When I asked Flo Davis who her favorite author is, she quickly answered, "Pearl Buck."



This past fall, Flo was able to travel to the land of these stories and to learn even more about the people that have held her fascination for so long.





Franscisco.

Their tour was Nov. 3 – 14, 2006 and the first stop, after crossing the International Dateline, was the city of Beijing. This city will host the upcoming 2008 Summer Olympics and preparations are being made city-wide for

"Beijing has a very relaxed pace and still holds a quaint, homey atmosphere," said Flo. "The northern parts of China are still very traditional and the countryside is beautiful."

It was interesting to Flo to see the ancient neighborhoods of Beijing being mixed in with the new developments that are being built for the Olympics. However, while many parts of Beijing are being drastically improved, several of these ancient neighborhoods that have defined Beijing's history for centuries are being torn down and replaced by the Chinese government without regard to the occupants and businesses.

Flo was glad to have visited the historic Hutong section of Beijing so that she could see the one ancient neighborhood that is being protected. "It is protected by the Beijing Cultural Relics Protection Association," she explained. "It was interesting to see what this city was like before the advent of high rise buildings and and shopping malls took over!"

The atmosphere in this neighborhood is very relaxed with traditional shops, food vendors and businesses that cater to the residents rather than just tourists. The alleys and streets in this section are extremely narrow and go off in many different directions. Their tour group was even able to visit a home in the Hutong neighborhood and to see how a somewhat traditional family lives their lives.

"It was fascinating to me to learn that the Chinese government took over every home they could during a part of their regime, but has now begun to give back homes that belonged to families for many centuries. The home we visited was one such home," she explained. "The Chinese are very simple in their decorating and are not allowed to have a lot of pictures on their walls. The influence and adoration of Mao Tse Tung is still very prevalent too, especially among the older Chinese."

Beijing is home to the "Forbidden City" that housed the great Emperors of China and their concubines in a place of amazing architecture and opulence. The group also toured the Summer Palace on Kunming Lake and saw the extravagant works of art that the Imperial rulers commissioned throughout the ages. The group was taken to the entrance of Tiananmen Square, but they could not walk through the great square because the Beijing-African Conference was being held. It was being heavily guarded and tourists were not allowed very close at all.

Outside of Beijing, Flo was able to tour the Great Wall of China and the Temple of Heaven. This is where Chinese rulers historically worshipped the Emperor of

"It was sort of amazing to me, but I had learned that the Chinese do acknowledge a higher power. While the teachings of Christianity are just now breaking into the country, many Chinese are very understanding of our western belief in God, and many are anxious to learn more. However, the Bible cannot be taught to anyone under the age of 18," Flo commented.

The tour then took the group to Ji'nan and Mount Tai. Ji'Nan saw the group greeted with a very colorful and extremely talented drum and cymbal band outside of their hotel. Inside, another concert was given by a group of musicians using all traditional and ancient Chinese flutes, woodwinds and other instruments.

"They played 'Jingle Bells,' 'My Old Kentucky Home,' and 'Oh, Susannah' for us!" Flo said. "That was a real treat among the other beautiful Chinese songs they played." Further along at Mount Tai, the group stayed in a large hotel. The entire group and other tourists were housed on the bottom through 5th floors. The 6th floor was reserved for the night for a group of 4-Star Generals of the Chinese Army and it was heavily guarded.

"The beds in our rooms were extremely low to the ground and when we laid on them, it seemed that they were only mattresses, with no box springs. We all discussed this the next morning and we pretty much figured that the box springs had been taken out of our beds for all the generals to use!" Flo recalled with a laugh.

They then traveled the town of Qufu, the home place

of Confucius, the great Chinese philosopher who lived 2,000 years ago.

"This was a beautiful setting and fascinating to see how the philosophy and teachings of Confucius are still so prominent in Chinese society today," Flo said.

This was also the place that Flo really began to notice something interesting about the air over China.

"Everywhere we went, it seemed hazy and sort of foggy. I thought that in the cities it was just due to their horrible pollution problem. But this haze just sits over the entire country," Flo explained.

According to their tour guide, China has no regulations on emissions, pollutants and such. These problems added to the mixture in elevations, sea winds and large populations make it a permanent feature to the landscape.

The landscape took on the look of a more westernized civilization upon their arrival in Shanghai. The city is huge and is divided by a large river promenade called "The Bund." On one side is the older side of Shanghai and on the other is the major metropolis. The metropolis is accented with high rise buildings, unique and extreme architecture. This part also comes alive with glowing and flashing fiber optic light displays across the cityscape at night.

"It was something to see with all those lights and how incredible the buildings are built," said Flo. "But it was almost too modern for me. I think this city is trying too hard to be like Las Vegas, with shows, hotels and casinos ... but I'm one that prefers the slower pace and traditional feel of Northern China."

Shanghai was also the place that had the most shopping available – for all types of Chinese, western and European goods. The large stores are all government owned and the small, "mom and pop" type stores are privately owned. The small stores were mostly food stores and food vendors.

"The citizens buy their food fresh everyday from the stores and street markets. It was so interesting to see the different varieties of vegetables, meats, fish and other food products they use. Their produce is beautiful and so fresh," she recalled.

