Steers kill Sudan

The Farwell Steers hiked their record to 5-3 last Friday at home by knocking off the Sudan Hornets, 25-13.

It was a big win for Farwell considering that, due to injuries, only two seniors suited up for the game. The JV players were brought up and several got into the game.

The win kept Farwell's chances at getting a state play-off berth alive before this week's big game against Bovina.

Sudan opened the game at its 28. They were held and punted to the Farwell 32. Ramon Quezada ran for 12. Johnathan Edwards had runs of 9 and 16 but the drive stalled to penalties.

Penalties were heavy throughout the game with Farwell racking up 106 yards in penalties and Sudan 92.

Sudan got the ball at its 13. Logan Carpenter and Danny Brown had good plays and Sudan punted to midfield.

The 2nd quarter opened with Farwell moving the ball behind Alex Olmos and Edwards. A Roper Ledbetter 8-yard pass to Brett Howard, plus a penalty, put the ball on the Sudan 24. Howard ran for 13, and Edwards scored from the 1 at 1:47. The Edwards kick made it 7-0.

The kick returner was tackled by Mason Howard. Ledbetter had a TD-saving tackle. But Sudan ripped off two big plays, then scored from the 2 with 33 seconds to make the score 7-all.

Brett Howard caught a 30-yard pass one-handed as the half ended.

Brown opened the 2nd half with an excellent kick return to midfield. Ledbetter and Brown has runs for 5, and Howard for 8, before Olmos scored from 30 yards out at 9:41 as Farwell took a 13-7 lead.

On defense, Ledbetter, Quezada and Nathan Cuevas had good tackles and Sudan was stopped at the Farwell 3. Farwell punted to midfield, as Bo Mitchell tackled the punt returner.

Ledbetter intercepted at the Farwell 30. Olmos then broke away for an apparent 61-yard TD called back due to penalty. Sudan intercepted. Then Quezada recovered a fumble and had a great runback to the Farwell 37.

On 4th and 2, Ledbetter passed long to Ross McClaran for a 28-yard gain. Howard scored from the 2 around end at 4:46 for a 19-7 lead.

Sudan had an 80-yard kick return to make it 19-13.

Farwell got the ball back at its 23. Quezada ran for 27. Then Howard gained 12, then 30 more for a TD on two outstanding cutback runs.

Ledbetter intercepted at midfield as the game wound own.

Your cooperative has always strived to provide power for its members and will continue to do so. With that in mind, the board of directors at Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative has decided that we will no longer take wells with 150 horsepower or greater. Temporarily, we will no longer take irrigation conversions, and the reason for this decision has more to do with capacity than anything else. Our system is being pushed to the limit, and we have to temporarily curtail indiscriminate load growth in order to maintain system reliability.

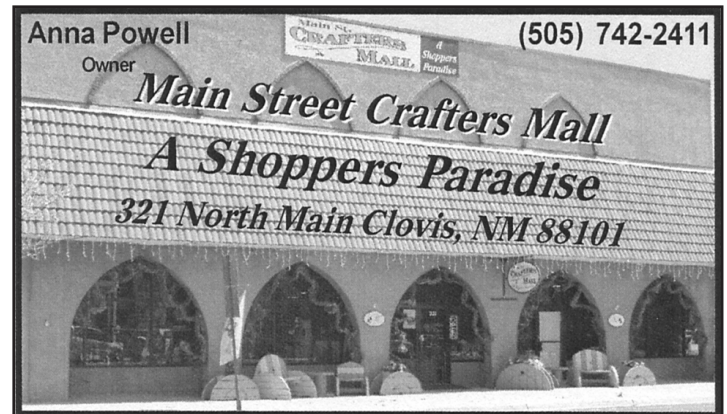
Red Raiders plan raffle

Farwell had never won 1st place in a CX Debate at a TFA Tournament -- until now.

