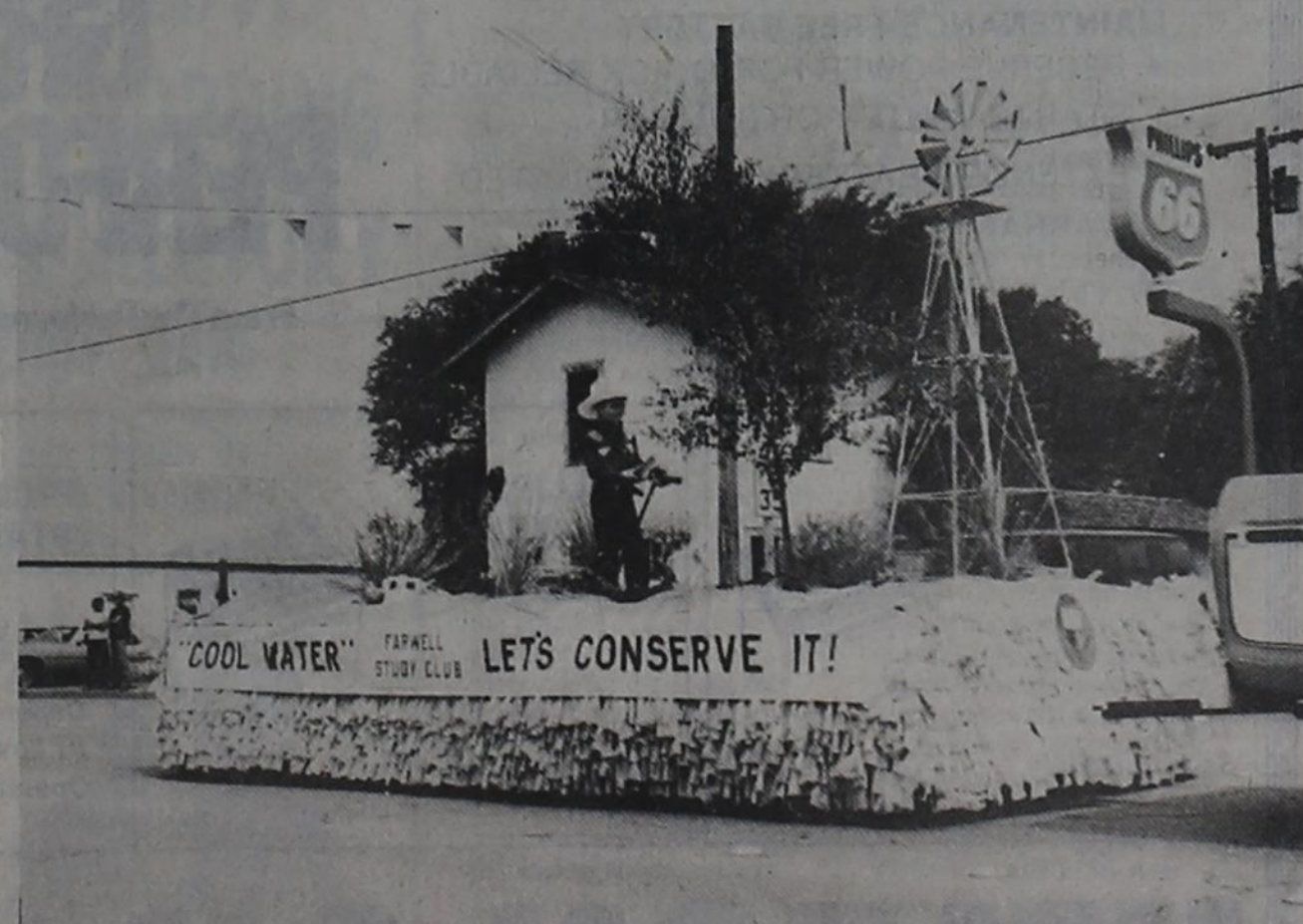

School Begins Aug. 18 - -

Texico Registration To Begin Next Week

Texico school registration for the 1982-83 school term is to begin Monday, Aug. 9, from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. MDT on each of the following dates:

Sixth, seventh and eighth graders will register at Texico Junior High on Monday, Aug. 9, in the junior high school office.

