Dairy heifers must be validated prior to Nov. 1, 2006, and must be bred to be eligible to show. General show rules apply.

Lambs will have 4 classes -- fine wool, fine wool crossbreed, medium wool and southdowns. Lambs must weigh 80 lbs. to show and have been shorn within 21 days of the show. Ewe lambs may be shown.

Goats -- only wether or doe goats are eligible to show. They must weigh between 60 and 115 lbs., with a 3-lb. tolerance allowed. Goats must have their milk teeth in place; any goat having lost one or both milk teeth will be disqualified. Horns must be tipped.

Exhibitors will be allowed to use halters or collars in the show ring.

Steers will have three classes -- crosses, American, and British breeds. Steers must weigh at least 900 lbs.

At the sale:

-- Animals must be present to be eligible for the sale.

- -- 140 head will be sold, with equal percentage of each species.
- -- One and one-half percent of the selling price of all animals will be retained by the stock show board for repair and improvement of stock show facilities.
 - -- Premium on animals will be by the head.
- -- Sale order will be: dairy, goat, barrow, lamb, steers. Grands of each species will sell in the same order.

The community has suffered a loss with the death of an area pioneer lady, Mae Stone.

Mae and A.D. McDonald were named 1992 Pioneers of the Year at Border Town Days.

The following story ran in the Tribune at that special time:

Mae moved to Texico with her family in the 1920s from North Central Texas. She attended school in Bovina and Farwell, and in the 1930s married and moved to the Texico area.

Mae picked cotton, worked in the food service business, ran a mom and pop grocery store, and gave countless hours of volunteer work.

She was an active member of the Farwell Church of Christ. She enjoyed singing in church, attending church socials, and visiting shut-ins.

In the letter nominating her for the Pioneer of the Year honor, the writer said, "Mae visits the sick, never empty handed. She always has some kind of homemade gift or food with her. You can find Mae daily walking and picking up trash, doing her share to help keep Texico looking good."

Mae aided in the cleanup of the Texico Cemetery at that time, and served on the Cemetery Association board. She was a member of the Texico Beautification Committee, often watering the flowers in the planter boxes along the highway.

Whenever there was a Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet, you would be sure to see her there with her sleeves rolled up and ready to tackle the task at hand.

She was named Texico Chamber of Commerce's Woman of the Year, then later Workhorse of the Year.

Mae will be missed by our community.

Prediction: The Dallas Cowboys may win their first playoff game but I doubt they have the defense to go any further than that.







In January, the City accepted the resignation of the City Engineer over a disagreement on the Environmental Impact Study for the new Waste Water Treatment Plant. The City received another clear audit for fiscal year 2005. Atmos, also, appealed the City's dismissal of the **GRIP** (request for increased rates).

In February, the City started gearing up for the 2006 election. This would include a reauthorization of the one-quarter percent sales tax for street maintenance. The City also established a working relationship with OJD Engineering to replace Oller Engineering.

In March, the City authorized offering health benefits to City employees who retire. The Police Department presented the Racial Profiling Report to the Council, and everything was normal. The City began discussions on obtaining a solid waste trash truck through a grant from Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. The City Manager was authorized to proceed on this action.

In July, the Council presented a balance budget for public review, voted to close public parks from 11 p.m. to 6 a.m., and started the paperwork on a \$250,000 grant from ORCA.

In August, the Council passed a balanced budget and looked at options for the fiscal year 2007 tax levy. The Council also sold the 5 ton Army dump truck and purchased a Firefighting Skid Unit.

In September, the Council passed the same tax levy as last year (\$0.58).

In October, the Notice of Receipt of an Application to obtain a Water Quality Permit was received by TCEQ. Two new positions were authorized by the budget that started on Oct. 1: a part-time EMS Director (Larry Mitchell was hired) and a maintenance worker for the new sewer (to be hired at a later date).

In November, an agreement between Cargill, TxDOT, and the City was passed to keep open and maintain the roadside park west of town.

In December, another "clean" audit was presented to the City by Chris Leonard of McGinty and Associates. This audit included all of the City's funds and the Bovina Housing Authority. A summary of the WWTP was presented to include an Archaeology survey of the property to make sure that there were no ancient artifacts on or in the ground, a Geology survey that stated that the test well that we dug was not where we dug it (latitudes/longitudes were corrected), and an Agronomist survey to establish whether or not the CRP grass was sufficient to metabolize the chemicals in the effluent applied. It is apparent the once this WWTP construction finally starts, it will be the most studied WWTP in the history of Parmer County.

Note: the rate increase requested by Atmos has been delayed almost two years, and the rate increase requested by SPS also continues in suspension.

All in all, 2006 was a productive and guiet year.

Children will be contacted by their coaches. All games are played in Bovina.