One thing that Flo just couldn't get over seeing in the food markets were the "other food products" that the Chinese consider delicacies. They eat dog and donkey meat, beetles, scorpions, roaches and larvae of many types.

"I have a picture or two of these things if you don't believe it!" Flo laughed. "According to our guide, the Chinese live by the philosophy that any creature that

crawls, swims, flies or has its back to the heavens is edible and fair game."

This style of eating is prevalent all over China in both large cities and the smallest of country villages. Flo did eat many traditional Chinese meals throughout the tour, but she stuck mostly to the dishes that had lots of vegetables and recognizable meats!

A side trip from Shanghai was to Suzhou. This city is called the "Venice of the Orient" and has many lush gardens, ponds and crisscrossing canals. The group toured the government owned silk spinning factory here and saw how silk is processed from the silkworm all the way through to the finished textile.

The government also owns large Jade and Pearl factories in this area as well. The Chinese government is a very dominant force throughout the country although it is currently not the repressive government entity that it was in the past.

They do still mandate that only one child can be born to a couple that lives in the cities. Couples that live in the small rural villages are allowed to have two children to help with farming operations. Girls are not favored and many thousands of newborn girls are left abandoned and unclaimed after birth or are aborted after being discovered through ultrasounds.

"This tour was very good to show the highlights of these parts of China, but it was also very good to give us a glimpse of the things that aren't so great about the country," Flo reflected.

Flo was able to talk with many of the Chinese that they encountered throughout the tour about various aspects of life in China and their views of America and western civilization.

"One thing that was told to us was that the Chinese think that Americans are very frivolous and spend money foolishly," she stated. "While I do agree with this view, I also found it interesting at how much they are working at building up their tourism and attractions for the Olympics and beyond to attract Americans to China. Sort of hypocritical of them, but they do exist off of far less money than we do and most live very simply."

The simplicity of the life and countryside is what Flo enjoyed the most about Northern China. This is the area that Flo would most like to travel back to someday to explore other towns and villages.

"This was a wonderful trip and experiencing it with my brother, sister-in-law and dear friend made for such a memorable time," Flo explained. "I look forward to more trips with them and to going back to China again someday soon."

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
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



Lazbuddie -- The varsity boys host Happy on Feb. 9 to end their season. The Lady Longhorns will be in the state playoffs.






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LIVE CATTLE: The market made a sharp jump to the ipside today after almost 10 days of choppy trading. We have expected a top in the market to come at some point during the last week of January or early February since back in December. Although the spread between cash and February narrowed on Friday, cash beef remains sharply lower and movement is also very weak.

FEEDER CATTLE: The movement in prices seems to be tied closer to Live Cattle prices more than corn for the time being. The market is still in an up correction and long term trends still remain lower. Corn prices still looked poised to move higher and are expected to pressure feeder prices at some point as we move closer to Planting Intentions which will be released in late March.

CORN: The market has check the mid \$3.90 range several times over the last few days and has been able to hold up to this point. The market has traded down about 12 days off their last major high and the market should be very close to a turning point. Technically, a close above \$4.10 basis the March contract should indicate another eg up to re-test contract highs.

SOYBEANS: Have become the leader over the last week while making new contract highs on Friday. As strange as markets have been and are likely to remain, it has made little sense to see the strength in soybeans as south American harvest begins and it is expected to be the largest bean crop ever recorded? Either way, trends all remain higher.

WHEAT:Prices have remained flat over the last few weeks waiting for some breaking news to give the market some renewed direction? For the time being, wheat prices continue to take their direction from the rest of the grain complex. As you can tell, the market is beginning to loose some steam on each move back up. Prices are beginning to look a little "top heavy"?

COTTON: This market continues to struggle to move in any direction. Prices have yet to take out the High or Low made on January 12th, the day of the last USDA Crop Production report. Export news remains weak and ending stocks seem to rise a little every week? The market just looks stuck at this time. A close below \$52.50 basis he March contract would turn trends back down.

Area wheat

set up to "take off" when temperatures warm up.

Wheat is currently and attractive crop due to higher market prices and good soil moisture conditions.

If adequate nitrogen fertilizer has not previously been applied, now is the time.

Ideally nitrogen should be applied two weeks prior to wheat jointing.

This will hopefully improve the chances of the nitrogen to move into the soil where the roots can pick it up when the wheat begins its rapid growth during the joint-

This is also just prior to when the wheat plant will begin to form the wheat head and the potential number of kernels per head is determined.

A rule of thumb for determining wheat nitrogen need is 1.5 to 2.0 lbs of available nitrogen per bushel of expected yield.

For example, a 35 bushel wheat crop that has not been grazed, will require 52.5 pounds of nitrogen for the entire growing season. A soil nitrogen test is suggested to establish the cur-

rent nitrogen level in the soil. In the absence of a soil test, dryland wheat exhibiting nitrogen deficiency symptoms in the late winter or early

spring should be fertilized with 30 to 40 lbs of nitrogen. Likewise irrigated wheat fields should be fertilized with 60 lbs of nitrogen with additional nitrogen applied in the irrigation water as needed, depending on the yield