Seniors and juniors will register on Tuesday, Aug. 10, and

sophomores and freshmen will register Wednesday, Aug. 11. The respective registrations are to take place in the high school office.

Those who will be attending Texico Elementary School for the first time are to register on August 18 at the school from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Elementary school registration is only for those new stu-

dents in grades 1-5. Those who have attended Texico Elementary School previously need not register, according to James Pierce, school superintendent.

Pierce added that any school age child who resides within the Texico School District is entitled to a free public education which includes handicapped children. Anyone knowing of a handicapped

school age child not receiving an education should contact the Texico Municipal Schools.

Pierce said that a school age child is at least five years of age prior to 12:01 a.m. on September 1, 1982.

Classes at Texico school will begin Wednesday, Aug. 18 at 9 a.m. Teachers are to report on August 17 for an in-service day.

Attracts Largest Crowd - -

Border Town Days Hailed 'Best Ever'

It was a perfect day! The skies were overcast to keep the parade marchers and riders cool, the rains held off and the wind was calm to allow the largest crowd ever to enjoy the fun, relaxation, laughter, and memorable moments of the 1982 Border Town Days celebration, which is being hailed as "the best ever."

The 16th annual Twin Cities event was filled with competitive spirit, lots of color, community friendship, and the reunion of friends.

Both the Parmer County Courthouse lawn and the Farwell City Park were packed with lawn chairs, blankets, and people as an estimated 1,500 to 1,600 community residents, friends, and visitors gathered to celebrate the Texico-Farwell event.

Kicking off the BTDD funfest was the first performance of the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association's rodeo Thursday night, which also took place Friday and Saturday nights.

On Saturday morning, the streets were lined for the traditional parade which featured riding groups, bicycles, antique cars, beauty queens, BTDD contestants, CAPB Honor Guard, fire trucks, law enforcement vehicles, marching bands, and many floats moving down the "main streets" in Texico and Farwell.

Special attractions in the parade included Miss New Mexico, Cindy Ann Friesen of Carlsbad, 1981 Border Town Days Queen Polly Turner of Farwell, Texas Tech Red Raider, Perry Church of Friona, and his horse Happy VI-II, and the West Texas State University Mascot, Thunder, and the Buffalo Herdsmen.

Float winners were the Farwell Study Club, first place, winning \$75; Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens, second place, winning \$50; and Hughes True Value, third place, winning \$30. Farwell Chamber of Commerce and the BTDD Committee furnished the float prizes.

Winners of the Kids' Decor-

ated Bike Contest were as follows: Category I, age six and under-first place, Corey Horner, \$5; second place, Eric Delgado, \$4; and third place, Scott Smith, \$3.

Category II, ages seven through 12-first place, Dawnette Fly, \$6; second place, Laura Jaime, \$5; third place, Angela Ceniceros, \$4; fourth place, Leslie Monk, \$3; and fifth place, Brian Rogers and Riley Malone, each \$2. The monetary prizes were donated by T & A Welding of Texico.

The winning riding club entry was the Cattle Capitol

Cowbelles of Clovis. The trophy was presented by the Farwell Chamber.

Winners in the old car category were Steve Jones with his 1934 Dodge pickup, first place; and Duane McDaniel with his 1955 T-Bird, second place. The two were awarded trophies, donated by the Texico Chamber of Commerce.

All floats were judged on a point system, as were the riding groups and old cars. Judges for the parade were Lloyd Franklin, Jack Eichenberger, and Jim Martin, all of Clovis.

Following the parade, BTDD attendants made their way to the Farwell City Park where over 1200 persons were served a barbecue dinner sponsored by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club. Walter Hughes and his Cook Shack Crew cooked the meal which was served by the Rotarians.

