 11 billion bushels this week. World demand will be the driving force going into next year.

SOYBEANS: This market is still range bound, but acts as though the bottom made in October will hold? A solid close above the \$6.00 mark basis the January contract should confirm a major low in place. Historically, prices usually don't begin their move up until after the first of

WHEAT: The December KC wheat tested last weeks nigh of \$3.75, but failed. Friday's close was strong enough that prices may test this level again next week. A close above this point projects up into the \$3.83 and then a test of the contract high made just a few weeks ago at \$3.93. World demand for hard red winter wheat is strong and production is expected to be lower this season.

COTTON: The market has continued to drift lower with osychological support coming in around the 50 cent mark pasis the December contract. Harvest pressure during this time of the year is normal. Trade talks between the US and China continues to go nowhere. Basically, this market has traded within a 5-6 cent range all year with little pops above and below the range.



Ute Water Project boosted

On Tuesday, the Ute Water Project had a meeting at the Texico Community Center designed to shed some light on what the project meant to Eastern New Mexico. Points made included:

- The water level of the Ogallala Aquifer is estimated to be too low to pump by 2055.

- There has been a 20% increase in the project cost over the last 2 years. Waiting any longer means higher

- To balance the amount of water coming out of the aquifer, New Mexico would have to retire up to 74,000 acres of farm land. The current estimated recharge rate of water into the aquifer is basically negligible.

- Dairies are not the biggest water concern to the aquifer. Much more water is taken out by farming.

- If this project is not accepted, the water pipeline will be offered to another part of the state. This could mean that when the aquifer runs out, there will be very few options to bring water into the area. If the pipeline is put in, Texico will be able to use wells to offset any water loss due to drought. It also means that the agricultural wells will last longer.

- The estimated average cost of each resident's water bill could be anywhere from \$31.51/month up to \$35.95/month. Right now, the average Texico water bill was reported to be \$25/month

- Bills have been introduced at the state and federal level to share the costs of this project. All of the cities have to sign onto the project before they will find out if there will be any extra money from the government.

- Parmer County has not been looked at to join the project, and help defray costs, because the politics of an inter-state project would be too high.

Farwell OK's ordinance regulating some vehicles







City Council reviews planned sewer project
