# 2006 cotton crop is a mixed bag

The 2006 U.S. Upland cotton crop is projected to total 21.3 million bales, down 11% from 2005 and the Texas crop is expected to "come in" at 5.7 million bales -- 2.75 million bales less than 2005, according to the National Agriculture Statistics Service. The Texas cotton crop as a whole is considered mostly fair to poor but an average yield of 651 lbs. per harvested acre is predicted.

The Northwest Plains cotton crop is a mixed bag. Local irrigated yields have been reported as high as 5.25 bales per acre while the dryland crop is practically non-existent. The average 2006 irrigated cotton yield is expected to fall short of the 1,155 lbs per acre produced in 2005.

The total 2006 Northwest Plains cotton crop will likely come in around 60,000 bales less than the 270,000 bales harvested last year. For the most part, fiber quality has been good with the exception of some low micronaire problems. The Lubbock classing office has classed 867,000 bales to date -- 47% of which had a color grade of 21 or better and averaged a 36 staple, 3.7 micronaire, and 3.3 leaf. Most percent lint turnouts have been very good.

Cotton yield in the Northwest Plains is typically limited by environmental factors. With the exception of a few areas, most irrigated cotton made it through the year with little environmental damage but much of the dryland crop never emerged. Two thousand and seventy heat units were accumulated in the 2006 cotton season (May-Continued on Page 3

This meant pixie-cut. short sheared hair that fell into the wash and wear category. I wanted the beautiful brush and mirror set to give my hair a glossy glow and to spend an hour brushing my long tresses.

What I got instead was a 39-cent black barbers comb from Woolco and two minutes to zip through what hair I might have.

So my resentment of my Nancy-doll was all based on the fact that she didn't have brushable hair.

I tried to rid myself of Nancy over and over, but to no avail. She kept making her way back into my Barbie case.

One time, I got the clever idea to have Nancy fall victim to a parachuting accident. We lived in a two-story home and my bedroom window faced the front yard and I would leave it open during hot summer days and nights. I decided to have Barbie, Ken and all their friends go skydiving for an afternoon of fun. I didn't have a real Barbie plane, but I improvised one out of a shoebox. I even made little parachute packs and used Kleenex for their parachutes.

Their plane flew all over my bedroom and as it was making its way by my window, Nancy suddenly fell out of the plane and out of my window. I snickered as I quietly whispered, "oops, she forgot her parachute!"

My plan was that Nancy would fall into the bushes that lined the flowerbeds along the front of the house and be lost in the wilds of our San Antonio suburb. What I hadn't planned on was my mother spending the morning planting flowers in the same flowerbed at the moment Nancy "took flight."

I heard something outside like a voice saving. "OWW!" I looked out my window and there stood my mom holding the back of her head with one hand and Nancy in the other looking up at my window.

She then came into the house and charged upstairs with Nancy in tow.

"Young lady, you will play with this doll and vou will not treat your toys in such a manner," she announced. She had seen through the "accident" and proceeded to take my other Barbie and Ken dolls away. I was forced to play only with Nancy for several weeks.

Nancy got pretty tough during her two weeks with me.

She survived through a Barbie-camper rollover, a ride on a runaway Dachshund while strapped to its collar (our dog would see me coming with Nancy and go hide in the closet) and she miraculously survived the sinking of the Barbie Dream Yacht. The paint got a little faded on the bright pink boat and Nancy only sustained a head full of even more matted hair.

I resigned myself to the fact that she was part of my Barbie family and that she wasn't going away. I would dress her and then assign her a task inside the Barbie clothing case. I didn't have to see much of her that way and I could truthfully tell my parents that I was "playing" with Nancy.

Years later, I wish I still had all my Barbies, Ken and that ragged, old Nancy. I had quite a collection of handmade clothes and some pretty hard to find pieces. And the irony of it all is that Nancy is the most valuable of the group.

As I overheard the little girl telling her mom all about the doll that wasn't a real Barbie and that only Barbie would do, I wanted to run to her and explain that dolls with poofy hair, weird eyes and their own clothing style are sometimes the most valuable friends of all!

And as I'm raising my own children these days, I'm making sure that they know to look past what is popular, flashy and to look for toys and especially friends that will hang tough and endure their adventures. The most valuable ones will also endure being put to the side or out of sight for a while and be willing to return to them again and again.



I have been employed here for the City of Farwell since September 2006. During this time I have had the opportunity to meet many of our good citizens. I am proud to be part of the city. Farwell is a very laid back and easy going community, the crime is at a low and I hope to keep it that way for you. If anyone has a problem, I am inviting you to meet with me at any time you wish. I have always had an open door policy to the citizens who want to express their concerns about the city.