All afternoon the crowd enjoyed themselves by browsing around the courthouse lawn viewing the many arts and craft booths and displays on hand. In charge of the Arts and Crafts Show were Janie Bow-

Summerfield Man Pleads Guilty To Cattle Theft

A Summerfield, Tex., man pled guilty to charges of cattle theft last week in Parmer County District Court.

John Henry Kuper, 32, of Summerfield pled guilty Tuesday Aug. 3, to a charge of theft of cattle. He was given two years probation and was fined \$150 plus court costs.

In sheriff's department action this past week, Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan reported:

Dora Bruns, 34, of Friona was arrested on July 31 by Texas Highway Patrol officers

on a Potter County warrant for writing worthless checks. She was released on \$500 bond pending County court action.

Henry Lloyd Pace, 33, of Hereford was arrested by Texas Highway Patrolman Talkington on August 2, and was charged with failure to stop and render aid, felony. He is being held on \$10,000 bond pending grand jury investigation.

Jesus Estrada, 22, of Friona was arrested by Parmer County Sheriff's officers on August 3, and was charged with contempt of court out of

District Court. He was given 10 days in jail and was ordered to pay \$500 in back child support.

In other sheriff's news, Troy Lovett, Rt. 1, Texico, reported a burglary at his residence. Approximately \$274 worth of items were taken.

Spudnut Shop in Bovina reported a burglary on August 1. An estimated \$8 in money and candy were taken.

Bob Thurman of Farwell reported that five guns were taken from his residence. They were valued at approximately \$1,000.

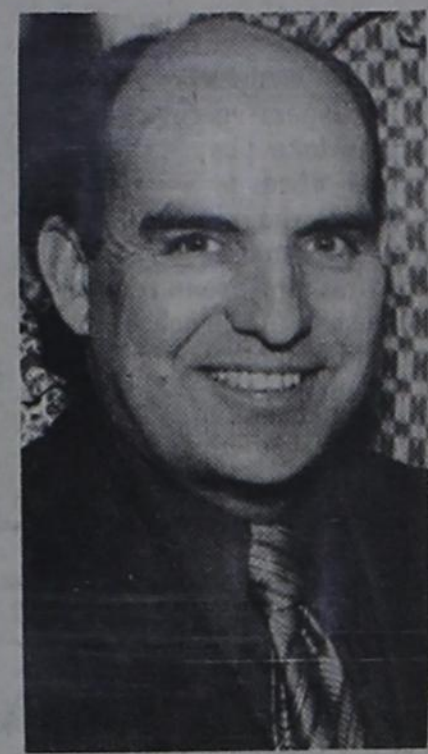

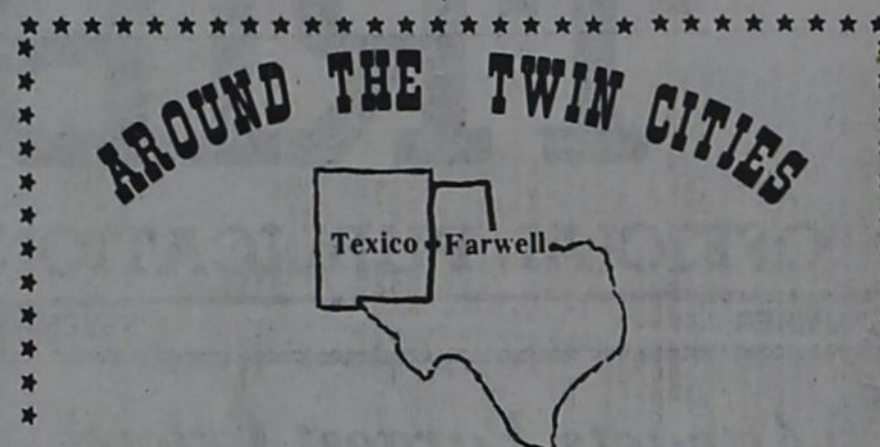
with burial in Evergreen Cemetery at Clarion.

FIRST GRADE: Big Chief tablet, green soap eraser, Elmer's Glue, crayons (16 regular size), tissue (regular box), box for supplies, several No. 2 pencils, set of 8 water colors, plastic tote bag, scissors.

