

detachment at Camp Anaconda, about 45 minutes east of Baghdad. As a medic, her jobs are diverse, running from ordering supplies to helping with mass casualties. She has helped in surgeries with U.S. military, our allies' soldiers, Iraqi civilians and enemy combatants.

On her second tour, she has spent 10 months in Iraq. After the remaining two months, she will be reassigned to Fort Leonard Wood, Mo.

What has she learned the most from her tours in the Middle East?

"It's not to take life for granted," she replied. "We have opportunities and advantages in out country that other's don't have.

Veronica spoke to 5th grade pupils at Farwell Elementary School on Friday. What were the most asked questions? 1. How do you deal with the animals, like spiders and bugs? 2) Do you go out and attack the enemy?

As for the second question, Veronica does carry an M-16 rifle with her (especially needed when she pulls guard duty), but she has not had to use it.

And the best part of her job is the obvious:

"I help save lives."





Swimming pool work praised

The Texico City Council on Tuesday heard a last report for the season from Sean Wooten, who ran the Texico swimming pool this summer.

Wooten praised the work that Street Supt. Darrel Stanton and city employee Tommy Nieto did "for the hard work in getting the pool up and running. They did a tremendous job of cleaning and preparing the pool and deck areas."

He noted that most of the swimmers were there on Fridays and Saturdays, but felt with a little more advertising he could increase the numbers. He also said that the only complaint received this summer was the lack of a diving board. Councilman Oran Jay Autrey said that next year there should be a diving board installed along with a slide.

In other business, the council:

- Discussed the area around the city dump with Charles Knotts, an environmental director from the New Mexico Solid Waste Department. He is interested in cleaning up the area outside of the fenced in area at the dump.

Autrey said much of the trash and junk outside of the fence either belongs to the land owner or was allowed to be dropped there by him. He also pointed out that as long as the area outside of the dump is filled up with items that look like trash, wrecked cars and dilapidated buildings, then people will continue to drop their trash outside of the dump.

Knotts said that he had been through some of the trash looking for names of people that he could fine for dumping. Several citations have been issued.

- Went to look at the property of Tommy Nieto that was discussed at a previous meeting. Several of the council members said they believed that Nieto was going to replace an older trailer with a new trailer house on his property. The new home was only a few years newer than the previous house, but it was in much better shape so the council didn't have a problem with the arrangement.

- Heard from Interim City Clerk Carolyn Johnson that the New Mexico Finance Authority has granted Texico \$194,000 that it will take to complete Phase 1 projects. They hope all work will be completed in October.

- Discussed the water line work being done on Hereford Street. Mindy Neal reports that the Little Dribblers basketball program likely will start the first week of November this year, instead of after Christmas as in past years.





Next up for Lazbuddie: a game at Lefors, which is 1-1 on the season.



LIVE CATTLE: Short term trends turned down this week with a slightly lower cash trade on Friday. The market moved up into new high territory based on news that South Korea would open their borders to US beef imports. Once the announcement was made, the market began to move lower. Retailers seem to be having problems moving beef at current levels. Expect to see lower prices over the next 2-3 weeks. Seasonal tendencies are still running contra (opposite) from normal.

FEEDER CATTLE: The market was able to turn down last week, but not before making all time record highs. The Cash Feeder Index is supposed to be calculated from 12 major sales across the country. It's been difficult to pinpoint how many cattle are trading at such lofty levels? Most feeders priced at these levels project a break-even around \$1.00 fat. Not much room for error?

CORN: The December contract was able to trade back ip towards our target at \$2.49 before turning back down. There will be a USDA Crop Production report out next Tuesday which is expected to either 1) leave estimated production unch from last month or 2) Increase production based on ideal weather and growing conditions over the last few weeks. Prices should move lower into har-

SOYBEANS: Beans have continued to slide lower over the last several weeks and now look as thought they will eventually test the \$5.00 level at some point between now and harvest. Improving conditions have kept a lid on any allies with ideas production is growing larger daily.

WHEAT: This market also met some targets as the December KC Wheat contract was able to move all the way back into the \$4.93 resistance area. This was also once a support level that was breached in early August. Markets have a tendency to go back an retest those levels. Improving weather conditions across all major winter wheat producing areas have held prices down.

COTTON: Since breaking a major support level at the 54 cent area basis the December contract, prices have continued to move lower. The USDA Crop Production report due out next week is expected to drop production in the US? The USDA has remained between 1-2 million bales higher than private forecaster's all year. Many analysts seem to think this report will realign with many of the private forecasts? Exports have slowed which has traders cautious.