I have had the task of investigating several offenses that have occurred in this city. During the investigations I have run into a situation where the identifying of possible suspects was set back because of not being able to track down the location of possible suspects. The setback was because of the amount of out of state license plates in this city. While I was looking in New Mexico, it turned out the suspects were living in Farwell.

Harvest totals are

The cotton gins are still in full swing around the region and the crop results are an interesting mix.

Early estimates by officials with Plains Cotton Growers had described the predicted harvest totals as "a whole new ballgame," and the grades and field totals are proving the prediction right.

The yields for the area are pretty consistent as years past but the micronaire numbers are up and down. This has some area gin managers watching with great interest as modules go through the gin.

"It's hard to say what exactly is causing the low mic numbers from some of the fields," said Darwin Robertson, manager of the Muleshoe Co-op Gin. A variety of reasons from type of cotton, soil conditions, temperatures and watering are all part of the mix.

"However, we've seen cotton some come through that had lot of water on it during the growing season that gins out with low mic numbers and cotton that received little to no water right behind it that is high grade and then vice-versa," said Robertson. "It's been pretty interesting at how there's really no explanation for the differences."

Craig Rohrbach, manager of Parmer County Cotton Growers Co-op gin explained further that the low mic numbers and grades are also reflective of how the crop was managed.

"Our yields are as good as last year and this is due to the fact that there was this vear." no hail Rohrbach commented.

When asked about the recent snowfall and if it will negatively affect the cotton grades, area managers agreed that there really wasn't enough snow to make a huge difference. "Any reductions would

most likely be due to the freeze effect and it's somewhat normal for this time of year," said Robertson.

"The seed weights will go down after a freeze or a snow, but since it wasn't a deep or lasting snow, the lint quality stays the same," said Rohrbach. "Just remember that with cotton, the brighter and whiter it is, the better cotton it will be."

Some area gins are caught up from the weather delays of last week and will be looking for more cotton or will be preparing to wind down for the season. Other gins are running around the clock and looking at a season that will extend into mid to late January.



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October) which is 212 more than the long term average.

The 2006 cotton crop had accumulated 250 more heat units by August 1 compared to the 2005 crop, but a cool August and September caused the gap to close to a mere 66 heat units by season end. This cool spell is likely responsible for the low micronaire observed in some fields; late maturing fields were particularly impacted. Most of the soil moisture was a result of irrigation. Many cotton fields in the Northwest Plains experienced extended periods of moisture stress during much of the growing season. May through July precipitation ranged from 4 to 5 inches but came in very small increments which compounded the impact of minimal precipitation. The 2006 pest pressure was light overall. Insects were responsible for a 3% reduction in overall yield in the Texas High Plains -- 1.2% cotton bollworm and 1% thrips. Thrips and cotton bollworm were also the two primary insect pests infesting the Northwest Plains cotton. The 2006 Northwest Plains cotton season is coming to a close, and with a few weeks of good weather most of the crop will be in. The cotton crop is coming in from one extreme to the other; a good irrigated crop was produced but the dry land crop was practically non-existent.



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
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

The next youth meeting will be Sunday at 7:30 p.m. All area youth are invited to attend and to enjoy the activities.



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
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# **District engineer gives update** on proposed overpass

It's time for an update on the proposed overpass between Farwell and Texico -- and nothing has changed in the past several years.

Littlefield District **Engineer Steve Perez** reports the same -- Texas has allocated funds for an overpass and New Mexico hasn't.

It appears that until Clovis area residents and businesses complain about the increased railroad traffic, nothing will change.

Currently, about 123 trains a day go through the Texico-Farwell intersection. Once the Burlington Northern Santa Fe Railroad reaches its goal of three complete track lines (which is coming soon), there will be about 150 trains a day going through.

of four minutes per train through the crossing (which has a maximum speed limit of 35 miles per hour), it means the crossing would be closed 600 minutes a day -- 10 hours.

Texas could build a bypass around Farwell but Farwell officials oppose this, said Perez.

Perez also reported on the surveying crew he has had in this area. They have surveyed from the New Mexico line to the Parmer-Bailey county line.

The Lubbock highway is getting rough in parts and with increased dairy traffic, it's putting more stress on the road, said Perez. Thus, road repairs may be needed down the road.