SECOND GRADE: Notebook paper, wide ruled or tablet, large bottle of Elmer's Glue, several pencils, No. 2, crayons (at least 24 colors), scissors, sharp pointed, green soap eraser, box of tissue (large size), box for supplies, set of water colors.

THIRD GRADE: Two No. 2 pencils, scissors, Elmer's Glue, crayons (at least 24 colors), water colors, ruler with metrics, green soap eraser, box of tissue, spiral notebook, wide ruled, notebook

paper, wide ruled.

FOURTH GRADE: Two No. 2 pencils, two red pencils, scissors, sharp pointed, bottle of Elmer's Glue, box of crayons, water colors, map pencils, ruler (metric), green soap eraser, tissue, notebook or clipboard, notebook paper, wide line, three spiral notebooks, wide line, school box, comb.

FIFTH GRADE: Notebook (looseleaf type), notebook paper, large bottle of glue, scissors (sharp pointed), several pencils, watercolors, crayons (at least 24 colors), ruler, tissue, box for supplies, map pencils (8 colors), three spiral notebooks, two red grading pencils.

Classes Start Aug. 23 . . .

Registration Set For Farwell Schools

Farwell schools registration is to begin Tuesday, Aug. 17, for elementary students; Thursday, Aug. 19, for high school students; and junior high school students will register on the first day of school, which is slated for August 23, according to principals at the three Farwell schools.

High school seniors are to meet in the school auditorium at 9:30 a.m. on August 19; juniors will meet 11 a.m.; sophomores at 1:30 p.m.; and freshmen at 3 p.m. the same day, according to Farwell High School Principal Don Malone.

"The students will register for classes, receive their school handbooks, be assigned a locker, and receive their books at this time," Malone said.

Elementary school students who are NEW to the Farwell School district and who will be five years old or older by September 1, 1982 are urged to pre-register August 17, from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. at the elementary school. New kindergarten students should bring health, immunization and birth records with them, according to principal James Craig.

Craig gave the following supply lists for elementary students:

FIRST GRADE: towel or mat, school box (cigar box), large box Kleenex (200 count), pair sharp pointed scissors, medium bottle Elmer's Glue (4 oz.), box crayons (16 colors), eraser, two regular pencils, water color set (8 colors).

SECOND GRADE: Big Chief tablet, two No. 2 pencils, eraser, box crayons (24 colors

only), small bottle school glue, pair sharp pointed scissors, zip pack to hold supplies, set of water colors-basic colors, large box Kleenex (200 count), spiral notebook-40 pages.

