The basket will break

Well, I see that the long-awaited nuclear arms talks are about to be held. I guess I should be happy, but I'm not.

No, I don't favor an armed conflict using nuclear weapons. Such a thought scares the heck out of me for the damage it can instill on the world.

Yet, I have absolutely no faith in negotiating any type of weapons agreement with Communist Russia. The Communists view such pacts as meaning we have to abide by them and they don't. Period.

It's always griped me that some leading politicians over the years have put faith in Communist promises. How absolutely naive. The Communist goal is simple: world hegemony. And there is only one major power standing in their way -- our nation.

It hurts me to write so poorly about the Russian rulers since my heritage is Russian.

My mother's parents fled Russia in 1917 just after the Bolsheviks (the early name for the Communist Party) took control in the October Revolution.

And my father left Russia about 1911 to avoid the draft. I can't say I really blame him. In those Czarist Russia days, you were drafted by lottery and his number had come up. Do you know how long the draft was for? No, not 2 or 3 years. It was for 30 years in those days.

The Russian people have been long-suffering, starting with the days when the Mongols conquered the area in the 13th century. It's a shame that they were finally able to overthrow the oppressive Czarist regime -- and allow a few fanatical Bolsheviks to gain control.

Then "Uncle Joe" Stalin became dictator, allowing the starvation of millions and millions of his countrymen. There probably still are some Americans who don't believe that.

Remember what happened after Hitler's troops first invaded the Soviet Union in 1941? Hundreds of thousands of Russians greeted them with open arms, figuring nothing could be worse than the Communist domination. Well, they miscalculated -- one evil was exchanged for another.

Today, the fact is that most Russians are non-political, just trying to make a living and have a decent life. Last year, a Pentagon officer, who had been stationed in Moscow for awhile, told me that most Russians were happy with their lot -- since their standard of living was much higher than it had ever been.

So I differentiate between the Russian people and the Communist leaders -- still a small minority in that country. But, unfortunately, they have the power, and the world has to suffer for it.

I am of the firm belief that the only way to prevent the Communists from attacking our nation is by having a strong defense. Make that a "stronger" defense. And, somehow, a weapons agreement, just doesn't fit in with my way of thinking.

A dictatorship which subjugates its people has to continually be on the offensive. Anything to take the minds of the people off its ills. So don't ever expect the Communist leadership of Russia to pull back its horns and give its priority to peace. It just won't happen.

For example, take a look at their war in Afghanistan. The Soviet Union will win easily. Their method is simple: kill all the Afghans. That's what is happening there -- but don't expect the TV people to get on top of this story. NBC, ABC, and CBS can't get their cameras in to see this mass slaughter -- therefore, it's now "news."

We can get our TV cameras into Ethiopia, so that's "news." What about the ongoing massacre in Afghanistan? That Asian nation's struggle should be on the news each night. You tell me why it isn't.

So now we will negotiate with the Communists, while they do everything in their power to undercut our defense throughout the world. So, fine, let's do it. But let's move quickly along with stronger defenses, more military capability and an aggressive international policy aimed at blunting the Communist initiatives.

If we don't, and we put all our eggs in a basket labeled "nuclear arms pact," then you can be certain one thing will happen:

The basket will break.

second, \$15; and third, \$10.

Those wishing to enter should take their pheasant tail feathers to Farwell Hardware no later than noon Dec. 24.

Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent, will be the official pheasant tail feather measurer this year, and he has his measuring tape all ready to start his job.

Pheasant season opens

Saturday marks the opening of pheasant season, and one of the options open to hunters is the preserves made available by the Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority.

In order to hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter, and one must also purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. The permits are good for any or all of the land secured by the sorority, including areas in Parmer and Bailey counties in Texas, and Curry and Roosevelt counties in New Mexico.

The permits may be purchased at Hughes True Value Hardware on Friday, Dec. 7, at 6 p.m., ESA will move the permit sales to the Farwell Community Center and will be there until 10 p.m. Friday night. On Saturday, Dec. 8, the permits may be purchased at the Community Center from 5 a.m. until 10 a.m.

After the opening days, the permits may be purchased at the office of Aldridge, Harding, Aycock & Actkinson at 402 Third Street, Farwell, or by calling Maxine Williams, 481-3638; Leslie Lunsford, 481-9336; Kim Norton, 481-3223; Altha Herington, 481-9351, or Terri Nichols, 481-3408.

The ESA permits cost \$75 if they are purchased on Dec. 8 or 9. Those purchased Dec. 10 through 16, \$50, and those purchased Dec. 17 through 23, \$25. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season.

Texas licenses may be purchased locally at Hughes True Value Hardware and at the Parmer County Clerk's office, which is located on the first floor of the Parmer County courthouse.

In New Mexico, hunting licenses may be purchased in Clovis at Reb's Gun Shop, White's Auto, Alco, and (Continued on Page 2)

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Retirement community planned for Farwell

A plan is in the works for a retirement community for Farwell.