FEEDER CATTLE: Prices really need to take one more shot at the lows, but the market has done a good job fighting the threat of lower prices. Corn has been the determining factor pushing feeder prices up and down, but corn should also be close to finding a stopping point? Look for some confirmation of a bottom within the next couple of weeks.

CORN: The market seems to be struggling to reach ome targets between \$3.96-4.10 basis the March contract. If prices can reach these levels at some point over the next couple weeks, then a sideways type correction should follow. Expect market to chop around during December until we move into the new year. Then expect to see significantly higher prices after into the New Year.

SOYBEANS: The market showed some weakness going nto the end of this week, but have held short term support thus far. A close below \$6.76 basis the January contract would probably place some pressure on the market Similar to corn, beans should be looking for a short term top to come at anytime? Higher prices are expected after the first of the year!

WHEAT: This market turned in a surprise this week as the July KC contract was able to move above the \$5 mark which has held prices the entire year. The nearby March contract has year to even test contract highs, but the news of dry weather across much of the winter wheat growing areas was enough to get the market moving. Wheat prices will probably hand with corn and beans.

**COTTON: Since rebounding after making new contract** lows just a couple of weeks ago, the market is beginning to realize that competition for acres this spring could leave cotton in the dark if prices don't begin to show some signs of improvement?  $\hat{A}$  close above \$54.50 basis the March contract would begin to turn long term trends back up.

### The value of education

I believe in education. I believe the public school system has been a major building block in our nation's success.

I support any programs that advance the cause of our young people's success in school, whether it is through academics or sports.

The path to success in our country is through education. A high school diploma should be a minimum requirement. Some type of advanced training, whether it is in a university or a technical school, is almost a virtual must.

Alas, too many young people drop out of high school without even a degree. And too many others settle for just a degree, then seek a labor job without any possibility of advancement.

Why is that?

When we look at our area, we recognize that some of our folks are new to this country. It always takes awhile to assimilate. Over our 200 years as a nation, we have seen wave upon wave of immigration take place.

But what each wave of immigrants recognized was this: the value of education. A given.

Then what are we to make of it when it seems

some of our area parents don't put that premium on education. The fact is that some kids are told by their parents something like "stay in school because it's the law, then get a job..."

While there's nothing wrong with that, and our area businesses are good ones to work for, I believe these kids are being shortchanged. I believe they can set larger goals. As a high school English teacher once told me, "Aim high, and you will hit high."

So the question is: how do we motivate some kids who seemingly lack any motivation of doing just that?

I know that our area school officials and staff work exceedingly hard to build motivation. But it's something that needs to

be supported at home, too. And from what I am told. that is not always the case. So here is what I pro-

pose. Something innovative.

What I propose is that school officials throughout Texas band together and present the state education agency with a plan for an innovative project at reaching those parents who it appears are not helping motivate their children to excel in school.

This would require bilingual (English and Spanish) personnel who would make home visits as the main focus of their job. They would work with parents on better motivating their children to do well in school, with the aim of further education beyond high school.

I don't see these folks (they wouldn't have to be certified teaching personnel) teaching school classes. I see them working one-on-one with families in need. The "working day" for these personnel would start at 4 p.m.

Yes, I know some folks would object to persons knocking on their doors in the late afternoon or early evening. But a lot wouldn't.

It's difficult when you are new to a nation and may not be able to speak its language. There is a tendency to shy away from the school setting.

if Mohammed won't come to the mountain, then the mountain needs to go to Mohammed.

Texas has a huge dropout problem. The way school officials are attacking it seems to be the same ol', same ol.' It's not working well.

So what I suggest is that the state education officials try something innovative. I realize we are dealing with a bureaucracy and those folks will fight tooth and nail to do anything different.

But surely there is someone who has the guts to try and make a difference. Let's start here, in Parmer County.

I suggest that the school officials from Farwell, Bovina Friona. and Lazbuddie put their heads together and come up with a plan along the lines of what I have written, and push it. At the least, seek a state grant for it to be tried; if any success is shown, then it can be adopted elsewhere.

I think such a plan would make a whole lot

better use of state money than for some of the programs the state spends money on.

And, if it were to be a success, think of the benefit it would be for many of our young people.

Т know that the Lazbuddie robotics team didn't come back with any trophies from last week's national -- state meet, but they shouldn't feel badly.

They did superbly at the area contest which allowed them to advance to the big meet at Lubbock and the competition at the big meet is severe.

For a small school, Lazbuddie stands tall.

Their track record in this competition over the past several years has been extraordinary. This is the type of academic endeavor that is great for our young people.