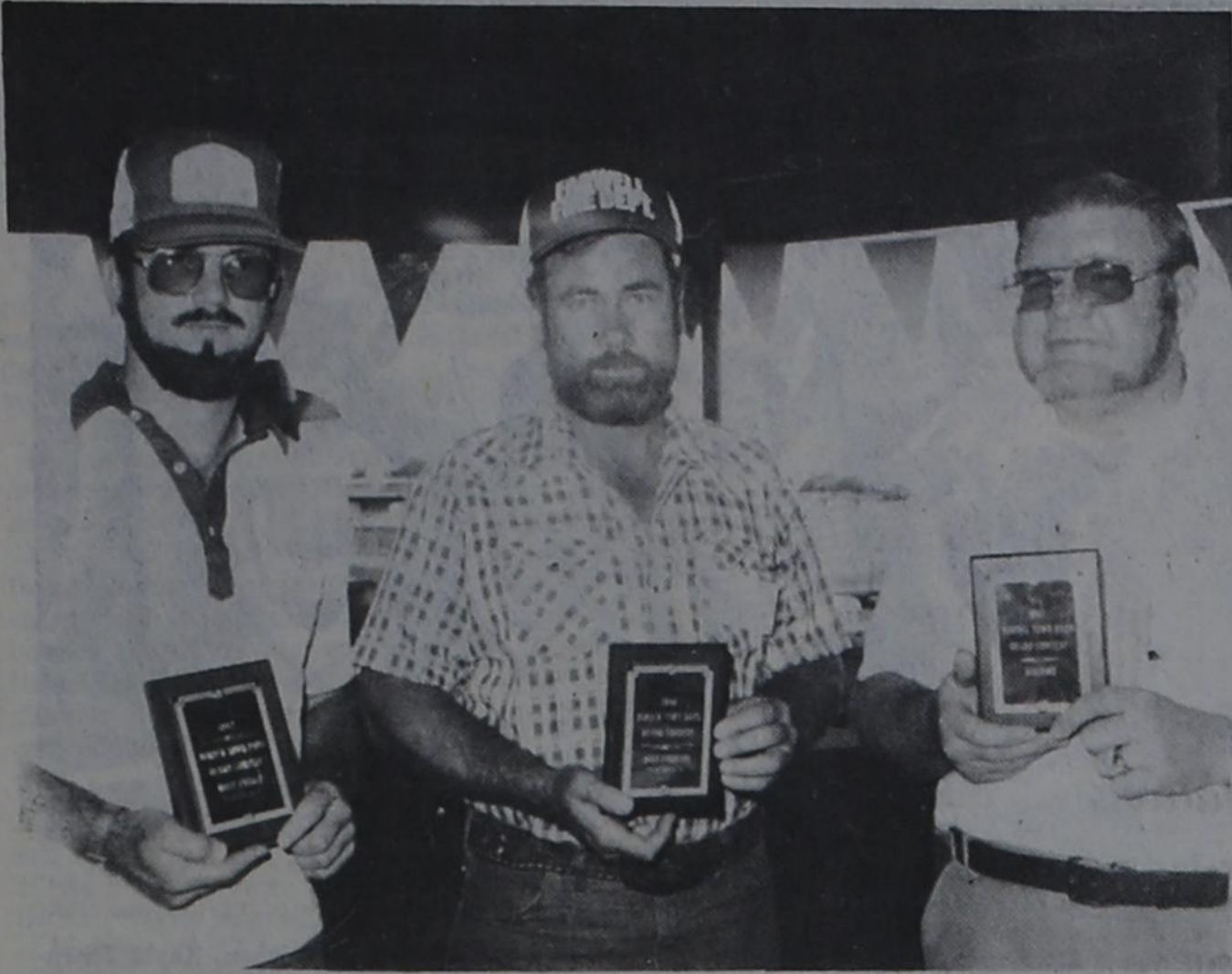

Strake Talk

Education—Our Money's Worth?

In my travels over Texas, it has become clear that Texans rate crime, the economy, and the education of their children among their principal concerns.

This week I would like to discuss education. As the father of six children, this has long been one of my principal concerns also.

We currently spend over half our tax revenue on education, and many people raise the question to me: "Are we getting our money's worth?" The questions put to me indicate some think we are spending too much; others, not enough.

I am concerned about the amount of money we spend on education, but I am more concerned about the quality of that education. I believe the quality of education our children receive can be improved by making some fundamental changes in the way we pay and treat our teachers.

I believe in merit pay for teachers. Frankly, I think good teachers ought to be paid more than poor teachers. A good, conscientious teacher cannot help but become discouraged and disillusioned when he or she ends the month with the same pay as one whom they know to be indifferent. The result is apt to be that they leave the teaching profession altogether.

I also think we ought to enter a system of competency testing not only for new teachers, but for those who are currently teaching. We test our kids, why not also test those who teach them?

In short, I think we ought to bear down on the basics, relieve our teachers of burdensome paper work now placed upon them, and recognize and reward our better teachers with better pay, for the sake of our children, and our future.

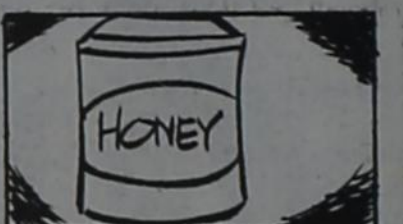
Outstanding awards for best flag performance included Codie Burch (junior high) and Schree Thigpen and Kayla Thornton (beginning).