The community will be situated on the lots behind the Farwell Convalescent Center.

This community will be for retired persons who can care for themselves, but supportive services will be available for those who wish to take advantage of them.

Some of the services which will be offered are: meals; emergency call systems; recreational activities, and transportation.

Some of the homes will be duplexes, some single units. They will be two bedroom units, with approxi-

mately 1,000 square feet of living space. They will have all the modern conveniences, such as dishwashers, garbage disposals, etc. They will also have garages, and some handicapped facilities.

The plan is that a person or couple will buy the home, then pay a small monthly maintenance fee. If the person decides to move out, a large portion is refunded to him, or if he dies, the refundable amount would be paid to his estate.

The prices of the units will be kept as affordable as possible. The units will be built on demand, and the more that can be built at once, the

lower the prices will be.

When the plans are finalized, there will be a community meeting to introduce them to the public. Right now, some time in February looks like a possibility for this meeting.

Ron Fehner, administrator of the Farwell Convalescent Center, will manage the community, and will see to the needs of the occupants. He says he is very excited about the project, and hopes for its success.

The number of units to be built depends on the demand.

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Sheriff's report

In Texas, a resident hunting license or a combination hunting and fishing license is required by all Texas residents who hunt outside the county of their residence.

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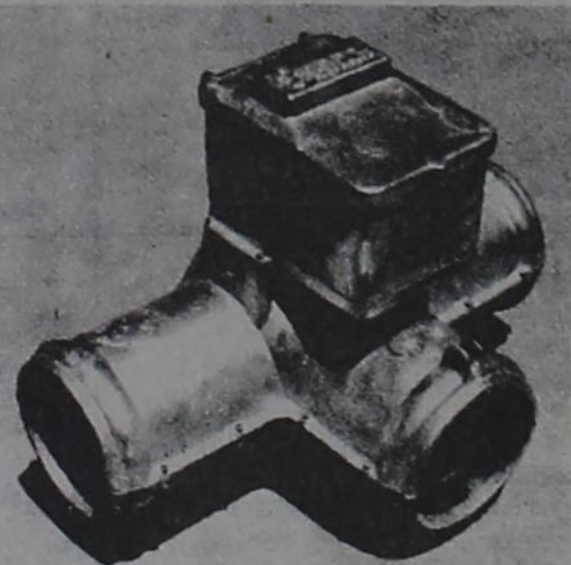
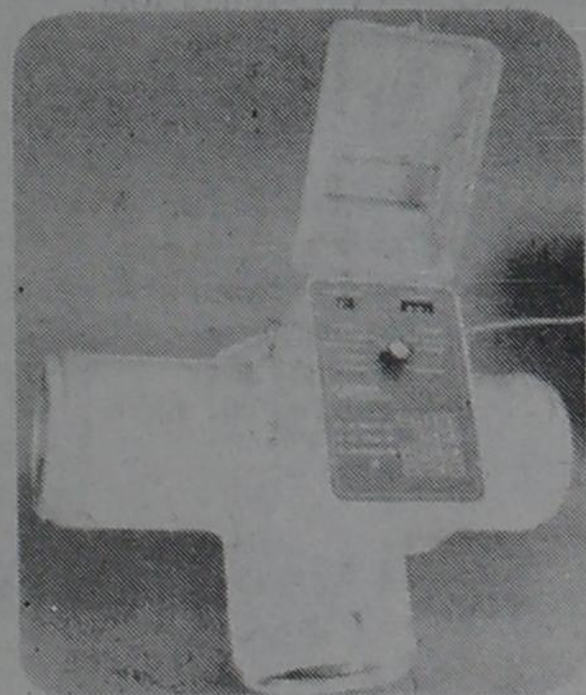
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Basketball action

Texico girls' varsity win opener

The Texico High School girls' varsity basketball team won its season opener against Springlake-Earth, 39-36.

Kelly Lynn was the top scorer in the game, with a total of 15 points. She was shooting with 33% accuracy from the field, and 87.5% from the free throw line. Kathy Harrison scored 8 points, shooting with 75% accuracy from the field and 100% accuracy from the free throw line. Cheryl Scott and Helen Jo Boorman each claimed 7 points and Coy Jo Burk, 2.

The top two rebounders for Texico were Cheryl Scott, with 13, and Kelly Lynn, 11.

Helen Jo Boorman owns 7 steals to lead the team in that department. Kathy Harrison led in the game with 6 assists to her credit, while Helen Jo Boorman had 4.

Overall, the girls made 12 field goals out of 39 attempts, for a 30.8% average. They were better at the free-throw line, making 15 out of 20 attempts, for a 75% average.

At the end of the first quarter, the score was tied at 10. Halftime score was Texico 18, Springlake-Earth 23. In the third quarter, Texico scored 10 and Springlake-Earth 5, to end the quarter in a tie at 28.