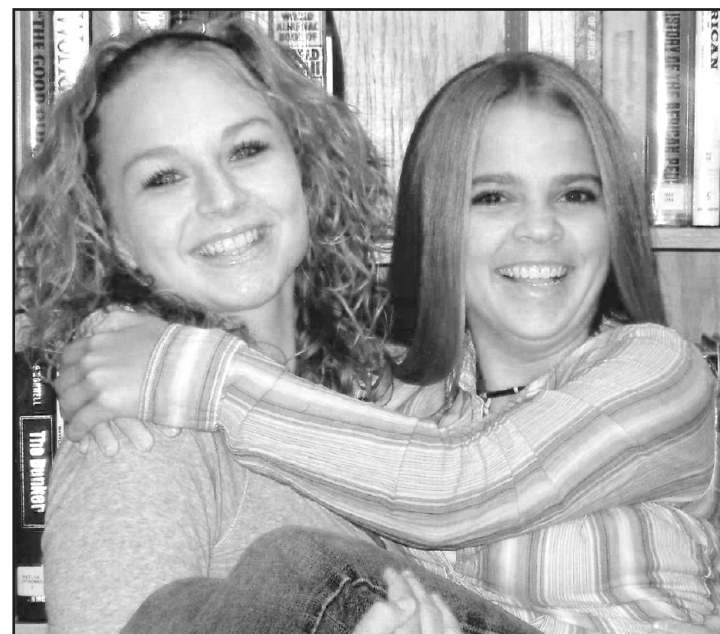

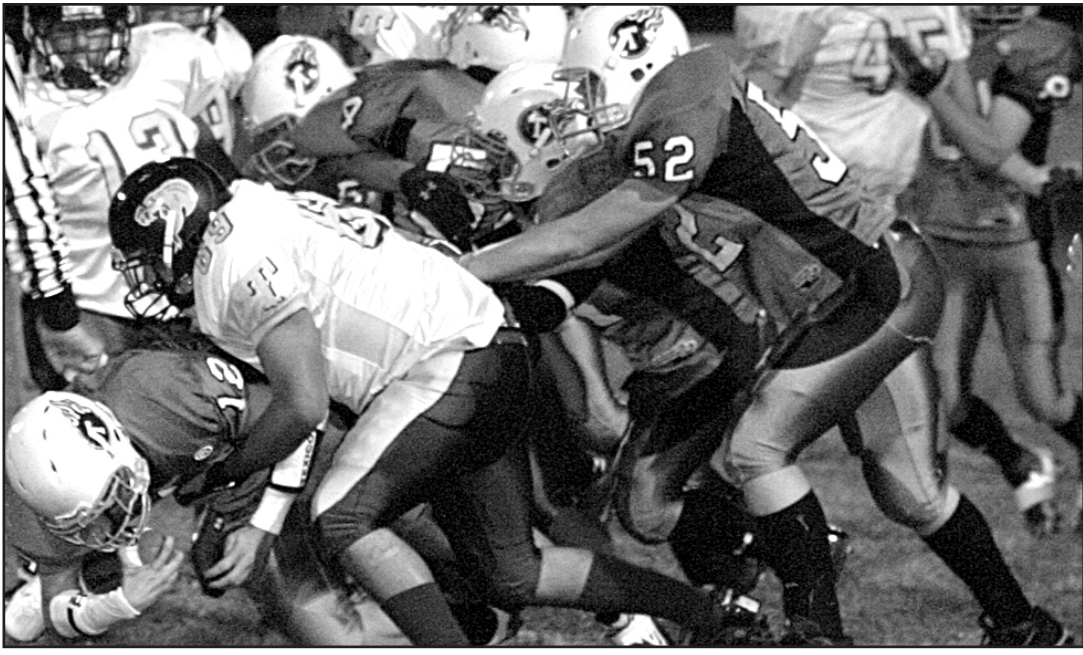

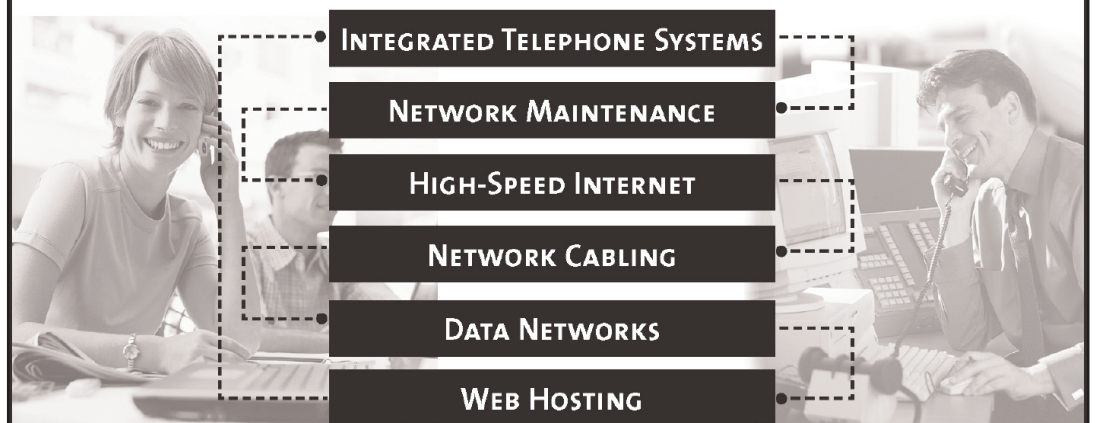

Reasonable Notice of Open Meeting Law

The Texico City Council met in a regular session on October 11, 2005, and decided that reasonable notice to the public as required in Open Meetings Act (NMSA 1978, Section 10-15-1 to 4) would be as follows:

Unless the business before the City Council dictates otherwise, the City Council conducts open meetings to take formal action on the second and fourth Tuesdays of each month at 6:30 p.m. However, when that Tuesday is a City holiday, that meeting will be held on the next business day.

The City Clerk and staff were authorized and directed to publish an annual schedule of regular meetings as legal advertisement in State Line Tribune.

Emergency meetings will be called only under circumstances, which demand immediate action to protect the health, safety and property of citizens or to protect the public body from substantial financial loss. The City of Texico Council will avoid emergency meetings whenever possible. Emergency meetings may be called by the Mayor or a majority of the members upon four (4) hours notice, unless threat of personal injury or property damage requires less notice. The notice for all emergency meetings shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how the public may obtain a copy of the agenda.

