It's harvest time; farmers have mixed emotions

It's harvest time around the region and area farmers are surveying the season with mixed emotions.

The rainfall that the region has received has been a mixed blessing ... for some crops, the rains couldn't have come at a better time; for others, the rains came too late.

The first crops to come out of the fields have been alfalfa hay and corn silage.

The hot summer stressed the alfalfa almost to the point of being too dry, but overall, the tonnage and nutrient contents have been counted as average to good.

Corn silage harvests have been very difficult.

Silage cutting crews couldn't make it into many of the fields for what seemed like an eternity to many farmers and crew members.

"With the late season rains, it pushed our time to the very last minute to get into the fields," said Scott Johnson, owner of Scott Johnson Farm Services in Farwell. "It looked like our season was never going to start there for a while!"

The yields on corn silage have been average overall. According to Johnson, the fields that had good irrigation through the growing season have turned out better than average yields. The fields that didn't get enough water were average at best.

"The quality of the silage is good across the region, however," Johnson stated.

Corn silage is the sort of crop that timing is everything. The moisture content of the silage goes down as it dries. Dairy and beef cattle need just the right amount of moisture in the silage to gain the best nutrients and roughage values. But with silage, one or two days of not getting the corn cut is not going to hurt that much; two weeks makes a drastic difference to the values and weights. Farmers, buyers and cutters get hurt in the end when the crop can't be harvested in a timely manner.

The potato harvest was being pushed against the timing mat as well.

Derrick Haseloff said that the potatoes got hit with a double whammy this year. The combination of high heat and high winds affected the crop through the growing season and kept yields down. Then the timing of the rains was off, too.

"You've got to keep water on potatoes; they like humidity and grow really well in humid conditions," he commented. "But then when too much rain falls on them and over soaks the ground, the crop can get hurt really fast and rot in the field in a very short amount of time."

Potato yields are measured by 100 pound sacks. The area average yields have been 300 to 350 - 100 pound sacks per acre. This year, the average has been down to 280 - 100 pd. sacks.

On a more positive note, the late rains have been excellent for our area vegetable farmers.

Mary Kalbas is happy to report that the rains have helped them tremendously.

"We've got such a shortage of water out our direction and the rains we've received since the first of August boosted our yields on all crops, especially Continued on Page 7

In the scrimmage, the Steers defense managed to shut out the Roughnecks. This was made possible by some great tackling by the whole team.



The pumpkin crops that have been ready for harvest since mid-August are in good shape too, as long as the trucks and picking crews can get into the fields before they rot. However, pumpkins are a hearty gourd that can take some extended moisture before ruin sets in.

"We'd love to see more people come on out to the garden to pick and buy vegetables," said Mary Kalbas.

The Kalbas vegetable farm is located off the State Line Road, south of Farwell. Their road is clearly marked with a large sign that points the way to the garden.

Wheat and sorghum are the next crops to be harvested.

Dry land wheat farmers that received ample rains are looking forward to increased yields. And the sorghum silage that is being cut for samples and fillers for area feed lots have shown increased yields as well.

The area cotton crop has benefited from the late season rains, too. According to Derrick Haseloff, his cotton crop is looking to be one of the best crops he's had in years.

One just has to drive the highways to see the height and density of the cotton fields along the way. The plants look great and very lush. Prayers for no hail, timely soft rains and a good kill off period are being said across the state.

While the increase in yields for many crops have farmers viewing things in a more positive way, the negative that faces them is the fact that they are all facing drastic increases in production.

Increased production costs that all stem from the increase in fuel prices.

"Cotton is an especially expensive crop to grow this year because of the increased fuel prices," Haseloff commented. "All crops have been over the top to grow because of the fuel."

Another negative that the farming industry faces is the fact that, while their production costs have had to keep up with current pricing, their payments for crops have not been adjusted to current economic increases in over 50 years for some crops.

The U.S. must become more self-reliant on food products and bring costs into alignment before the outlook for farming is a totally positive one.

But our area farmers are positive about one thing and that is the fact that they are here to stay as long as they can reasonably afford to produce crops and provide a living for their families. And how blessed we are as a nation to have farming families willing to go through rough times and low prices to put food on our tables.

I saw a bumper sticker over 25 years ago that perhaps sums it up the best: "Without farmer profits, bellyaches become real!" McKenzie Bruton and Taylor Lane, 1 each.



With 6:05 to go, the Steers got the ball back. Edwards and Brett Howard ran the ball well, and Robert Williams scored from 5 yards out.




Niko Ulibarri had a big hit on the kickoff. McCurdy went 3 and out. Garrison returned the punt for a 40-yard TD.


With the mercy rule in effect, the rest of the game went quickly. In the 4th quarter, the Bobcats scored from 10







Trent Quintana had the hit of the game that could have resulted in a touchdown. On the following play, the Mustangs recovered a fumble late in the first quarter, but failed to score.


Mauricio Garcia rushed for 30 yards.



Since the May 2006 election in which the residents of Parmer County Hospital District (PCHD) showed overwhelming support in the effort to replace the existing hospital facility, we have made significant strides towards that goal. As we will do on a regular basis throughout the building process, we would like to provide an update regarding the progress of the project.


Most of the parties who will be involved in the building project have been identified and the design/planning phase of the project began in August. PCHD has retained the services of Health Facilities Group (HFG), an architectural firm, who has made two visits to PCCH for planning/design consultations with hospital board members, staff and physicians, and their next visit will be in early October.

HFG comes to us with extensive experience and expertise in the planning and design of rural hospitals, including Critical Access Hospitals such as Parmer County Community Hospital (PCCH).

The planning/design phase of the project will continue for approximately 6 to 8 months until completion of the construction documents, at which time the bonds will be issued and construction will begin. Barring any unforeseen complications, the design process and issuance of the bonds will be completed between April and June 2007. Construction will begin immediately following issuance of the bonds and take 18 to 24 months to construct the new facility.

Please watch for further updates throughout the course of the project and do not hesitate to contact me at PCCH if you have questions. Please know that we greatly appreciate the remarkable support this area has shown for PCCH.