Commissioners Court Accepts Equip. Bids

Farmer County Commissioners Court, meeting in regular session Monday, July 26, accepted bids for two pieces of equipment for county use.

A bid from Dale Gober of Bovina in the amount of \$6,750 for a used truck-tractor for use in Precinct No. 1 was accepted as the lowest and best bid. The other bid was received from McGehee Truck Co. of Clovis.

Deckard Equipment Co. of Amarillo with a bid of \$21,893 was the successful bidder for a new tractor with front end loader and back hoe for use in Precinct No. 3. Other firms bidding for this equipment sale were Case Power and Equipment of Clovis, and Running Water Irrigation of Bovina who offered a used machine for sale.

In other court business the "jury of view" recently appointed will be continued until the court meeting of August 9 since the group's attorney, Charles Aycock, is out of town.

The commissioners voted to participate in the surplus cheese program through the Panhandle Community Action Corp.

Seth Halbert and C.L. Abernathy of the Central Plains Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center made their annual report to the court and requested consideration that an annual fee of \$2,430 be contained in the new county budget. This is the same amount as requested last year and was approved unanimously for the 1983 budget.

A boarding care bill in the amount of \$1,005 for county foster children was approved for payment. This money will be refunded to the county.

It was voted to pay Richard Collard \$437.50 as attorney ad litem appointed to represent a juvenile in a criminal action.

Larry Jesko met with the court once again to ask that a road problem be corrected. Archie Tarter, commissioner of Precinct No. 3 and County Judge Porter Roberts are to look into the matter.

High Plains Pest Control will spray the trees at the county courthouse at a cost of \$260.

A delegation from Farmer County Community Hospital in Friona, including Elda Hart, J.W. Gammon, Wendell Gresham, Cordie Potts, and Dr. Paul Spring, appeared before the court to explain the hospital's need and seeking help from the court. Commissioners assured the delegation that the court would try to include some help in the 1983 budget.

At the suggestion of Benna Felts, county treasurer, it was voted to re-invest \$125,000 right-of-way money from a C.D. now maturing in another C.D. to mature November 9 of this year. Also re-invested was \$10,000 of permanent improvement money in a C.D. to mature 11-9-82.

A motion was made to approve and ratify the following soil conservation work and that the work be performed when the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the road:

Precinct No. 3: Ricky Bennett, Kenneth Johnson.

The commissioners court minutes show that "all the court drove to the Ted Walling place east of Bovina on the Running Water Draw to investigate a complaint telephoned to Judge Roberts by Walling. It was the consensus that some of Walling's fence posts, had indeed, been scorched by fire but were still as firm as the others that had not been burned."

Researcher says solar power not cost efficient

COLLEGE STATION — Home and apartment dwellers can take several steps to trim their utility bills, but solar water heaters are not yet cost effective, say Texas A&M University energy experts.

Public acceptance of costly devices to save fossil fuels is not enough. The devices must also pay for themselves in a moderate length of time, they say.

"My figures showed that for about \$1,800 I could get a solar water heater that will save about half of my \$65 annual cost of gas-heated water," said Dr. Dale Webb, a civil engineering professor and materials specialist. "It doesn't add up."

An architecture professor suggests less costly measures and practices that can be applied to existing or new homes. Adding or installing attic insulation, cutting down on air infiltration or leaks, keeping air conditioning and heating systems properly adjusted and choosing appliances with the best energy efficiency ratios are some of the best steps for trimming utility bills.

THE LOVE OF GOD

Millions of people—even religious people—are afraid of God and are struggling to earn His favor. They suppose that salvation is the reward of showing enough love to Him.

"(We) were by nature the children of wrath, even as others, BUT GOD, WHO IS RICH IN MERCY, FOR HIS GREAT LOVE WHEREWITH HE LOVED US, even when we were dead in sins, hath quickened us together with Christ. By grace ye are saved" (Eph. 2:3-5).