The Mayor or majority of the council members upon three (3) days notice may call special meetings. The notices shall include an agenda for the meeting or information on how members of the public may obtain a copy of the agenda. The agenda shall be available to the public at least twenty-four hours before any special meeting.

All other meetings which may be called for informational purposes at which no action is taken shall be held only after written notice is issued to the State Line Tribune no later than 12:00 noon of the day of such meeting, of four (4) hours before such meeting, whichever is greater.


Park may qualify as historical site

As has been reported, the Bovina park on the Amarillo highway, just west of town, is in question, since the state highway department plans to close it.

The property is owned by Cargill Cattle Feeders. Bovina City Manager Ernest Terry reports that the state has given the city until Dec. 1 to come up with an agreement with Cargill to operate it or the land will be leveled.

The city council will be working on this. But there's another twist in this story: the park has a monument that may qualify it for the Texas Historical grouping.


If so, that means the state cannot level the park until this is decided by the state Historical Commission, which could take up to three years.

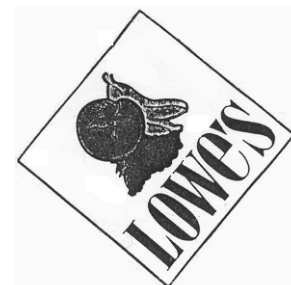
